International Women's Day Highlights Global Call for Gender Equity

Every year on March 8 governments and civil society across the globe celebrate the social, economic, cultural and political achievements of women as part of International Women's Day (IWD). The first IWD gathering took place in 1911, then supported by over a million people, making this a commemoration that has been taking place for well over 100 years.

Along with the commemoration of women's many contributions, IWD is also a day that marks a call for action for accelerating women's equality and equity. The 2023 theme this year's IWD, which the Family Resource Centre has adopted for the entire month, is #EmbraceEquity.

"For a long time, the marker for progress-

both nationally and within different organisations like the Civil Servicehas been equality," explains Mr. Franz Manderson, Deputy Governor. "However, the wonderful thing about progress is that it demands that we aim higher. meaning that those markers change. Unlike

equality, which looks at simply making things equal, equity recognises that each person has different circumstances, and allocates the exact opportunities and resources needed for each individual to be successful."

Equity-based solutions take into account the diverse lived experiences of individuals and communities, adapting services and policies according to these differences. Equity is a long-term and sustainable solution, and is a process for addressing imbalanced social systems.

"Equity requires commitment, determination, power, resources and social responsibility," adds Premier and Minister for Gender Affairs, Hon. Wayne Panton JP, MP. "To achieve it, Government, civil society, communities and families must work together to change structures and provide opportunities to those who are marginalised."

"In order for our community to not only fully embrace this year's IWD theme, but also to understand what equity looks like not solely as a concept, but also in its real-life application," explains Ms. Judith Seymour, Director of the Department of Counselling Services. "As part of their full calendar of events for the month, the Family Resource Centre has engaged an equity consultant to deliver not only the keynote address at this year's IWD breakfast, but also to lead an experiential workshop for professionals and leaders in both the public and private sector to help take the discussion of equity to the next level," she adds.

Ms. Desiree Phillips is a Registered Psychotherapist, senior trainer, and equity consultant. She will be delivering the keynote address at the FRC's IWD breakfast event No Two Paths Alike: Understanding Identity in Women's' Equity, which will highlight the unique journeys of women of various intersecting identities within Cayman and the

ways in which individuals can practice empathy, inclusion, and equity in their personal and professional interactions with women in their spaces.

Ms. Phillips will also be providing a more experiential workshop for professionals and leaders in the public and private sector entitled Setting the Stage for Equity, on Monday March 13th. Participants at this smaller event will examine the concepts of oppression, privilege and intersectionality in order to broaden perspectives and understand the compounding and interconnected nature of oppression as it unfolds for both staff and community members. Strategies for translating this knowledge into practical action will also be discussed.

"These events, and this entire campaign, isn't just for women. When we speak of equity, and gender equity, it is something that impacts all of us, but often times we don't connect the dots for people to understand that" explains Ms. Anne-Marie Diaz, Programme Coordinator for the FRC. "Gender equity includes how fathers parent their children, how a female leader addresses her team complement, how a recruitment officer operates inclusively, how we educate and empower girls and boys, and so much more. It's our individual responsibility to recognise one another's individual needs in the various spheres and spaces we operate and can have direct influence over. This is what #EmbraceEquity is all about. We're fortunate to host Honouring Women Month to raise these issues, because only with a concerted effort will gender equality be achieved in the Cayman Islands", Ms. Diaz highlights.

We are aware of information that is in the public domain regarding the events that has led to the closure of the Papa Johns Grand Harbour store. This is our official release and we, SSL Capital (Cayman) Limited, operators of the Papa Johns Franchise wish to advise our beloved customers, clients, service providers and the public at large that we are taking steps to exit the Cayman market in 2023 starting with the closure of our Grand Harbour store, which was shuttered on March 01, 2023. Papa Johns International has decided to focus on larger markets with a minimum of twenty (20) stores coming out of the recent COVID pandemic and consequently, where our Unit Licenses came up for renewal in February 2023, has decided not to renew these licenses. We operated two locations, one at Grand Harbour and one at Queens Court. Our store leases were also up for renewal and consequent on the directive from Papa Johns International not to renew the licences, we also took a decision to terminate our lease.

We wish to make it absolutely clear that the termination of the Grand Harbour lease is not due to any amount owing to the landlord as we have paid up




all amounts due on the said lease up to the end of February 2023. There is no seizure of equipment and any allegation to that effect is false and inaccurate.

