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

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# AGEING GRACEFULLY - BASIL SPRINGER COLUMN



# Bill Proposes Reducing Drivers' Alcohol Limit

With Cabinet's approval, Government is proposing to reduce Cayman Islands' lenient admissible blood alcohol limit for drivers from 0.1% to 0.07%, to enhance deterrence against driving under the influence.

The PACT Government has gazetted the Traffic (Amendment) Bill, 2022 today to ensure that the proposed legislation gets the prescribed minimum of 28 days' dissemination before being considered by parliamentarians in the next meeting of Parliament this year.

The proposed bill decreases the admissible limits of alcohol in blood, urine or breath during breathalysing but leaves untouched current prescribed penalties and punishments for those who are convicted for contravening the current law. It also does not impact cases prior to the possible amendments to the Traffic Act (2021 Revision) if MPs pass the bill in Parliament.

The Cayman Islands' current maximum limit of 0.1% is among the most lenient

thresholds in the world before one can be charged for driving under the influence. The new proposed limit of 70 milligrammes of alcohol in one hundred milliliters of blood will put the Cayman Islands ahead of the UK, the US, Canada and Jamaica where the legal threshold is 0.08%. In contrast, Ireland, Germany and France have the limit at 0.05% while the Scandinavian countries of Norway and Sweden have some of the lowest levels in the world at 0.02%.

In Parliament last November while dealing with the Islands' budget, Premier Hon. G. Wayne Panton, JP, MP, indicated Government's aim to lower the driving alcohol limit to address unacceptably high road safety issues on Cayman Islands' roads, including fatalities. One of the solutions would be to lower the legal blood alcohol limit for drivers, he emphasised.

The bill now introduced also heeds public discussions about improving the safety of Cayman Islands' roads. The current high-

er limit of 0.1% puts the onus directly on drivers, family and friends to ensure drivers do not drink and drive. However, an increasing number of road fatalities this year-- already at 12 so far -- underscores that drivers are disregarding alcohol's possible effects on driving.

Premier, Hon. G. Wayne Panton noted: "The PACT Government said that we were committed to tackling the alarmingly high level of road safety issues throughout our Islands. As a society, we have become too tolerant of drunk driving and too many lives have been lost. The proposed limit brings us more in line with the modern world and we will continue to implement measures to encourage more personal responsibility. In fact, there is a Traffic Act Review Committee already established, whose work will likely lead to further amendments to the Act in due time. These may include further strengthening of the provisions around driving under the influence."

All Government high schools, including CIFEC, are scheduled to reopen for all students on Tuesday, 30 August.

Year 12 students enrolled at CIFEC, including those who have not yet been notified of their status, are required to report to the institution for registration, consultation and guidance based on the first letter of their surname on 25 and 26 August, as per the schedule outlined below.

Orientation Day provides new students and their parents with essential information for successful integration into the new learning environment.

Parents are required to accompany their children to Orientation Day, which is mandatory for any student entering a government school for the first time.

On Sunday 14 August 2022 at Cayman International School, the 3<sup>rd</sup> Cohort of the Cayman Islands Regiment held their Passing Out Parade. It was a proud mo-

ment, not only for all the new recruits but for all the family, the mothers and fathers and brothers and sisters who had come to see Cayman's finest on their best day. The cohort was led by Major Shoreland Ball of the Royal Dragoon Guards,

as they marched into the hall. The parade was attended by His Excellency the Governor, Martyn Roper, and Hon. Sabrina Turner MP, Minister of Home Affairs, and the Hon. Franz Manderson, Deputy Governor.

Mr. Roper Said, "After today's passing out the regiment will consist of 107 men and women nine of whom have attended the Royal Military Academy at Sandhurst. On both occasions when Cayman Islands officers attended Sandhurst, a Caymanian was awarded Best International Cadet. The regiment should be extremely proud of that achievement. In this Cohort there are 14 Caymanians and the regiment is over 65% Caymanian, It's excellent that so many young Caymanians see the value in serving their country in this way.

