
Caribbean tourism is a business where the value proposition clearly communicates the product and services our warm weather destinations can deliver to our "customers". It has the potential to be exploited as an even stronger engine of Caribbean economic growth.

Caribbean tourism includes agricultural linkages and touches countless areas of economic activity, including community development, meetings and incentives, cruise, cultural, eco/environmental, education and training, farm stays, flora and fauna, health and wellness, long stay, marine, medical tourism, faith/spirituality, sports, weddings and more.

Source markets include Africa, The Americas, China, Europe, Russia and Southeast Asia. So far, we have only scratched the surface in terms of making these vast audiences aware of the boundless attractiveness of our tourism product.

The economic gearing system is central to investment in the tourism sector. It is depicted by three connected gears of different sizes. The biggest gear brings in visitors from far and wide and drives the system. This is facilitated by air and cruise arrivals.

The second gear provides the hospitality framework, including accommodations, food and beverage, entertainment, attrac-



tions and activities, and infrastructural revitalization that is consistent with consumer demand. This is facilitated by local as well as foreign investment.

The smallest, fastest spinning gear, coupled with the other two, can build up phenomenal momentum, creating commensurate employment and steady economic growth in the system. This is facilitated by enterprise development but requires a shepherding function and a self-sustaining system of seed, equity and working capital funding.

I recall a visitor from Japan who was on a mercy mission to Barbados on behalf of a

He continued that there are more than 100 million people in Japan, tens of millions of whom constitute a major potential market for Caribbean tourism, if only they were aware of the destination.


I have told many similar stories in this same vein.



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CAYMAN PORT: THE DEBATE CONTINUES

If all goes according to the plan suggested in the Strategic Outline Case(SOC), Cayman could have a new cargo port at Breakers.

But it may take that plan a long time to materialise as already the matter is the subject of extensive coast-to-coast debate throughout the land.


From the time Hon. Minister of Tourism and Transport, Kenneth Bryan, made the unexpected announcement and tied his flag to the mast of a new cargo port, the issue has risen to the top of the national discourse with strong arguments for and against.

Driving the new debate is the Woods SOC(Strategic Outline Case) for a new cargo port, authored by Joseph Woods, Cruise and Security Manager at Cayman Islands Port Authority, and former Acting Port Director.

His report adequately addresses operational shortcomings and limitations at the present cargo facility which shares space with cruise ship passenger movements, restricting it to night-only operations.

The ports of a country - sea and air are vital indicators of its current state of development. Therefore any projections about their expansion must be tied to well-researched evidence of the country's socio-economic growth projection.

The Woods SOC recognises this, stating: "Forecasting the demand and growth in cargo is not simple, straightforward and easy, as it is influenced

by many factors. Population growth, affluence of the population, the state of the economy locally and worldwide, infrastructure development, the stage and vibrancy of the local construction industry, the volume of both stayover and cruise visitors are among the leading influences of the demand and growth for cargo importation."

It also notes that "it is inevitable that as the economy and population of the Cayman Islands continues to grow, so will the volume of cargo".

According to its assumptions, "for every increase of 5,000 in the population, the trend indicates that containerized cargo increases by an average of 5,500 TEUs (Twenty Equipment Unit/ 20-foot container).

Based on that, the report projects that "when the population reaches 100,000, we can expect to be importing an additional 33,000 TEUs per year, for a total of approximately 65,836 TEUs per year or approximately 80% of the 82,836 TEU capacity of the vessels currently calling Cayman."

That in turn relies on what the Woods SOC report says is 'based on information from the Economics and Statistics Office(ESO)' which suggests that Cayman's population will grow to between 100,000 and 120,000 in ten years.

Significantly this is not directly attributed to the ESO but is based on an extrapolation from the 2021 census report. -

And that's where the case for a new cargo port seems to go a bit adrift.

Projecting a Cayman population of 100,000 in ten years is a staggering increase of over 28,500 in a decade. That's an average increase of around 238 more people coming to live in Cayman each month or 4,856 per year.

