JOINT STATEMENT ON DEALING WITH THE RISE IN ROBBERIES

JOINT STATEMENT BY HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR MARTYN ROPER, THE HONOURABLE PREMIER G. WAYNE PANTON AND LEADER OF THE OPPOSITION THE HONOURABLE ROY MCTAGGART ON WORKING TOGETHER TO COMBAT THE RISE IN ROBBERIES

Today Friday 16 December, the Commissioner of Police briefed Cabinet and Members of Parliament on the current spike in robberies here in our islands.

Today we learned that there have been 32 armed robberies, whether with a firearm or bladed weapon, reported to the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS) since August. These robberies span from retail and commercial stores, robbery of the person, and also include two instances linked to illegal gambling. The RCIPS has identified a loosely associated group of suspects involved in the commission of these robberies, who often operate in small groups of four or less. The RCIPS has deployed additional resources,

both overtly and covertly, including additional Officers with Firearms to protect the community and arrest those responsible for the robberies.

During what is traditionally one of the most pleasant times of year, we know there has been public concern with the recent spike in reported robberies through the community. We wish to assure the public that we along with Members of Cabinet, and all MPs share your concern. These robberies do not align with our strong Caymanian values of honesty, work ethic and caring for our neighbours.

The RCIPS has a proven track record of confronting and reducing serious crime and as a country, we must support the brave men and women of the RCIPS who risk their lives to keep us safe.

The RCIPS needs the help of the community to tackle this serious crime spree and community engagement is necessary to identify and apprehend the criminals involved. The police need our support to keep our businesses, homes and families safe. There are people in the community who know the identity of these criminals. If you do, you have a duty to your country and your community to share the information you know. This can be done by contacting the RCIPS using their online form, which you can do anonymously; or by calling the RCIPS Confidential Tipline at 949-7777 where you can leave an anonymous voicemail. Also, you may submit tips to Cayman Crime Stoppers

on their website caymancrimestoppers.com and it will be shared with the RCIPS without identifying the source. We are pleased to announce that Crime Stoppers has offered an award up to \$25,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of these robbers. We wish to record our thanks to Crime Stoppers for being a valuable partner in safeguarding our community. It is for this reason, that the Government has pledged an additional \$75,000 to be added to the reward to encourage persons to help authorities bring the perpetrators to justice.

The Cayman Islands Government has zero tolerance towards crime and we will work with the RCIPS to prevent further escalation of any activity that incites fear and anguish in our communities. Again, we implore everyone to cooperate with the police, and proactively offer any information that could assist in ongoing investigations. We deserve to enjoy the holiday season, including shopping for gifts for our loved ones, without the fear of being a victim of crime.

Finally, to the offenders of these crimes – we urge you to consider the consequences of your actions. Our prisons are filled with persons who thought they would never be caught for their acts.

Do not mistake short term gains from these horrible and nefarious activities for success. Justice will be served and the penalties will indeed be appropriate for the level of distress and harm being caused to the citizens of our community.

PROVEN customers set to save this Christmas

Even though it is customary for Cayman banks to follow the US Federal Reserve Bank's lead when it comes to interest rate movements, PROVEN Bank has announced it won't be increasing rates on its variable rate loans (such as mortgages) until the New Year. This comes as the Fed raised interest rates by 0.5% last week and is likely to raise rates further in 2023, thereby pushing up the cost of borrowing.

While almost all Cayman banks have followed suit, PROVEN Bank said it was pausing interest rate increases on variable rate loans until 2023 to alleviate financial strain for customers around the holiday season. The hiatus will put around US\$75 in the pocket of anyone with a PROVEN bank mortgage.

Ben Freeman, PROVEN Bank CEO, said they wanted their customers to enjoy a break this holiday given the compounding effect that inflation and rising interest rates had on gift giving associated with the season.

"We are not passing the increased costs on to customers during this time as we want to help keep holiday cheer for customers and our community, while minimising the impact of unexpected expenditures," he confirmed.

Inflation rates were already high, Mr Freeman, so PROVEN Bank did not want to pass increased rate costs on to their customers. He indicated that the average savings would be close to US\$75.

"We estimate that the overall programme will cost the bank between US\$40k - \$50k in benefits to our customers," he stated.

Help is on hand

Anyone struggling to repay their mortgage should reach out to their bank immediately, he furthered, advising that banks would work with their customers to help them explore options during this time.

