Premier: Cayman's growth among the best

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Camana Bay's newest buildings win Awards

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THE PRICE OF PROGRESS: RE-FRAMING CAYMAN'S EMPLOYMENT AND POPULATION DEBATE

There's been a flurry of debate surrounding the demographic and dynamics of Cayman's population based on recent employment statistics, particularly work permits.

It's a necessary debate to have but care must be taken that figures are not taken out of context.

In August last year when the 2021 Census of Population and Housing Report was published, the number of persons in the working-age population was recorded at 57,360, of which the labour force was 47,120.

The Census report showed that the labour force participation rate for Caymanians was 73.2 per cent compared to 91.4 per cent for non-Caymanians.

It also detailed that employment among Caymanians totalled 19,494 or 43.9 per cent of the total, while non-Caymanians were counted at 24,947 or 56.1 per cent.

Fast forward six months to January 2023 and it's now reported that there are over 34,000 foreign workers registered in Cayman by the Department of Work Opportunities and Residency Cayman(WORC).

In absolute numbers that's an increase of 9,129 - or almost 10,000 - or percentage terms, that's over 40 per cent.

By all counts, it's a staggering increase and should be of concern.

But what are these numbers really telling us?

NUMBERS REALLY COUNT

Crucially, Cayman does not have an illegal immigration problem anywhere near the scale of what some other countries and territories are grappling with. In fact, it's fair to say that our immigration controls are quite robust...and fair. Importantly, foreign workers are here by invitation to fill vacancies in the job market.

And while there will always be scrutiny and questions, rightfully so, about the work permit policies of governments through the years and prioritising Caymanians in the job market, one thing remains crystal clear. That is the law of supply and demand.

By all accounts, Cayman's economy is rebounding in the aftermath of the COVID-19 pandemic, outperforming many other economies regionally and globally. Given the nature of our service economy, there is a tremendous demand for workers to fill roles in tourism, construction, finance, ancillary services, government and other sectors of the economy.

DEMAND AND SUPPLY

During the economic slowdown much was said and much effort was put into training and upskilling Caymanians for new opportunities in the job market.

We anxiously await the latest updated employment statistics from the Economics and Statistics Office. (The current fig-



ure of 5.7% as of Oct 2021 scrolling on its website is woefully out of date).

Commenting on the 2021 Census Report, Hon. Deputy Premier and Minister for Labour and Finance, Chris Saunders, had said: "Our goal is to get as many of our people trained, developed and moved into the workforce, so the number is trending in the right direction."

This brings us back to the question "To what degree has the lucrative 'work permit economy' distorted the Cayman job market?

There's no question that work permit fees have been a stable revenue source for Cayman governments down through the years.

One expert quite knowledgeable of business trends and government policies in Cayman, offered us this masterclass perspective:

"The realities are this; we are a service-based economy. 95% tertiary to be exact. Our primary and secondary industries are roughly 5%. We don't have mining. We don't have manufacturing. To slow the economy means to slow down job creation.

"I will then ask the question...what area do we want to slow down: Financial services? Tourism? Construction? The reality is that with all the interest rate hikes construction will be slowed down. It will be more difficult to get loans to buy properties thus reducing demand, thus reducing supply, thus reducing jobs in that sector.

"In short," our expert said, "the market will correct itself."

Looking at the work permit debate, it was further pointed out that instead, attention needs to be focused not just on the number of foreign workers or work

permits, but more importantly on how many of the work permits are temporary and what sectors they are issued for.

"The real question to ask is this: How many of those permits are in the 'supply sector' and how many are in the 'demand sector'? That's really where the rubber meets the road," our expert concluded.

It's indeed a welcome move in the right direction that WORC is now making it a requirement that temporary vacancies must first be advertised for 14 days before a request for a work permit is submitted.

That allows for greater opportunities for Caymanian job seekers and is a further step towards further levelling the playing field which, admittedly, is somewhat uneven in some parts of the economy.

THE PRICE OF PROGRESS

Another aspect that cannot be overlooked is how 'demand for Cayman' impacts what's known in economic circles as a country's carrying capacity.

It raises the question of the size of the economy, the rate of growth, and Cayman's own ability to service this growing, in-demand, labour-hungry economic juggernaut.

More people needed to service the demands of the economy in turn means more people to be supported by the economy.

