EAST-WEST CORRIDOR EXTENSION PLAN DRIVES DEBATE


A series of large-scale road projects are underway as efforts continue to ease Cayman's chronic road congestion problem.

But striking the right balance between transport connectivity and minimising the impact on Cayman's delicate environment remains a persistent and major hurdle for policymakers, engineers, the public and campaigners.


Meetings are being held this week to gauge public feedback on one of those projects, the East-West Arterial Extension.

The National Roads Authority(NRA) justifies the project by stating that the project will reduce travel times to and from George Town for East End, North Side and Bodden Town residents, and will assist in the promotion and implementation of sustainable public transportation (dedicated bus lanes).

It will serve as a major horizontal conveyance and treatment for future stormwater management systems. It will also enhance access to tourist destinations and will also serve as an emergency route when coastal roads are compromised and preserve connectivity between population centres.

On Monday 30 January 2023, Dr. Robert W. UCCI's partnerships with other universities and organizations open global opportunities for faculty, students, and staff. These worldwide collaborations increase the quality of UCCI's teaching and learn-

ing, research, and innovation amongst many further benefits. These include exchange programs for staff and students, joint seminars, lectures and meetings, joint research projects, program collaborations and much more.

More than 50 Cayman Brac dignitaries, community members, UCCI board members, staff and students attended a meet and

greet with the new UCCI President and CEO, Dr. Robert W. Robertson at the Brac campus on Friday 27 January 2023. In attendance

was the Minister of Education, District Administration and Lands, the Honorable Juliana O'Connor-Connolly, who shared her vision for a new UCCI campus.

Also present was the Chairman of the Board of Governors, Mr. Gilbert McLean, alongside fellow board members, Mr. Carson Ebanks and Dr. Gayle Woods plus representatives from Public Works, HSA, the Layman E. Scott High School, and many local businesses.

The University College of the Cayman Islands serves the communities of Grand Cayman and Cayman Brac and has a growing footprint in the Brac. Serving students from the ages of 16 to 65+, UCCI is dedicated to enhancing the educational opportunities there. With the support of the Minister of Education, UCCI commits to working with businesses, community members, stakeholders, and the school to bring a greater offer to Cayman Brac.

UCCI currently offers in the Brac a full-time dual enrolment programme for students from the Layman E. Scott High School and both daytime and evening part time courses for people of all ages, in areas as diverse as tourism and construction.

The news of expansion coincided with an announcement from the Minister of Education, the Honorable Juliana O'Connor-Connolly that the PACT Government is still committed to providing a free education to Caymanians. The Minister also highlighted her plans for the University to move into the Layman E. Scott campus over the next few years once the High School moves up to its new location on the bluff. It is expected that an expanded facility would provide many synergies and enable the delivery of much needed workforce skills training on Cayman Brac, including training in conjunction with neighboring Public Works Department.

Mr. Gilbert McLean, Board Chairman of UCCI's Board of Governors, confirmed the

support of the University for an enhanced presence in the Brac and committed the efforts of the Board in delivering the Minister's vision.

Dr. Robert W. Robertson, President, and Chief Executive Officer of UCCI, commented: "UCCI is strongly committed to offering educational pathways to the whole Cayman Brac community. We recognize that there is a lot of talent on the island and many people who wish to progress in their careers and lives. As the Minister rightly said, vocational trade skills are hugely in demand in the Brac. A shortage of plumbers, electricians and more, are areas of need that UCCI has a duty to fill. We will shortly be introducing robust, accredited trade qualifications so that the Cayman Brac community can up-skill and gain skills that will provide them with a good living wage for their entire lives.

"UCCI was recently recognized by the National Center for Construction Education and Skills (NCCER) as an accredited provider of vocational skills training. These short stackable qualifications will be introduced to Cayman Brac to help meet industry needs. 2023 is shaping up to be a very positive year for UCCI."

Shavon Bodden, Deputy Registrar at UCCI's Cayman Brac campus, commented, "We were thrilled to host a community meet and greet and it was great to see so many of our instructors, students and community leaders attend on the day. Jay Ebanks, the Minister of Planning, Agriculture, Housing and Infrastructure, is encouraging everyone to support the upcoming annual Cayman Islands Agriculture Shows, starting this month.

