# HOT! HOT! HOT!

In Cayman, across the Caribbean, in the United States, parts of Canada, southern Europe, much of Latin America, all of Africa, and some regions of the Far East, much of the world is baking in a scorching heatwave that shows no immediate signs of abating.

High-temperature records are being broken in several countries with the US, China and parts of Europe already experiencing their hottest temperatures since record-keeping began.

Death Valley in the US lived up to its ominous name with temperatures at one point

# Mia Mottley: Speaking Truth to the World? Part One

There are those who argue that the bonds of nationalism are being torn asunder by forces of globalization. Hegemonic ideas like capitalism and democracy, the forces of capitalism in the forms of direct foreign investment and trade, labor migrations, and capital markets are seen as operating to dramatically reduce the power and significance of nation-state. In addition, the pressures to remove trade barriers in line with neo-liberal economics, globalizing institutions such as the WTO, UN, IMF, World Bank, and regional agreements among others, they insist, are making the nationalist framework redundant. While there is significance to this perspective, nation-states are still the most critical actors in the modern global system and global inequality is the cause and basis of many of our intractable global problems.

The inequality of nation-states and its impacts on human lives and outcomes is one of the defining features of human societies. Scholars of international relations explain that though power is multidimensional, certain 'natural' features of states such as geographical and population size and the possession of certain vital natural resources, in particular, immediately endow a country with significant power. A large size naturally gives a state some power status-The USA, Russia, China, Australia and so on come to mind. Even though smaller countries with highly educated and skilled population can wield powerful economic and political clout, population size immediately gives great power status as it means a large potential market

for outside goods, the possibility to have a large army and so on. Such resources as oil, gold, copper, bauxite, etcetera are deemed important.

A country's level of industrial development as evidenced in higher education levels, advanced technology, and the export of higher end goods such as computers, cars, ships, aero planes, machines, research outcomes and so on, are more powerful than states which are not industrially developed. But there are also intangible sources of power, some argue, such as national image, that is how the country is viewed internationally can affect its level of influence on the world stage. There is also public support and cohesion, the ability of leaders to bring their people along with them in decisions made by the leadership the country has.

Barbados, with a population of just over three hundred thousand, is devoid of size, geographical or otherwise, does not have vital physical resources but having invested heavily in its human assets, has managed to attain a GNI per capita of just over seventeen thousand US dollars placing it in the high-income category of the world's countries. Barbados has attained this as an independent country that has even recently become a republic having given up its constitutional association with the British Monarchy. However, as commendable as this is, Barbados is a small state, which, like many others, is attempting to survive within the vicissitudes of global realities most of which it did not create but must respond to if it is to survive. Still, its leader has shown that size, impact, and influence notwithstanding, it can punch above its weight in global affairs, or so it would appear.





Many were thus quite pleased to see the formidable Prime Minister of Barbados named by the Times Magazine as one of the most influential persons on the planet in 2022. Those who heard her for the first time, in Glasgow maybe, might have been taken aback by her consummate poise, the power of her oratory, the force of her delivery and the cogency of her arguments.

Mottley is an addition to the long list of strong Caribbean leaders who punch above the weight of the countries they lead. Between the 1940's and 1960's, the leaders of anglophone Caribbean countries took the lead in the movement towards decolonization moving their people towards independence believing like Nyerere of Tanzania that the political house must be in their control. During the 1950s and in the decade after independence, Jamaica stood out in the developing world in its levels of economic growth.

In the 1970's, Michael Manley championed democratic socialism, and was one of the most fluent and irascible defenders of the none aligned movement and of the call for the creation of a New International Economic Order (NIEO). He, like other leaders in the South, had come to realize the debilitating effects of global inequality and the global institutions that keep the system in place. They had called for changes in the terms of international trade, the establishment of a common fund, the regulation of multinational corporations, and a relief of the debt burden among others. At least they could show that they received the LOME Convention for their efforts. This convention allowed for preferential accesses of goods from African, Caribbean, and Pacific countries into EC markets.

On this issue of apartheid in South Africa and the freedom of Mandela, as Fergal Keane points out, while the western world traded with South Africa and their

most powerful nations maintained secret security ties with the apartheid state, and while western firms profited handsomely from their investments in the Republic of South Africa, an antiapartheid movement championed the isolation of the white state and became a remarkable community of conscience in the post-war world.

