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OfReg enhances consumer protection



CAYMAN AIRWAYS BARBADOS BOUND!

In what has been described as a 'mutually beneficial arrangement', Cayman Airways will be adding Barbados to its growing list of destinations from later this year. Following negotiations between the

Barbados government and tourism offi-

cials and the Cayman Islands authorities led by Hon. Minister to Tourism Kenneth Bryan, the Cayman-Barbados route is expected to be launched in October offering two flights per week.

Speaking in a joint video press confer-

ence with his Barbados counterpart, Ian Gooding-Edghill, Min Bryan described the latest addition to Cayman Airways routes as a game changer.

NATIONAL HEALTH SURVEY EXTENDED PARTICIPATION ENCOURAGED



Cayman is on the home stretch of the important nationwide STEPS health survey and to ensure maximum participation, the project is being extended to September 3rd.

To date, over a thousand persons from randomly selected households have taken part in the first two phases of the three-part exercise which started at the beginning of June and was initially due to be completed at the end of this month.

The purpose of the exercise is to "determine the national prevalence for non-communicable diseases (NCDs), as well as their risk factors, in Cayman," said a government statement at the launching of the project.

The last time the nationwide exercise was carried out was ten years and the data is now being updated to ensure that Cay-

man stays on top of trends and threats affecting the health of the population.

Collecting the data involves a threephase process. The first and second phases have been completed and phase three is now underway.

Chief Medical Officer Dr Nick Gent and Epidemiologist with the Ministry of Health and Wellness, Rachel Corbett, have been outlining to Caymanian Times how necessary it is for the households and persons selected to participate in the third phase.

"What we've got is going to be useful, it will be important information, but to get that extra detail we do we do need several hundred more people to be coming



through step three as well," the CMO ex-

He assured that all the data collected from the tests being carried out is confidential and the information is analysed to get a broad understanding of the state of health of the Cayman Islands. No individual or household is identifiable in the analysis.

"It looks like we probably will get the numbers on Steps One and Two," he said, but is concerned that Step Three is lagging at present.

"It looks like Step Three will be suboptimal, which will be a great shame because that's probably going to be one of the most important ones to determine diabetes and prediabetes...Step Three is one of those where the information is really going to help us with some of the health care service planning and teaching."

"We're thankful for everyone who's taken part and given their time," says Epidemiologist Rachel Corbett, "We need to get a minimum of 1300 with these estimates to give us national prevalences for the whole of Cayman that reflects Cayman. We're close to that target, so it'd be great to keep pushing and to continue to get a few more through."

For the third phase, called Step Three, participants are invited to have an appointment with a nurse, for a basic finger-prick blood test. "It just takes about 10 minutes, so it's very quick and then the individual gets their results back straightaway for their blood sugar and their blood cholesterol."

According to Epidemiologist Corbett, "We've tailored our approach this time around to try and make that easier. We're offering home appointments to try and make it more convenient for individuals that we can go to them, and also have facilities spread all over the island, rather than just in Georgetown."

One issue that has arisen, is participants suggesting that the information cloud be obtained from their doctor. However, based on doctor-patient confidentiality and data protection that is not allowed.

The importance of the STEPS programme to formulating a national health strategy is key, CMO Dr Gent said. It enables the health authorities to get an early indication of where policies and resources would need to be focused. And already he said, there are some indicators of concern.

"For instance, if we uncover a problem with a lot of people with quite severe weight problems - and that that is almost certainly the case - we're going to need programmes that go through everything from the school ages to through to adulthood, that figure in nutrition, access to exercise, and other clinical advice and caring support."

The CMO further stressed his commitment to ensuring the good health of the people of the Cayman Islands.

"I want Cayman to be the healthiest place in the world, not just in the Caribbean. It's a beautiful place. And its people deserve to have the best health outcomes. But for me to be able to advocate for that, I've got to understand what those underlying problems are, articulate them and measure them. We can then repeat this kind of survey in 10 years time and see whether or not what we're doing has an impact. We also need a baseline to measure whether or not we're successful in intervening to try to put things right."

