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Dear Representative,

I wish to present this letter as my feedback to the digital identity bill which is to be debated in parliament.

I would like to acknowledge the intended purpose of the digital identity bill and the digital identity framework. I have listened as the government has made a concerted effort to promote the digital identity as something that will improve the lives of Caymanians and all residents - making it easier to open bank accounts, making it easier to deal with DVDL, immigration, needs assessment, etc. I think it's clear that the intent of those who created the legislation and those who are promoting it is benevolent. It does appear as though the intent of the legislation is to make all our lives better and more conven-

However I wish to express some concerns that I and others around me currently share. I am concerned about the widespread implementation of digital identity bills on a global level – as if on a concerted basis, and wonder why this is being pushed on countries around

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the world all of a sudden. I am concerned that the digital identity card will one day be required to access critical services on the island. It may be voluntary now, but what guarantees me that it will remain so? I am concerned that the digital identity could be used as a tool by a future government or private sector entity such as banks with intentions to censor, discriminate and deny important services to persons that it does not agree with.

The digital identity system may be voluntary now, it may only be linked to limited and basic information now, but there is nothing stopping future additions to the system, like linking medical records, school records, travel records, banking information, social media records, police or court records, vaccination status or other very sensitive information. This system requires strong legislative controls to remain inclusive and beneficial to all Caymanians.

Additionally, I expect that the tenets of the data protection law will still apply to the data that the government collects and links together for the formation of each person's digital identity.

I hope that the very real risk of data breaches and unlawful sharing of personal data with third parties is addressed in the policies that are developed in support of this new legislation.

For this reason, I would like to petition the government to ensure that any digital identify legislation contain the following guarantees in the law itself:




- 1. The use of the digital identity card should remain voluntary
- 2. A service provided by government or a private entity like a bank should not be denied if a person chooses not to use the digital identity card
- 3. That the consent of the user is required for the future linking and storing of additional information which are not included currently such as travel records, medical information and any other information which may one day be linked to the digital identity card

I think the above are MINIMUM requirements to ensure that the digital identity cards remain solely for the improvement of life in the Cayman Islands, and to ensure that the cards not be misused in the future. As our lives continue to be more and more digital, we need to ensure that our rights and freedoms are protected by any new legislation put in place.



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CIBC FIRSTCARIBBEAN AFFIRMS ITS COMMITMENT TO INCLUSION AND DIVERSITY BY HOSTING A WORKSHOP ON DEAF AWARENESS FOR MEMBERS OF THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY

▶ Feature Speaker, Lionel Smith, tells of his experience as a deaf person at school and in the world of work.

"I use my eyes to hear you". Those were the words of guest speaker, Lionel Smith as he gave the feature address at a workshop designed to give business houses in Barbados a glimpse into the life of the hearing impaired. The workshop was a joint venture between The Barbados Council for the Disabled and Signature Interpretations and was hosted by CIBC FirstCaribbean at its Great House Conference Room.

Participants learned more about the experiences of the deaf as they navigate a world dominated by those who can hear. The workshop, entitled "Hi There, I Can't Hear!" was designed to help those in business in Barbados to increase their knowledge of how to effectively communicate with deaf people and to understand the barriers they face. The training was aimed at improving customer service and engendering in the various organisations a culture of community, equality, inclusion and diversity.

During his speech, Mr. Smith, who was born deaf and was assisted by an interpreter, told the participants of his experience as a deaf student at the Barbados Community College, where he studied Tourism and was the top student in his year. He noted that he went on to a successful work attachment at FLOW but noted that many deaf people struggle to earn a living as businesses are not often equipped to accommodate them

in the workplace. He noted that even as customers, deaf people often struggle to make themselves understood or even navigate the customer service areas of many businesses. He made a passionate plea for businesses to provide improved, simple signage and to make changes to their customer service areas which would improve access to service by the members of the deaf community and all those who were living with a disability.