The events are organised by the Cayman Islands Agricultural Society (CIAS) with the support of the Agriculture Ministry and other key stakeholders. They will be in Grand Cayman on Ash Wednesday, February 22; Cayman Brac on Saturday, March 18 and Little Cayman, Saturday April 29.

Minister Ebanks praised CIAS for restoring the events after a two-year hiatus due to the pandemic as well as the damage suffered by several farmers from Tropical Storm Grace. "It is good that the agriculture shows are back on track," he said. "The Government has been supporting our commercial farmers to modernise and strengthen the sector and will continue to assist them with needed resources. They have been focusing on their rehabilitation efforts, and so I feel confident they are in a position to put on a good show this year.

"I want to encourage everyone to turn out for the agricultural shows. They provide an opportunity to support our hardworking farmers as they sell their produce, display their livestock and just showcase

the best of what we have in agriculture."

George Smith, President of CIAS said that this year will be bigger and better than previous events. "In the coming days, the Society will share more details with the public on what will be a truly memorable event, starting with the show in Grand Cayman."

Features of the event on Ash Wednesday will include Farm Queen Competition, Beautiful Baby Competition, expanded agro industrial area, district and livestock displays, equestrian showcase, interactive children area, food court, live music and entertainment.

The internationally renowned Chicago Boyz Acrobatic Team, a professional gymnastics troupe and members of the Cuban Circus, are confirmed for the event.

As part of the agriculture activities, the Ministry of Planning, Agriculture, Housing and Infrastructure and the George Town Revitalisation Initiative will host a family-friendly town market on Cardinal Avenue, George Town on Friday, February 17. Over 25 vendors, including farmers and other artisans, will have their produce and other locally made items for sale.

The heart of George Town came to life on Saturday January 28th as the 40th anniversary of Cayman's National Carnival, Cayman Carnival Batabano, was officially launched and celebrated.

The extended Batabano week begins with Junior Batabano on April 22th. and runs through May 7th with J'ouvert April 29th, Steel Pan on Wednesday May 3rd, an International Costume Showcase on Thursday May 4th, Friday Night Fete on May 5th, and the 40th anniversary Grand Costume Parade on Saturday May 6th.

Minister for Tourism and Transport, the Hon. Kenneth Bryan, attended the event and congratulated the organization on its 40th anniversary. "As the Minister for Tourism and Entertainment I have already given my commitment that we will be a major sponsor again this year for Batabano, so I'm really looking forward to it," he stated. "We went through a whole lot since the pandemic and we

want to get our entertainment back to where it once was, lively and robust." The Minister added that he is also looking forward to being in a Batabano shirt in the parade this year.

Police Investigate Serious Assault in George Town

Shortly after 2:00AM on Saturday morning, 4 February, officers responded to a report of an altercation at a bar on Shedden Road, east of Eastern Avenue. Officers attended the location and observed a man who appeared to have been assaulted and received a wound to the back of the head. The other persons involved left the location prior to police arrival.

Emergency Services attended the location and transported the man to the

Cayman Islands Hospital to be treated for what appear to be serious injuries. He remains in hospital in critical but stable condition.

Police Investigate Robbery in George Town

Shortly after 6:30PM on Thursday, 2 February, officers responded to a report of a robbery at an address on Kennedy Drive in George Town - which has previously been the scene of two reports of robberies related to illegal gambling.

It was reported that two persons visiting the location were seated outside when they were approached by a masked man carrying a machete who demanded cash. The man then made off with two bags belonging to the vic-

tims, containing cash, bank cards and personal items. No one was injured during the incident.

The suspect is described as being about 5'10" tall of light complexion. He was wearing a black shirt over his face, a multi-coloured shirt, dark shorts and dark sneakers.

The matter is currently under investigation and anyone with any information is asked to contact George Town CID at 949-4222.