Caribbean nations and their leaders were at the forefront of this community of conscience, their small sizes and limited influence notwithstanding. Our leaders then utilized global platforms and every means possible to denounce the abominable system of racism. Even with limited trade with South Africa, and while still a colony of Britian, as early as 1957, Jamaica declared a trade embargo against South Africa and Hugh Shearer as Prime Minister of Jamaica between 1967-1972, in an address to the UN Assembly called for an embargo against that racist country. During the 1987's and 1980's Caribbean leaders Forbes Burnham of Guyana, Seaga of Jamaica, etcetera, were most critical of the apartheid regime with the latter in particular working to ensure that the embargo stayed in place.

Mia Mottley speaks in the tradition of Michael Manley, Owen Arthur, Eric Williams, and such intellectuals as Marcus Garvey, Arthur Lewis, and Rex Nettleford, just to name a few. She raises some of the most pressing and urgent issues especially for small and developing states existing on the periphery of the global capitalist system: climate change, global poverty and food security, universal education, human dignity, antiracism, world peace and sustainable development. The issues have not substantially changed since the time of those who were before her. Even with changes in the global political system, the fundamentals of global inequality are still in place. We will pick up on these in subsequent articles.


# Is wind an option?

Energy has evolved throughout the course of history. From firewood, coal, oil and diesel, the way that energy was used to meet the demand of the industrial needs of our world has advanced and there has been a big shift to utilising natural resources that are climate friendly. CUC has through the years looked at all various types of energy sources to shift away from oil and diesel generating units. In 2003, CUC looked at wind energy to see if it was a viable option for Grand Cayman. Through a year-long study, it was determined that the average wind speed of 13 mph on Grand Cayman was not strong enough to create enough energy needed to support the Island. There were also regulatory airspace laws that would be required to change to allow for large wind turbines to be constructed. Even though there were barriers to this energy source, CUC believes that wind energy will form a part of the renewable energy mix in the future.

In 2002, two 170-foot wind-monitoring towers were erected in East End and North Side to determine the feasibility of wind power

# CORE/DER Programmes and Solar

At present, the most viable renewable energy source is solar energy and CUC has been making investments into this type of energy for many years. This includes the development and implementation of our Customer Owned Renewable Energy (CORE) and Distributed Energy Resource (DER) Programmes. Both programmes allow for solar energy to be utilised by our customers and excess energy can be sold to the grid. CUC was also responsible for the issuance of the request for proposal that led to the first utility-scale solar project being commissioned on Grand Cayman in 2017.







# Utility-Scale Battery Storage

With solar energy as the most viable renewable energy source for Grand Cayman, CUC has taken the necessary steps to ensure that this energy source is supported for the future. The Company has purchased two 10 megawatt (MW) battery storage systems that will enable the storage of excess solar energy to be used when needed. The installation of these batteries will be completed by the end of 2023. To further support green energy, the Company will also convert five of its diesel generating units to run on liquid natural gas (LNG) and this project is set to be completed at the end of 2024.

The Company anxiously awaits the bid process with OfReg for the competitive renewable energy auction scheme. This bid process will allow CUC to openly provide details on the plans that the Company has for renewable energy and demonstrate to the public its commitment to finding affordable, reliable and environmentally friendly energy for the people of Grand Cayman. CUC is committed to staying the course and building a future that Caymanians deserve.



peaking at 127.4F - 53.3C raising fears that it was close to setting a new record for the highest temperatures ever recorded on Earth.

According to meteorologists, 2023 is on track to become the hottest year on Earth since records began and climate change is said to be the main cause.

In other parts of the US and Europe outbreaks of wildfires are compounding the heat problem while in some other places, extreme rainfall is the menace at the other end of the spectrum.

And there are no signs of a respite from the hot weather especially happening any time soon, at least not for another month or so. The World Meteorological Organization said the extreme heat and rainfall were expected to extend into August.

There's also the knock-on effect on the health of older people and children in particular with government officials issuing advisories over the risk from the sweltering heat waves.

The impact of agriculture in some parts of the world is crippling with some regions on the brink of famine with its knock-on effects.

Locally for Cayman, the National Weather Service on its website is projecting "moderate heat impact potential with a possible upper limit of extremely high heat for July, August and September."

In its monthly climate bulletin for July, the CINWS also says that a mid-summer dry spell between July to September, marking the peak of the Caribbean Heat Season (May to October) is forecast to be hotter than usual.

"Frequent and, possibly intense episodes of heat stress in the vulnerable populatiand small livestock because of high temperature and increasing humidity through September."

It explains that a possible transition into El Niño is often marked by a warmer heat season, a drier summer season, and reduced tropical cyclone activity.

While all of this is happening, concerns are mounting over what this might mean for this year's hurricane season.

