LIZ TRUSS RESIGNS

British politics has been sent into another tailspin with the abrupt resignation this past Thursday of Prime Minister Liz Truss.

While she has been under tremendous pressure to quit over a series of policy u-turns and political missteps, her announcement nevertheless caught the country and the watching world by surprise.

Ms Truss who was in office for just 44 days prior to Thursday's resignation, has become the shortest-serving prime minister in British political history. She will stay on in a caretaker capacity until the ruling Conservative party selects a successor, expected to be named by this weekend.

In her resignation address, she stuck to her 'low-tax, high-growth economic ideology, but was forced to concede that it didn't work.

"I came into office at a time of great economic and international instability. Families and businesses were worried about how to pay their bills. Putin's illegal war in Ukraine threatens the security of our whole continent. And our country had been held back for too long by low economic growth. I was elected by the Conservative party with a mandate to change this."

She cited as achievements in her six-week term in office: "We delivered on energy bills and on cutting national insurance.

Am I going Mad? - Mental Health of Self

Let me ask you a question. When was the last time you asked yourself "Am I going mad?"

The then President of the American Psychological Association, at the packed APA 2002 Annual Convention in Chicago pointed out that; "My colleagues and I have demonstrated that situational forces... can generate surprisingly powerful contributions to make good people behave in bad ways" in a presentation worryingly titled; **Why and how normal people go mad.**

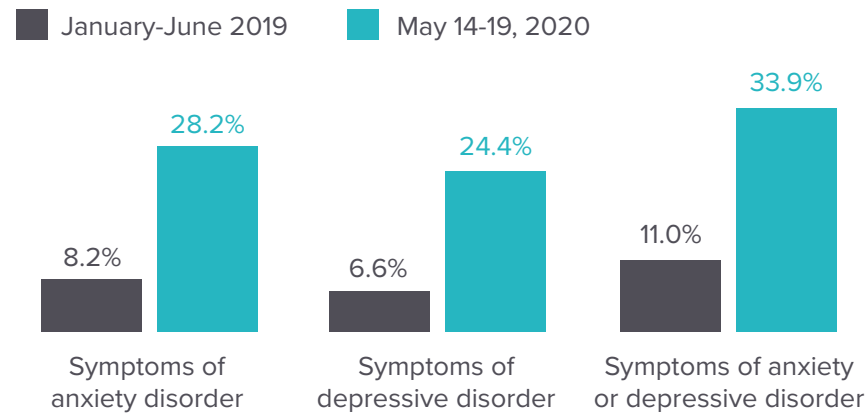
I would like to approach this from a *Better Health for Self* perspective, and so my own conversation would be called; **How normal people can stay sane**, and at the moment that might have an additional caveat of; in a world seemingly going mad. Clearly mental health is a hugely important issue and when we considering better health, we so obviously need to address both the mind and the body, approaching each with equal respect for their impact on our wellbeing.

Firstly, it is important to remember that far from being disconnected, our brain and the remainder of our physical self are inextricably linked.

Lorin Koran, studying patients from California's public mental health system (Koran. Arch Gen Psychiatry 1989), estimated that of the more than 300 000 patients treated in the California public mental health system in fiscal year 1983 to 1984, 45% had an active, important physical disease. This is hugely important. Nearly half of patients considered sufficiently unwell as to need active intervention in fact had underlying physical conditions that in part or in whole explained their mental health conditions or symptoms. So, if you find yourself exhibiting what you feel are mental or emotional symptoms, perhaps the first action to take is

to visit your GP and ascertain if there might be an undiscovered more physical or biochemical ailment at the root cause level.

So why do we today have such a heightened awareness and indeed concern for our mental wellbeing?

It's utterly clear that the experience of the last few pandemic years has contributed massively to our sense of anxiety and ultimately to increases in depression. This set of mental shocks is not standalone. In the

Cayman Islands, in our first pandemic year; we added a 7.7 magnitude earthquake with subsequent tsunami panic, a horrible dump fire, a hurricane and a heap of job anxiety to our otherwise blissful existence.

With this in mind, I'd like to propose the analogy of the mental health fuel tank, much like that of the average car. The car runs great when we put in good quality fuel, and keep it at a sensible level, especially in relation to our journey. It helps to give the car a service every now and again too. Because when we find ourselves on the dregs of reserve, especially if having fuelled it with low grade sustenance, we start to get problems from minor hiccups

to major failure. I'd argue we are no different.

So, what is our human high-grade fuel?

There is no question that the ultimate high-grade fuel constituent is sleep, a topic I covered in some depth last week. Sleep deprivation encourages:

- Mood changes
- Difficulty concentrating
- Memory problems
- Paranoia
- Hallucinations

Let's recognise that these are ALL neurological or mental symptoms and, when considering my original question, the very reasons we find ourselves asking "am I going mad?". I may just need more sleep.