"Similarly the regiment needs diversity to ensure it benefits from all the talents and skills that we have on our islands. So it is very welcome that we have permanent residents and British Citizens as part of this recruitment. The regiment is a great opportunity for people to learn new skills, receive high quality training and discipline. It also allows private sector companies and public institutions to benefit from the skills they bring back to the workplace.

"The new recruits before us have just been through a very rigorous training process, delivered by a short-term training team from the British Army. Our recruits will have benefitted greatly from the fifteen days they have had in train-

ing by this team. The training was an intense course that included an introduction to a wide range of skills needed for post-disaster response. Including first aid, casualty evacuation, navigation, communications, as well as important lessons on the values and standards of the regiment. Five marines from the Turks & Caicos Islands also joined them, to receive advanced training. This was a great opportunity for the regiment to work with our regional partners and to get to know them better.

Mr. Roper Continued: "Disaster preparedness and response is key to the work of the regiment, and is its primary purpose. The regiment has already been tested, and has proved its worth. They've rescued people from flooded homes after thunderstorms, distributed food aid to families in need while undergoing Covid quarantine, and cleared storm debris and done so much more. Our regiment can prepare drinking water from seawater, can prepare food for hundreds, and set themselves up in a self-sufficient camp with their own energy. Cayman is better-placed to respond to natural disasters thanks to the dedication of this troop, who in turn are learning many valuable, transferable skills. This regiment is a major asset to this jurisdiction and I am proud of the extraordinary progress they have made."

After the parade was dismissed, the Governor joined Sabrina Turner in cutting the regimental cake, each with a regimental sword.

# Prospects for the Cayman Economy

*“The one-handed economist and the finance minister”*

“Give me a one-handed economist!” demanded President Harry S. Truman.

President Truman was frustrated with economic advisors giving him economic forecasts but then hedging by saying, “on the other hand...”

The government, suggested The President, would get more valuable forecasts if they employed one-handed economists.

This anecdote is humorous, but with the serious point that economic forecasting can be notoriously difficult.

However, there are some clear economic trends that we can all see coming. We can also identify some significant threats that we must be ready to deal with, including the twin threats of record-high inflation and the fear of a looming recession.

To start, we know that we are facing the highest price increases in over 40 years! Crippling inflation is being felt in all sec-

tors of our economy, impacting families and businesses. Worryingly, the indications are that this record level of inflation will persist for some time and has been made worse by world events.

Global manufacturing supply chains are still struggling to recover from the pan-

demic. The Russia/Ukraine war is creating even more disruption. And fuel prices are high and volatile. All of this has created a cost-of-living crisis.

What does this mean:

- The latest government data shows that in the first quarter of 2022, Cayman’s inflation rose at a frightening 11.2% and will continue to rise.

- The main inflation drivers are the skyrocketing housing, utilities, and fuel costs, which rose at a combined rate of over 20%.

- In April, the OECD put the global inflation level at 9.2%.

- In the United States, inflation hit 9.1% in June, the highest level since November 1981. It is expected to remain high for 2022 and into 2023.

In June, I reminded the Parliament that much of the inflation we experience here in Cayman is imported. We are at the mercy of global trends, and the ability of local government to bring prices under control

is limited. Nonetheless, the government must do everything possible to help ease the burden on the people.

And the government certainly has options to give some relief to families and businesses who are now struggling and will struggle more over this year and the next. Options that I have written to the Premier about and have shared publicly.

I will explore the cost-of-living crisis and our suggested responses to it in more detail in the second article in this series. However, ahead of that, you can get an idea of my thoughts by watching the following video:

In the United States, interest rates increased by 0.75% on 16 June. A similar interest rate was again done on 27 July, and the Federal Reserve, which sets U.S. interest rates, have indicated that further rate increases are likely by the end of 2022. At home, as we know, Cayman's banks follow these rate changes, so interest rates here are also rising.