"One option may be to consolidate debt into a lower cost facility," he said. "For example, you can consolidate auto loans, person loans and credit card loans into a secured facility like a mortgage to bring down the interest rate. For distressed situations - like health issues or loss of employment - the bank can consider modifying the terms of the loan, such as extending the loan period."

Variable to fixed

Anyone looking to change their loan from a variable to a fixed rate need to go to the bank and talk the situation through with an expert, Mr Freeman advised.

"The bank will review the existing loan, update the customer's financial situation and then modify the existing loan. The fixed interest rate period is up to 5 years. Typically, the fixed interest rate will be 1%-1.5% greater than Prime rate plus 1% (our variable rate pricing). After the fixed period, the rate reverts to a variable rate vs Prime rate," he said.

Mr Freeman said the bank anticipated at least another 0.5% rate increase next year.

"This will bring Prime rate to 8%. However, the Federal Reserve has indicated that bringing down inflation is a key priority. There is no guarantee rate will not rise further," he stated.

Ahead of the game

Mr Freeman acknowledged that they understood PROVEN Bank's rate freeze for the holidays would not fix the hardships customers currently faced.

"The intention is to help customers to have a bit more spending money and have one less thing to worry about over the holidays," he confirmed. "I was hoping the other banks would follow our lead to offer broader relief in all the communities. PROVEN Bank may not be as large as the other banks but as a challenger bank, we can still lead by example."

PROVEN Bank will resume the normal course of business in early January in accordance with the US Federal Reserve Bank. For further information regarding rates and payment terms, customers can call PROVEN Bank at (345) 949-7822.

PACT PUSHES AHEAD WITH ID CARDS

By the summer of 2023 a national digital ID card for the Cayman Islands is expected to be in place alongside a voluntary registry.

After lengthy debate in Parliament, the law for the introduction of the ID system and the accompanying legislation for setting up the registry was passed with a PACT government majority supported by MP for West Bay McKeeva Bush. The opposition Progressives voted against citing the government's refusal to delay the law and refer it for more public consultation.

Presenting what were described as the two ground-breaking measures, Hon. Minister for Financial Services & Commerce, Investment, Innovation & Social Development, Andre Ebanks, set out to allay fears mainly over data protection and confidentiality assuring that robust controls were built-in.

It was acknowledged that the concept for the national ID card system, initiated by the previous Progressives administration, had been under consideration for quite some time but had become even more of a pressing requirement in the digital age, especially in the financial industry which underpins Cayman's economy.

Min. Ebanks pointed out that much of the



information required for the ID card and registry was already held in various government ministries which would now be accessible in the new system, but with extensive data security safeguards. Another advantage he said is that it would eliminate the need for volumes of documentation from a variety of departments. There are severe penalties for misuse or otherwise breaching the system including fines of up to CI\$20,000 and four years in prison.

He rejected the calls for delay, saying adequate consultation had been undertaken and some views could not be changed.

"The request for time (the withdrawal of

the bill) might not achieve what some think, or worse, might lead to further public confusion. There are folks of all walks of life who've come up to me and said 'Minister, the accommodation that you're proposing in the legislation should be able to alleviate the doubts and concerns and give those who do not want to join at this time, to give the ample time to decide if they want to join but don't stop for those who want it and see the vision of it now.'

Min. Ebanks said further public consultation was hardly likely to change the views of those people whose views were already entrenched.

OPPOSITION OBJECTIONS

But the opposition Progressives maintain that there are still concerns about some aspects of the system which warrant further public consultation.

Hon. Deputy Opposition Leader Joey Hew, who was at the forefront of developing the original concept bill during the Progressives government, called on the PACT administration to withdraw the bill in its current form.

"The provisions of the bill, which to be very honest the minister (Ebanks) spoke to some of the amendments actually covers some of the concerns, but we still feel on this side that the bill should be withdrawn and proper public consultation should happen, because I agree with the minister, this bill is too important to the future of this country and to its people. It's ground-breaking, it will set the platform for future development in our financial services, and it will make life easier for our people."

Mr Hew, the previous Minister of Commerce, said it would be regrettable if such an important piece of legislation was filed away after passage and rendered ineffective because the government failed to address valid concerns.

Former Progressives Premier, and Hon. MP for Red Bay, Sir Alden McLaughlin is in favour of the ID card and registry but also questions the haste with which the PACT government was proceeding with it, which he feels is counterproductive.


"I think we all understand the critical importance and the benefits that having a national ID will bring to a whole range of experiences which the average person living and working in Cayman - not just Caymanians - have to deal with." Among those, he said, is the discrepancy where naturalised Caymanians have a single identification document but born Caymanians must present numerous pieces of information to prove their status.