At the outer scale, it projects a population expectation of 120,000 by 2033 - an alarming growth of over 48,500 more people in the next 10 years with an average increase in residents of 404 more persons every month, or 4,856 every year until 2033.

But according to ESO, Cayman's pop-

ulation between 2010 and 2021 grew from 55,036 to 71,105(updated to 71,432 by the time the 2021 Census report was released).

Compared to what the Woods SOC is basing its population rationale for the new cargo port on, that was a much smaller increase of 16,069 over the past ten years. It shows that around 1,606 more people came to live in Cayman each year between 2010 and 2021, or 133 per month.

The figures in the Woods report on the one hand double that each month over the next 10 years for an expected population of 100,000 and almost quadruples it if one goes by the projected population projection of 120,000 by 2033.

As population figures are so crucial to this report it would be necessary to have empirical evidence supporting this projected growth trend.

Further, in the absence of an updated National Development Strategy since Vision 2008, it's difficult to justify the broad population projections contained in the Woods report.

This opens a wider debate about whether and how Cayman can sustain a population of 100,000 within the next ten years...or if ever...and the impact on the environment, healthcare, traffic congestion, education, housing, cost of living and the demographic composition of the population.

Those are major issues to tackle even before we get to the stage of thinking about a larger cargo port and relocating it from Hog Sty Bay to possibly Breakers as recommended with all of the other issues surrounding that.

There's still much work to be done, further reports to be written and conversations and consultations to be had. It may very well be the case also that previous ideas for separate cargo and cruise facilities might even be dusted off and given another look.

But crucially, a comprehensive updated strategic national development vision for Cayman seems now to be more of a prerequisite than ever. CRUISE SHIP SCHEDULE - WEEK - FEBRUARY 27 - MARCH 3

Symposium tackles the impact of trauma

Mental health experts gathered at The Ritz-Carlton last Saturday for the sixth annual Alex Panton Foundation Mental Health Symposium to discuss the impact of trauma on the mental health of young people.

Jane Panton, Chairperson of the Alex Panton Foundation, explained that trauma was defined as a deeply distressing or life-threatening experience that left an individual feeling helpless and overwhelmed, and it had a profound effect on their mental well-being.

"Trauma affects so many in our community, much of which is experienced in formative years," Mrs Panton stated. "As we planned this year's symposium, it became evident that many of us have varied understandings of what trauma is. That is why we are here today, to gain a better understanding and to work together to support our young people who have experienced trauma."

She went on to say that trauma could be brought on by the impact of natural disasters like hurricanes, or violence, bullying, abuse, discrimination, the loss of a loved one or a global pandemic.

"The impact on us, especially in our formative years, can be devastating. Persons affected might experience symptoms such as anxiety, depression and post traumatic stress disorder. Trauma can also impact their relationships and ability to trust others, as well as their ability to perform well at school or work," she furthered.

Mrs Panton said the personal stories shared by the symposium's speakers, such as Rhonda Kelly, a Board member of the Alex Panton Foundation whose own daughter, Addi, succumbed to the impact of mental health, would help to provide a deeper understanding of the impact of trauma on young people. She said such individuals showed immense courage in sharing their stories.

She continued that young people were able to recover from trauma and support was available to allow them to process their experiences and learn coping strategies, some of which were shared at the symposium. "Let's talk about trauma. Let's open up the conversation to support our young people who are suffering silently because it is the invisible elephant in the room that few people want to tackle," Mr Panton said.

Governor Martyn Roper also spoke at the opening of the symposium and said that it was essential to address the subject of trauma affecting the mental health of Cayman's young people, if the island was to make any progress in changing things. In Cayman, he said there was still a stigma in openly discussing people's own mental health.

"There is a serious mental health challenge impacting our young people," he stated. "There are cultural taboos within our community that we do need to tackle. Substance use and abuse is one that is being looked at. Mental health anxiety is also linked to individuals' sexual identity, linked to the sexual abuse of children."