The problem is that these interest rate increases are happening after most major economies have already begun to show signs of slowing down. The likelihood is that higher interest rates will further slow already slowing economies. There are real-world consequences, and we are seeing them play out, with retail sales in the United States falling 0.3% in May 2022. That is just the beginning.

The combined impact of all of this is that economic growth rates are now predicted to be much lower than previously thought. The OECD's growth forecast for the USA in 2022 was downgraded in June to 2.5% from the 3.7% predicted in Dec 2021. The IMF also cut growth forecasts for 2022 and 2023, with an expected economic worsening in 2024.

These forecasts of lower growth over the next two-plus years are fuelling fears that the United States, and other developed economies, will face a recession. Indeed, some economists are suggesting that the United States is already in a recession.

The S&P 500 US stock index fell by 20.6% in the first half of 2022 in response to those fears of recession.

Consumer confidence in the United States is declining and fell to a 16-month low in June 2022.

These factors further impact consumer spending, especially discretionary spending for travel, affecting our tourism market. This puts even more pressure on families and businesses as we work to restore our economy and rebuild our tourism sector. In summary, our people, businesses and government will likely face some very challenging times.

In his budget presentation last November, the Minister for Finance had forecast 5% growth for Cayman for 2022, and 3.2% over 2023-2025. A reasonable forecast, if only we were in reasonable times.

In presenting the Oppositions budget response back in November, I asked the finance minister about the risk of inflation:

*"how will the government manage risk and uncertainty in public finances as we continue through these troubled times? It is not just COVID that presents a significant risk to these Islands."*

*Only a couple of weeks ago, the United States reported that inflation had hit 6.2%, its highest rate since 1990. We all know that inflation in the US will mean inflation in Cayman. We see that already in the prices at the gas pumps, utility bills, and grocery stores.*

*Businesses will see it as the prices of materials rise. Government will see its own costs rise significantly and if its forecasts are fixed by a two-year budget that has not addressed the issue, it will find financial challenges ahead.*

*Inflation often hits the poorest and most vulnerable in our society hardest, Mr Speaker. As costs rise due to inflation, so must government support for our people"*

That was my warning to the Government on November 29th last year.

The Finance Minister's growth forecasts are now shown to be 'very ambitious' considering what is happening in the global economy.

There are steps that the government should take to help support our future economic growth. To start, the government must recognise that they have got things wrong and act now to avoid looming troubles and protect our Islands and people from undue economic despair.

In the third article in this series, the Deputy Leader of the Opposition, MP Joey Hew, will outline the steps we believe the government must take to navigate a possible recession and steer Cayman towards future sustainable levels of economic growth.

Sustainable levels of growth that will create future jobs and opportunities for our young people. However, for young people to take up these opportunities and achieve their full potential, we need to continue, and accelerate, the improvements underway in Cayman's education system.

One of the significant areas of agreement between the Progressives Opposition and the PACT Government was regarding education policy. From early in the very formation of his Government, Premier Panton made clear he would continue the education policies set by the previous Progressives-led Administration. He even maintained the previous Education Minister in the post to ensure continuity.

The reason for the Premier's expediency was clear: The reforms driven forward by the last two Progressives-led administrations are working. The government's independent Office of Education Standards has reported that Cayman's schools are improving. The results achieved by Caymanian students are getting

better. The Premier also acknowledged this in a statement to Parliament.

We need to continue that momentum of improvement, not change tack and disrupt a system currently moving in the right direction.

However, the Progressives believe that more must be done to accelerate the rate at which the levels of educational attainment are improving. In the fourth article in this series, our Shadow Education spokesperson, Barbara Conolly, will explain the steps that Cayman can take to give our students the best chance of future success.

The Progressives left a track record of sound financial stewardship and robust public finances despite the effects of the pandemic. Those solid public finances, with much-reduced debt, allowed us to ride out the pandemic in a better place than most other countries in the region and the world.