Sir Alden who was also at the forefront of previous efforts to introduce digital ID cards, said there were still several issues surrounding the system which need to be resolved before putting it in place.

"Conceptually, we have no difficulty with what's being proposed," he said, but added: "I do not believe that due regard is being paid by the government to concerns which are being expressed, increasingly various sectors of the community including the legal fraternity."

Hon. MP Moses Kirkconnell (Progressives) also implored the PACT government to delay the introduction and extend the consultation period for at least another two to three months.

Mr Kirkconnell cited a letter sent by the leader of the Progressive's opposition, Roy McTaggart, to the government in late November urging to delay the bill. He also read an extract from correspondence seen by the Opposition of one company's concerns on behalf of its clients and seeking public disclosure and discussion of amendments the government was considering



"This letter is was extremely important," he stated. "It registers the level of interest and concern from the community that it has moved to another level of concern with a large form representing a client that is concerned about the legislation."

PACT: TIMELY AND NECESSARY

Speaking in support of the joint bills for the digital ID card and registry, Hon. Deputy Governor, Franz Manderson said he was pleased that the system was finally being implemented.

"I am pleased that it will finally come to fruition," he said, describing it as "necessary to create the foundation for a high standard of customer service affording transparency and accountability that complies with a robust Data Protection Act and enables the government to adapt in tandem with the development of widely used technology."

Mr Manderson recalled a situation in which the vast majority of Caymanians who had turned out for a job fair, had no form of ID to verify who they were, which also caused major challenges in even setting bank accounts for them.

Hon. Minister of Finance, Chris Saunders, acknowledged the role of the previous Progressives administration in setting the stage for the introduction of a national ID card and registry system. But he countered the reservations of the Opposition by saying that with the system due to come on stream by July next year, there is adequate time to make adjustments and amendments as necessary after the law is passed.

"At the end of the day, we have to get started at some point. We have to get started. At least passing this now gives us the green light to start moving to the next stages where we can start the implementation process," he reasoned.

Hon. Attorney General, Samuel Bulgin, assured that human rights and data protection were guaranteed in the legislation and also pointed out that the previous plan for mandatory registration had been withdrawn with the public now having the choice to participate voluntarily.

"The real issue is if there is any sort of fundamental defect in the legislation itself. We examined it from the human rights perspective and we haven't been able to find any fundamental problems with privacy or any of those other rights that would have been (affected) by the legislation," he outlined, stressing that the system is voluntary. "Persons will have the choice to opt-in if they want to...From a privacy and a human rights standpoint, the legislation meets all those tests."

Hon. Premier Wayne Panton defended his PACT coalition government's move to press ahead with what he called 'an excellent piece of legislation'.

According to Premier Panton, the benefits will become obvious very soon and he will be among the first to sign up.

"Before this thing is completely rolled out you'll have people recognising the increasing value of it, and I think the ministry will be even more busy than they anticipate because they are going to get a lot of people participating. I want to be one of the first ones," Premier Panton stated.

Crooks is top of the world



The Cayman Islands can now boast a world champion swimmer amongst its sporting legends; take a bow Jordan Crooks, the men's 50-metre freestyle king. Sporting history for the Cayman Islands was made as the 20-year-old Caymanian won gold at the FINA World Championships (25 metres pool) in Melbourne, Australia.

This is by far the greatest achievement of any sports person representing Cayman in any sport. The fact that not so long ago Cayman used to struggle to win medals at CARIFTA is testament to how dramatically and impressively this tiny country has come through its fantastic swimming programme.

Crooks started out in an unseeded preliminary 50m freestyle heat where he established the fastest semi-final qualifying time of 20.36 seconds. This time is the fifth fastest ever in this event. Later that afternoon in the semi-finals, a composed Crooks turned in a blistering 20.31 seconds, assuring him the top seed in the finals.

His gold medal swim early Saturday morning was against Olympic medallists and reigning champions. The pressure was intense from start to finish and Jordan hit the wall first in 20.46 seconds to make history. He finished a finger tip ahead of UK's Ben Proud (20.49) and the Trinidadian

an Dylan Carter (20.72).