The ongoing survey, now extended to September 3rd for data collection in Phase Three, is targeted at persons living in Cayman for at least six months and who are between 18 and 69 years old.

"This new service to Barbados is a game-changer for regional connectivity. It will deliver a faster and cheaper alternative for travelling between the Cayman Islands and Barbados than any other currently existing routes on the market."

This is the first time that a scheduled service is being offered to a destination in the

Eastern Caribbean as a part of the strategy to expand connectivity to the north, south, east and west."

According to Mr Bryan, the vision is to expand Cayman Airways' connectivity to key locations situated to the north, south, east and west of the Cayman Islands.

The Barbados connection is expected to reduce flying times and costs between the two destinations without having to intran-

sit via Miami, and provide connectivity to other islands in the Eastern Caribbean.

A key strategy is also to provide easier links to both Cayman and Barbados via a second Cayman Airways schedule being added to the Los Angeles route.

"From a strategic standpoint, the Cayman-Barbados route will deliver several key benefits that will help to improve our competitive advantage. For example, this will allow visitors from several currently underserved European markets such as Germany and Finland to access the Cayman Islands more directly," Mr Bryan explained.

For Barbados, the benefits are substantial, said the country's Minister for Tourism and International Transport Ian Gooding-Edgehill.

"This agreement with the Cayman Islands is a step in the right direction for destination Barbados as we look to further increase connectivity in the region, and open up opportunities for Barbadians to travel to Europe and vice versa...The opportunities with Cayman Airways will be for Barbados to be used as a hub connection for the Eastern Caribbean and for onward connections to the Northern Caribbean."

Mr Gooding-Edgehill also stated that the new arrangement builds on the success of previous Cayman Airways charters arranged by Barbados.

The Chairman of the Board of Cayman Airways, Dr John Paul Clarke, said this latest move adds to a series of what he termed 'significant milestones' for the airline.

"As Minister Bryan stated, traditionally at Cayman Airways in the Caribbean we have flown to our closest neighbours, Jamaica, Cuba and Honduras. This new flight to Barbados offers one-stop connections to a plethora of Eastern Caribbean countries."

He also said that combined with the planned second LA midweek 'red-eye' flight' that opens up even greater convenience for passengers returning from Asia because when they come in they can just come directly home.

At the same time, opportunities are being explored in the British midlands via an interline agreement with Virgin Airways.

"We will have the only one-stop itinerary, of course with convenient baggage check-through between Manchester International Airport in England, and Cayman, which means we now have a one-stop service to the British Midlands, which is a place for which we have great interest from a tourism perspective," Dr Clarke outlined while reporting improved financial and operational performances by Cayman Airways.

Chief Executive Officer(CEO), Fabian Whorms, said the airline is proud to support the Cayman Islands Government, its sole shareholder, in this collaboration with the Barbados government which he noted "will undoubtedly improve airlift across the Caribbean region."

He said the scheduled start dates are tentative at this point and subject to change but that they are aiming for the flights to begin on October 18th.

"We're currently working with the relevant regulatory and operational support agencies to ensure that the required approvals for the operation and sale of the flights can come in soon. We expect to have everything in place for tickets to go on sale in early to mid-August. We're currently working with a draft schedule as I indicated, but this schedule will have two midweek rotations(flights) back-to-back from Barbados between Barbados and Grand Cayman on Wednesdays and Thursdays" he stated detailing the planning and operational processes.

In response to a Caymanian Times question asking 'if it's the long-term strategy for Cayman Airways to increase its service to the Eastern Caribbean and to encourage more residents of the Eastern Caribbean to come over to the Western Caribbean, Min. Bryan offered this perspective:

"Most naturally, any travel is good travel for the airline. Obviously, we have cultural connectivity, which I think we should embrace. Cayman is a melting pot as it is and I would love to see more Eastern Caribbean nationals here. We've grown tremendously as a population but it's been mainly of Europeans and North Americans. So I think it'd be good for us to have growth in visitation from visitors who have similarities in our background, our culture and heritage. So, yes, it's simply the answer to that."