To ensure a smooth transition from the Cayman market, we will continue to operate the Queens Court store until further advised. All orders previously served by the Grand Harbour location are now being routed to the Queens Court location and all staff are on board to continue to serve our customers providing the highest level of customer service for which we are known.

We are also taking steps to dispose of aspects of the business and to ensure that some of the remaining staff can continue to be gainfully employed and is in discussion with an interested party with the aim of concluding a sale with them.

We would like to use this opportunity to thank our many valued customers, clients, and service providers and to assure everyone that we will honour all our obligations to our staff, clients, and service providers. Whilst we regret this decision, we have to be mindful of the continuous changing landscape exacerbated by the global COVID pandemic.

On behalf of the management and staff of Papa Johns Cayman, again we say, "Thank You" for all the support and love that our customers have shown us over the years. We are forever grateful.

The Ministry of Health & Wellness would like to advise the community that information relating to "flight restrictions due to Ebola virus disease outbreak" is false and was not released by the Ministry.

The misinformation, being circulated by email and what's app social channels, states that the "new Ebola virus" was detected locally in tourists, and as such measures to restrict passengers and airlines would be coming into effect later this month.

"There has been no suspicion, much less confirmation, of the Ebola virus in the Cayman Islands to date," explains Chief Medical Officer, Dr Nick Gent.

"The Cayman Islands Government has not imposed any new restrictions on the arrivals of passengers to our Islands, and this statement being attributed to me and my Ministry is unequivocally false and misleading," affirms Hon. Sabrina Turner, Minister for Health & Wellness and Home Affairs.

Dr Gent would like to encourage the community to tune into official channels in an effort to ensure access to accurate and credible information and updates.


Police Investigate Fatal Collision on West Bay Road



Shortly before 1:00AM on Wednesday, 8 March, officers responded to a report of a fatal collision on West Bay Road in the vicinity of the Queen's Court Plaza, involving a Jeep Cherokee and an electric bicycle. The Jeep and bicycle collided and the driver of the Jeep continued to drive from the scene. The Jeep was later found parked further north along West Bay Road, with the driver having left the scene.

Emergency services attended the location and the cyclist was transported to the Cayman Islands Hospital via ambulance, where he was subsequently pronounced dead.

Officers later located driver of the Jeep, a man, age 36 of West Bay. He was breath-tested with a positive result and subsequently arrested. He remains in custody as investigations continue.

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BRYAN SETS CHALLENGES FOR CARIBBEAN TOURISM

The minister-chairman of the Caribbean Tourism Organisation(CTO), Hon.Kenneth Bryan of the Cayman Islands, has set the regional industry a challenge for growth as tourism in the Caribbean emerges from the pandemic.

Speaking at a CTO media event in Barbados this Mr Bryan who is also Cayman's tourism minister, detailed several initiatives that the CTO under his chairmanship needs to address.

Some are already in the works including restructuring the regional tourism organisation.

"With the Caribbean being one of the most tourism-dependent regions in the world, and the industry moving from recovery to growth, there is an acute need to ensure that the CTO is appropriately sized and structured, to fulfill the needs and objectives of the members," he stated.

"With this background in mind, consideration is being given to the restructuring

of the organization and reforming its strategic vision and direction for the next five (5) years."

The CTO has been without a Secretary General for some time and the minister-chairman reported that a new job description has been formulated and the role is now being advertised across the region.

There was welcome news that tourism arrivals and revenues were trending back to the 2019 pre-pandemic peak globally and in the Caribbean. This has also been evident in the Cayman Islands.

BOUNCING BACK

Neil Walters, the CTO's Acting Secretary General reported that tourism in the year 2022 was characterized by strong recovery.

"According to data from the World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) approximately 917.0 million tourists travelled internationally in 2022. This level of arrivals was doubled that of 2021 and represented 62.6% of pre-pandemic levels."

He also said that in 2022, the second full year of the global pandemic, the Caribbean tourism industry was resilient and built on the rebound that was noticeable from the middle of 2021. By the end of 2022, there were 28.3 million registered tourist visits in the Caribbean, approximately 52.4% more than there were in 2021. The region accounted for 3.1% of all arrivals worldwide, down one percentage point from the historically high share of 4.1% recorded in 2021.