We happen to be blessed with the ultimate rejuvenators - nature and sunshine.

Sunshine alone is linked to increased serotonin levels leading to mood improvements and a sense of wellbeing. We have an abundance and so we need to be sensible but given the recognised impact of sun-deprivation on seasonal affective disorder and even severe depression found much further up in the Northern Hemisphere, we need to get out there and embrace our ultimate free therapy.

When it comes to nature, the evidence is no less impressive. Cynthia Frantz, PhD, a professor of psychology and environmental studies at Oberlin College in Ohio states; "Spending time in nature has cognitive benefits, but it also has emotional and existential benefits that go beyond just being able to solve arithmetic problems more quickly". She goes on to explain a series of benefits from mental functional ability to mood improvement and reductions in anxiety and depression.


In a World where currently, many people are suffering from increased mental health difficulties due specifically to financial anxieties, it is already mood lifting to realise that three of the most powerful interventions; sleep, sunshine and nature, are free and readily available to us all.

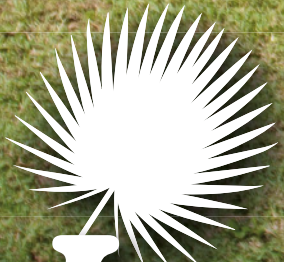

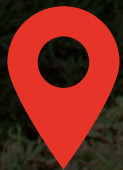

October clinic schedule for Moderna (bivalent) COVID-19 Fall Booster

Following the arrival of the Moderna (bivalent) Fall COVID-19 Booster, the Public Health Department will be holding vaccination clinics starting Sunday 16th October 2022 for healthcare workers and persons ages 70 and over. The Moderna booster enhances protection against the omicron variant of COVID-19.

The rollout of this vaccine will be in phases based on vulnerability & exposure. It started with persons in care homes and is now being extended to persons over 70 and healthcare workers. Caregivers of persons 70+ are also eligible for this booster in the continued effort to keep the most vulnerable safe. Persons who had their last COVID-19 vaccination or booster more than 3 months ago are eligible for the Moderna (bivalent) fall booster shot.

As the vaccine is rolled out, it will be made available to other priority groups and noted on each new schedule:

- Elderly residents (70+)
- Health Care Workers
- Adults 60+
- Individuals with underlying medical conditions (16-49)
- Adults 50+

The new schedule is for the Moderna Fall Booster only. No appointment is required; will be provided on a first come first serve basis. Individuals still completing the primary course of Pfizer vaccine (Dose 1 and Dose 2), should refer to the regular COVID-19 vaccine schedule.

- **Sunday, October 23, 2022** – Women’s Health Clinic (Cayman Islands Hospital) 10am – 3pm. Healthcare Workers & 70+ only
- **Saturday, October 29, 2022** – Women’s Health Clinic (Cayman Islands Hospital) 1:30am – 5pm. Healthcare Workers & 70+ only
- **Sunday, October 30, 2022** – Women’s Health Clinic (Cayman Islands Hospital) 10am – 3pm. Healthcare Workers & 70+ only

Sister Islands - Moderna vaccines will be provided on Wednesday October 19 & 26 at the Public Health Office at Faith Hospital 2pm – 4pm.

If someone is home bound and unable to attend one of the vaccination clinics, they should contact the Flu Hotline 1-800-534-8600 or 947-3077 or their local HSA District Health Centre and arrangements will be made to with a Public Health nurse to provide the vaccine in their home.

 - Government issued photo identification showing date of birth
 - Facemasks (please bring your own)

Ferguson wins season-opening Foster's 800 sea swim

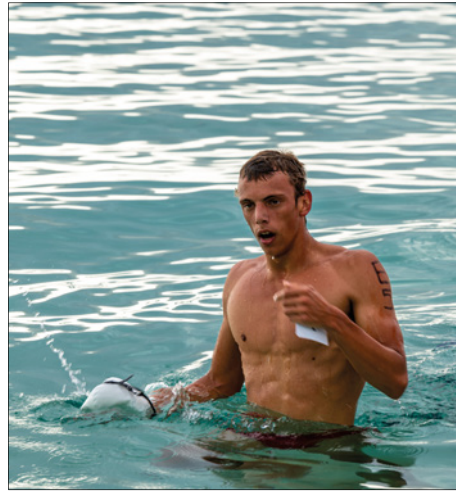
The domestic sea swim season opened on Saturday (15 Oct.) with Thomas Ferguson edging defending winner Will Sellars to take first in the 38th-annual Foster's 800-metre Sea Swim.

"It's a really significant event," Cayman Islands Aquatic Sports Association Events Director Martin Trott said. "It normally kicks off our open water swim season for the 800 meters and we're very grateful that Foster's sponsored it again this year. This is the 38th running, would you believe, in this event, which is fantastic support for Cayman swimming."