However, as already said, it was evident when the government presented its budget last year that it contained significant risks. In my response to the budget, I warned of those risks. Risks that have since been compounded because Cayman's economic prospects look significantly different from those on which the government's budget was predicated. But the government has said little about this despite my asking them to reassure the country.

Throughout this article, I have tried to heed President Truman's words and not say, "on the other hand....". At a time of the twin threats of skyrocketing inflation and fears of a looming recession, our people deserve clarity, and they are not getting it from the PACT Government.

Our people also deserve a government willing and capable of taking action needed in the face of those twin threats. As an Opposition group, we cannot deliver those actions directly, but we will continue to do what we have been doing. To stand up for what our Islands and our people need, and we will continue to press the government to act.

# Amendments Will Improve the Accountants Act

Ensuring clarity in legal definitions, and allowing additional licensing conditions for public accountants, are two of three key provisions of the Accountants (Amendment) Bill, 2022.

The third provision expands the membership categories for the Cayman Islands Institute of Professional Accountants (CIIPA), which regulates the accounting profession in our jurisdiction.

Clarity

- Limited Liability Partnerships (LLP) in the Cayman Islands can be used to structure professional businesses, including accounting firms. Accordingly, the Accountants (Amendment) Bill, 2022 takes the step to include LLPs in its definition of "firms of public accountants".

Licensing

- Conditions. The bill broadens CIIPA's scope to issue public accountant licences with conditions. The Accountants Act currently allows conditions to be attached only in relation to limited duration/tem-

porary licences for persons on temporary work permits.

By broadening the scope, CIIPA would be able to issue licences with conditions under other circumstances - for example, when a new practitioner has experience that would be sufficient for simple engagements, but not for complex or public interest entity engagements.

- Deregistration process. Currently, deregistration happens only when a sole practitioner or relevant firm fails to renew its licence. The bill proposes to allow a sole practitioner or relevant firm to also surrender its licence, and also for CIIPA to cancel registrations under appropriate circumstances.

CIIPA memberships

- Retired members. This new category would have several benefits for persons of retirement age, including:
  - recognising their contributions to the accounting profession during their careers; and
  - providing them with opportunities

to contribute and stay engaged with the profession, by sharing their professional and life experiences via discussion groups, on volunteer or mentor roles, and attending events, webinars and conferences.

- Student membership.

This category already exists, but the bill would allow all persons who legally reside and work here, and who also are pursuing a professional accounting qualification, to apply for membership.

The bill originates from CIIPA's proposals. The Ministry of Financial Services and Commerce has consulted relevant stakeholders on the proposals, and considered their input during the drafting of the bill.

The bill will be presented to Parliament by the Minister of Financial Services and Commerce, the Hon. André Ebanks.



"CIIPA has worked collaboratively with the Ministry to ensure that the accounting regulatory regime is clear across multiple pieces of legislation, and that it's sensible and fair in its oversight of practitioners," he said.

"I also appreciate CIIPA's recognition that wisdom from retired members of the profession, and the fresh perspectives from those entering the ranks, will help strengthen the local discipline of accounting."

# CIIPA welcomes changes to Accountants Act

The Cayman Islands Institute of Professional Accountants welcomes provisions included in the Accountants (Amendment) Bill, 2022, which updates certain legislative references and definitions, enhancing the administration of the legislation.

CIIPA led the effort to initiate the changes and worked together with the Ministry of Financial Services on the legislation.

"We appreciate the opportunity to col-

laborate with the Ministry of Financial Services on this bill as well as working together on future necessary amendments," CIIPA Chief Executive Officer Sheree Ebanks said. "CIIPA's input stemmed from its members' vast experience and knowledge. CIIPA is also thrilled to formally recognize our retired members who have contributed significantly to the development of the profession and the financial

services generally. We look forward to the Bill's passing as it will allow CIIPA to more effectively, efficiently and equitably act in its role of industry regulator for the Cayman Islands."