The 28.3 million registered tourist visits in 2022 made up 88.6% of the visitors who arrived in 2019, which served as the baseline year for typical tourism activity before the pandemic. Thus, he noted the Caribbean was one of the regions with the quickest recovery rates globally in 2022.

However, despite the encouraging figures, CTO minister-chairman Kenneth Bryan issued a word of caution warning that there are major long-standing stumbling blocks to be tackled. A main one is the issue of airlift.

POLICY SHIFT ON AIRLIFT

According to Mr Bryan, Caribbean governments will need to look at this issue, especially the cost of travel in the region which is impacted by taxes on the airline sector.

In what could be a landmark appeal for a policy shift on tissuesues Mr Bryan expounded: "Turning my attention now to the nagging issue of air connectivity, tourism is a significant economic driver for us all, and yet the lack of inter-regional air connectivity continues to pose a risk to our resilience and sustainability. It is a situation that has existed, and been talked about for decades, and has worsened due to the economic effects of the Covid pandemic."

"Why?" he asked and proceeded to outline his case.

"The slowdown in tourism has caused airlines to re-evaluate their business structures and routes from a position of profitability more so than connectivity. Additionally, there is a global shortage of pilots also adding another layer of complexity to this long-standing issue. It would be illogical for me to promise a solution to this issue during my tenure as Chairman. But what I can, and will commit to, is getting the players around the table to forensically examine what we need to do as a unified region to improve this scenario and starting the ball rolling towards the solution."

According to Mr Bryan, aside from the convenience, improving regional connectivity would have a knock-on effect that would positively influence travel for all sorts of reasons; such as business, leisure, sports, conferences and meetings, and could potentially transform the region.

He said the added benefit, aside from tourism, is that it would facilitate and encourage residents across the Caribbean to travel more easily to other islands to visit family and friends.



AMPLIFY CAYMAN PROPOSES ALTERNATIVE TO EWA

As plans for extending the East-West Arterial(EWA) continue to be the topic of much public debate, the campaign group Amplify Cayman is proposing an alternative to the route being considered by the government.

The group argues that the current plan threatens the pristine, environmentally vital but delicate Central Mangrove Wetlands.

Instead, it now proposes an alternative route referred to as BP40 in a privately commissioned study by the firm Ardent Consultancy.

"BP40 would go along the southern coast of Grand Cayman from Pedro Castle Road through Beach Bay and into Bodden Town to Manse Road, and would include an access point near Hawking Moore Drive to accommodate commuters from Lookout Gardens," Amplify Cayman explains.

It claims this route would be more environmentally considerate, as the terrain in this part of the Island is dry forest on porous limestone, which would greatly mitigate flooding in nearby areas during heavy rains and storm seasons.

In contrast, the group says, the EWA extension, if built at sea level within the Central Mangrove Wetlands, would not provide this added benefit, and could potentially increase flooding in nearby areas due to its construction.

"From a climate resiliency perspective, the development of BP40 would be less impactful on our environment, and provide the same positive benefits of traffic alleviation and an additional emergency access route, as the proposed extension of the East-West Arterial through the Central Mangrove Wetlands."

Amplify Cayman says it's asking Cabinet "only to approve developments that meet the nested interdependence framework, explored in Amplify Cayman People's Sustainability Charter, which was published September 27th, 2021 on the 20th anniversary of the 2001 Environmental Charter and can be read here, which holistically ensures community and nature are balanced with economic growth."

It further states that within the community, there is support for alleviated traffic, increased economic opportunities for those in the Eastern districts, and efficient public transportation, as well as broad opposition to developing such solutions at the expense of our sensitive wetland environments.

Amplify Cayman also says that it is pro-sustainable development, not an anti-development, "as we recognize that a balance needs to be struck, whereby socio-economic needs are met within the constraints of our natural resources."

"We at Amplify support solution-finding that balances the protection of our environment with society's needs and the economy, and the order in which we act will ensure a balance is found when developing for national growth."

Statement by Hon Roy McTaggart, The Leader of the Opposition PACT Government Member MP McKeeva Bush Charged for Indecent Assault

We agree with Premier Panton that the arrest of MP McKeeva Bush on charges of Indecent Assault is a most serious and concerning matter. We agree also that we can rely on our courts and system of justice to resolve the matter.