The US National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) reports that it has been tracking a steady climb in ocean temperatures since April this year, which is causing unprecedented heat stress conditions in the Caribbean Basin and the Gulf of Mexico.

Globally, warm sea surface temperatures that can fuel hurricanes have been spiking this year with weather experts saying what really matters for Atlantic hurricanes are the ocean temperatures in two locations: the North Atlantic basin, where hurricanes are born and intensify, and the eastern-central tropical Pacific Ocean, where El Niño forms.

"Hurricanes draw energy from warm ocean water beneath them. The warmer the ocean temperatures, the better for hurricanes, all else being equal," an article in Scientific American explains.

It said that the effects of the weather phenomenon known as El Niño and the extreme ocean heat are about to clash for the 2023 Hurricane Season.

"Warm ocean waters are primed to provide plenty of fuel for the 2023 hurricane season," the article stated but added that a possible El Niño could quash storms.

The article also recalled that tropical Atlantic Ocean temperatures were unusually warm during the most active Atlantic hurricane seasons on recent record.

The 2020 Atlantic hurricane season produced a record 30 named tropical cyclones, while the 2005 Atlantic hurricane season produced 28 named storms, a record 15 of which became hurricanes, including Katrina.

At the start of the 2023 season, the NOAA predicted a near-normal season with 12 to 17 named storms, of which between five and nine could become hurricanes, including one to four major hurricanes.

# Simpson, Allen, Lynn charge to 4H Le Castellet victory





Algarve Pro Racing's trio of Kyffin Simpson (CYM), James Allen (AUS) and Alex Lynn (GBR) charged to overall victory at the 4 Hours of Le Castellet last weekend at Circuit Paul Ricard, France, in the second round of the 2023 European Le Mans Series.

Bouncing back from a disappointing result at the Barcelona season opener, 18-year-old Kyffin and his APR teammates executed a near-perfect four hour run to the checkered flag, taking an early lead, and maintaining track position through most of the event's duration.

Although the #25 Kimpton Seafire Resort + Spa ORECA 07 LMP2 machine lacked speed in Saturday's qualifying session, signs from longer practice runs indicated strong race pace and low tire dropoff – something APR's competitors in the LMP2 Pro class were evidently struggling with as heatwave temperatures exceeded 92°F.

Simpson opted to start the race for the #25 team, and it was clear from the opening laps that the Caymanian driver had plenty of speed to deploy. Kyffin was fourth by turn one, third a lap later, and then second – all in just the frenetic opening minutes of the race.

Chasing down the #47 COOL Racing team in first, Simpson set about closing

down the six-second gap as the LMP2 Pro class began to encounter slower traffic from the LM GTE field of cars. By the first fuel stop, Kyffin was within a second of the #47 car, and the young Caymanian delivered some of the fastest racing laps seen all weekend to 'overcut' the leaders once both teams had stopped for fuel.

The #25 Algarve Pro Racing machine now had control of the race, extending its lead by up to six seconds as fellow Chip Ganassi Racing driver Alex Lynn took over from Simpson in the second hour.

Unfortunately, a mid-race safety car period effectively reset the gap to zero, and APR's race was further complicated by tire damage that forced an unplanned change of two left-side tires at the halfway point.

James Allen took over for the final race stint and emerged from the pits fifth overall after the unfortunate timing of safety car, further yellow flags, and the tire issue. However, APR's stunning pace elevated the team back to third in short order – second in class – with the #25 around 15 seconds behind the leaders with 30 minutes to go.

The combination of heat and tire wear was now clearly impacting the race leaders – and did so in dramatic fashion as the #28 in first suffered a puncture, promot-

ing APR to second overall. The final 10 minutes of the race saw the top three cars close together in a dramatic fight for the win.

As the leading #34 ORECA suffered its own tire wear issues, James executed a decisive move for the lead through turns one and two with just seven minutes left on the clock. APR duly set about extending its lead by several seconds, once again demonstrating the team's inherent pace, and took the checkered flag to seal victory at the 2023 4H Le Castellet.

Speaking after the race, Kyffin said:

"God is good! I'm proud of what we've accomplished today. Alex, James and the whole team executed flawlessly. A few things went against us, and it was really quite challenging with the heat to keep the tires alive, but we stayed focused on our own race. It's a well-deserved win for the team and it's nice to bounce back from Barcelona with this one."

