

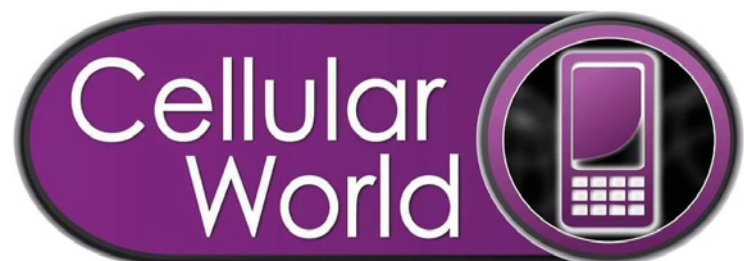

CIBC FirstCaribbean Glow's for Women

On International Women's Day, three female employees share their perspectives on their careers, work-life balance and more.



Rosemary Herbert

Three women on three different career paths and at different stages see one light illuminating the culture at CIBC FirstCaribbean. That light radiates career growth and human development regardless of gender or class, with work-life balance-its filament.

Rosemary Herbert saw its glow brightening during her forty-plus years at the bank. Now, Director - Centralised Operations Services (Southern Hub); Technology & Operations Performance Management, Herbert recalled her first job as a teller at a Barbados branch where only one woman was a senior manager but over time, she saw more females promoted. "The merger of CIBC & Barclays and the regional perspective of the organisation created more opportunities for females to be in senior management," she added.

Many like her gained access to the bank's management trainee programme. However, for Mrs. Herbert's career the 1991/'92 period was a watershed. She was reassigned from retail banking to technology, joining the team working on the first automated teller system. It also highlighted to her the bank's gender equality attitude in those days when technology was seen regionally as a male domain. That project had an equal number of men and women. "I did not see any favouritism toward men."

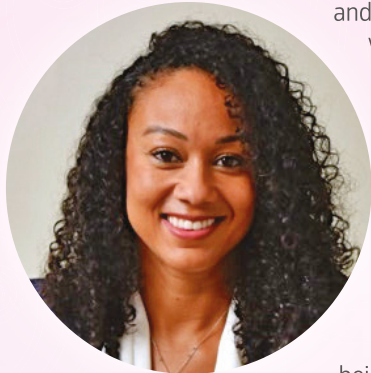
In contrast, Ms. Chanel Wallace was not fresh out of school in 2021 when she joined the bank as Insurance Agency Manager of the St. Lucia-based CIBC FirstCaribbean Insurance Agent. She described her experience leading the EC Territories and St. Maarten teams as challenging, but added: "I have never experienced a work environment like here where the emphasis is on helping you grow. There is always a mentor to ensure you navigate your space easily."

When she was offered employment, she said, "I was 'wowed by the very, very attractive leave package. The length of bereavement leave, some organisations merely give you a day or two; there is family leave to take care of a close relative during illness; a medical insurance package, the portion you pay is very small, but the benefits are great. I can give more than my all because here I am valued," she said.



Nikia Christie who is approaching her fifth anniversary as Marketing Manager for CIBC FirstCaribbean's Bahamas and Turks and Caicos, echoed similar sentiments. She noted the opportunities to shadow other employees and to attend meetings give her a rounded experience of the bank's operations. Unlike Mrs. Herbert and Ms. Wallace, whose children are adults, Mrs. Christie, a former government employee, has a three-year-old and a toddler, therefore her work-life balance weighs with a different perspective.

She noted the attention children at those ages need; how they tend to cry for mummy when ill, and for those like her son, who recently started school, being there during the transition period puts a demand on parents' time. Yet as an individual, she wants to combine developing a career while caring for her young children and pursuing hobbies like her fitness programme, after all she is an Olympian, having represented her country in swimming. She gains flexibility from the Remote Working Policy which allows employees to split the work week between working from home and working in the office. All three women welcomed this system.



Mrs. Herbert reflected on her early motherhood in pre-online connectivity times. "I would go home, ensure my children were well looked after and when they were in bed, I would complete my work ... save it to the hard drive to be uploaded onto the bank's system."