Where we disagree with Premier Panton is in his reference to Mr Bush as an "Independent Member" of Parliament. The facts are that not only is Mr. Bush a member of the PACT Government, but Mr Bush was instrumental in the formation of the PACT government, for which he was rewarded by the Premier with the Speakership.

It was Mr. Bush's assault on a female in 2019 and his insistence to remain as Speaker following his conviction and sentencing for that offence in December 2020, that led former Premier Sir Alden McLaughlin to call for early elections in 2021. It was precisely because of our concerns regarding Mr Bush's conviction that we refused to campaign with or form a Government with him following those elections.

Following the 2019 assault, now Premier Panton claimed he was resigning from the Progressives as a matter of principle because Mr Bush had been allowed to remain as Speaker following his conviction. However, despite his "principled" stance prior to the 2021 elections, Mr. Panton agreed to Mr. Bush becoming Speaker after the election in order to form the PACT Government. It seems that the Premier is now hoping that the public has forgotten this and is seeking to distance himself from Mr. Bush by asserting that Mr Bush is an "Independent Member" and not a part of his Government.

Premier Panton may also be hoping that the public has forgotten that Mr Bush, along with other members of the PACT Government, has signed a Parliamentary Code of Conduct which they published this past New Years Eve. We wait with bated breath to hear how the Premier will address the current situation under the Code of Conduct.

Statement from Premier on Charges Filed Againts Former Speaker Bush

The charges laid today against long serving independent MP, McKeeva Bush, are serious and concerning. I believe in our system of justice along with the principle of innocent until proven guilty, and I have faith in our courts to resolve this matter. Whatever the outcome of this particular case, there are larger social issues that this matter raises, such as the treatment of women in the workplace and in our society. Almost every woman has had inappropriate experiences. We, as a society, must do better. The draft Sexual Harassment Legislation out for public consultation offers the country an opportunity to have the uncomfortable but necessary conversations about how we do a better job of treating each other with the respect that we all deserve, regardless of gender.

FORMER SPEAKER BUSH FORMALLY CHARGED WITH ASSAULT

Former Speaker of Parliament McKeeva Bush has been arrested and formally charged with two counts each of Indecent Assault and Common Assault (in the alternative).

A brief statement by the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS) confirming this new development said it was In relation to an incident occurring at a formal event at the Ritz Carlton Hotel on 13 September 2022.

While it didn't give any further details, Mr Bush who resigned from the Speaker's chair last October is alleged to have been involved in an incident at that hotel on the date mentioned.

A subsequent series of police and political issues emanated from that with Mr Bush now sitting in Parliament as an independent MP for his West Bay West constituency.

The matter featured prominently in the public domain last year with the RCIPS issuing cautiously-worded statements.

September 14th initial release: "The RCIPS is aware of social media reports circulating of an incident/incidents of assault involving a senior politician on two women, which occurred at a formal event at the Ritz Carlton Hotel on West Bay Road, last night, 13 September. No formal complaint has yet been made to the RCIPS by either of the women concerned. The RCIPS has commenced an investigation and will interview both women to ascertain whether a complaint/complaints are to be made. There is no further information available at this time."

October 5th: "Following a number of media enquiries on the matter, the Commissioner of Police confirms that the investigation file on the incident involving a senior politician on Tuesday, 13 September, is nearing completion, and will be submitted to the Director of Public Prosecutions."

There were calls for Mr Bush to vacate the Speaker's chair by both outgoing Governor HE Martyn Roper and Hon. Premier Wayne Panton while the investigation was ongoing

He resigned on October 12th 2022,



Scholarship for Mental Health Studies Established in Memory of Caymanian Teen

A new scholarship is now available for those individuals who want to pursue post-graduate studies in the mental health field. The Addison Kelly Memorial Scholarship has been created in the memory of Caymanian teenager Addison Kelly who lost her life to suicide on 8 February 2022 at the age of 16. Her family has established the fund to help increase the mental health support services and resources that are available on island and put more qualified Caymanians in the field.

The scholarship will be administered through the Alex Panton Foundation and will offer CI\$25,000 per annum for up to 4 years for Caymanians to pursue post-graduate studies in the fields of psychology, psychiatry or psychotherapy. It will be awarded every two years (biennially) and recipients must return to work in Cayman for the number of years for which the scholarship was given. The opportunity also includes a mentorship with a doctor level psychologist/mental health provider to support the navigation of this journey.