Alex Lynn added:

"It has been a fantastic day for Algarve Pro Racing. We always felt we would be competitive in the race and that was the case. Kyffin got us up into the lead, the team had a great first full service and from there we just set about trying to build our advantage. We had good pace to do it, although the Safety Car scuppered that a bit and we had to be really clever on strategy to make sure we got the win we felt we deserved. After my stint, James had a fantastic drive under difficult circumstances with high tyre wear, not really knowing how hard we could push. In the end, it was an exciting finish and I'm super proud to be part of the team." James Allen said:

"It was a fun race and we come away with a great result for Algarve



Pro Racing. Kyffin's first stint was amazing and he handed the car to Alex in the lead of the race, which was maintained right through to when I took over during the third hour. We somehow lost track position in the final driver-change, but I fought hard to get back up from fifth to the front before the end. There was a lot of tyre management and many teams had failures on the front-left corner, which made it very difficult. However, we were able to get the car to the end in first position and I can't thank Algarve Pro enough. The strategy, setup and pit stops were all on point, the


effort from my teammates Kyffin and Alex was amazing."

With two of five ELMS rounds complete, Algarve Pro Racing next travel to Motor-Land Aragón, Spain for Round 3 of the series, August 26th 2023.

Kyffin's next event is Round 8 of INDY NXT by Firestone at Iowa Speedway, Newton IA this coming July 22nd weekend.

# Year 6 Summer Programme in Schools

The 2023 Year 6 summer school programme, organised by the Ministry of Education and the Department of Education Services (DES) in conjunction with primary schools will take place in Cayman Brac 31 July to 11 August. The two-week programme, which also ran in Grand Cayman, ended on Friday.

The programme is aimed at providing additional intense support in Mathematics and English for those students working towards age-related expectations. It is anticipated that through engaging and interactive learning experiences, students' academic growth will continue during the summer break.

The four hubs sites for the sessions are George Town Primary, Red Bay Primary, Edna Moyle Primary and West End Primary, which identified students from all government primary schools. Specific intervention programmes, including Read Write Inc. Fresh Start, On Track English, and Math Whizz, which includes a virtual tutor, are being implemented in the summer sessions. Math Whizz combines adaptive

technology, interactive content, and gamification to enhance mathematics learning. It offers personalized learning experiences, fosters motivation, and provides valuable insights for educators and parents. In commenting on the catch up initiative, Department of Education Services Director Mark Ray noted, "The summer school programme demonstrates how the Ministry of Education, the Department of Education Services, educators, and parents are dedicated to the ongoing academic success of our students".

In addition to targeting academic skills in Mathematics and English, the programme is also providing students with the opportunities to extend learning throughout the community with weekly field trips and a daily science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) challenge. Through the group STEM activities, it is expected that students will have the opportunity to develop essential interpersonal skills, such as communication, collaboration and leadership.

The Department has also developed a website, www.summerlearningci.com to provide parents and guardians with the resources to support their child's continued practice and learning throughout the summer. On the site, parents will find recommended resources and summer learning activities for students in every year group of primary school.

Lionel Messi copied Dwyane Wade, Dan Marino and LeBron James on Sunday as he was unveiled as Miami's latest sporting superstar. Messi is a fantastic addition to the Major League Soccer franchise and for football fans in the Cayman Islands another great reason to visit the already buzzing city which is only a short hop away.

Messi may be in the twilight of his career but he is still an immense talent, worth watching at any level.

His first official appearance as an Inter Miami player took place in front of thousands of adoring fans at Fort Lauderdale's DRV PNK Stadium.

"I'm very moved to be here in Miami," Messi told the crowd in Spanish, which is spoken by over half of Miami's population. "I want to thank you for the kindness and love that you have given me."

The seven-time Ballon d'Or winner was given a number 10 shirt to rapturous applause on a \$60 million a season deal until the end of 2025.

He has been reunited with defensive midfielder Sergio Busquets - with whom he played at Barcelona - who has also signed for Miami until 2025. Busquets,

Dan too, was formally unveiled at the event.

Inter Miami really made an effort to welcome the 36-year-old striker. Seven-time Super Bowl winner Tom Brady and fourtime NBA champion Stephen Curry also recorded welcoming video messages.

Don Garber, commissioner of Major League Soccer, said someone of Messi's status choosing to play in the league was a "transformational moment", and he hoped the signing would "shout to the world that this is a soccer nation". He added: "It's been so many years of developing this league into becoming a player on the global stage, so it's a very momentous night for us."

The DRV PNK Stadium is Inter Miami's temporary stadium and has a capacity of 18,000, making it the joint-smallest in MLS along with San Jose Earthquakes' PayPal Park in California. A temporary grandstand has been erected to allow more fans into the ground.

Messi left French champions Paris St-Germain in May after scoring 32 goals in 75 games across a two-year spell. He turned down lucrative offers from other countries to play in the US. This the first time he will play for a non-European club.

