# CAYMAN MONITORS GLOBAL BANKING INDUSTRY WOES

Banking and finance sector regulators and operators in the Cayman Islands are no doubt closely monitoring recent developments in the international banking and finance industry.

The collapse or near-collapse of several banks and other finance companies of various sizes has sent shockwaves in what has been described as “a crisis of confidence that threatened to spread across global financial markets.”

The multi-billion dollar bailout of banking powerhouse Credit Suisse by the Swiss government has so far failed to quell the uncertainties about its future after the company ran into serious problems over its solvency and its future.

The Swiss government had initially pumped \$US54 billion to bail out the ailing company.

A takeover deal by another industry giant, UBS, was being contemplated.

The woes affecting the already-troubled Credit Suisse, come on the heels of the near-collapse of Silicon Valley Bank, bankers to the US and UK tech sectors among others.

Its UK arm was only rescued at the last minute by the intervention of banking superpower HSBC which took it over at the last minute for a nominal £1.

However, it has since been reported that the bank had splurged excessive bonuses on senior management just days before it folded.

In the US, the collapse of SVB’s main arm has become the second-largest bank failure in US history after a run on deposits. Most of its customers had rushed to close their accounts over fears of the bank’s solvency.

Meanwhile, another troubled bank is in the news as the shares of First Republic, a mid-sized company, took a nosedive after customers rushed to remove their deposits. Several of its larger Wall Street industry partners have stepped in with an emergency US\$35 million injection.

These developments which have sent shivers down the spine of the global banking and finance industry follow on the heels of another finance industry earthquake last November with the scandal and consequent liquidation of the Bahamas-based cryptocurrency



firm FTX and the arrest of its founder Sam Bankman-Fried. He is awaiting trial in October this year and could be sentenced to over 100 years if found guilty.

Prior to its collapse, FTX was the third-largest cryptocurrency exchange by volume and had over one million users.

Here in Cayman, a hub of global financial activity, there has not been official comment from the government, the banking and finance sector, or local industry regulators about these developments.

However, earlier this month in an unrelated development, the Cayman Islands Monetary Authority (CIMA) announced the launch of its first-ever annual Financial Stability Report, which it said “provides an assessment of our local financial system, including salient trends and vulnerabilities over the reporting period.”

In a statement on its website, CIMA stated that as part of its mandate to ensure stability within the domestic financial system, and following months of preparation, the report also provides a macroprudential review, which not only examines sectoral performances but also assesses future endogenous and exogenous risks, which in turn, can hamper economic growth.

Commenting on this milestone, CIMA Managing Director Mrs Cindy Scotland, OBE says, “The annual publication of the Financial Stability Report, together with the present work of the Authority, is a testament of our commitment to reinforce the integrity of the financial services industry, maintain development of an appropriate macroprudential framework for sustainable financial stability while upholding the robust and credible reputation of the Cayman Islands.”

He further said: “The technology which is available means we are now able to provide effective, precise, and less invasive cancer treatments for the people of the Cayman Islands.”


It’s a dream come true for Health City founder Dr Devi Shetty who dedicated the facility to his friend and business ally, Caymanian GeneThompson, recently deceased.

# Health City Cayman Islands Opens New Radiation Oncology Centre in Camana Bay

## *Ushers in New Era of Hope for Cancer Patients*

Health City Cayman Islands on Thursday 16 March, officially opened its new Radiation Oncology Centre in Camana Bay, ushering in a new era of hope for cancer patients resident in the Cayman Islands and surrounding territories. Equipped with the latest technology in the form of a Siemens TruBeam Varian Lineae Accelerator, the Centre is the first of its kind in the Cayman Islands and one of the most advanced in the region. It marks the first phase of the 70,000 square foot modern, state-of-the-art medical facility being built on three acres of land to the south of Camana Bay, at a cost of US\$100 million. It will be officially named the Gene Thompson Radiotherapy Centre, in homage to the late developer and entrepreneur, who was instrumental in establishing Health City.