The Cayman authorities assured that Cayman Airways has the capacity and resources to pursue these new opportunities in what is the third major route announcement for the airline in the past year, with others under consideration.



Over the Next Year, Caymanians Can Look Forward to 76% of Companies Hiring in Semi-Skilled Roles

This month, the University College of the Cayman Islands (UCCI), hosted a fully subscribed Business Breakfast and Labour Market Assessment Forum to uncover the findings from the Island's largest workforce survey that took place in late 2022 with almost 600 respondents.

The study took place as part of the RE-SEMBID project - Renewable Energy and Sustainable Development Training for the UCCI - which was launched in July 2022. UCCI received a grant of €432,000 (CI\$405,000) from the European Union (EU) RESEMBID Programme to engage 55 unemployed and underemployed Caymanians in a year-long training programme in sustainable trades. This was so successful that it was also rolled out in Cayman Brac as well.

Developed in collaboration with WORC and the Chamber of Commerce; this was one of the biggest studies of its kind into workforce needs within the Cayman Islands and revealed some groundbreaking findings.

Key findings were as followed:

- There is a current misalignment between the demand and supply of skills in the Cayman Islands, with jobs of interest not aligned to the future jobs in demand except in the case of accounts and finance.
- Out of the industries surveyed, firms in solar photovoltaic and ICT reported being the largest employers of Cayman nationals currently.
- Top job positions currently employed across all sectors were accounts and finance (36%), operations managers (35%) and receptionists (25%).
- Of the 123 firms surveyed, 76% said they would be actively hiring within the next 12 months showing a clear expectation of future job growth.
- When asked how many employees they plan on hiring in this time frame, the largest employers for job growth were accommodation and food services; information and communication; financial and insurance; professional, scientific and technical; as well as electricity fuel and air conditioning. These align closely with the sectors within the RESEMBID training programme.
- When asked how many of these would be skilled workers, 41% of these will be highly skilled vacancies, 47% semi-skilled and 12% unskilled.



- Firms also expected to see a shift in their workforce from highly skilled professionals in the main to semi-skilled. Of the 1257 employees within the 123 companies surveyed, 61% were currently highly skilled. The firms expected to recruit only 41% highly skilled employees in the future, seeing a shift in needed skills.
- The impact of new technology was driving many concerns amongst employers, specifically in the scientific and ICT sectors.
- High demand future jobs for the Cayman Islands were listed as accounts and finance (18%), digital marketing (15%), professional and technical (15%), operations management, (13%) and carpenters (12%).
- Of the underemployed Caymanians surveyed, the highest percentage currently worked in customer services (18%).
- The main reasons given for them currently being underemployed was that they were not qualified for available jobs (32%).

The study was funded to provide insight and direct policy makers and key stakeholder groups on future job supply and demand in the Cayman Islands. Two study populations were surveyed: 123 employers

across all industry groups including the four industries for RESEMBID – construction, hotels and tourism, ICT and solar photovoltaic (renewable energy). The second population group was 435 underemployed and unemployed Caymanian nationals between the ages of 18 and 45.

The industry focused event saw special guest speakers including the Honourable Dwayne Seymour, MP Minister for Border Control and Labour, Mr. Andrea Floudiotis, RESEMBID Programme Manager, Marine Biodiversity, and keynote presentation by Kishka Anderson from Market Research Limited into the findings from the Labour Market Assessment Report.

Matthew McGill, Project Officer for UC-CI's RESEMBID project, commented: "It is important for the Cayman Islands to understand its workforce so that we can best prepare community members for future skills and so that we can plug the skills gap between employers and employees. Some key pieces of information came out of this study, not least that there is a current misalignment between job vacancies and future skills needs and the qualification level

of unemployed Caymanians. Unless training is put in place to upskill Caymanians in these key areas, the Cayman Islands will have to continue to rely upon permit holders to plug the gaps."