Inter Miami co-owner David Beckham hailed Messi's signing as a "dream come true". He said: "Leo, we are so proud that you have chosen our club for the next stage in your career."

Inter Miami's primary owner, American billionaire Jorge Mas, called Messi "the best player ever to don boots".

Messi is expected to make his Miami debut against LIGA MX side Cruz Azul on Friday in their opening match of the Leagues Cup.

He reunites with his former Barca and

Argentina boss Gerardo Martino after the 60-year-old was appointed manager in June following the sacking of Phil Neville. Miami only started playing in the Eastern Conference of the MLS in 2020.

Messi was offered a deal by Saudi Arabian club Al-Hilal worth \$1.5bn over three years. But he chose Florida for many reasons other than money; its language and culture is more like Barca's, it is easier to get to Argentina, the football standard is higher and Miami is a more exciting place for his wife and three sons to enjoy.

# Americans want World Cup hat-trick



The United States women want another World Cup win

The United States have won the past two Women's World Cups - and there is a strong chance they could complete an unprecedented hat-trick by next month

The Americans are the favourites to triumph in Australia and New Zealand this summer and repeat their wins of 2015 and 2019. However, they are far from overwhelming tournament favourites. Germany are second in the world rankings behind the Americans and their chances are good too. The tournament started this week and runs until 20 August.

England, led by Chelsea's Millie Bright, are in one of the most competitive groups at the World Cup. Group D also features Denmark and China alongside debutants Haiti. Nevertheless, the Lionesses, who won the Euros last year, should have little trouble navigating their way through to the knock-outs.

Sweden, ranked third in the world by FIFA, are capable of becoming cham-

# Windies ton up against India

West Indies cricket is still spinning out of control despite all the good intentions of the new regime over the last few years.

The Cricket West Indies selection panel's squad for the second Test match against India in Trinidad and Tobago only has one change despite being humiliated in the first Test in Dominica. The match started on Thursday.

Only Raymon Reifer was replaced-by Kevin Sinclair, the off-spinning all-rounder. Reifer will still travel to Trinidad as cover in case of injury. Guyanese Sinclair has made a huge impression. So far, he has played 18 first-class matches taking 54 wickets including three five-wicket hauls at an average of 23.98 each. He has scored 756 runs at an average of 29, including six half-centuries.

This is his maiden call-

up to the West Indies Test squad. The Trinidad Test is historic as it marks the 100th Test between West Indies and India, since the two teams first met at the Feroz Shah Kotla in Delhi in 1948. FULL SQUAD



# NATIONAL GALLERY LAUNCHES THIRD CAYMAN ISLANDS BIENNIAL

The National Gallery of the Cayman Islands (NGCI), with support from Butterfield, is pleased to announce the launch of the third Cayman Islands Biennial, a tri-island multi-venue art project held every two years that seeks to highlight the latest developments in the contemporary art scene. This year's exhibition is organised under the title 'Conversations with the Past—In the Present Tense', inviting artists to respond to the ways in which history continues to shape our experiences in the present. Reflecting further on questions of personal and collective identity,

the exhibition explores the multi-faceted nature of Caymanian culture from a variety of perspectives—foregrounding traditions that have endured to this day, as well as aspects of our heritage that have evolved over time. In turn, the featured artworks provide an illuminating portrait of our ever-changing society—initiating conversations around Caymanian history and its various social, political, and artistic legacies.

Following an open call for participation that was circulated to artists across the Cayman Islands and the Caymanian diaspora, NGCI received 136 submissions from 87 local artists. The final selection, shortlisted through a rigorous juried process, includes work by 57 local artists in a wide variety of media: from performance, photography, and video, to painting, ceramics, textiles, sculpture, site-specific works, AI-generated image making, and installation art. beth Paige Smith, Kay Smith, Gordon Solomon, Nasaria Suckoo Chollette, Larisa Sved, Scott Swing, Simon Tatum, Debbi Truchan, Avril Ward, Zhenya Xia, and John Gray High School students.

Given its expansive scale, this year's biennial has been structured into three distinct sub-themes, providing a strong sense of stylistic and thematic coherence within each of the principal display spaces. These include 'Identity and its Multiple Origins', which is on view in the NGCI Dart Auditorium Community Gallery; 'Sites of Memory', which is presented in the Gallery's Lower Exhibition Hall; and 'Cultural Mythologies', which is displayed within a modern annex space on the grounds of the CNCF Mind's Eye Cultural Centre in South Sound. In keeping with the exhibition's ambitious scope, artworks are being displayed at seven further locations across the Cayman Islands, drawing attention to the unique characteristics of the venues in which they appear. These include Owen Roberts International Airport, the Cayman Brac Museum, Cayman Brac Heritage House, the Little Cayman Museum, Gram Bella's in Northside, John Gray High School, and Barker's National Park.