Speaking at the opening ceremony, Health City Clinical Director, Dr Binoy Chattuparambil called the new Radiation Oncology Centre “a symbol of hope, built

on a legacy of excellence in medicine which balances compassionate patient care with research, development, and innovation.” He added, “The technology which is available means we are now able to provide effective, precise, and less invasive cancer treatments for the people of the Cayman Islands.”

Distinguishing services which will be offered at the Centre include External Beam Radiation Therapy (EBRT), 3-D Conformal Radiation Therapy (3DCRT), Intensity Modulated Radiation Therapy (IMRT), Image-Guided Radiation Therapy (IGRT), and Volumetric Modulated Arc Therapy (VMAT). Special services such as Stereotactic Radiosurgery (SRS), Stereotactic Body Radiotherapy (SBRT), and Total Body Irradiation (TBI) will also be offered. Brachytherapy Services will be accessible in the future.

Cayman Islands Premier, The Honourable Wayne Panton, who was in attendance, extended his congratulations to

Health City on behalf of the Cayman Islands Government. He stated, “This facility will dramatically transform the options of our people to regain health and wellness without suffering the disruption, cost and inconvenience of having to travel away from their homes and families to receive this lifesaving cancer treatment option.” He thanked the institution “for making amazing strides over the past few years in improving our access to high quality health services, physicians and treatment facilities.”

The construction of the new facility is a major step towards advancing local health care, an effort which is largely dependent on synergistic partnerships and strategic alliances. This was highlighted by The Honourable Sabrina Turner, Minister for Health and Wellness. “One of the goals of not only my Ministry, but of this current administration, is to promote healthier living through access to healthcare services and wellness education.

My colleagues and I all recognise that in order to achieve this goal we must work together with private sector and NGO partners to strengthen our local healthcare system. I am grateful for Health City Cayman Islands’ ongoing investment in Cayman’s healthcare system, and the opportunity that it affords them to offer equitable, accessible, evidence-based, best-practices informed, multi-disciplinary cancer care to our people right here at home.”

Located where the majority of the population live and work, the facility is a major part of the development of Camana Bay. Justin Howe, President of Real Estate Asset Management at Dart called the new Centre “a transformative step in healthcare delivery in the Cayman Islands and a demonstration of what happens when long term planning is paired with world-class delivery.” He lauded Health City’s efforts, stating, “This commitment to investing in innovation and infrastructure for the benefit of current and future generations aligns with what we are doing at Dart, and we welcome this development as an important feature of the future of Camana Bay.”

Health City’s Chief Business Officer, Shomari Scott noted, “The new Radiation Oncology Centre is an outstanding healthcare resource for the community, not just for cancer treatment but also specialised radiation services. There is no longer the need for the people of the Cayman Islands to travel overseas for advanced care and be away from family members when their love and support is most needed. This translates to more lives saved and a better quality of life for those who will benefit from these services.”

Upon completion, Health City Camana Bay will feature several medical specialties not currently available in the Cayman Islands. Key among those will be a neonatal intensive care unit (NICU), an emergency pavilion and critical care unit, and a robust multispecialty program which includes robotic surgery. The facility is expected to be fully operational in 2024.

# R3 Cayman Foundation Announces US \$1M Donation to Enhance National Security for the Cayman Islands

The Simpson Group has pledged a donation of US \$1 million to the R3 Cayman Foundation (R3), requesting that up to US\$500,000 be designated for national security projects to benefit the Cayman Islands. Specific measures are being identified by His Excellency the Governor Martyn Roper in collaboration with the elected Government and relevant law enforcement agencies.

The donation of US \$1 million has been matched by the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation, with the US \$500,000 security-focused donation being matched pursuant to a new pledge related to this donation and the remainder being matched under the original matching pledge of CI \$4 million from the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation. The Kenneth B. Dart Foundation has also pledged an additional CI \$1 million to match future donations to R3 to support its ongoing mission.

Based on a recommendation from the R3 Readiness Committee, the first programme funded by the security focused donation is acquisition of imaging equipment by the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service. The equipment will also be used by Customs and Border Control.