Dr Robert W. Robertson, President, and CEO of UCCI, stated: "This study is a crucial piece of information for the Cayman Islands as it shows where funding and training needs to be directed to plug not just the skills gap but also the employment gap in the Cayman Islands. The findings give us a roadmap that we can utilize to ensure that we can deliver the skills and qualifications that the Cayman Islands needs for the future advancement of Caymanians."

RESEMBID is a 47-project progamme funded by the European Union and implemented by Expertise France – the development cooperation agency of the Government of France and supports sustainable human development efforts in 12 Caribbean Overseas Countries and Territories (OCTs) – Aruba, Anguilla, Bonaire, British Virgin Islands, the Cayman Islands, Curaçao, Montserrat, Saba, Sint Eustatius, Saint Barthélémy, Sint Maarten and Turks and Caicos.

The Opposition's Response to the Cayman Airways' New Route to Barbados

The Progressives Opposition notes, with interest and some concern, today's announcement by Minister Bryan of the new Cayman Airways Limited (CAL) air route to Barbados.

Of course, this route will make travel between the Cayman Islands, Barbados, and the Eastern Caribbean more accessible and enhance inter-region travel between Islands. That is certainly a positive aspect of the route. But first and foremost, the route must make sense for the Cayman Islands and Cayman Airways.

Despite the Chairman of CAL seeking to give assurances as to the viability of the route and its sister 'route' to Los Angeles, several questions remained unanswered.

As a part of the arrangement with Barbados, CAL also announced the introduction of a second flight to Los Angeles (LA) that will serve both the Cayman and Barbados markets. However, CAL stated that it is relying on travel numbers from Barbados to LA to make this second flight viable.

Worryingly, the Minister and CAL are proposing to start the flights during the slow season in October. This certainly seems detrimental to the viability and success of this second flight to LA. It does not seem like a business decision that CAL would usually take. This appears to have been acknowledged by the

CAL Chairman, who said that he and the CAL board were not initially planning to provide a second flight at this time. But the partnership with Barbados was the impetus for starting in October.

We are also sceptical about Minister Bryan's hope that many UK and European (EU) tourists will travel to the Cayman Islands via Barbados. The Minister did indicate that increasing arrivals from the UK and the EU would be a key measure for him as to the success of the new route for the Cayman Islands. We will see in the coming months how well the Barbados connection with the UK and, indeed, the second LA flight performs for the Cayman Islands and CAL.

At a time when recent stayover statistics indicate that both the Cayman Islands and Barbados are struggling to get back to 2019 tourism numbers, there is no room for the Barbados route to fail and not perform as anticipated for either country.

As CIG and CAL enter this new partnership with Barbados, it will also be important that the risks and rewards are clearly understood and suitably shared.

There may be many considerations in deciding on a new CAL route, but two questions should be asked and thoroughly answered. First, does a proposed new air route pose any undue increased financial or other risks to CAL and the Cayman Islands Government? And second, is there an alternative and more profitable route for CAL and the Cayman Islands that better uses CAL's aircraft?

The answers to those questions were not fully explored during the announcement. Indeed the Press were limited in the questions they were allowed to ask. A question was posed to the Minister on cost sharing of the route, but Minister Bryan refused to give details regarding the financial arrangement with Barbados. He said the contract prevented the financial information from being advised to the public. Admittedly, that was undoubtedly concerning for many viewers to hear. There should be noth-

ing to hide from the Cayman and Barbados public.

Also of concern was CAL stating that Barbados had not provided their marketing data/route analysis for CAL to consider when deciding on the route – including the viability of the second LA flight. Instead, CAL effectively relied on assurances that all would be well. We can only conclude that a formal and complete route analysis was not performed.

We hope the Minister was correct when he assured the press and the public that neither CAL nor the Cayman Islands would lose on an arrangement that includes twice weekly flights to Barbados on a Wednesday and Thursday and a second flight to LA. Only time will tell if he is right.