"Artwork has been positioned at each venue based on both the sub-themes and the context of the location," says Natalie Urquhart, NGCI's Director and Chief Curator. "For example, at the newly renovated annex space at Mind's Eve - home of Gladwyn 'Miss Lassie' Bush's 140-year old wattle and daub cottage - the work on display engages with historical themes and subject matter, and demonstrates the profound influence of Cayman's cultural heritage as an ongoing source of inspiration for our contemporary artists". William Helfrecht, Collections Curator at the National Gallery, further emphasised the importance of such institutional partnerships, stating that "NGCI is grateful to each of the satellite hosts for helping to make the multi-site, decentralised vision of the biennial a reality", adding that "the National Gallery is particularly excited to be collaborating with the Cayman Brac Museum, Cayman Brac Heritage House, and the Little Cayman Museum to help extend even greater access to our exhibitions and public programming in the Sister Islands".

As with each recurring edition, the biennial includes the prestigious Bendel Hydes' Award component, presented to the top selected artist, as well as an Emerging Artist Award for the most promising newcomer. Both awards have been selected by a jury comprising local and international arts professionals Leonard Dilbert, Davin Ebanks, and Lisa Howie. Taking place in mid-July, the biennial awards ceremony will also mark the launch of the 140-page accompanying exhibition catalogue, which includes essays, artwork images and biographies of all the participating artists, and will be on sale in NGCI's gift shop later this month. The project is further supported by an extensive education programme of workshops, conversation circles

(hosted at historic venues across all three islands), late night opening events, and guided exhibition tours, which have been designed to provide developmental support for creative professionals, as well as opportunities for community members to engage with the project through a variety of settings and public platforms.

The 3rd Cayman Islands Biennial has once again been made possible through partnership with the inaugural biennial supporters, Butterfield Bank (Cayman) Limited. Speaking of their ongoing collaboration, Michael McWatt, Butterfield's Managing Director, commented "as a committed supporter of the arts, Butterfield is pleased to be the lead sponsor of the Cayman Islands Biennial. Building upon the success of its predecessors, the exhibi-

tion highlights the remarkable ways local artists are engaging with topical subject matter, whilst also encouraging constructive dialogue within our community that is both stimulating and thought-provoking".

The project is curated by Megan Arch, William Helfrecht, Daniela Granados Solis, and Natalie Urquhart, with the original selection committee comprising Davin Ebanks, Lisa Howie, and Natalie Urquhart. Additional support has been provided by the Ministry of Youth, Sports, Culture and Heritage, and participating venues. ## Cayman Islands' Customs & Border Control Confirms Arrests

The Cayman Islands Customs and Border Control confirms the arrests of two

American nationals, Jelena Noura Hadid and Leah Nicole McCarthy for the importation of marijuana and importation of utensils used for the consumption of marijuana, on 10 July 2023.

The two females, who arrived on a private aircraft to the Cayman Islands from

the United States were arrested following a search of their luggage, and a small amount of marijuana was recovered.

Both parties appeared in Summary Court on 12 July and were charged with the importation of a controlled drug and the importation of a drug utensil. They entered guilty pleas and were fined CI \$1,000.00 and no conviction was recorded.



# 21 year sentence for attempted murder

On Tuesday, 11 July, a man, age 28 of East End, was sentenced following his conviction for Attempted Murder and Possession of an Unlicensed Firearm, in relation to an incident on 20 April 2022, where he shot a man known to him. The man was sentenced to 21 years imprisonment for Attempted Murder and 12 years imprisonment for Possession of an Unlicensed Firearm, with the firearm sentence running concurrently.

In addition, a 35-year-old-man and a 26-year-old-woman of Bodden Town were sentenced on Tuesday, 4 July 2022, following convictions for Possession of an Unlicensed Firearm and Ammunition, in relation to a firearm and ammunition that were recovered during the search of a residence on Bodden Town Road on 9 December 2021. The man was sentenced to 11 years and 6 months imprisonment for the firearm, while the woman was sentenced to 10 years. Both were sentenced to 12 months for the ammunition, running concurrently with the firearm sentence.

"These sentences reflect the serious consequences of violent crime, particularly firearm crime," says Chief Superintendent Brad Ebanks, "and we hope this will serve as a deterrent to those persons presently involved in these ongoing firearm incidents. These sentences also demonstrate our islands continued commitment to protecting our communities from these appalling crimes by pursuing and bringing the perpetrators to justice."