Welcoming the participants to the workshop was Chief Administrative Officer at CIBC FirstCaribbean, Neil Brennan. Mr. Brennan spoke of the bank's commitment to inclusion and diversity, which includes hiring members of the deaf community and other disabled members of society among its staff and ensuring conditions for transacting business in its offices were accommodating and welcoming for them. He noted that the bank had facilitated a work experience programme for several members of the disabled community prior to the Covid pandemic and was keen to restart the programme as soon as conditions were safe to do so.

Mr. Brennan also spoke of his personal experience with a deaf person, as his niece was born deaf in Scotland, and he told the participants of the adjustments he and his family had to make – like learning sign language - to ensure she

developed into a happy and productive member of society.

He asked the participants to present the output of the workshop to CIBC FirstCaribbean and other businesses, so that companies would have a better understanding of what they need to do both as employers and as service providers to help those in the deaf community. Mr. Brennan made an offer to host further workshops of this nature at the bank's conference facilities.

The facilitator of the workshop was Bonnie Leonce, assisted by members of the Deaf Community. Bonnie Leonce is an American Sign Language Interpreter by profession and has been so for over 25 years. She is the founder of "Signature Interpretations", a business which is committed to providing quality and professional sign language services and training to individuals and organisations to effectively communicate with members of the Deaf community".

CUC secures \$80m loan

Caribbean Utilities Company has announced the closing of US\$80 million 5.88% Senior Unsecured Notes.

The 30-year debt offering was privately placed with institutional investors in the United States with RBC Capital Markets acting as sole placement agent. Proceeds from the offering, due 15 November 2052, will be used to repay short-term indebtedness and to finance ongoing additions and upgrades to CUC's generation and transmission and distribution systems.

CUC provides electricity to Grand Cayman under a non-exclusive Electricity

Generation Licence expiring in 2039 and an exclusive Electricity Transmission and Distribution Licence expiring in 2028.

Richard Hew, President and Chief Executive Officer, said: "We are pleased to se-

cure this long-term financing on favourable terms, a reflection of the continued sustainability and strong credit ratings of the Company and the jurisdiction as a whole.

"Significant and ongoing capital investments are necessary for electric utilities to meet anticipated growth in customer needs. CUC remains committed to providing a safe, efficient and reliable electricity service to Grand Cayman, as it has for over 56 years."

The notes will not be registered under the United States Securities Act of 1933, nor will they be registered under any state securities laws. Unless so

registered, the notes may not be offered or sold except pursuant to an exemption from, or in a transaction not subject to, the registration requirements of the Securities Act and applicable state securities laws.

RESIDENTS REASSURED ABOUT COVID-19 BOOSTER VACCINE CHOICES AND AVAILABILITY

Cayman has adequate stocks of COVID vaccines on hand to last until the end of the year, while the option of obtaining additional quantities is not expected to be necessary until early next year.

This assurance from the new Chief Medical Officer Dr Nick Gent comes in response to a query raised by Caymanian Times newspaper about personal vaccine preferences and available supplies.

The Health Services Agency (HCA) is continuing with its Covid-19 booster and flu schedule at clinics throughout the jurisdiction with the Moderna vaccine available to all persons over 18 years of age without an appointment being necessary. However, anyone who prefers to have the Pfizer-BioNTech brand of the vaccine is required to complete a questionnaire and give their consent.

IDs are required for the Moderna vaccine, and in the case of the Pfizer-BioNTech, the consent form includes necessary data including name, address and immigration status

A statement to Caymanian Times from the office of the CMO explains: "The Cayman Islands Government has only procured the



Pfizer monovalent vaccine for use as new primary immunisations for people who have never received SARS-CoV2 vaccine before, or for people who prefer to have a Pfizer fall vaccine booster."

On the issue of available supplies, it states that "at this point in time, we are not expecting a "shipment of Pfizer/BioNTech bivalent COVID-19 booster" given that our last shipment arrived in late September and we have sufficient stock to take us through until at least the end of the year. Any decision



around additional procurement of vaccines is not expected until early 2023."

Regarding the Moderna vaccine, the response from the CMO says: "The Moderna bivalent 50 microgram vaccine, which can only be used as a booster in people who have completed initial primary courses with 2 x doses of Pfizer vaccine."