This impacts infrastructure, the road network, traffic congestion, the provision of healthcare, education and social services along with public safety and security.

It also requires an honest debate about Cayman's population projection and its carrying capacity.

As the recovery of Cayman's economy continues, the future looks bright according to Chamber representatives, who lauded the Islands' counter-measures in the wake up the disruption caused by the worldwide pandemic.

The government's handling of the crisis, has no doubt been a major catalyst for the resurgence.

and his team.


Several volunteers and donors were also recognized for their contributions to the work of the Chamber of Commerce.

See grouper moon on YouTube

The annual Nassau grouper spawning happened with the full moon last week and members of the public were able to watch this incredible phenomenon as it happened, as it was live-streamed while marine scientists conducted live educational sessions.

The video was broadcast in real time from the spawning aggregation site (SPAG) off the western tip of Little Cayman, one of the largest and last known sites in the world.

Scientists have been studying this grouper hole for over 30 years in col-

laboration between the Cayman Islands Department of Environment, the Reef Environmental Education Foundation (REEF) and other members of the regional marine science community.

The conservation project and strict fish-

ing ban at the site has played a key role in the successful recovery of Nassau grouper populations in the Cayman Islands. Generous logistical support has been provided throughout the years by the Southern Cross Club, as well as by local dive operators at the Little Cayman Beach Resort/ Reef Divers. Brac Reef Resort has provided lodging support for education efforts on Cayman Brac. Cayman Airways has provided inter-island travel support. Grants from the Disney Worldwide Conservation Fund, beginning in 2011, have supported field efforts, the Baby Grouper Adrift webpage, several outreach products, and the development and continued coordination of the Grouper Education Program.

Premier Panton Praises Cayman's Economic Resurgence

Cayman Islands Premier, the Honourable Wayne Panton outlined the successes of the Islands' post pandemic economic recovery and outlined how Cayman's growth is among the best in the region during a recent speech.

Addressing a room filled with Cayman's business community at the recent Chamber of Commerce Annual General meeting no



February 9th, the Premier said that when he took office, the Cayman Islands were at a pivotal point in the crisis brought on by the ravages of the pandemic and its effects on local businesses.

"When we took office, the country was quite literally closed," he explained, adding that, Businesses - both small and large were struggling to keep the lights on."

Mr. Panton said, with people losing their jobs and difficult times casting a bleak forecast on the Islands' economic prospects, he and his government had to act fast, and noted that though those time seem like a world away after the reopening of the Islands' borders and economy, the impacts still live with us today.

He explained that he was proud of the resilience of the business community and how people from all walks of life "rolled up their sleeves" and pulled together "...to get our "... beloved Cayman Islands working again."

The Premiere said he was pleased to be able to report that today the economy is strong and getting stronger.

He outlined some of the highlights of the Islands' recovery:

"Hotels are full again, shops and restaurants are bustling, and jobs are available up and down the economic ladder," he said.

The successful reopening of Cayman has meant that there will be a surplus in government revenue this year.

Some of the measures being taken to continue to aid the economic recovery include extending the reduction in business fees for small and micro businesses, which has proven to be a booster shot for commerce.

From June 2021 to June 2022, small businesses benefited from CI\$166,294 in fee discounts and micro businesses benefited from CI\$1,471,300 in fee discounts, respectively.

The Premiers said there have also been great strides made in meeting the ever-changing global financial regulatory regime.

"We've improved technical compliance and are largely compliant with the 40 FATF

recommendations, we have also made strong progress toward completing the FATF's 3-point plan, issued in February of 2021," he remarked.

The Cayman Islands is also developing a consolidated Beneficial Ownership Act in Parliament and examining the European Union's Court of Justice November 2022 judgement regarding beneficial ownership registers to understand its impact.

According to Mr. Panton, there is a need to "stay ahead of the curve for regulatory developments and positively contribute to the global discussion around major financial talking points..."

For the period ending on January 31st, 2023, new business applications in the Cayman Islands were up by 351 and there were 1,164 renewals, according to the Premier, who added that as of 31st December, the total number of business licenses and certificates stood at 13,309.

As the cost of living increases and the war in Ukraine rages on, the Premier said he would be challenging his government to do everything in its power to assist the Caymanian people in facing the challenges of rising prices.

