Ocean Therapy for Personal Wellbeing



So, you take a soothing dip in our wonderful seas and what's the first thing you

I know, you're thinking a sense of wellbeing or feeling refreshed, and then it dawns on you, a runny nose! And with that realisation, we can start to appreciate that the benefits of the ocean are more than mental, even if some of the most powerful effects are on how we feel.

Now that I've given you just a small sniff of the potential breadth of health benefits of the sea, I guess you're wondering about that runny nose. Sinus problems are really common, whether longer term or related to more immediate health obviously no substitute for good medical advice, that medical advice, in Cayman, may well include a dip in the ocean, the ultimate saline wash. So how does this benefit us?

Cilia are small, complex, hair-like structures of the paranasal sinus mucosa. The lungs and nasal passages are continuously exposed to pathogens, toxins, and other particles, and mucociliary clearance, the act of dragging up and expelling this gunk, is an essential part of our normal respiratory defence. Mucus acts as a primary physical barrier, trapping these particles and pathogens. The cilia move both the

issues like a cold, and whereas there is



mucus layer and fluid in the underlying periciliary layer up the respiratory tract and out. And as anyone taking a dip knows only too well, seawater is the perfect accelerant.

So, what other benefits are associated with the ocean? Well, quite apart from the obvious benefit of the exercise you get, especially if that dip involves swimming, there are a range of recognised health ef-

- Skin health
- Immune system
- Mental health & wellbeing
- Weight loss
- Cold water benefits

That latter area is increasingly well-recognised, from improved blood flow and circulation to reductions in musculoskeletal problems and pain, including improved recovery of muscles. Of course, our Cayman Islands oceans are not quite as beneficial as a dip in a Finnish pond in winter, but it does remind us when we are shivering at the prospect of an average winter water temperature of a just above freezing 79F (26C), this is perhaps the very best time to embrace a bracing swim.

The effects of cold water extend to weight loss too and the same principle applies. The effects can be observed from a single, short duration dip, and health influencers such as Tim Ferris go further, advocating sitting in an ice bath; "I'll sit in the ice bath up to my waist for about 10 minutes also reading a book or magazine and then for the last few minutes go up to the neck with the hands out of the water". That might be a bit extreme for us tropical humans, but it certainly reinforces the benefits of a winter ocean dip.

Seawater is rich in essential minerals, including magnesium, sodium, calcium, chloride and sulphate. Quite apart from the skin rejuvenating affects of the sea, individuals with skin health issues such as psoriasis and eczema may well see enhanced benefits. Of course, these conditions need the guidance of a qualified dermatologist too but the sea is in the therapeutic armamentarium. Beyond skin specifically, the magnesium in sea water is thought to lower cortisol levels, which calms the nervous system and reduces stress, which ironically is a trigger for skin conditions, especially inflamma-

And that leaves us with mental health and wellbeing. And I am inclined to think this is where we see our biggest benefits, given the link between mental and physical health. Hydrotherapy has long been advocated as a treatment for anxiety and depression and if you think about Granny's advice if you're feeling stressed, it's going to include a relaxing bath, or getting out in nature. Well, how about a relaxing ocean bath (no shampoo though!) in nature? That has to be the ultimate in non-medical mental therapies.

And if we want a more scientific confirmation, a study commissioned by Swim England for World Mental Health Day found that 43% of those swimming regularly cited feeling happier as a result of making this a daily habit. Furthermore, 26% were more motivated to achieve their daily tasks and 15% even said that life felt more manageable. Given the detrimental effects of feeling overwhelmed, it is difficult to over-estimate the positive impact of this.

So, yet again, alongside things like better sleep, we have identified a natural cure-nearly-all, scientifically documented, that comes without a cost and is available to anybody in Cayman, regardless of means. Dip in the ocean anyone?

Lareta Mack could not hold back the tears as she accepted her accolades as the Cayman Islands Government Employee of the Year for 2021 last night (Tuesday, 1 November 2022) for delivering outstanding customer experience.