In today's digital technology era, when COVID-19-enforced lockdowns led to the home being both school and the office, Mrs. Herbert saw the bank's culture facilitating parents by accepting that children were likely to be around and therefore might be heard in the background

or might interrupt a parent. That attitude has continued.

The aim is to make the policy a win-win. For Ms. Wallace sometimes, to be optimally productive requires being at home focused on a particular procedure, other times, the office is ideal. On the other hand, Mrs. Christie said: "I decide when I want to stay away from the children and work and when I can escape from the office and be with them while I work."

She said the bank's generous vacation package was a plus in the family togetherness equation. It allows her to schedule time off for special events such as birthdays and tells her that the bank recognises the heavy workloads and the need for well-deserved breaks.

"My husband is an entrepreneur, so the medical insurance family package is another important benefit, I'm blessed that I can care for everyone in this way." She quickly added that she felt the bank's caring embrace after a relative's recent death. "I was surprised and thankful for the compassionate leave. It was not a day or two and on my return to work, how I was treated showed that they understood that this had a huge impact on me."

These women feel the bank's regard for them, not only as factors of production but as people with emotional, mental and social needs, and as wives, partners, sisters and mothers. They are encouraged by the number of women holding senior management positions. Mrs. Herbert concluded: "the fact that our last CEO was a female is testament that there are no limitations on the roles women can hold within the organisation."

Draft Sexual Harassment Bill Issued

The Cayman Islands Government has announced that the Draft Sexual Harassment Bill, 2023 (“the Bill”) has now been published as a White Paper for public consultation.

The White Paper will remain open for comments and feedback from the public through 15 April 2023. Before it becomes a law, the draft Bill has been released to allow for thorough consultation while it remains easily amendable. It also allows the public to express their opinions and concerns, which helps elicit any suggestions or opinions from stakeholders, the wider public and Members of Parliament.

Premier and the Minister for Gender Affairs, Hon. Wayne Panton JP, MP, said the Government has been working through several versions of a Sexual Harassment Bill designed to prevent, deter and hold individuals accountable for sexual harassment offences:

“This bill seeks to provide individuals with protection from sexual harassment and sets out requirements and duties for employers, institutions and associations. I recognise that the scale and scope of this legislation warrants an extensive period of public consultation to allow sufficient time for people to familiarise themselves with the proposed bill and provide feedback,” said the Premier.

“The Government seeks the public’s input on how to adopt a robust framework, and operationalise it in a way that reflects fair and balanced governance.” the Premier concluded.

The public consultation process seeks to ensure a high level of awareness and understanding of the rationale and aim of the legislation amongst the general public and the relevant entities. The Gender Affairs Unit (under the Cabinet Office) will coordinate stakeholder engagement and feedback processes through methods such as face-to-face meetings and presentations. Feedback will be used to improve and clarify concepts, procedures or provisions of the Bill.

Members of the public can submit their comments for consideration before 15 April 2023 via email to genderequality@gov.ky (with the subject heading: Sexual Harassment Bill Public Consultation 2023), or by completing the Survey on the Public Consultation Hub.

At the end of the consultation period, feedback will be collated, analysed and incorporated into the draft Sexual Harassment Bill for consideration by Cabinet and Gazette at a later date.

RBC Launches Race for Kids

The Royal Bank of Canada (RBC), launched the RBC Race for Kids in the Cayman Islands on Tuesday, March 2nd.

RBC Country Manager Ericka Rolle said the Race for Kids has its genesis in one sole purpose - "creating brighter prospect for our children and youth."

"This event has a long and productive track record benefiting charities dedicated to improving the lives of our youngest citizens that experiencing issues ranging from mental health the cancer throughout the Caribbean," said Mrs. Rolle.

She explained that in 2016, RBC adopted the name 'RBC Race for the Kids,' which is a compelling series of global charitable funds supporting youth focused causes.

To date the series has seen over 360,000 participants who have collectively raised more than 82 million dollars.

This includes the efforts of individuals and communities in races in Barbados, The Bahamas, Trinidad and Tobago and now for the first time, the Cayman Islands.