These were sensitive and difficult issues which needed to be looked at before progress could be made, he said.

"The emotional and psychological effects of trauma, particularly from those issues that I have highlighted, can be devastating and long lasting, particularly to young people who are still developing their sense of self and identity," Governor Roper said. "It can lead to a range of mental health issues including depression anxiety and PTSD, all of which can have a highly negative affect on a person's ability to work and form healthy relationships... that trauma can last a lifetime."

The Alex Panton Foundation gave him hope that such issues could be tackled and people could be made comfortable discussing their mental health with their family and friends and get the support they needed to heal from trauma and also build resilience.

"This starts with creating safe spaces where they can feel heard and understood and provided access to quality mental health and psychological services," he said.

Alex's Place was one such place, Cayman's first adolescent-specific mental health hub which opened last month in memory of Jane and Premier Wayne Panton's son Alex, who succumbed to severe depression at the age of 16.

CIMA Seeks Public Input for CI Banknote Redesign

In light of the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, the Cayman Islands currency, currently in circulation, will be phased out and replaced with a new design featuring an effigy of His Majesty King Charles III.

As the primary financial services regulator responsible for the issue and redemption of the local currency, the Cayman Islands Monetary Authority ("CIMA"), together with the Cayman Islands Government, is workindg on a complete redesign of the current banknotes. This process is expected to be completed in 2024. The current design of our banknotes features local marine life, flora and fauna as well as references to our seafaring history and scenic locations.

CIMA is seeking the public's input via an online survey to determine which theme is

most preferred for the new banknote designs. Participants will have the option to select from specific themes and will also have an opportunity to submit additional ideas of their own. With the exception of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II's image being replaced by His Majesty King Charles III, the coin designs will remain the same.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Finance & Economic Development Honourable Chris Saunders said, "While we phase in the use of His Majesty the King's image on our bank notes and coins, it presents an opportunity to involve Caymanians of all ages and walks of life in the redesign process. The end result will be a currency design that is truly of the people and for the people of these Islands."

"We look forward to developing banknotes that Caymanian citizens can identify with and be proud to use as their money," said CIMA Managing Director, Mrs. Cindy Scotland, OBE.

She added, "The process to redesign our local banknotes will also include an educational campaign that will seek to raise awareness about the history and unique features of our local currency."

As steps to guarantee that physical cash continues to be available and accepted as a means of payment for many years to come, CIMA is also taking this opportunity to upgrade the paper used in the banknotes to polymer, which is more durable and cost effective.

Following the design process, CIMA will authorise the production of the new banknotes in consultation with the Cayman Islands banknotes printer and decide on potential issue dates. COMMUNITY


Girls Softball – Game Report

Eat for amazing results

The foods that you eat make a huge impact on your fat loss results. But it's not just about what you are eating, it's also about how much and how frequently you eat.

All of these factors make the topic of how to eat for best results a hot one with my clients! So let's dive into the most popular eating strategies...

A quick online search produces two popular eat-for-fat-loss strategies: Intermittent Fasting versus Six Small Meals.

Which strategy works best? And, more importantly, which strategy would work best for YOU? Let's find out...

Intermittent Fasting: this eating strategy cycles between periods of eating and periods of fasting. The content of your meals during eating periods is not a factor. Some cycle between eating and fasting each day, creating a small window for eating and fasting for at least 16 hours, while others cycle eating and fasting across several days, taking as much as 48 hours at a time to fast.

Pros: Humans have been fasting for thousands of years. Our bodies are well equipped to handle periods of fasting. Research shows that fasting produces benefits for disease prevention, metabolic health, weight loss and even life extension. Some find it less work to fast rather than to plan for several small meals. During eating periods you get to eat whatever you want.

Cons: Abstaining from nourishment for long periods of time can be challenging, especially when food is all around you. So-cially it can be awkward to skip meals while your friends and family break bread together. Some find themselves overeating during eating cycles, and some find the ongoing absence of food to aggravate food obsession and to produce an unbalanced focus on food.