In front of His Excellency the Governor, Mr. Martin Roper, Premier Hon G. Wayne Panton, other Government officials, colleagues and her family, the Strategic Human Resources Officer in the Portfolio of the Civil Service (PoCS) received the award from Deputy Governor Hon. Franz Manderson.

The awards ceremony was the culmination of the 2021 round of the Deputy Governor's Award Programme. The initiative, created by the DG in 2012, seeks to identify and recognise civil servants who embody the vision, purpose, mission and values of the Cayman Islands Government, and whose activities help to advance the goals of the Civil Service's 5-Year Strategic Plan.

Mrs. Mack won the top award out of a field of 12 finalists. These finalists were initially nominated by a colleague, endorsed by their Chief Officers and ultimately selected as Employee of the Month by the Deputy Governor. All finalists as well as Chief Officer's Choice Award recipients were recognised at the ceremony.

The gala event was held at the Kimpton Seafire Grand Cayman, where attendees heard of the work, attributes and impact of each nominee. Mrs. Mack was recognised for the strategic goal of Delivering an Outstanding Customer Experience.

Portfolio of the PoCS Chief Officer Gloria McField-Nixon explained that she had chosen Mrs. Mack as her Chief Officer's Choice because of "the amazing customer service that she delivers each and every day [as] a consummate professional who brings her passion to work."

Mrs. Mack's duties include payroll processing and data analytics for the over 4,000 civil servants, and she is often called upon to provide guidance to HR personnel across departments. She shared that she is driven by the knowledge that what she does affects the lives of each employee and their ability to manage themselves and their dependents. "It doesn't matter where I am, whether I'm sick or on vacation or at the dentist," she said. "If I can stop to help, I'm going to stop. If it's something that I can action then, I'm going to do it. I think just getting it done can benefit them sooner than later."

The Deputy Governor spoke of the importance of the Civil Service's push to be world-class and of employees' role in the effort: "We won't be world-class without our amazing civil servants. It is not the laws and policies and procedures that make us world-class; it is our staff."

He continued, "We are here to serve the Government of the day and I have seen so many amazing civil servants who go out of their way to do just that. I walk around and talk to civil servants and I hear their enthusiasm; I hear their commitment, and it makes me very proud."

New Medical Forms for Work Permits & Immigration Applications

WORC Simplifies Medical Forms with new Medical Declaration Cover Letter

Changes are on the horizon as Workforce Opportunities & Residency Cayman (WORC) simplifies applications by removing the requirement to submit multiple medical records for persons submitting Work Permits, Permanent Residency and Cayman Status applications, Temp Work Permits, Extensions, Business Visitor's Visas, and Special Economic Zone applications.

Effective 1 December 2022, a medical declaration cover letter from a medical practitioner will be the document required for submission of applications. "The change to simplify the medical documents for application submission has been long overdue, and with the passing

of the Data Protection Legislation (DPL), it is imperative now more than ever that WORC receives, processes and stores only the relevant and necessary information that belongs to that department for processing applications." said Acting Interim Director Jeremy Scott.

It's important to know that WORC does not own medical documents that are considered sensitive data under the Data Protection Legislation. WORC will receive in the medical declaration cover letter what the individual has been screened for in accordance to the medical examinations guidelines.

The medical declaration cover letter will need to be completed in conjunction

with a medical examination guidelines document which specifies the minimum medical requirements. The cover letter is valid for twelve (12) months.

Individuals or companies submitting the applications need to ensure they remain in compliance with what's required and that medical declaration cover letter is signed and dated by the medical practitioner carrying out their examination.

A medical examination will need to be completed by a practitioner fully registered as a medical doctor from one of the jurisdictions accepted by the Medical and Dental Council of the Cayman Islands (the United Kingdom, United States or Canada, Jamaica, South Africa, Australia, and New

Zealand). If coming from other countries, the medical examination needs to be completed in the Cayman Islands.

A grace period will be given to allow for persons submitting applications to be aware of the new requirement. However, applications received after 1 December 2022 without the medical declaration cover letter will not be accepted for processing.