Mrs. Rolle said she was proud to announce that the inaugural Cayman RBC Race for the Kids event will benefit the Alex Panton Foundation, also known as APF, which is a Non-Profit Organization dedicated to raising awareness of mental health issues affecting children and young adults in the Cayman Islands, with a particular focus on anxiety and depression.

APF was established in memory of Alex Panton, who in 2010 tragically succumbed to the effects of severe depression, at the age of 16.

Alex's parents, Jane and Wayne Panton, along with some of Alex's closest friends and their mothers founded APF to help build awareness and reduce the stigma around mental illness.

The RBC Race for Kids is a 5K walk/run event that will offer participants an opportunity to get active and a chance to make a difference, according to organizers.

They added that it also gives Team RBC

Public Health removes requirements for COVID testing

Public Health Department has announced that effective 1st March 2023, confirmation PCR testing for positives will no longer be required and COVID testing centres will cease operations on all three islands. LFT positive online reporting will also no longer be required.

We continue to recommend that cases and primary contacts of cases of Covid-19 continue to follow the existing advice on isolation and testing:

- Vaccinated & Unvaccinated COVID-19 positive persons will isolate for 6 days and leave isolation on day 7 as long as you have no symptoms

- Vaccinated & Unvaccinated Contacts -Persons who are primary contacts of COVID-19 positive persons must conduct daily lateral flow testing for 6 days, but may continue usual activities

Note: The day of your original positive LFT test is considered Day 0.

“Relatively small numbers of people are now seeking voluntary confirmation PCR test when LFT COVID positive, and this service is no longer providing useful epidemiology information” stated Chief Medical Officer, Dr Nick Gent. “I encourage persons in the community to still test



themselves with a LFT device if they are experiencing COVID-19 symptoms and adhere to our recommended isolation requirements”.

RCIPS Warns Public About Reports of Sexual Harassment

The RCIPS has received three separate reports of sexual harassment that occurred in George Town over February that appear to be linked.

The incidents occurred in the vicinity of Dr. Roys Drive and Grackle Road, at around 07:00pm, when the complainants, three women, were walking home from work. Two of the women were walking alone, and the third was with a female friend.

It was reported that in each case the women were approached by a vehicle, and the driver of the vehicle, a man wearing a black balaclava and black hoodie, engaged them, proposing to pay the women a sum of money in exchange for a sexual act.



When the women refused the man’s proposition, he departed the scene.

Man Charged Following Incident at Condominium

On Saturday, 25 February, officers responded to a report of an incident at a condominium complex on West Bay Road. It was reported that two women had seen a man on the premises exposing himself. The man then entered one of the units and made his way to an empty bedroom. When police arrived on the scene they found the man in the room in a state of undress.

The man, age 30 of West Bay, was arrested and taken into custody, however he continued to expose himself while being

transported to the Cayman Islands Detention Centre.

He has been formally charged with Criminal Trespass and three counts of Intentional Harassment, Alarm or Distress. The man, who was on court bail with electronic monitoring at the time of the incident, has also been charged with Damaging an Electronic Monitoring Device.

He has been remanded in custody in relation to an ongoing case, and appears in court in relation to this matter on Tuesday, 7 March.

Police Investigate Serious Assault in North Side

Shortly after 8:10PM on Thursday, 2 March, officers were dispatched to a report of a serious assault at an address in North Side. It was reported that two men had been involved in an altercation, during which one of the men struck the other in the head with an object. Emergency services attended the location and the injured man was transported to the Cayman Islands Hospital by ambulance, to be treated for wounds to his head.

Officers subsequently located the other man involved, age 43 of North Side, and

arrested him on suspicion of Wounding. He remains in custody as investigations continue.

with slippers and a dark face mask. The other man was described as slim build, about 5’7”, dark complexion, and wearing a black hoodie, dark jean shorts with slippers and a white face mask.

Barbados digs for oil riches

Barbados is the latest Caribbean country exploring for oil hoping to boost its riches like Suriname and Guyana have done spectacularly in recent years.

Guyana and Suriname are two of the Caribbean Community's largest and most resource-rich countries. They have found huge offshore oil and gas sources which are raking in billions of dollars.