"This generous donation from the Simpson Group speaks to the R3 Cayman Foundation's Readiness mandate by enabling preventative measures to mitigate the impact of emergencies and disasters on the Cayman community, which would include measures to mitigate the impact of violent crimes both under normal circumstances and in post-disaster situations", said R3's Readiness Committee Chair Richard Hew. "The Simpson Group donation is an example of how R3 donors can direct their financial contributions to be used for a particular area of focus that aligns with R3's objectives while leaving it to R3 to deter-

mine the most efficient and effective mechanisms to support that area of focus for the benefit of the community."

David Simpson, Managing Director of the Simpson Group said, "The security of the Cayman Islands is of paramount importance to all who live or visit here, and we are grateful to be able to support His Excellency the Governor in efforts to contribute to the overall safety and well-being of the Islands.

As Principal for R3, Governor Martyn Roper has certain oversight powers under R3's constitution to ensure its good governance. R3 has asked the Governor for his advice on additional programmes R3 should

support to enhance the national security of the Cayman Islands. Support for enhanced radar coverage of Cayman's territorial waters is also being explored with the Cayman Islands Coast Guard.

Since its inception in May 2020, R3 has donated to more than 30 local charitable organisations and governmental departments and authorities that provide emergency preparedness and relief for natural disasters and societal crises. R3 was seeded with a CI \$1 million donation from the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation which pledged an additional CI \$4 million in matching contributions to those from other philanthropic foundations, corporations and individuals.

"The R3 Cayman Foundation has attracted donations nearing the original matching pledge of CI \$4 million by the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation," said Jackie Doak, Director at the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation. "Inspired by this latest gift from the Simpson Group, the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation has raised its matching pledge with conviction that the Cayman community will continue its dedicated financial support of the skilled non-profit organisations that provide crisis support services."

The match of the Simpson Group donation increases the Kenneth B. Dart Foundation's total commitment to R3 to CI \$6.5 million.

## Work on Colliers Dock to be Completed Early April

Members of the Public Works Department are currently undertaking repairs to the Colliers Dock in East End, with work scheduled to be completed next month.

The Colliers Dock sustained damage during Tropical Storm Grace. Structural assessments indicated several deficiencies including destruction of the trex deck, removal of some of the stock piles from the foundation and damaged cross bracing to split pile caps.

Director of the Public Works Department Troy Whorms expressed that his team are working closely with other agencies to ensure adherence to environmental regulations while repairs are underway.

Last year, the Department conducted minor repairs to four docks across Grand Cayman to include Gun Bay, Coe-Wood Beach, Heritage Park and Lobster Pot.

# Government tackling challenges “head on”

As business leaders contemplated the global economic outlook at this year's Royal Fidelity Cayman Economic Outlook Conference, Premier Wayne Panton gave his address, talking about the indicators that spoke to Cayman's economic growth. These included GDP at 3.7% in 2022 and 4.0% in 2021, and 8,900 more jobs created relative to the pre-pandemic period of 2019.

“When compared to the low of 2020, the economy has added over 14,700 jobs,” he confirmed.

In addition, the unemployment rate for Caymanians was at a record low of 3.6%, while those without a job for more than a year were getting opportunities for training and retraining to get them back into meaningful employment.

“Our real GDP per capita in 2022 was estimated at US\$70,790, higher than the United States and most other advanced economies,” Premier Panton said.

But success was not purely measured by money and government had started measuring Cayman's social progress, looking at where Cayman sat in the United Nations' Human Development Index, a summary measure of achievements in three key dimensions of human development: a long and healthy life (the Health Index); access to knowledge (the Education Index); and a decent standard of living (the Income Index).

For the Cayman Islands, the 2021 Human Development In-

dex value was 0.877, which fell within the range of 0.80 and 1.0 in the HDI Report 2021/2022. Countries in this group are classified as having a Very High Human Development Index, the Premier said.

But Cayman also faced some serious challenges, the most urgent of which were the cost of living and traffic. Premier Panton said the government was “committed to tackling these problems head on”.

“The government is considering a raft of new measures to address this cost-of-living crisis. We are currently evaluating policy options such as: raising the minimum wage; considering cost of living adjustments to salaries; incentivising adults already in the workforce to get technical and vocational training to upskill or retrain themselves – investments which will help them to qualify for higher paying jobs with good benefits, and we are diligently working to find sustainable and responsible ways to lower the cost of electricity, food, housing and healthcare,” he advised.