Minister Bernie Bush said: "On behalf of the Ministry of Youth, Sports, Culture & Heritage (YSCH), the Cayman Islands Government and Caymanians everywhere I wish to extend congratulations to swimmer Jordan Crooks on this historic achievement. Watching Jordan win gold was nothing short of impressive and phenomenal. This young Caymanian's stellar achievements over the past week has made him the fastest man in this event! We are with you Jordan and wishing you continued success on the road to the 2024 Paris Olympics."

Jordan started his exhausting week of the world championship campaign in the 100m freestyle as an unseeded competitor. He went on to post the fastest preliminary time – a blazing 45.61 seconds, a personal best as well as a new national record. In the semis he secured a finals place as the fastest qualifier in 45.55 seconds. In the finals he went out in a blistering 21.31 seconds and led for the first 75m but was unable to hold off the defending world champion – Kyle Chalmers – and finished in 45.77 seconds, in tied sixth place.

And while Jordan was impacting as a serious contender for the 2024 summer Olympics, sister Jillian – who swam the 50m butterfly and 100m free – impressed too. Jillian set two new national records, in the 50m butterfly in 26.40 seconds and the 100m free in 54.20 seconds.



Cayman Islands Aquatic Sports Association president Steve Broadbelt said: "Jordan's shown he can swim at world record pace and is now the new world champion in the elite world of swimming. After the 100m freestyle, the president of World Aquatics Husain Al-Musallam asked to meet Jordan. He, along with the president of Pan Am Aquatics Maureen Croes met with Jordan, Jillian and Cayman Swimming's Technical Director and National Coach Jacky Pellerin and, after congratulating our swimmers he spoke of his support for the continued development of swimming in the Cayman Islands, and in the CARIFTA and Pan Am Aquatics regions."

Minister Bush added: "Applause and congratulations must also go to Jillian Crooks on her outstanding performances at FINA. The Olympian is truly a phenom in her own right, once more proving that these swimming siblings are a formidable duo. Much credit must also to their parents on their unending dedication to their success. I must also thank CIASA on its continued commitment and support to our swimmers."

Liquor and Music and Dancing Licence Holders Receive New Year's Extension

Liquor and Music and Dancing licence holders will get an extension beyond regular closing times on New Year's Eve.

The Liquor Licensing Board made the decision this week that bars, nightclubs, restaurants and hotels are permitted to sell liquor until 1:50 am and play music until 2:00 am on the morning of Sunday, 1

January 2023. All other licensing stipulations remain in effect.

The Board also noted that there are no extensions in effect for Christmas Eve on Saturday, 24 December.

No Alcohol Sales on Christmas Day

The Department of Commerce and Investment (DCI), along with the Liquor Licensing Board for Grand Cayman and the Sister Islands, wishes to advise the public of Christmas Day-related restrictions on alcohol sales.

Liquor license holders, in the retail bar, nightclub, package, distributor, and retail mobile categories, must adhere to the license restriction which prohibits the sale of intoxicating liquor on Christmas Day, Sunday 25 December 2022.

The prohibition period begins at 12am on 25 December and ends at 11:59pm. Licence holders are reminded that all sales must cease 10 minutes before closing.

Hotel and restaurant licenses are not



subject to this prohibition, in accordance with Section 11 of the

Liquor Licensing Act (2019 Revision).

Music and Dancing Control Amendment Bill Passed in Parliament

The Music and Dancing (Control) Amendment Bill, 2022 was passed during the latest meeting of Parliament, which began on 7 December.

Presented by the Minister for Financial Services and Commerce, the Hon. André Ebanks, the Bill is intended to equalise economic opportunities for owners of stand-alone bars and seagoing vessels on Sundays.

Once the Bill is gazetted and comes into force, licensed stand-alone retail bars and sea-going vessels will be able to play music of a low, background nature for their patrons, on Sundays during the prescribed operating hours. This is not limited to pre-recorded music, which was a

prior restriction under previous legislation.

This year's Youth Sailing Championship was one for the ages. Cayman sailors were pushed to the brink of their sailing limits over two days of competition. In what most described as 'on the verge of survival mode' conditions; thirty-nine youth sailors battled it out for 2022 sailing supremacy on the North Sound. Sailors were split across four classes of boats - Optimist Green (beginners), Optimist Championship (advance), Hartley 12 (double handed) and International Laser Class Association 4 (ILCA 4) (single handed). In the end, reigning Hartley champions Molly DeSeram and Stella Dean were the only ones to successfully defend their title and three new champions were crowned.