Ferguson finished first with a time of 9-minutes, 29.7 seconds, while Sellars (9:33.05), Harper Barrowman (9:37.3), Jordan Lisle (9:46.02) and Sierrah Broadbelt (10:05.02) round out the top five.

"Obviously amazing. You see everyone — all the clubs, all the parents, all the coaches. Even my dad [Camana Bay Aquatic Club coach Grant Ferguson] swam today. Amazing to see everyone come out and try their best," Thomas Ferguson said.

The Foster's 800 marks the first of a series of local open water events, including the 5K national championships, the Pirates Week 5K, the Flow, Butterfield and CUC 800 sea swims and the annual Flow-ers Sea Swim.

"One of CIASA's priorities is to push open water swimming as much as we possibly can," Trott said. "Because, as you can see, we have incredible facilities. Seven Mile Beach is one of the best — if not the best — open water swim facilities in the Caribbean. So we need to use that to our advantage and get as many of these swims in the calendar as we can."

Foster's Managing Director Woody Foster said the sea swims bring the communi-

ty together, which is why the organisation continues to support the event.

"My dad started this 38 years ago because he was a big swimmer, loved swimming," Foster said. "The first one was the Pirates Week 3-mile and we've just been doing it every year since. We love it. It's a great event"

Up next on the local swimming calendar is the CBAC Fall Kick-Off Meet 21-23 Oct. at the Camana Bay Pool. The next local open water swim is the 12 Nov. Pirates Week KPMG 5K.

CHHS clinch Dart Under 13 Girls' high school football title

The young ladies from Clifton Hunter High School (CHHS) created history last week as they clinched the 2022 Dart Under 13 Girls' high school football title defeating Cayman International School (CIS) 2-0 at the CHHS Field in Frank Sound.

CHHS' victory marks the first time in the league's short history that a public school has won the coveted title. Since the league's inception in 2017, CIS and Cayman Prep have dominated proceedings winning two championships each.

CHHS' remarkable season saw them finish undefeated with five wins out of five scoring an impressive 15 of goals while conceding only four. Their 2-0 win against CIS ensured that CIS finished runners-up while defending 2020 champions Cayman Prep finished in third place (there was no high school football season in 2021 due to COVID-19).

In other scores on the last day of competition, it was St. Ignatius Catholic 6 vs. Triple C 0 and Cayman Prep 6 vs. JGHS 0.

In the Dart Under 13 Boy's League, there is a battle brewing between the three top schools - John Gray High School (JGHS), CHHS and Cayman Prep 1 with a few games remaining. The schools are currently enjoying the Mid-Term Break and will play their final games during the week of October 24.

The key matchup in the championship race will be between CHHS and Cayman Prep 1. A CHHS win will secure the title for the boys from Frank Sound but a draw or a loss could open the door for Cayman Prep 1 or JGHS. JGHS are scheduled to play Cayman Prep 2.

In other scores, it was Cayman Prep 1 vs. JGHS 1, CHHS 6 vs. Cayman Prep 2 0,

CIS 4 vs. St. Ignatius Catholic 0, Cayman Academy 6 vs. Triple C 0, CHHS 5 vs. Cayman Academy 0, St. Ignatius Catholic 0 vs. Cayman Prep 1 5 and Triple C 0 vs. CIS 6.

UK TO GET THIRD PRIME MINISTER IN A YEAR

And we set out a vision for a low-tax, high-growth economy that would take advantage of the freedoms of Brexit."

But the departing Prime Minister admitted: "I cannot deliver the mandate on which I was elected by the Conservative party."

POLICY PITFALLS

For Prime Minister Truss, her brief tenure from September 6th was marked by historical political and economic upheavals.

The main setback was a controversial tax-cutting mini-budget delivered by her then-Chancellor of the Exchequer (Finance Minister) Kwasi Kwarteng on September 23rd, which caused huge turmoil in the financial markets..

The resulting economic and political fall-out saw Prime Minister Truss sacking Mr Kwarteng.

A new Chancellor, the fourth in four months, was appointed and immediately set about dismantling what has come to be known as the Truss/Kwarteng economic experiment labelled Trussonomics.

Jeremy Hunt, a former health and foreign secretary (minister), warned that the corrective measures he was putting in place would mean "taking the difficult decisions necessary to ensure there is trust and confidence in our national finances. That



means decisions of eye-watering difficulty," he stressed.

Mr Hunt was expected to present a revised mini-budget on October 31st. That target date remains in place despite the resignation of Prime Minister Liz Truss on Thursday September 20th.

POLITICAL WOES

Things had been getting progressively worse for Prime Minister Truss with calls for her to quit coming from within her party.