It further states that the Moderna bivalent booster vaccine has an enhanced protective effect from being a different vaccine type from the Pfizer monovalent primary vaccine that was principally used here in Cayman in the initial immunization programme.

"We do allow people out of personal choice continue to use the Pfizer monovalent vaccine for their Fall booster; and the



evidence is good that this monovalent vaccine does produce a good protective effect against omicron variants, but the Moderna vaccine can be expected to produce a better vaccine effectiveness still. Both are good choices for the Fall booster, but Moderna has the edge," the statement from the CMO adds.

The latest bulletin from the HSA and Public Health Department advises that the Moderna Fall Boosters is available to all eligible persons 18 years and older who have had their last Covid-19 vaccine or booster more than three months ago.

The November rollout of the Moderna bivalent booster, Pfizer Covid-19 and flu vaccinations is being done with consolidated clinics providing all three vaccines.

Air show finally takes off



The Cayman Islands Air Show, previously scheduled during the Queen's Platinum Jubilee weekend in the summer, will now be staged next month in Grand Cayman

and Cayman Brac.

A collaboration between the Cayman Islands Airports Authority, The Civil Aviation Authority and the Department of Tourism, the December Air Show celebrates the 70th anniversary of the first commercial plane landing at Owen Roberts International Airport.

"The air show will commemorate when the first commercial airplane, the PBY Catalina, arrived in Grand Cayman in 1952. Our aviation industry has come a long way since then and the air show is a great way to showcase the evolution of the airplane," said Albert Anderson, CEO of CIAA.

On Saturday morning, 3 December, the public can watch the air display above Grand Cayman's Seven Mile Public Beach. The show will feature iconic airplanes and international acts including a PBY Catalina, the Qyon Jet Team, aerobatic pilot Skip

Stewart, and the Red Bull Sports team accompanied by pilot Kirby Chambliss.

In the afternoon, the static display aircraft exhibition at the Island Air Hangar will pro-

vide the public the chance to view the planes and meet some of air show participants.

The Sister Islands will also join in the fun with a static display aircraft exhibition taking place from 12:30-2pm at the Charles Kirkconnell International Airport in Cayman Brac on Sunday, 4 December.

Richard Smith, Director-General of Civil Aviation, said: "We are excited that we will get the opportunity to stage an air show this year as we know that many were disappointed when it was postponed in June. We hope that the public enjoys the display of international talent and takes advantage of the aircraft exhibit."

Kenneth Bryan, Minister of Tourism and Transport, said: "I encourage everyone to come out to enjoy the air show activities in Grand Cayman and Cayman Brac, from enthusiasts to families there will be something for everyone. It was a well-loved event in the past and we look forward to welcoming back future air shows to be enjoyed by the community and visitors alike."

RCIPS Issues Warning on Phishing Email Purporting to Be from RCIPS



The RCIPS has received reports that persons have received emails purporting to be from the RCIPS Criminal Records Office, but which are actually fraudulent messages being used to compromise the information of the recipients. These emails have been sent from an address ending "@rcips.com," which is not a valid

RCIPS email address.

Official emails from the RCIPS will come from addresses ending in "@rcips.ky." If you receive an email purporting from the RICPS, but it is not from an address ending in "rcips.ky" or you have any other reason to question its validity, do not open the message but contact the RCIPS Digital Forensics Hub at

RCIPSDFH@rcips.ky<mailto:RCIPSDFH@rcips.ky>.

It may also be good practice to verify any emails from official sources with a phone call to the institution. It is also good practice to be very wary of clicking any links sent to you via email, especially when they are unsolicited.

Police Investigate Robbery in North Side

On Friday 11 November, police were dispatched to two reports of armed robberies and one attempted robbery in George Town.

At approximately 7:45PM, police received a report that someone broke the glass doors of the Uncle Clem's Grocery Store located on Mary Street. The occupants of the store ran through the rear door and one person fell while trying to get away from the incident, sustaining minor injuries.

The investigation revealed that two masked men dressed in hoodies, one armed with a machete, the other with an axe, entered the premise and stole money from the cash registered. They then left store, their direction of travel unknown.