Saturday was the windiest of the two days, sailors had to contend with 20 knot gusty winds from the North northeast, coupled with the infamous North Sound chop, which made sailing on the day an arduous task, especially on the upwind legs. But these conditions only strengthen the sailors resolve. Race officer Peta Adams who had a front seat view of the action said, "I was in awe by what I saw from the sailors today".

In the optimist championship fleet (15yrs and under), there was a hard-fought battle between Cameron Lloyd, Bronwen Burt and Russell Wilson. Cameron led the first day with two bullets and both Bronwen and Russell had one a piece. They would go into the final day on 6, 9 & 9 points respectively. Bronwen took the fight to Cameron on Sunday, tying up the points with two bullets of her own, which meant that it was all to play for going into the final race. Ebba Collins, who had a remarkable day two, took first place in the

final race closely followed by Cameron. Cameron was crowned optimist champion with 10 points, Bronwen second place on 11 and Russell third place on 14. In the beginner's optimist class, Red Bay Primary student Zaiden Doctor took first place, followed by Harrison Hewitt and Alexander Butterworth.

In the ILCA 4 fleet there was another three-way battle between Allie Capasso, Lyndon Pickering and Victoria Rowlette for the championship going into the final race of the day. With just one point separating 1st and 2nd, and one between 2nd and 3rd, it was all dependent on the final race. In the end it was Allie who was unfazed by the pressure and sailed her way into first place to take the championship. Even though Victoria finished ahead of Lyndon in the last race (which meant that they were tied on points after their discarded race), Lyndon was awarded second overall because he had more first place finishes than Victoria; this was in accordance with "The Racing Rules of Sailing Appendix A".

Hartley 12 Defending champions, Molly and Stella were the standout performers at this year's event, finishing the regatta with six bullets from 7 races. This was the third consecutive championship across two fleets that dynamic duo has won. Most improved sailor of the year, Claudia Bullmore and her crew Dominic Gunn were second, followed by Nicholas Sved and Kaden Ramos in third.

Every person who is entitled to be registered as an elector in the **Newlands, Savannah, Bodden Town West and Bodden Town East** electoral district(s) and who wishes to have his/her name placed on the Register of Electors for the three month period commencing on the **1st day of April, 2023** shall, unless already registered in the current Register of Electors, apply in writing in Form 4 for registration as an elector, which duly completed form must be received by the registering officer for the said electoral district(s) on or before the registration date, namely the **1st day of January, 2023**.

- (b) Every person not disqualified on any of the grounds set out in the next paragraph of this notice is qualified to be registered as an elector in the said electoral district if he or she –

Qualifications of Electors

90(1) Subject to section 91, a person shall be entitled to be registered as an elector in one electoral district only, but he or she shall not be entitled to be registered as an elector for elections to the Legislative Assembly unless—

- (a) he or she was, on the day immediately preceding the date of commencement of this Constitution, entitled to be registered as an elector; or
- (b) he or she –
- is a Caymanian; and
 - has attained the age of eighteen years; and
 - is resident in the Cayman Islands at the date of registration; and
 - has been resident in the Cayman Islands for a period or periods amounting to not less than two years out of the four years immediately preceding the date of registration;
- or
- (c) on the day of the issue of a writ ordering an election, he or she is otherwise qualified under paragraph (b) but has not attained the age of eighteen, but he or she will attain that age on or before the polling day at the election.

Disqualifications of Electors

91(1) A person shall not be entitled to be registered as an elector in any electoral district who—

- subject to subsection (2) is serving a sentence of imprisonment (by whatever name called) exceeding twelve months imposed on him or her by a court in any country or substituted by competent authority for some other sentence imposed on him or her by such a court, or is under such a sentence of imprisonment the execution of which has been suspended;
 - is a person certified to be insane or otherwise adjudged to be of unsound mind under any law in force in the Cayman Islands; or
 - is disqualified for registration as an elector by any law in force in the Cayman Islands relating to offences connected with elections.
- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1)(a)—
- where a person is serving two or more sentences of imprisonment that are required to be served consecutively he or she shall, throughout the whole time during which he or she so serves, be regarded as serving a sentence exceeding twelve months if (but not unless) any one of those sentences exceeds that term;
 - no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed as an alternative to or in default of the payment of a fine; and
 - no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed by a court outside the Cayman Islands other than a sentence on conviction of an offence constituted by conduct which, if it occurred within the Cayman Islands, would constitute an offence punishable under the law of the Cayman Islands by imprisonment of twelve months or any greater punishment.
- (d) A revised list containing the names, street address and occupation of all persons qualified to vote in the said district –
- whose names appear in the current Register of Electors; or
 - who have submitted to the registration officer a duly completed and signed application for registration in Form 4 will be available at the Elections Office in George Town, the District Administration Office in Cayman Brac and the Post Office in Little Cayman for a period of twenty-one days beginning on the **20th day of January, 2023**.
- (e) copies of Form 4 may be obtained at the following places –
- any post office or sub-post office;
 - the registering office for any electoral district; or
 - the Elections Office
- (f) The registering officer for the electoral district(s) is **Kerry Nixon**.