That was compounded by the resignation of her Minister of Home Affairs, Suella Braverman, on Wednesday evening September 19th over a breach of the ministerial code involving sending official correspondence on her private email.

But in her letter of resignation, the now-former minister took a swipe at Prime Minister Truss over an unrelated matter, the direction of the government.

"Not only have we broken key pledges that were promised to our voters, but I have had serious concerns about this government's commitment to honouring manifesto commitments, such as reducing overall migration numbers and stopping illegal immigration," she wrote.

Later on Wednesday evening another crisis blew up for the Prime Minister over accusations of members of her ruling Conservative Party being bullied into voting against a motion on an energy supply issue tabled by the opposition Labour Party.

Two senior MPs managing that process were reported to have resigned but subsequently backtracked.

SEARCHING FOR A SUCCESSOR

The process to find a replacement for Liz Truss from within the ruling Conservative Party has been urgently activated with party managers saying they expect to have a new leader - and new British Prime Minister - in place by Friday September 28th.

That person will become the UK's third prime minister in less than a year after Ms Truss's predecessor, Boris Johnson was forced to resign under a cloud of scandals and questions about

his personal integrity and leadership judgement.

That has set in motion a feverish process in which the leader will be chosen via an online vote instead of the drawn-out, in-person campaign carried out a few months ago.

Among the early front-runners is the former Chancellor of the Exchequer Rishi Sunak, Ms Truss's rival in this year's vote to replace Boris Johnson.

Mr Johnson is also being tipped to take on the role again, a development that has added another element of controversy to the already febrile political atmosphere.

Another candidate getting attention is Penny Mordaunt, a former Secretary of State for Defence (the first woman to hold the post) and former Secretary of State for International Development including the Overseas Territories.

She had also unsuccessfully campaigned to take over from Boris Johnson.

With the Conservative Party trending woefully low in the polls the main opposition Labour Party, now recording historically high ratings, is calling for early general elections along with the other opposition parties.

The next general election is due by 2024 but could be called earlier since the Parliament had repealed the Fixed Term Elections legislation. However, facing the prospect of a massive electoral defeat now, it's unlikely that the Conservatives would exercise that option.

9th Annual Veterans Gala: 'Lest We Forget'

The Cayman Islands Veterans Association put on their ninth annual fundraising Gala at the Marriott Hotel on Saturday 15 October.

In attendance were His Excellency the Governor, Mr. Martyn Roper, The Premier, Hon. Wayne Panton, and the Deputy Governor, Hon. Franz Manderson. All the members of the Cayman Islands Veterans' Association were there as well, along with contingents from all of Cayman's Uniformed Services, including the RCIPS, the Cayman Islands Regiment, the Coast Guards, and Cadet Corps. The theme for the evening was 'Lest We Forget,' and was all about the supreme sacrifice that members of the armed forces have given for the freedom we enjoy today.

When everyone was seated at their tables there was the Pinning of the First Poppy on Governor Martyn Roper, by Veterans' Association Member Shadden McLaughlin. President of the Association, Andrew McLaughlin, was in charge of giving out fines to attendees, and one of the fines included having a poppy before the first poppy pinned on the Governor.

Veterans' member Loxley Banks said grace, thanking the Lord for his grace and favor in difficult times, and everyone settled down to eat their Gala dinner. There were raffle tickets sold during the evening and there were some lovely prizes, with 50 percent of the raffle proceeds going to help the elderly veterans.

After everyone had finished, there were remarks by two guest speakers, MSGT Karli Ann Varnado, a retired member of the US Army, and Lieutenant General David A Deptula USAF (ret).

Ms. Varnado recalled: 'I joined the peace plan army a year and a half before 911 I had no comprehension how everything would change after that. Different training, a different enemy, a different world. My two decades in the army there were challenges but also so many opportunities.....'

David A Deptula, a retired three star general, spoke next about the present conflict between Ukraine and Russia, and how we should learn lessons from history: "I come to you here tonight during another time that we find the world in crisis. Conventional large scale conflict has returned to the global stage," he said. "Russia has plunged Russia into a conflict with the

specter of nuclear war hanging over the European continent. Vladimir Putin seeks to resurrect the former Soviet Union's spheres of influence that dropped an iron curtain over Europe following the end of the Second World War.

"While the threats we see today might seem unprecedented, they are nothing more than a re-brand of the autocratic empires that the free world vanquished more than 70 years ago. In the spirit of this year's theme, 'Lest We Forget,' we should look at history as a template to guide our actions moving forward

"Just as Hitler quietly absorbed his neighbors in Austria and Czechoslovakia in 1938, Putin capitalized on a complacent world to illegally annex Crimea in 2014 and begin a further assault against Ukraine. Putin paid homage to the totalitarian regimes of the 20th Century, conducting his invasions under the auspices of liberating supposedly, Ethnic Russians," he said.