A second incident took place at just before 7:50PM, where it was reported that a delivery driver was leaving Diaz Lane, after making a delivery, when someone banged on his car window. Two masked

men, one carrying an axe was seen. The driver said they began banging on his vehicle with the axe and as a result he sped off from the location. Nothing was stolen and no injuries caused, however the vehicle sustained minor damage.

Following this incident, police received a report of an armed robbery at Asian Retailer, located on Shedden Road just after 8:20PM. It was reported that two men wearing dark coloured clothing and hoodies, entered the store, brandished a firearm and demanded money and assaulted the store keeper. The men made off with a quantity of cash in an unknown direction.

All three incidents are being investigated by the RCIPS and detectives are encouraging anyone with information to call the George Town Police Station at 949-4222. Alternatively, anonymous tips can be provided directly to the RCIPS via our Confidential Tip Line at 949-7777, or via our website.

Family Resource Centre Celebrates Men and Boys

On Saturday, 19 November, the Family Resource Centre (FRC) will be joining countries around the world to mark the 11th Annual International Men's Day (IMD) celebrations in the Cayman Islands.

International Men's Day (IMD) commemorates the positive contributions men make to the world, their families and communities, while highlighting men's and boy's well-being.


As part of the IMD initiative, the FRC will be joining the global dialogue about manhood, masculinity and the social issues that men and boys face. This year's theme "Men Leading by Example" encourages men to teach boys in their lives the value, character and responsibilities of being a man.

"Our aim every year when celebrating IMD is to celebrate men and boys while still recognising the multiple barriers which affect them specifically," explains FRC's Clinical Supervisor, Charmaine Miller.

For the first time, the FRC will be hosting the IMD "State of Men and Boys Forum", an awareness and education event that will feature a panel of experts, male advocates and professionals discussing key issues of mental health, unemployment, lack of positive male role models, and positive opportunities to engage men and boys, among other relevant topics.

"The global suicide rate is twice as high for men compared to women. Men are twice as likely to die from heart disease than women, and overall have shorter life expectancy than women. Additionally, there is growing concern about men's mental health that needs to be discussed more openly and often," Ms. Miller adds.

"Gender equality is often misunderstood as 'women's issues' but it is far more encompassing than that," Mr Franz Manderson, Deputy Governor and Head of the Civil Service affirms. "Gender equality impacts both men and women, and not simply on how it applies to women's lives. Gender equality is also a men's issue - poor health, lower education levels and



rigid gender norms are all gender-related issues that directly impact our men and boys. To have a truly equitable society, which is our ultimate goal, we must recognise and address these disparities in our homes, our communities, and our workplaces. The Civil Service remains committed to gender equality for all, which is why we continue to both encourage and support initiatives like International Men's Day," Mr. Manderson adds.

"When we speak of gender inequality and the imbalance of power, it is understandable that we would highlight male privilege, which is the concept that men are automatically granted certain advantages in society and the workplace due to their gender," explains Premier and Minister for Gender Affairs, Hon. Wayne Panton JP, MP.

"No one is denying that those privileges exist in varying degrees, or accepting that they are appropriate. Yet, the privileges aren't the full story. Men have vulnerabilities, and the very system that creates the privileges discounts those vulnerabilities. The same messages aimed to create hierarchy between the sexes, which often times are toxic, dehumanise men - and even boys - as they are robbed of their emotions, of their childhood, of their ability to show and receive love, of connecting with loved ones and the community, all for fear of being judged as weak or less than. That is why International Men's Day, and events like this forum, are so important: it is time for us to move the conversation forward, no matter how difficult it may be," Premier Panton concluded.

In keeping with new trends, the FRC will also be using International Men's Day as a platform to launch new parenting programmes and social-based programmes for men and boys. Among them, the FRC will be delivering a new programme for young boys called A Young Man's Guide to Self-Mastery, a 16-week gender-responsive treatment programme that addresses the impact of socialisation, adverse life experiences, and substance use. Additionally, the FRC will continue its efforts to increases services amongst fathers within the community and the prison in keeping with their mission of improving the lives of the people in the Cayman Islands.