One long term fix was to take a close look at development planning and zoning laws.

“We need to create more mixed-use communities that are more walkable and denser than the way we currently develop,” the Premier said. “Denser, more walkable communities would reduce the need for people to get in cars for simple errands, or for all residents to get in a car to commute to work or school.”

They would also enable public transportation to thrive, cycling to thrive and promote walking which promotes health and wellness.

“Well designed, mixed-use communities are good for community health, good for the environment and good for our economies,” he advised, adding density did not automatically mean sky-scrapers.

“Greater density can be achieved through allowing auxiliary dwelling units on a traditional lot, allowing smaller lot sizes and/or adding two to three storeys to residential dwellings,” he confirmed.

The East/West arterial road was another priority to alleviate traffic pressure.

“We are determined to get that important element of road infrastructure in place as quickly as is legally possible – yet, we know that we need to offer interim solutions now to improve the quality of life for thousands of residents who are suffering each day,” he said.

Such solutions would include incentivising car-pooling, offering subsidised bus services from the outer districts on weekdays and discouraging the typical pattern of a single occupant in hundreds of cars making their way into George Town.

“We will also take a tougher stand on restricting the number and types of cars that can be imported,” he said. “In the medium term, we need to create and resource an effective public transport system that

reduces the number of cars on the road. Making public transportation more regular, more comfortable and more available will improve its usage.”

Premier Panton said due to Cayman's small size and rapid growth, it would always have challenges with mobility and affordability.

“It is expensive to transport goods and services to our is-

lands. And, because we only have so much land and we cannot fill it up with American style highways. But, through our policies and our focus on improving the lives of our people, we can make sure and steady progress improving our transportation systems, making our country more affordable and improving the quality of life for our citizens.”

# WEST BAY CENTRAL DISTRICT COUNCIL IS UP AND RUNNING

As an indication of an election promise fulfilled, the West Bay Central district council is up and running.

It was one of the commitments made by MP Katherine Ebanks-Wilks to activate the council as a central reference point to address the issues and concerns of the constituency.

Speaking during a meeting to install the board, Mrs Ebanks-Wilks who is also the Speaker of the Cayman Islands Parliament, told residents that the council will be independent and advisory.

She stressed that it would not have any political leanings and that representation will not depend on political affiliation.



Council members are selected through a democratic and transparent process with an interim board laying the groundwork for how the council will function and the issues it will tackle.

The successful council members are Ms Sharlene Rogers (Deputy Chair), Mr Charles Brown, Ms Alyssa Ebanks (Youth Ambassador), Ms Sophia Bryan, Ms Glenda Lee-Ebanks, Ms Daubreen Maxwell, Mrs Roberta Powery, Mr Shemar Harding, Mr Jehu Rivers and Mr Clint Hunter (Chair).

"Congratulations to all Nominees, who have been identified by their neighbours and friends as persons who can lead in this capacity", said Mrs Ebanks-Wilks. "I look forward to seeing this WBC Council be a driving force for



West Bay Central."

Already several areas of concern have been lighted from a small online survey recently carried out.

The main issues are housing, cost of living and traffic management, especially specific to the West Bay West area.

Mrs Ebanks-Wilks said these matters, along with others brought up by residents will be referred to the relevant government departments for action.

Advisory District Councils are enshrined in law in the Cayman Islands.

They are established to operate as advisory bodies to the elected members of the Parliament and "shall have such functions, duties and powers as are conferred by this Law or



regulations made under this Law".

The legislation also states that the Council for an electoral district may advise in relation to finance, tourism development, immigration-related matters, district administration, works, gender affairs, education, training, employment, community affairs, housing, health, environment, youth, sports, culture and any other matters affecting the district.

The members, all of whom shall be appointed by the Governor in Cabinet are a Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer; and up to six other members at least two of whom shall be recommended by the Leader of the Opposition.