CIIPA is eager to become more inclusive in its membership offerings. In addition to recognising retired members, student membership would now be open to anyone legally residing in Cayman who is

pursuing a professional accounting qualification.

The Ministry of Financial Services announced the Bill through a press release on Monday, 15 Aug. In it, the Ministry outlined the key provisions of the Bill, which include clarity around the definition of firms of public accountants, broadening of licensing scope and categories of CIIPA members.

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# Patients laud new neurosurgeon for life-changing procedures

The Health Services Authority's (HSA's) new neurosurgeon Dr Dwaine Cooke has hit the ground running, performing several life-saving surgeries, and garnering the respect and support of his patients who have been delighted with the quality of care he and the staff have provided.

One patient, Andre Yates expressed, "Many years of lower back trauma and a slip-and-fall in January 2022 caused me to be in pain and leaning to one side. Eventually, I could not work nor concentrate."

He was referred to Dr Cooke who recommended spine surgery. "(Prior to the surgery) Dr Cooke sat with me to ensure that my employer's request was met and even called me to check in," said Mr Yates. He was impressed with and grateful for the level of care, respect and professionalism the doctor and the staff showed him.

"Several weeks have passed since my surgery and I am healing, mostly pain-free. Dr Cooke and the HSA team did a great job; they delivered care with a holistic approach to my

needs." Mr Yates mentioned that he has told many others of his experience and recommended that they visit Dr Cooke if in need.

Another patient, Wainford Selvin, recalled narrowly avoiding a car accident after experiencing a seizure in traffic. "I had my first seizure while driving by a stoplight in George Town. Luckily, I had a friend in the passenger seat who assisted and guided me home safely. That same day, I had three more seizures and was experiencing stiffness in my neck and uncontrollable twitching of my body. That's when members of my household had to call an ambulance."

He was soon introduced to Dr Cooke who explained that he had a 2.5-inch brain tumour and recommended brain tumour removal surgery.


"Since the surgery and to this day, I'm 100 per cent back to normal," Mr Selvin declared. "Dr Cooke and his crew did a perfect job on me, and I would recommend anyone to him. His personality and professionalism put both me and my family at ease and we were very comfortable with him, which made undergoing the surgery much easier."

Most recently, Dr Cooke performed a life-saving procedure on a patient who was in a coma and suffering from a saccular aneurysm, also known as a berry aneurysm, a rounded sac containing blood, that is attached to a main artery or one of its branches of the brain. Over time, pressure from the aneurysm on the already weak artery wall can result in the aneurysm's rupture causing blood from the artery to move into the brain which can lead to death.

Dr Cooke performed a post aneurysm clipping, successfully waking the patient from the coma. The patient is now undergoing rehabilitation.

Dr Cooke has done thousands of surgeries prior to his tenure at the HSA. He received his medical degree from the University of the West Indies- Mona, Jamaica, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery having received numerous honors and distinctions. He earned his Doctor of Medicine in Neurosurgery at the University of the West Indies-Mona along with an Enfolded Fellowship in Neurosurgery at the Halifax Health Sciences, Nova Scotia, Canada. He also completed an Epilepsy Surgery Fellowship at Yale New Haven Hospital, Connecticut, USA.

He worked as a neurosurgeon in Jamaica at the Kingston Public Hospital (KPH), Bustamante Children's Hospital (BCH), An-

drew's Memorial and Medical Associates Hospital. His position as a neurosurgeon allowed him to perform groundbreaking neurosurgical procedures and train residents and medical students.

He served as Joint Head of the Epilepsy Surgery Programme at KPH and BCH where he established an epilepsy surgery programme and commenced the multi-disciplinary management of potential surgical treatment of drug resistant epilepsy candidates, the first of its kind in the English-speaking Caribbean. He has served as the Caribbean representative of the Young Epilepsy Section (International League Against Epilepsy) and presently serves as the vice president of the Epilepsy Society of the Caribbean. He is also a fellow of the American College of Surgeons.