Financial Services Minister to Attend Compliance Conference, Meet UK and EU Stakeholders





Minister of Financial Services, the Hon. André Ebanks, is travelling to the Bahamas, London and Brussels on a number of financial services matters.

From 3-4 November he will attend and speak at the Caribbean Regional Compliance Association (CRCA) Conference in the Bahamas. Industry compliance associations and regulators from around the region will discuss topics including ethics; terrorism, smuggling and exploitation; trends in the trust, banking, corporate services and insurance sectors; cybersecurity; sanctions; cryptocurrency; taxation; and understanding the needs of boards, regulators and shareholders.

The Cayman Islands Compliance Association (CICA) is a CRCA organising committee member, and the Ministry of Financial Services and Commerce is a conference sponsor. CRCA will be held in the Cayman Is-

lands in 2023.

Minister Ebanks then will travel to London for meetings with UK officials following the change in government. He also will meet with financial services stakeholders, including during a Cayman Finance event hosted by new CEO Steve McIntosh. Following this, he will meet with EU stakeholders in Brussels.

Cayman Islands Government representatives Deborah Bodden, Gene DaCosta and Chris Duggan will accompany Minister Ebanks to the London meetings; and Ms Bodden and Mr DaCosta will join him for the Brussels meetings. The delegation will return by 18 November. The Premier, the Hon. Wayne Panton, is the acting Minister of Financial Services and Commerce until Minister Ebanks returns.

The Ministry will update the public upon the delegations' re-


churches is unparalleled.

Mrs Gloria Bell touched the lives of thousands of children, not just through the 12 years she spent as Prospect's beloved principal from 2006 to 20014, as well as through her contribution to teacher training and literacy throughout the Island before going to Prospect, and her work as Senior Schools' Improvement Officer with the Department of Education after leaving Prospect.

All the children were there to give her a great retirement send off, and a steel pan band was up onstage adding its joyful music to the celebrations. Lots of people came onstage to pay tribute to her endless dedication, encouragement and support, not just to children, but to parents and teachers

Prospect MP Hon. Sabrina Turner said, "You will never ever imagine the impact you have had moving forward and it is my honor on behalf of the people of prospect and me personally, to thank you for your service and enjoy life. This is an example of true leadership through nation-building.

Born in Trinidad And Tobago in the Fishing Village of Carenage, Mrs. Bell attended

where she received a teacher's diploma. The challenges in children's reading she encountered while teaching in primary schools there motivated her to gain a certificate in the teaching of literacy.

In 1991 Mrs Bell secured a teaching po-

Believing in the development of the whole Child, Mrs. Bell is remembered for many initiatives at PPS, including the Annual Student Christmas Luncheon, the PPS steel band, violin club, Cooking Club, photography club, Arts & Crafts club, and AAA - afterschool Academic Acceleration Club.

Mrs. Bell has gained many awards including Cayman Islands Civil Servant of the Year, 2000, and the 2008 Golden Apple Award for excellence in teaching as a school principal

There were a great many tributes by past pupils by video, many of whom are now university students, business leaders and entrepreneurs. Devonte Howell attended Prospect Primary School from 2009 to 2016: "I had the privilege of Ms Bell being my Principal for four of the six years I spent at the Best School in the whole wide world.

Mrs Bell was a very strict, yet Caring and loving principal, and I'll never forget the support and motivation she gave many other students and me at Prospect Primary," he

Victor Hemans presented an award on behalf of the Specialist Music Teachers. "We are so thankful of the things you have done for us, and your inspiration for us," he said.

There was also a presentation from President of the Prospect PTA, Dave Howell, who expressed the hope that the school would shortly be renamed in Mrs. Bell's honor.

"Good memories have been brought back, and as I stand here I am humbled by the outpouring of appreciation that has been demonstrated today," Mrs. Bell said. "It is certainly an honor to be recognized for one's contributions, and to be able to smell the roses, and hear the tributes while you're alive. Thanks to Almighty God for giving me this rare opportunity. This celebration is not about Gloria Bell alone, but this group of teachers."