The full list of IMD events is as follows:

- Men & Boys Football Tournament 19 November, in partnership Cayman Islands Football Association, a football tournament where men and boys will play on the same team and encourage camaraderie as well as engaging in fun and healthy interaction.
- IMD Dress for a Cause- 19 November, an opportunity to raise awareness and funds for programmes and services supporting men's well-being.
- Raising Resilient Boys parenting webinar 22 November, a free parenting session focused on equipping parents with knowledge and skills specific to raising boys.
- IMD The State of Men & Boys Forum **25 November,** an opportunity to engage men through male-to-male candid discussions on topics that include mental health, relationships and gender. The overall objective is to inspire participants to become agents of change by increasing their understanding on the subject areas and learn to embrace masculinity in a healthy way. Additionally, this conference will launch new programming targeted to boys and young men who experience the world from a masculine perspective.

Constitutional Commission Publishes Explanatory Notes on the Role of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council

The Constitutional Commission has published the latest in its series of Explanatory Notes to mark the occasion of the historical visit of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council ("JCPC") to the Cayman Islands this week. This is the first such visit to a United Kingdom Overseas Territory and therefore an important constitutional milestone for the Cayman Islands.

Under section 118(3)(c) of the Cayman Islands Constitution ("the Constitution"), the Constitutional Commission is charged with promoting understanding and awareness of the Constitution and its values and, to these ends, the Constitutional Commission's Explanatory Notes on the JCPC cover a range of topics, including:

- The role of the JCPC as the court of final appeal for the Cayman Islands;
- The history of the JCPC and its enduring

relationship with the Cayman Islands;

- The process by which appeals from the Cayman Islands proceed to the JCPC;
- The composition of the JCPC and the appointment of Caribbean jurists;
- The regional debate surrounding the continuing relevance of the JCPC;
- The significance of JCPC case law and examples of decided cases; and
- The cases that will be decided in this sitting of the JCPC in the Cayman Islands.

These Explanatory Notes have been designed for general informational purposes and the Constitutional Commission has also included links to a range of materials online for persons interested in further research and investigation. Constitutional Commission Chair, Vaughan Carter, also emphasised: "the Constitutional Commission's hope that the Explanatory Notes on

the JCPC will be accessed by educators and young people, in particular, as the Constitutional Commission seek to generate interest in all matters constitutional in our schools and colleges".

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US MIDTERMS: A REFLECTION - FOR WHOM THE POLITICAL BELL TOLLS

There is a collective sigh of relief rippling through American body politics over the fact that the country's democracy has withstood the onslaught of the hard rightwing Trump-Republicans.

All indicators point to the Democrats controlling the Senate in the US midterm elections. The outcome of the House of Representatives still hangs in the balance, although the Democrats controlling both houses of the US Congress seems unlikely despite the narrow margins.

With the race for the Georgia Senate seat going to a run-off early December, even if the Republicans win there resulting in a 50-50 split, the Democrats will ultimately have control with Vice-President Kamala Harris retaining a tie-breaking vote.

Reports and analyses suggest that this year's midterms have been one of the closest-followed globally for what is normally the equivalent of a mainly parochial affair in US politics, unlike the presidential elections with its global implications over who sits in the White House.

This year's midterms were significant as they were seen as setting the stage for the 2024 US presidential election and a possible second bid for the office by controversial former president Donald Trump.

And he may yet still run again despite his forecast 'Red Wave' reduced to a muted trickle and desperatately trying to distance himself from the failed campaign that he engineered for his rightwing acolytes.

Mr Trump has been at the forefront of thie midterm campaign backing a coterie of candidates who echo his persistent - and rejected - refrain that the 2020 presidential election was stolen from him.

Most of them lost, and an acrimonious parting of ways with one of his main disciples, Florida's Ron DeSantis, has cast a further shadow over the former president's electability.

Pushing back against the Trump-backed Republican faction, President Joe Biden had framed the 2022 midterms as a fight for America's democracy, recalling the events of the assault on the US Congress on January 6th 2021 for which Mr Trump is being investigated as the main instigator.