"Neurosurgery is my passion. Although operating on the brain and spinal cord involves many complex procedures, I perform every surgery with precision, patience, skill, temperance and with my patient's future in mind," noted Dr Cooke. "It's a pleasure to join the medical team at the HSA. I am touched by the positive feedback I've received from my patients and colleagues."

Dr Cooke treats multiple diseases affecting the brain and spine including tumours and infections, head injuries, seizures, intracranial bleeding and swelling, degenerative diseases of the spine, such as a slipped disc, back pain and nerve pain. He specialises in epilepsy surgery, which seeks to surgically remove tumours and other causes of seizures that are unresponsive to regular treatment.

Prior to joining the HSA, Dr Cooke led a medical team that successfully performed a groundbreaking brain surgery in June 2020 on a patient at the Kingston Public Hospital who had a tumour sitting on the brain over the area that controls speech. He and his team performed the surgery with the patient fully awake, allowing them to communicate with her throughout the procedure. The outcome was the successful preservation of the patient's speech and her ability to sing.

"We are delighted to welcome Dr Cooke whose talent, experience and reputation precedes him," stated Medical Director Dr Delroy Jefferson. "The addition of neurosurgery to our extensive and continuously growing list of specialist services is a benefit to our patients and the Cayman community who can get the treatment they need here on island rather than having to be referred overseas."



# Joshua: I'll smash Usyk

Anthony Joshua has for most of his glittering career been the overwhelming favourite to win all his heavyweight clashes. Until now. He is in the unfamiliar position of being a firm underdog in a

rematch with Oleksandr Usyk on Saturday in Saudi Arabia.

When this fight was initially touted almost a year ago after Joshua was easily outpointed by Usyk, even AJ's promoter Eddie

Hearn made a faux pas when stating the winner would fight Tyson Fury. Such was the comprehensive manner of Usyk's win, Hearn misspoke by claiming he expected Fury to face the 35-year-old Ukrainian.

Neither fighter has boxed since that September bout in London but it's AJ whose mental state is most in question.

"I don't care how good he is - my competitive spirit will overcome all obstacles," Joshua insisted, pledging to bring back the aggression of old after a cagey, stuttering performance last time.

Joshua was embarrassed in front of a partisan crowd against the smaller but quicker and cleverer southpaw. Now a 32-year-old multimillionaire, he's endured heavy criticism in recent years for losing to Usyk and the lardy Andy Ruiz Jr before avenging the loss to the Mexican-American, albeit in unconvincing fashion.

Joshua has changed trainers and his training base but many believe it will make little or no difference. Social media and even face-to-face interaction has not been kind to him. "I try not to focus on criticism," he insisted. "There are a lot of positive vibes out there as well. This time I'll smash through him."

Victory would see Joshua (24-2) recover the WBO, WBA and IBF titles. But even then he would not consider himself the best heavyweight in the world, not without fighting Fury.

"Unless he's 100 per cent retired, you've got to beat Fury as well," he admitted.

Despite the widespread predictions, Usyk (19-0) is taking nothing for granted. "The difference is that I'm going to have the belts with me," he said. "I will be walking second, people are going to be waiting for me. When I walk into the ring in the position of a champion, it doesn't make me feel like it'll be easier and it won't be easier in the ring."

"I realise that I have to do my job properly and it's not going to

be an easy assignment for me."

Joshua is taller, heavier and a serious puncher. Usyk admits he'll be heavier this time. That could be taken as a sign he intends to stand his ground looking for a knockout.

"I'm not a big forecaster," he added. "You'll see Saturday night, I'll just do my job, what I have to do."

He goes into this fight with a message for the world. As Ukraine resists Russia's invasion, Usyk wants to represent his country on a global stage. He has his own foundation supporting civilians during the war.

"I want to help my people and my country and Saturday night is going to be a small party for them, maybe a big party."