To do this, the government is formulating a comprehensive 'Cayman Sustainability Agenda', which will include and adjustment to the minimum wage, a substantial new investment affordable housing -with 100 homes planned - and support for educational initiatives relating to the Community College to prepare Caymanians for higher paying jobs.

The Cayman Sustainability Agenda will mean that critical road infrastructure and housing arrangements will encourage car sharing, biking and a new clean, reliable public transportation system.

In the past four years alone, there have been roughly 13,000 cars imported in the Cayman Islands, contributing to growing congestion issues.

Energy efficiency is also a priority for the government and plans are being formulated for the Ministry of Sustainability and Climate Resiliency to assist eligible Caymanians to retrofit their homes in this regard.

Due to Cayman's geographical location, there will always be a cost of living challenge, the Premier noted, adding that this would not be solved over night but that the government was working to make things a little bit easier.

Fifteen Migrants Repatriated to Cuba





The Cayman Islands Customs and Border Control Service (CBC) repatriated fifteen (15) migrants to the Republic of Cuba on Tuesday, 14 February 2023. The twelve (12) males and three (3) females departed on the chartered Cayman Airways 737-8

from Grand Cayman at 8:39am and arrived in Cuba at 9:23am.

Acting Director of CBC Bruce Smith stated "additional migrant repatriation flights are being coordinated for the very near future. Prompt repatriation flights are part of

the CBC's and the Cayman Islands Government's approach to managing and expediting matters involving irregular migration.

Recognizing that operations of this nature involves a significant amount of planning and resources, I wish to thank

the officers of His Majesty's Cayman Islands Prison Service (HMCIPS) and Workforce Opportunities & Residency Cayman (WORC) for their excellent collaboration which contributed to the safety and overall efficiency of the operation."

Fatal Collision in Cayman Brac

Police in Cayman Brac are currently on the scene of a fatal two-vehicle collision which occurred shortly after 1:00PM today, 14 February, near the intersection of Polack Drive and Heights Road.

The driver of one of the vehicles, an off-duty police officer, has been transported to the Faith Hospital for treatment for what appear to be non-life-threatening injuries. The passenger of the other vehicle

was uninjured. However, the driver was pronounced dead on scene by medical personnel.

RCIPS accident reconstructionists from the Traffic & Roads Policing Unit in Grand Cayman are travelling to Cayman Brac to assist in the investigation.

Polack Drive is currently closed near Heights Road, as investigations continue.

RCIPS Issues Reminder on DUIs Following Weekend Arrests

This past weekend, RCIPS officers arrested nine persons on suspicion of DUI, with eight of the arrests taking place overnight Friday, from 10 to 11 February. Four of the arrests took place following motor-vehicle collisions; two drivers were arrested with a blood alcohol reading of under 0.100%.

In one incident, the driver of a vehicle attempted to evade a check point on West Bay Road by making a sudden turn onto a side street and then fleeing on foot. However, officers were able to quickly locate the two occupants of the vehicle, who appeared to be under the influence of alcohol. Both men were arrested on suspicion of DUI.

The RCIPS is reminding the public of the importance of refraining from drinking and driving. All nine persons arrested are now facing the possibility of losing their drivers licenses for at least one year if convicted. If any are repeat offenders, the penalties increase, and further repeat offenses carry the possibility of jail time.

In addition to the nine DUI arrests, three persons were also arrested for driving whilst disqualified over the weekend.

"We are forever vigilant, looking out for persons who potentially compromise the safety of other road users," says Superintendent Brad Ebanks. "Fortunately, only one person received minor injuries as a result of being involved in a collision and has subsequently been discharged from hospital".

RCIPS officers continue to proactively target and prosecute persons who engage in unsafe driving behaviours. As always, the best course of action is to not drink and drive. If you plan to drink, plan not to drive.

CICG Continues To Prevent Illicit Contraband from Entering Our Islands

On Sunday, 12 February, 2023, while engaged in border protection patrols to the south of Grand Cayman, the Cayman Islands Coast Guard was alerted to the presence of a single vessel of interest traveling towards the Island.

When approached, the vessel of interest in-

creased its speed and attempted to evade the CICG Vessel, resulting in a chase. During the chase, officers onboard the CICG vessel observed that a number of packages were being thrown into the ocean by persons onboard the vessel being followed. As the CICG closed the distance between them, the operator of the vessel being followed attempted to evade capture by running his vessel into the side of the CICG vessel on three occasions.