# Stolen Boats prompts Police warning

In the past, the RCIPS has responded to and investigated reports of stolen boats and other marine vessels. Such incidents have involved vessels moored in water, as well as cases where boats have been stolen while on a trailer.

Police are taking this opportunity to remind boat owners to properly secure their vessels, whether they are kept in the water or stored on land on trailers:

1. It is best to store the vessel in a well-lit area, ideally somewhere with cameras nearby or security on site. This applies both for

vessels stored on land on trailers, and those moored in the water.

2. If possible, secure the trailer for your vessel with a wheel boot and/or coupler lock, so it cannot be easily moved.

3. It may also be a good idea to consider installing an alarm or other anti-theft system.

4. Make regular checks and do not leave your vessel unattended for extended periods of time (longer than a day or so), whether on the water or on land.

5. Always remove the key from ignition when leaving the vessel unattended, and do

not store the key on the vessel itself.

6. Remove all valuables from the vessel when leaving it unattended.

7. Keep a list of all the equipment you have mounted in and on your boat, as well as serial numbers.

8. Use high-quality locks on all hatches, storage compartments, and doors to prevent unauthorized entry.

9. Use a boat cover to keep the vessel and its contents out of sight from potential thieves.

10. Consider investing in a GPS tracking system for the boat, which can help locate the

vessel if it is stolen.

11. If possible, remove the propeller from the boat when it is not in use, as this makes it more difficult to steal.

12. Be mindful of who has access to your keys and who you allow to operate your vessel.

Following these tips will make it less likely for you to become a victim of the theft of a vessel, or items from your vessel. However, if you are the victim of such a theft, contact 9-1-1 or your local police station immediately.

## UPDATE: Man Arrested in Relation to Eastern Avenue Armed Robbery

At about 8:00PM on Friday, 17 March, officers had reason to stop and search a vehicle in George Town, which was suspected to have been involved in a robbery which had taken place at a business on Eastern Avenue early the same morning.

The lone occupant of the vehicle, a man, age 29 of George Town, was arrested on suspicion of robbery in relation to the incident. He has been granted police bail pending further investigation

Shortly after 1:00AM Friday morning, 17 March, officers responded to a report of an armed robbery at a business on Eastern Avenue, just north of Godfrey Nixon Way. It

was reported that two men, one of whom was carrying a gun, entered the location and demanded cash. The men then fled the location with a quantity of cash. No shots were fired and no one was injured during the incident.

The culprits are both described as being of dark complexion and medium build. Both were wearing green shirts, dark glasses, and had their faces covered.

- where a person is serving two or more sentences of imprisonment that are required to be served consecutively he or she shall, throughout the whole time during which he or she so serves, be regarded as serving a sentence exceeding twelve months if (but not unless) any one of those sentences exceeds that term;
  - no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed as an alternative to or in default of the payment of a fine; and
  - no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed by a court outside the Cayman Islands other than a sentence on conviction of an offence constituted by conduct which, if it occurred within the Cayman Islands, would constitute an offence punishable under the law of the Cayman Islands by imprisonment of twelve months or any greater punishment.
- (d) A revised list containing the names, street address and occupation of all persons qualified to vote in the said district –
- whose names appear in the current Register of Electors; or
  - who have submitted to the registration officer a duly completed and signed application for registration in Form 4 will be available at the Elections Office in George Town, the District Administration Office in Cayman Brac and the Post Office in Little Cayman for a period of twenty-one days beginning on the **21st day of April, 2023**.

- any post office or sub-post office;
  - the registering office for any electoral district; or
  - the Elections Office







# Journo pays Grenada \$120k

Grenada's bid for reparations from historic colonialism has received another boost after a top British journalist, whose family became rich from slavery, abandoned her successful career to help the tiny island's campaign.

Laura Trevelyan admits that her professional success can be traced back to Britain's colonial history after quitting the BBC last week to tackle her family's slave trade legacy. She has even donated a huge sum of her personal pension to Grenada as part of her personal reparations.

Trevelyan admits she feels a personal responsibility for her ancestors owning slaves in Grenada.

Trevelyan also called on King Charles III to properly confront the British royal family's connection to slavery amid increasing demands from Commonwealth nations in the Caribbean.