Without full transparency by Minister Bryan on any shared financing arrangements and route analysis (route viability), there is doubt about the viability of both the Barbados route and the second flight to LA. But the Opposition and the Caymanian people will undoubtedly hold the Minister to account if he gets this wrong.

To end, The Opposition does have concerns regarding the new route and additional LA flights. Whilst we may genuinely want the new route to succeed, it cannot be allowed to burden CAL or the Cayman Islands people unduly financially.

OfReg enhances consumer protection with new outage reporting rules

OfReg has issued a determination to its' information and communications technology sector licensees as part of its' ongoing efforts to enhance consumer protections in the utilities sector. The new rules for reporting on outages require them to provide enhanced reports to the regulator following an unplanned outage and to also provide advance notice to all costumers of any planned outage.

The new rules set out a Licensee's obligations for reporting disruptions to the public and other critical communication services like hospitals and emergency services. The enhanced reports must include detailed information on the nature and cause of outages such as a specific component failure, loss of power or a cyber-attack. This level of detail is essential for OfReg to improve monitoring of the reliability, resiliency and security of Cayman's communications infrastructure as well as consumer service quality standards.

Although similar reporting rules have been in place for some time, the reports received did not provide the level of clarity on breadth, frequency and impact that outages were having on consumers and networks. Additionally, there was no obligation to notify customers of planned outages. This meant that prior to the new rules, a telephone company could shutdown service to upgrade or repair its network without providing any advanced notice to its customers relying on that service. Now customers must be notified of upcoming outages and OfReg will be provided with details necessary to evaluate licensees' compliance, the resiliency of networks and be better able to protect Cayman's critical national tel-

ecoms infrastructure.

OfReg's Executive Director for the telecommunications sector, Mr. Sonji Myles said, "The information on network and service outages is essential to maintain and improve the infrastructure reliability as it provides the basis for us to determine whether any outages or repeated outages justify regulatory interventions or industry cooperation initiatives to prevent the recurrence of similar outages."

Interim CEO Mr. Peter Gough added, "The proper functioning of public communications infrastructure is critical for consumers and as the regulator, we are determined to put in place the necessary consumer protection measures. The new rules for the reporting of outages in the telecommunications sector are another tool that we will use to ensure consumers get the level and quality of service they deserve and pay for."



First Addison Kelly Memorial Scholarship Recipient Named

The Alex Panton Foundation (APF) has named Ms. Jamara Bodden as the first recipient of the Addison Kelly Memorial Scholarship. The funding will allow Ms. Bodden to complete the final year of a two-year online master's degree programme in psychology and neuroscience of mental health at Kings College London in September, after which time she intends to pursue a Doctor of Psychology (Psy.D) degree in the UK.

The Addison Kelly Memorial Scholarship was created in the memory of Caymanian teenager Addison 'Addi' Kelly who lost her life to suicide on 8 February 2022 at the age of 16. Her family established the fund to help increase the mental health support services and resources that are available on island and put more qualified Caymanians in the field. The scholarship is administered through APF and will be funded primarily from the proceeds of the Addison Kelly Butterfly 5k Walk/Run, the first of which took place in February 2023. The event raised just over US\$52,000 in registrations and donations which was matched by Dart.

Ms. Bodden was one of five highly qualified candidates who applied for the scholarship which offers CI\$25,000 per annum for up to four years for Caymanians to pursue post-graduate studies in the fields of psychology, psychiatry or psychotherapy. Awarded every two years (biennially), recipients must return to work in Cayman for the number of years for which the scholarship was given. The opportunity also includes a mentorship with a doctor level psychologist/mental health provider to support the navigation of the recipient's journey.

"To be the first awardee of the Addison Kelly Memorial Scholarship is an incredible honour," said Ms. Bodden. "This scholarship carries a weight of responsibility

which motivates me to strive for excellence in my academic pursuits and future career. Receiving this opportunity also fills me with gratitude and humility. I hope to one day pay forward this blessing by using the expertise that I acquire to improve the lives of others."