The vessel was eventually stopped and the occupants, three males, were questioned as to their actions. During this time the vessel they were on began to take on water and eventually sunk. Having been taken onboard the CICG vessel, they were subsequently arrested on suspicion of being concerned with the importation of controlled drugs into the Islands and were then transported to shore and handed over to RCIPS. The men were subsequently taken to the Cayman Islands Hospital, as



they reported having injuries.

With the assistance of the RCIPS Air Operations Unit a number of packages were recovered from the ocean, and subsequently handed over to the RCIPS.

All three men were examined at the Cayman Islands Hospital, and released later that night. They remain in custody pending further investigation by the police.

The CICG Vessel involved in the chase, although sustaining some damage, remains operational, and luckily, none of its crew members sustained serious injuries.

UPDATE: Men Charged Following Drug Interdiction, 15 February

The three men who were arrested on Sunday have now been formally charged with one count each of Illicit Trafficking, Being Concerned in the Importation of Controlled Drugs (Ganja), Reckless and Dangerous Act, Damage to Property and Resisting or Obstructing an Arrest.

Antigua's new migrant trouble

The Antigua and Barbuda government has a fresh problem after hundreds of West African migrants who arrived recently on Antigua Airways are seeking to stay and not return

The government said that hundreds of African migrants who travelled to the island in the past three months from West Africa will not be allowed citizenship, but may be offered residency and work permits.

Information Minister Melford Nicholas said on whether they would be issued with Antiguan passports: "No, I don't think that that is on the cards, but certainly the whole idea of residency and work permits, that is part of the legal framework that we are considering,"

The main opposition United Progressive Party (UPP) called for a Commission of Inquiry last week to determine if the authorities are actually human trafficking after supporters staged protests against the government's decision to legalise the status of hundreds of African migrants.

Opposition Leader Jamale L. Pringle led the protest outside the office of the Prime Minister Gaston Browne. Pringle said: "There is some semblance of human trafficking after the Cabinet said it had discussed the treatment to be meted out to the visitors who arrived on charters from West Africa.

"We are asking the government to come clean on this matter and how we can be comfortable knowing that this situation is a legitimate situation is by a public inquiry. We are now seeing over 700 persons on the ground and they are not in a comfortable position."

Nicholas said: "One of the features we have asked the Immigration (Department) to be able to do is a skills audit, to determine whether we have some additional attendant benefits to be derived from some of these persons who are here."

The Government said that 637 of over 900 people who arrived between November and January remained in Antigua. Many of them are Cameroonians fleeing civil war there. But it is unclear how many of them are seeking asylum having arrived on Antigua Airways or other chartered airlines.

The government said last week it has examined the circumstances under which the Antigua Airways flights were conceived and originated. It said the passengers were professional citizens of Nigeria and neighbouring countries who wished to travel to the Caribbean as tourists.

A government spokesman said: "The Cabinet was informed that the visitors remaining in Antigua can be located in several small hotels and guest houses across the island. An offer to return them to their country is to be made, though many are likely to choose to stay, it was reported. Some arrangement may likely be made to ensure that their status is legal."

Ex-Honduras leader 'bribed' by rich family

Former Honduran President Juan Orlando Hernandez was bribed by the country's prominent Rosenthal family, which owned a "massive" group of businesses in the Central American country, U.S. prosecutors said on Friday.

Hernandez, former US ally who led Honduras from 2014 until January 2022, was extradited to the United States last April on charges of receiving millions of dollars

from drug-trafficking organisa- Rosenthal family in Honduras, detinental's chief, Jaime Rosenthal, tions in exchange for protecting them from investigation and arrest. He has pleaded not guilty.

In court papers filed on Friday, prosecutors said evidence at Hernandez's trial, currently scheduled for September 18, will show that the former president "also received bribes from the Rosenthals as well as helped them obtain business contracts to launder money."

Marlon Duarte, a lawyer for the





His son Yani Rosenthal and another family member, Yankel Rosenthal - both former Honduran congressmen - served US prison sentences after pleading guilty to money laundering. Both were released in 2020. Their case is separate from the charges against Hernandez.