## Driver dies in early morning crash in Cayman Brac

Shortly after 2:00AM Saturday morning, 15 July, police and other emergency services in Cayman Brac responded to a fatal single vehicle collision along Dennis Foster Drive, in the vicinity of Public Works. A Honda Fit was travelling eastbound when it left the roadway and collided with a fence and a building. The driver of the vehicle was pronounced dead on the scene.

Investigations into the collision are ongoing and accident reconstructionists from Grand Cayman travelled to Cayman Brac to assist.

## Water-Related Death in West Bay

Shortly after 10:00AM on Thursday, 13 July, the 9-1-1 Communications Centre dispatched officers to a report of a person in distress on the shore in the vicinity of Boggy Sands Road, West Bay. It was reported that a woman had been swimming offshore when she experienced difficulties and lost consciousness. She was assisted

to the shore by family members who administered CPR until the arrival of Emergency Medical Services. The woman was then transported to the Cayman Islands Hospital via ambulance, and was later pronounced dead.

The deceased, a woman age 80, is a visitor from the United States.

## Water-Related Death in East End

Shortly after 3:10PM on Monday, 17 July, officers responded to a report of a person in distress on the shore off Austin Conolly Drive in East End. It was reported that a man had been in the water snorkeling when he experienced difficulties. He was assisted back to shore by

family and members of the public, who administered CPR until the arrival of emergency services. He was transported to hospital by ambulance, and subsequently pronounced dead.

# Marley biopic trailer is out

Jamaican fans of Bob Marley are excited after the release of the trailer for his biopic last week.

The first trailer for Reinaldo Marcus Green's Bob Marley: One Love,

The movie, set to hit cinemas next year, stars 37-year-old British actor Kingsley Ben-Adir as the reggae icon, and is produced by Bob's son Ziggy Marley. Ben-Adir has previously played Malcolm X in One Night In Miami and Barack Obama in The Comey Rule.

One Love charts the 'Three Little Birds' singer's rise to fame and the turbulent social conditions that gave rise to his One Love Peace Concert in 1978, which was held during a violent political crisis in Jamaica.

"It was exciting and emotional," Ziggy told Entertainment Weekly. "I was very focused on making sure that we represented him right, and being given that responsibility to help Reinaldo was a very serious thing for me. We explored different elements of Bob that people don't know, different emotions that he went through. I actually learned some stuff, too. As someone who was there in this time period, it brings back a lot of memories and things that were hidden inside of me before. It was a very emotional journey."

Green, 41, is best known for directing King Richard, the 2021 biopic starring Will Smith as the father of tennis stars Venus and Serena Williams.

"To get the blessing of Ziggy and the family to come on and be the steward of the ship was significant for me because I knew that I was gonna get access to things that aren't in the public domain: real conversations and memories from people who were there in the room," Green said.

"Ziggy was young, but he was still there. And when you are 11 or 12, that's the most impressionable time. You do remember a lot from those periods of time."

Lashana Lynch plays Marley's wife and Ziggy's mother, Rita, whom the musician married in 1966. Jesse Cilio plays Marley's father Norval, and James Norton plays Island Records founder Chris Blackwell.

The film follows Marley to the point of his death in 1981, aged 36, which came as a result of melanoma – an aggressive type of skin cancer.

The country's main opposition party slammed the settlement in a statement saying it provided too little money for the families and was aimed at avoiding obligations to address safety issues raised by the fire, at a boarding school for indigenous families in the town of Mahdia.

The May 21 fire in a heavily fortified girl's dormitory killed 19 female students and the son of a school administrator. Officials say one of the students deliberately started the fire, and she has been arrested and charged with murder.

Announcing the settlement late Monday, Attorney General Anil Nandlall said

t the families had requested the cash to "enhance their ability to continue to y provide for their families" and that they t all had signed agreements with the gov-

The state also had taken care of all burial and related expenses. One badly burned girl was sent to a New York hospital for specialized treatment.

The main opposition party, A Partnership For National Unity, APNU, said in a statement that the settlement wasn't sufficient because the money isn't enough to build a house in the capital, much less in the interior where materials are more expensive to transport. Nevertheless, the families of the victims have been promised more money in the future.

## Grenada's violence and suicide rates rise



Grenada's prime minister is worried by disturbing trends

Grenada has seen an alarming increase in murders, general violence and mental health issues, a worrying trend that is worrying the government.