Bodden, who said she was motivated to apply for the scholarship after watching a video about Addison's story, is looking forward to coming back to Cayman, establishing herself in the mental health

community and participating in more initiatives that raise awareness, foster greater empathy and acceptance, and reduce stigma within the society. She currently works as a Relief Worker at the Cayman Islands Crisis Centre where she is a passionate advocate for victims of domestic abuse.

"I am so excited to be able to announce the APF's first scholarship recipient. Offering a scholarship has been a part of my vision for the APF for a long time. I

believe that the Foundation's ability to help provide more mental health resources for the community can only serve to strengthen the three pillars upon which APF was built awareness, advocacy and support," said Jane Panton, APF Founder and Chair. "We are so honoured that Addi's family entrusted APF to handle this incredible gift that will change countless lives even as Addi's life and her story inspired and touched so many. Congratulations to Jamara; we wish her every success in her studies."

"Addi expressed her desire to be a psychiatrist and in her more hopeful moments, she was making plans about how to accomplish that dream and ultimately help others struggling with mental health illnesses. Our family is so happy that her legacy, her aspirations will be realised through individuals like Jamara who are compassionate, determined and zealous about helping others, as Addi was," said Addi's mother Rhonda Kelly, who sat on the scholarship committee.

"We were so impressed by the quality of the candidates who applied for the scholarship; they were all so deserving and although we couldn't award scholarships to everyone, we are so eagerly looking forward to the contributions and the impact these Caymanians are going to make in the community once they have completed their studies."

Fire Safety Visits Resume on 1 August

The Cayman Islands Fire Service (CIFS) will resume its Home Safety Visit initiative on Tuesday, 1 August, 2023. Visits will begin in the Prospect area and continue throughout the other districts during the period.

The initiative is designed to increase fire safety awareness within the community, particularly for high-risk individuals such as senior citizens, households with minors, smokers, disabled persons and those who reside in timber structures.

During a Home Safety Visit, Fire Safety Inspectors will conduct checks including but not limited to the following safety measures:

- · inspect all smoke detectors to ensure that they have been properly installed and make recommendations if necessary;
- · aid persons in developing an effective

fire evacuation plan;

- · verify electrical safety by checking for electrical overload, improper use of cords and other hazards; and
- · discuss cooking safety and fire safety practices for children.

"Our Home Safety Inspections are a major part of our proactive fire safety education practices. Visits will be conducted on all three islands, and the Fire Service will also share information on its channels to keep the public safe and informed", stated Chief Fire Officer D. Randy Rankin.

The Fire Service has also developed a home safety survey to collect data on current practices within homes in the Cayman Islands. Persons can complete the survey anonymously at https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/XRDL2PC.

WORC Enforcement Operations Continue

The Compliance & Enforcement Unit at Workforce Opportunities & Residency Cayman (WORC) continues its operations with the support of other enforcement agencies such as the Department & Labour (DLP), Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS) and Customs & Border Control (CBC).

In mid-May, WORC received information about persons working illegally, which resulted in an operation being carried out at an air-conditioned business and two (2) persons were arrested on suspicion of breaching the Immigration Transition Act. The result was a fine levied against two separate employers and two employees for the offence.

In mid-June, WORC partnered with DLP and completed on-site inspections at beauty salons and a grocery store. WORC arrested one (1) person and this matter continues to be under investigation. DLP officers issued five (5) audit letters which identified various breaches under the Labour Act and the Pensions Act. The audit letter requests employers to provide spe-

cific information in accordance with the Labour Act and National Pensions Act. If the requested information is not received, it may lead to a report of the employer being non-compliant with the law.

At the end of June, information was received of persons working illegally at a business in the eastern district. RCIPS joined in this operation and provided helicopter assistance. CBC Officers also joined due to a report about a possible illegal person working on-site. The investigation resulted in five (5) persons being arrested for breaches of the Immigration Transition Act. Both the employer and the employees are under further investigation.