Guyana's oil and gas discoveries were so large, the crude oil so light and so cheap to produce, that an international consortium led by American company ExxonMobil broke all records by rushing into actual production by the end of 2019, less than five years after the first discovery. Experts say this was probably an industry record for field development in deep-sea waters. They are already raking in billions. Stockholders are enjoying a windfall.

Neighbouring Suriname had similar discoveries but actual production is not expected to begin before 2027.

The Guyana oil find means that the country could be the Dubai of the Caribbean in a

decade. It has led to a mad scramble by other CARICOM member nations to also attract the big oil companies to search for 'liquid gold'.

Authorities in Barbados last week indicated that it is looking at a similar type of economic transformation in the near future through commercial discoveries.

Senior Barbadian Minister Kerry Symmonds said the prospects of such a find have never been higher as initial explorations indicate that large deposits of hydrocarbons have been identified.

"I don't want to go and give news now before it is ready to be given, but let us say the prospect is highly regarded," he told a local academic forum. He added: "We want to be able to have natural gas as the bridging fuel as well."

Barbados has no major offshore discoveries, but for decades, has been producing about 1,600 barrels of oil daily for inland wells. Neighbours Trinidad and Tobago has been producing oil and particularly gas in large quantities for over a century. It thinks its pros-

pects are great.

Guyana recently placed 14 blocks near the area where Exxon, Hess Corporation, and CNOOC of China are producing nearly 400,000 barrels per day, raking in billions because production costs per barrels have never exceeded \$35 per barrel. International prices are around \$76 per barrel, making an easy profit for the consortium.

Grenada has also toyed with the idea of attracting exploration companies, well aware that its close proximity to daily Trinidad could bode well for its own prospects.

Trinidad and Tobago has just concluded its first full Carnival in three years and voted as Band of the Year is one of the event's newest contestants.

The Lost Tribe's '202WE' presentation was voted large Band of the Year, the National Carnival Commission has announced. The seven-year-old band also won the title in 2019.

Valmiki Maharaj, The Lost Tribe's bandleader, said: "After the three years and after the years we have had leading up to this Carnival, to say it is hard, would be the understatement of the year. This is both unexpected and the most welcome happening ever."

Maharaj said he felt blessed and thankful. He dedicated the win to Carnival's un-

sung heroes whom he described as "every producer, road manager, bar person and vendor - who were struggling the last couple of months leading up to the national festival".

Maharaj said there were moments he did not know if the band was going to make it. "Emotionally, coming out of the pandemic, there were a lot of restarting and teething issues. I think generally the world coming out of this act of God global crisis left us as bandleaders and as Carnival practitioners, with a lot of challenges."

He also thanked the masqueraders saying: "We make the costumes but the costume is a body and the masquerade is the soul."

Reggae star conned out of \$30k

Reggae legend Marcia Griffiths is battling to get over US\$30,000 back from a conman who tricked her by claiming he was setting up a museum in her honour in the US.

Ray Morgan confessed to scamming Griffiths and has reportedly suffered a stroke and is unable to walk.

"Mr Morgan is not doing well at all. It doesn't look good," Senior Parish Judge Lori-Anne Cole-Montaque said in the Kingston and St Andrew Parish Court. "He cannot walk but he will have to come here at some point," she said adding that if he does not repay the money he will be imprisoned.

Morgan's illness is another setback for Griffiths. Morgan approached the former Bob Marley backing singer in 2021, claiming to be a property manager seeking to purchase properties to construct a museum to preserve her legacy.

He told her that the museum would cost US\$2 million and that along with his alleged overseas colleagues, he would finance its construction. In July 2022, Morgan told Griffiths that he would instruct his overseas partners to expedite the process. He claimed that he would lend the

reggae singer US\$500,000 to purchase the property.

The court heard that Griffiths was told that purchasing the property would require over US\$30,000 in stamp duty and taxes. Morgan told Griffiths that she should pay him, which he received via wire transfer. Following this payment, Griffiths made several attempts to contact Morgan, who stopped answering her calls. Morgan had previously served 12 years in prison for multiple fraud.