Six Small Meals: this eating strategy, of breaking the traditional 3 square meals into 6 smaller meals that are spaced 2-3 hours apart, has been used by body builders and fitness competitors for years. The content and size of each meal is an important factor of this eating plan. Meals early in the day contain lean protein, fiber-filled veggies and a small portion of complex carbs, while meals later in the day are smaller and do not contain any complex carbs. All meals are low in fat.

Pros: You never feel hungry. By fueling up every 2-3 hours you never get the feeling of deprivation that comes with fasting. Energy levels are steady and high due to the constant supply of wholesome calories. Fat loss results are steady, and, when done with an exercise plan, muscle is maintained.

Cons: You have to plan ahead. Every. Single. Day. Get used to carrying around a small cooler filled with containers of chicken, broccoli, brown rice and sweet potatoes. Each meal is small, so restraint is required. Unless you are including the occasional cheat meal, or cheat day, there is no room in this diet for empty calories or comfort foods.

Conclusion: The facts are out there to prove that both of these eat-for-fat-loss strategies work. There are photos of real, actual people who have subscribed to each of these methods and have gone from flabby to lean. Both methods irrefutably work.

But why? How can two methods that utilize opposing strategies both produce fat loss results? And which one is better? Let's dive deeper into what makes these eating strategies work...

1. Meal Timing: When you eat is a factor with both of these eating plans. This means that subscribers to both plans are required to wait until the appointed time to eat. So

mindless snacking, or grabbing a muffin just because it's there, is out of the question. This reduces overall calories, which is key to weight loss, and explains why both plans produce results.

2. Meal Content: The Six-Small-Meals plan focuses on the content of each of your small meals in great detail. Your meals contain lean proteins, fiber-filled veggies, and limited complex carbs. This detailed control of calorie content is largely why this plan is a sure bet for fat loss, not just weight loss.

Intermittent Fasting does not consider the content of your meals during eating periods.

3. Meal Size: The Six-Small-Meals plan also focuses on the exact size of your meals, which makes sense since you are eating six times each day, and excess calories would quickly add up. Typically this is done by weight, so as you pack your meals for the day you'll be using a food scale to ensure that you have exactly the right amount of lean protein and complex carbs. Veggies are often measured rather than weighed.

Intermittent Fasting does not consider the size of your meals during eating periods.

So What's the BEST Eating Strategy for FAST Results? As we've discussed, both of the eating strategies above are capable of producing results. This is due to the fact that both plans result in a lowered caloric intake.

When it's all said and done, weight loss comes from caloric balance.

Remember the junk food diet where the professor lost weight eating restricted calories of only vending machine food? As long as you are taking in fewer calories that you are burning, you will end up losing weight.

While both of the strategies above end up curbing your calories, only the Six-Small-Meals plan encourages wholesome calories





Among some of his more high profile projects are the Health City, of which he was a founding Director and Project Director, leading the project from inception, to completion and operations for its first 3 years

"It's about saving lives and providing the highest quality healthcare to the most people at an affordable price, because humanity deserves it," he noted at the time with regard to the Health City project.

Mr. Thompson was also the founder of the Cayman Islands Real Estate Brokers Association.

As a fifth generation Caymanian, many in the community would have been familiar with Mr. Thompson and his contribution to the Islands' growth over the years. A devoted family man and Christian, who helped to establish the Seventh Day Adventist Church's headquarters, he was described as a kind and compassionate human being by those who knew had the privilege of knowing him.

In addition to his many successful ventures in business, Mr. Thompson was, a founding member and director of the Association for the Advance of Cruise Tourism, director of Cayman Island Investment Council, a founding member and director of Have A Heart the Cayman Islands, and a past director of the National Trust.

In addition to affecting government policy with regard to medical tourism and other endeavors, he was a man of the people, whose visions helped to catapult the Cayman Island on to the international stage.

One of his most recent projects, is Tech Cayman, a tech enabling service provider, created to bring new and existing tech companies from around the world to Cayman and facilitating their physical presence in the Cayman Islands.