Natey Jones will make his American stage debut as Ivan.



CARICOM at slavery forum

Caribbean countries seeking reparations for slavery and colonial domination in the past now have the full backing of CARICOM who sent representatives to Switzerland for the first conference to discuss these issues.

Delegates attending the inaugural United Nations Permanent Forum on People of African Descent in Geneva earlier this month have supported the Caribbean Community's (CARICOM) ten-point reparation plan, calling for its adoption globally.

Gaynel Diana Curry, a Bahamian, was one of the five experts appointed earlier this year to serve on the United Nations Permanent Forum on People of African Descent. She outlined the priorities for CARICOM, including reparatory justice, climate justice, systemic racism, and socio-economic opportunities, faced by vulnerable and marginalised groups of people of African descent, especially women, children and migrants, and LGBTQ+ people.

Matthew Wilson is the Barbados Ambassador and Permanent Representative-Designate to the United Nations and the World Trade Organisation. He said: "What we have collectively launched today is for our ancestors and for our descendants still to come. It is brave. It is necessary. It is a long time coming.

"In the Caribbean there was a long history of advocating, articulating, and agitating

around issues of racism and the injustices inherent in post-colonial societies. In CARICOM these issues have been placed very high on its agenda, with the prime ministerial sub-agenda on reparations being chaired by Barbados' Prime Minister, Mia Mottley, with its core members, Guyana, Haiti, St. Vincent, and Suriname."

The CARICOM Reparations Commission (CRC) states that European governments were owners and traders of enslaved Africans, committed mass genocide, and created the legal, financial, and fiscal policies necessary for the enslavement of Africans.

Professor Verene Shepherd, chair of the United Nations Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, said she is pleased that the forum had been created after serving with various pro-African organisations at the UN in recent years.

Using the Pan Africanist Marcus Garvey as an inspiration, Shepherd said she hopes that the Durban declaration for permanent action will finally be implemented in the search of reparatory justice.

The forum came two years shy of the International Decade for People of African Descent coming to an end and follows the General Assembly that in August 2021, adopted a resolution to create "a platform for improving the safety and quality of life and livelihoods of people of African descent".

Throughout the four days of meetings, the forum repeatedly acknowledged the commonality between the climate crisis, poverty, disability, racism, the Sustainable Development Goals, food justice and gender inequalities and has called for a holistic approach to addressing the lives of people of African descent. There was also recognition and appreciation for the work of faith-based organisations like the World Council of Churches in supporting people of African descent.

LIAT workers still waiting for pay

Some LIAT workers who were laid off when the airline almost went out of business nearly three years ago, are still fighting for a severance settlement.

The Antigua and Barbuda Workers' Union (ABWU) has urged the governments of the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) to get involved in rescuing cash-strapped regional carrier LIAT.

ABWU General Secretary David Masiah has written to Antigua and Barbuda Prime Minister Gaston Browne, calling on governments to come together and devise a plan to aid the airline and support employees laid off in March 2020 after it suspended operations when the pandemic exacerbated its financial woes.

The governments of Antigua and Barbuda, Barbados, Dominica, and St Vincent & the Grenadines - the four major shareholders of LIAT - resolved four months ago to liquidate the debt-ridden airline and

transfer its assets to a new company, LIAT 2020 (Antigua). The existing airline has been in court-appointed administration in Antigua and Barbuda since July 2020.

It continues to operate three ATR42-600s and holds an Antiguan Air Operator's Certificate and EU Third Country Operator authorisation for flights to French and Dutch territories in the Caribbean. It operates about 50 flights a week, 90 percent less than its 500 weekly services before the pandemic. The result has been a lack of access for air cargo and passengers to the detriment of tourism, trade, employment, business, and social relations.

Meanwhile, laid-off workers are still awaiting their pay-outs.

Last year Antigua and Barbuda promised the equivalent of US\$750,000 in severance pay to former employees in Antigua, French Caribbean News reported. But they have received little or nothing.