"Our precious Addi struggled with several mental illnesses in her life and benefitted greatly from the expertise and quality care of a team of doctors here in Cayman. She expressed a desire to become a psychiatrist and in her hopeful moments

started making plans to bring that dream to fruition. Her vision was to help other young persons who are battling mental illnesses," said Addison's mother Rhonda Kelly.

Our family believes that this scholarship is one of the best ways we can honour her

dream and build a legacy of hope in her name and memory. The Alex Panton Foundation is the perfect organisation with which to partner as the team there is already doing important and much needed work to help the youth in our community. The scholarship will complement their initiatives, and we are grateful to be a part of this movement they have created to overcome the stigma."

Ms. Kelly added that both her family and the members of the Foundation recognise the importance of having trained Caymanian mental health professionals who also have the cultural awareness and competency of the community they are servicing and inherently understand the unique needs that are presented.

"The mental health needs in our country are on the increase, hence the need for local mental health providers is in high demand," said Dr. Erica Lam, executive member of the Alex Panton Foundation and Consultant Clinical Psychologist at Aspire Therapeutic Services.

The process of training to become a mental health practitioner, psychologist, or therapist is hard work and requires dedication before one can begin practicing. It involves an undergraduate, followed by postgraduate training and clinical internship, or/and doctoral programme. Even after the postgraduate/doctoral programme, the requirement to meet supervised experience can take up to years. This can take up to 10 years before one can practice. A lot of times, students run out of funding to support further study or pay for the living cost during their internship. Hence a scholarship that specifically supports students in this field is desperately needed to ensure the student's passion and dedication is supported and to make the workforce more equal for those who might not have the privilege of financial support from their family."

The Addison Kelly Memorial Scholarship will be funded primarily from the proceeds of the Addison Kelly Butterfly 5k Walk/Run, the first of which took place on Saturday, 4 February. About 900 individuals participated in the event which raised just over US\$52,000 in registrations and donations. Dart has matched those funds, giving the scholarship coffers significant seed money to award to its first recipient in 2023.

CIASA Nationals: Last Chance CARIFTA Qualifier Delivers

After four days of intense competition, the Cayman Islands Aquatic Association (CIASA) National Championships ended last week Tuesday evening with eight records. Swimmers that took part were from Camana Bay Aquatic Club, Stingray Swim Club, Seven Mile Swimmers and John Gray Swim Team (JGST).

Held at the Camana Bay Aquatic Centre; around 200 swimmers, including Olympian Jillian Crooks, raced in morning preliminaries to qualify for evening finals. As the last-chance qualifier for CARIFTA 2023, (regional agegroup junior championship, Curacao) the meet attracted a capacity crowd. Attendees included Deputy Premier, Hon. Chris Saunders and Minister for Youth & Sports, Hon. Bernie Bush.

Outstanding form secured Crooks gold in her 50m, 100m, and 200m Freestyle races, as well as winning the 50m and 200m Backstroke, and the 50m and 100m Butterfly. Crooks' dominance was further highlighted by setting new National and CIASA records in the 50m Backstroke, 100m Butterfly, and 50m Freestyle. However, the University of Tennessee sophomore's winning streak was briefly halted on Tuesday evening by 14-year-old Sierrah Broadbelt, who out-touched the Olympian to win gold and National Record in the 200m Butterfly. Broadbelt also smashed the existing record, later gaining another in the 50m Butterfly.

Another edge-of-your-seat race was Connor MacDonald's 1500m Freestyle race on Day One. His performance set the celebratory tone of the National Championships, earning him a 20-second personal best and a CARIFTA qualifying time.

With several participants securing CARIFTA-qualifying times, all of John Gray Swim Team's participants earned personal bests.

"It was an extremely fruitful meet and showed that all their training had been worth it. Krystal Campbell showed tremendous heart, courage and mental determination swimming in the 13-14 year old category. Her hard work paid off winning our only gold for the women in the 50m Breaststroke and a bronze in the 200m Breaststroke," said Department of Sports Head Coach for Swimming and JGST's Coach, Ryan Mushin.





The meet also saw two Chinese swimmers Zicheng Wang and Ziyang Zhang compete. Both are coached by former Cayman Swim Coach Dave Kelsheimer.



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FUEL EXPENSE REDUCTION