Incoming Passenger Detained for Weapons

The Customs & Border Control Service confirms that on 28, January 2023, CBC Officers seized three (3) firearms, a 9mm Semi-Auto Rifle; a 9mm Pistol; and 12 gauge shotgun from a male passenger arriving from Canada at Owen Roberts International Airport (ORIA).

"I commend the actions of the CBC Of-

ficers in seizure of these weapons," said Deputy Premier and Minister of Border Control & Labour. "It's because of their skills and training that they are able to make such finds and continue to protect our borders."

The passenger, was arrested and remains in custody and investigations are on-going

Man Arrested for Traffic and Other Offenses Following Attempt to Evade Police

On Wednesday afternoon, 1st February, officers were dispatched to a report of an incident which had taken place in the vicinity of Powell Smith Road in West Bay. It was reported that the driver of a silver Honda Accord had brandished what appeared to be a firearm at another driver, after the two were involved in a collision, and made threats before driving off.

The same vehicle was spotted by officers shortly afterwards and was signaled to stop, however the driver continued driving recklessly and at high speed. Officers established traffic control points along the Esterley Tibbetts Highway in an effort to stop the vehicle, however the driver evaded these, continuing to drive dangerously in the process, and collided with a private vehicle and a marked service vehicle. Shortly afterwards the vehicle collided with another private vehicle in the vicinity of Snug Harbour Drive and came to a stop. The driver then attempt-

ed to evade police on foot but was captured.

The driver, a man age 33 of West Bay, was arrested in relation to traffic and other offenses. Emergency services attended the location and the man was taken to hospital by ambulance. He was subsequently discharged and taken into custody.

Searches were conducted of the man's person and the vehicle, and an imitation firearm was recovered. The man has been further arrested in relation to the imitation firearm and remains in custody as investigations continue.



Water-Related Death in West Bay



At about 12:00PM on Saturday, 4 February, officers responded to a re-

port that a man had been found unresponsive in a boat in the waters near the Kimpton resort in West Bay. The man was brought back to shore by a private vessel and later pronounced dead.

The matter is currently under investigation, however the circumstances of the death are not considered suspicious at this time.

Newcomers, seasoned swimmers come out for 34th CUC 800 Sea Swim



As 7-year-old Ashley Christian stepped out of the water onto the soft sands of Governor's Beach, she glanced back to take it all in.

"I was challenging myself," said Christian, who was participating in her first Cayman Islands Aquatic Sports Association (CIASA) open water event when she took off in Saturday's (28 Feb.) 34th-annual CUC 800-metre Sea Swim. "I was scared I was going to lose but my mom said that even if I don't win, I can be proud that I finished."

Thomas Ferguson was the first to finish while Harper Barrowman was the top female finisher. It was a day of fun and development for Cayman Swimming, which saw 103 swimmers register for the 800; while a number of younger or less-experienced swimmers took on the 400-metre course, including Christian.

"We're thrilled to see young swimmers coming out to try their first open water swim," said CIASA President Ste-

phen Broadbelt. "These swims are all about having fun, bringing the community together and developing a love for the sport regardless of ability or experience."

Ferguson, who finished first in the Foster's 800 event in November, placed first in the CUC 800 by clocking a time of 10-minutes, 47.02 seconds. That was more than two seconds better than Will Sellars, who finished second in 10:49.05, edging third-place Dominic Hilton (10:50.02). Jordan Lisle (10:55.99) and Connor MacDonald (11:01.67) rounded out the top five. Barrowman (11:02.49) placed sixth overall, followed by Sierrah Broadbelt (11:14.02), Riley Watson (11:20.05) and Lola Haworth (11:33.14).

The event marked the first of four CIASA open water events for 2023.

"CUC has always been involved in all sorts of sports, particularly sports that involve kids," said Sacha Tibbetts, CUC's Vice President of Customer Service & Technology. "It was a great turnout today — all walks of life, a cross section of the entire island and it's great to just get all of those folks together and doing something that's healthy and fun."

The next event on CIASA's open water calendar is the Flow 34th Annual 800-metre Sea Swim, slated for Saturday, 13 May.