The 54-year-old broadcaster enjoyed a 30-year career at the BBC, presenting shows including Emmy-winner BBC World News America. She's left to join the movement for reparatory

justice for the Caribbean.

"My own social and professional standing, almost 200 years after abolition, is almost certainly linked to the wealth and the status that our family acquired, at least partly through slave ownership," she said. "There's no coincidence. The past does define the present."

Trevelyan, who is married to former ABC News chief James Goldston, and her family apologised last month to the people of Grenada because their ancestors owned more than 1,000 slaves across six sugar plantations.

Trevelyan will use her journalistic skills and public platform to raise awareness of the legacy of colonialism in the Caribbean. She does not have a formal role but said she would be a "roving advocate for reparatory justice."

Trevelyan felt compelled to resign after making a BBC documentary in Grenada last year about her family's slave trade history. She said the trip had a "profound" impact, partly because Grenada's epidemic of obesity, hypertension, and diabetes can be traced back to colonialism.

"We signed our apology and we gave it to the prime minister of Grenada, and he thanked us and forgave us, and said he hoped that this would be a turning point in the fight for reparatory justice," Trevelyan said of her visit last month, during which she donated a £100,000 (\$121,000) reparatory fund.

Trevelyan said she feels "liberated" to talk about the issue of slavery after leaving the BBC, which holds staff to strict rules on impartiality. "I'm ready to have my own voice and I feel that this is a story that I hope I can tell in conjunction with the Caribbean," she explained.

She now feels empowered to criticise the British royal family for the first time, arguing that its current position of "regret" on slavery "isn't really cutting it anymore."

# Cuba's record exodus rolls on



► Some Cubans live in dire conditions

Cubans in their record numbers are still fleeing the island as it suffers its worst socio-economic crisis since the collapse of the Soviet Union.

The number of Cubans seeking entry to the US, mostly at the Mexican border, leapt from 39,000 in 2021 to more than 224,000 in 2022. Many have sold their homes at knock-down prices to afford one-way flights to Nicaragua and travel through Mexico to the US.

Cuba's 11 million inhabitants find themselves in increasingly desperate straits. Internal migration from the poorer provinces has led to overpopulation in Havana. Those for whom the government can't provide homes live in albergues (precarious abandoned buildings refashioned as temporary homes). Others live in solares (tenement buildings), some at serious risk of collapse.

Acute shortages of food and medicine are a daily reality in a country that's been ravaged by a US trade embargo since 1962, and strict government control of the economy since 1959. Regular power outages have reminded Cubans of the early 1990s when Soviet subsidies ended as the USSR collapsed, leaving the island struggling.

To survive that "special period", Cuba became reliant on hard currency earnings from international tourism and nationals working abroad. Both are now much reduced. COVID measures closed the island to foreign tourists and reduced visitor numbers by 75% during 2020.

Ill-timed currency reforms, which unified Cuba's two currencies, in early 2021 created an inflationary shock. Food shortages have sparked a black market boom.

# Montserrat loves Paddy's Day

Montserrat is an unlikely place to see mass celebrations of St Patrick's Day but the Irish festival was in full swing on the tiny island last week.

While many of Montserrat's villages and family names still bear the legacy of Ireland's presence during and after slavery, Montserrat's version of St Patrick's Day was a chance to remember the price paid in the struggle for freedom.

The landmark Montserrat Cultural Centre in Little Bay, which was built from funds raised at the historic Music for Montserrat concert in 1997 at London's Royal Albert Hall, served as a performance centre for concerts, theatre pro-

ductions and national ceremonies. It was not all partying as there were plenty of arts and cultural events too.

The Slave Feast was renamed Heritage Feast and was the highlight of the festival on St Patrick's Day in Salem village.

Parties included Boozey Brunch, Bring U Selectah and Forward, and Wet Dreams. The very popular Leprechaun's Revenge happened in Leprechaun's Valley. This high-energy fete offered lots of food and drinks with multiple DJs performing throughout the night.

Revenge rolled right into Leprechaun's Dust which was an early morning jam with the top mas band Island Diva Mas.