In the final analysis, it might very well be the spectre of January 6th 2021 that shifted the balance and prompted a higher-than-normal turnout for the normally parochial midterms.

The international focus on the process and the outcome also speaks volumes.

On both sides of the political divide - and a third element could possibly be added by isolating the Trump faction of the Republican party - voters aligned themselves with a cause and campaign.

With politics becoming even more entrenched in recent years has seen a corresponding increase in turnout at the polls, though not yet on the scale of the presidential elections.

It also shows that no matter how compel-



ling the personalities who front campaigns, the common cause under the umbrella of the party structure, is itself a safeguard; keeping those personalities in check and keeping the party focused on policies against which the voting, and wider public, can judge its performance.

Looking at it that way raises the question of whether our way of doing politics in Cayman is unique, unusual or just plain outdatod

However, we sense a mood of re-evaluating our methods of electing our representatives in Cayman with a shift away from individualism to a more structured party system.

The challenges - and opportunities - facing Cayman demand that. 'One-manism' -

politely referred to as 'independents' - lends itself to fractures, uncertainty and potential instability from within. That is a prospect that Cayman cannot afford.

A first-world country demands a first-world, some would say 'mature', approach to the way it does politics.

If anything, that could be the key takeaway here from the US midterm elections.

To quote:

"No man is an island entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main

Therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee."

Mottley blasts rich on climate issues

Mia Mottley, Prime Minister of Barbados, again criticised industrialised nations for failing the developing world on the climate crisis, in a blistering attack at the Cop27 UN climate talks in South Africa.

Mottley received a thunderous ovation after delivering the 20th Nelson Mandela Annual Lecture in Durban last week. Her address pursued the theme 'Social Bonding and Decolonisation in the Context of the Climate Crisis: Perspectives from the Global South'.

She said the prosperity – and high carbon emissions – by rich nations has been achieved at the expense of the poor in the past, and now the poor were being forced to pay again, as victims of climate breakdown that they did not cause. Droughts, floods and other severe weathers are affecting Africa and Asia far worse than other areas.

Mottley said: "Seventy percent of the world's poor live in middle-income countries and when you exclude middle-income countries from being able to borrow, you are effectively condemning the poor in middle-income countries to remain in poverty for the rest of their lives, cementing inter-generational poverty.

"The notion that Barbados, Bahamas and the Maldives cannot borrow as of right from the World Bank in today's world in a climate crisis is so preposterous, that it tells us that we need to reset and recalibrate urgently if we are to prepare for

fighting these battles."

Mottley accused richer countries of putting profits ahead of helping poorer countries from the effects of climate change.

She added: "The Bible talks to us about tithing and the Quran speaks to us about giving back to those, and we simply say that if you are going to make 100 cents in profit, \$200 billion in the last quarter alone, some estimates explain that they may even reach \$2 trillion in one year in profits – then, you have a responsibility to put something on the table in a loss and damage fund for those who are now having to pay out."

One of the biggest issues at the talks was climate justice – the fact that poor people are bearing the brunt of the damage to the climate, through extreme weather, while rich countries have failed to fulfil promises to cut emissions and provide finance to help the poor with climate breakdown.

Mottley, 57, highlighted how developing countries are struggling against the comparatively smaller problems the richer ones have: "No one would ever have thought that the United States of America would take days to count votes in an election. No one would ever have thought that the United Kingdom would have had three prime ministers in less than three months. And,

regrettably, none of us would have ever dreamt to see war in Europe after World War II again, so soon and so tragically.

"Mind you, it is almost as if they've forgotten that war existed in Africa and in the Middle East for decades. The world that we have come to know has changed upon us and we will either decide as people of the south to be firm craftsmen of our fate and shapers of our destiny, or we will continue to be the victims as we have been for centuries."

She warned of a billion climate refugees around the world by the middle of the century if governments fail to tackle the climate crisis




cord wasn't plugged in fully into the wall. If we are not plugged into the true source of power we'll run out of power. In the physical.

Spiritually, Jesus taught this lesson to His disciples using the imagery of the vine and branches.