Grenadians are being urged to think before they act and to be kinder in their interactions with one another as society has been recently dealing with acts of violence and loss of life.

Prime Minister Dickon Mitchell said the violent acts in recent weeks are a sad reminder that the actions of a few can derail the shared progress of Grenada as well as plunge families into deep despair.

He is calling on citizens to think before they act as every act of violence affects the entire community emotionally and economically, as well as the livelihoods of Grenadians across the island.

Community policing will be strengthened to get to the root of this violence.

Mitchell said according to statistics from the Royal Grenada Police Force, 14 homicides have been recorded so far for the year. There has been an increase of illegal firearms too. At this time in 2022, 16 illegal firearms were recorded, while 31 have been recorded so far.

Prime Minister Mitchell is also concerned about mental health incidents. He noted in the last two weeks there has been a lot of attention on suicides arising from the alleged suicides of two women, one a prominent lawyer.

· Tip: Don't swear off all carbohydrates-instead stick with wholesome carbs.





# **Update on the Poinciana Residential Mental Health Facility**

The Ministry of Health & Wellness wishes to advise the public of the following updates pertaining to the Poinciana: Residential Mental Health Facility (formerly the Long Term Residential Mental Health Facility) in East End:

### **Facility Update**

Poinciana's Project Management Team (Public Works Department) has advised that the main facilities, including administration, workshop and cafeteria building are now in the final building inspection phase with some items not yet being cleared; the cottage works and perimeter security system are nearing completion; and the expected handover to the Ministry of Health and Wellness is end of September 2023 and not June 2023 as previously anticipated. The Ministry will continue to keep the public

apprised as to the status of the ongoing inspections and handover of the facility.

### **Appointment of** Director

The Ministry of Health & Wellness is pleased to announce the appointment of Mrs. Marcia Amoy Mullings-Thompson as the incoming director of the Poinciana: Residential Mental Health Facility in East End.

"I know that there continues to be great anticipation and interest about the status of the facility and the human resources complement of the facility," explains Ministry of Health & Wellness' Chief Officer, Nellie Pouchie. "As such, the Ministry is pleased to make this announcement today. The recruitment process for this post was rigorous, and we are confident that, based on Mrs.

Mullings-Thompson's and rich experience and qualifications, she is suitably poised to assume the Director role and lead the management and administration of the Poinciana Residential Mental Health Facility. We look forward to working with her as we seek to bring the facility onboard and to fill the mental health needs in our community."

Mrs. Mullings-Thompson has been a registered nurse for twenty-eight (28) years, sixteen (16) of which were spent in management positions. She holds her Bachelor's Degree equivalent (formerly certificate) in General Nursing Care from the Kingston School of Nursing in Jamaica and a Master's Degree in Mental Health/Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner from the University of the West Indies.

2005, Mrs. Since Mullings-Thompson has held the post of Regional Mental Health Officer for the Southern Regional Health Authority (SRHA) in Jamaica, which constitutes of three parishes, coordinating, supervising and managing the nursing and other aspects of the community mental health services. She transitioned into Jamaica's Ministry of Health to act as the National Mental Health Coordinator for a short period of time where she was responsible for assisting with monitoring and auditing, policy development, and legislative reviews. Her experience also allowed her to be seconded for two years to the Bellevue Hospital (BVH), the largest psychiatric facility in the Caribbean, to work as the Chief Executive Officer with the overall responsibility for the day-to-day management of the hospital with over 500 patients and 600 staff members.

Along with her advanced degree, Mrs. Mullings-Thompson has continuously engaged in continuing education activities in the field of mental health. She is a Trainer of Trainers in several are-



as, including disaster related psychological trauma, mental health support and crisis intervention, psychosocial support and psychological first aid, human rights and ethical issues in mental health, PAHO/WHO mhGap intervention, PAHO/WHO Problem Management Plus intervention.

"I understand that there is a lot of hope and many expectations around this facility, and I take the responsibility of being accountable not only to the Ministry of Health and Wellness but also to the residents we serve, their families and the community as a whole very seriously," Mrs. Mullings-Thompson states. "This facility is not intended to stand alone, but rather to help enhance the full suite of mental health services that already exist on island. I am looking forward to developing strong and meaningful relationships with not only these providers, but also the advocates and civil society organisations that have their finger on the pulse of the community," she concludes.

Mrs. Mullings-Thompson will take up her post as the Director of Poinciana: Residential Mental Health Facility on Monday, 10 July 2023.

It has been a long road, but we continue to take positive steps forward and I am confident that the finish line is fast approaching in getting the facility ready to receive its first residents," Minister Turner adds.