WORC Director Jeremy Scott said "Well done to our Compliance & Enforcement team for carrying out these necessary operations to ensure persons and companies remain compliant with the employment and immigration laws of these Islands. Thank you to the officers from DLP, RCIPS, and CBC who partnered with us and provided support to ensure any arrests were made without incident."

NRA Encourages Safe Driving This Hurricane Season

The National Roads Authority (NRA) urges residents and visitors to take care on the roads this Hurricane Season. With the potential for severe weather conditions and increased hazards on the road from 1st June to 30th

November, NRA is committed to promoting awareness and providing guidance to ensure the safety of all road users.

Hurricane season brings unique challenges that require careful preparation and vigilance. The NRA emphasises the following essential safety measures in the event of a hurricane. It is not advisable to drive through flooded areas, as you may not be able to see dangerous debris and fallen power lines.

Businesses and individuals are reminded to check their homes and offices to ensure they are prepared for the 2023 Hurricane Season. Some key things to consider include securing materials to protect windows and doors in the event of a storm, ensuring first-aid kits are fully stocked and medications are within date, as well as pruning back any overgrown trees near the home that may



pose a threat.

During a storm, NRA is responsible for setting up traffic controls and detours, clearing the roadway of debris, conducting emergency repairs, assessing damages and providing emergency engineering services, among other things.

"As we enter hurricane season, it is of utmost importance that we prioritise road safety and take proactive measures to protect ourselves and our communities," said Edward Howard, Managing Director of the National Roads Authority. "By staying informed, planning ahead, and following recommended safety guidelines, we can reduce the risks associated with severe weather events and ensure the well-being of all road users." Will they mourn us on the front line?

Mia Mottley: Speaking truth to the World? Part Two

For those who have eyes to see, for those who have ears to listen, and for those who have a heart to feel: 1.5 °C is what we need to survive, 2 °C, yes, Secretary General, is a death sentence for the people of Antigua and Barbuda, for the people of the Maldives, for the people of Dominica and Fiji, for the people of Kenya and Mozambique, and yes, for the people of Samoa and Barbados. We do not want that dreaded death sentence. And we have come here to say: "Try harder." Try harder because our people, the climate army, the world, the planet, need our actions now - not next year, not in the next decade.' Mia Mottley, PM of Barbados, Speech at the Opening of the World Leaders Summit of the United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP26), **November 1, 2021**

The earth has recorded what are possibly its hottest days in its modern history. The planet churns out fifty-one tons of greenhouse gases into the atmosphere in every typical year and as human influence on climate change is unmistakable, for small island states in the Caribbean, climate change threatens our long-term survival on the planet. It is as serious as that and the urgency of this fact has been strongly expressed by Mia Mottley, PM of Barbados. As temperatures rise globally, those who deny the obvious need to face reality.

Mottley would have found additional salvo in a just released study published in the journal Nature Communications that was carried by the New York Times. Essentially, scientists have new evidence that human activity leading to the emission of gases that trap heat are causing changes in the environment which are most difficult to reverse. The thawing of the Artic permafrost, the loss of the Amazon rainforest, the collapse of the Greenland and West Antarctic sheets are examples of these says this study by researchers from the University of Copenhagen's Niels Bohr Institute. Now to be added, is the possibility that



the system of ocean currents that regulates the climate of larger parts of the planer could collapse sooner than expected. This is serious stuff.

There are many views about climate change. For some, it is the most far-reaching manifestation of white privilege and class privilege. For others, it continues the historical trajectory of a demarcation between developed and developing countries. For others like activist and author Naomi Kleine, we must abandon the free-market ideology, restructure the global economy, and remake our political systems as serious and far-reaching climate solutions will not come from capitalism. For others, it is a time for individual, community, and global repentance within a theological framework, as a prelude for success. Others like Bill Gates, take view that this is a moment that cries out for human ingenuity in the creation of relevant technologies.

In his recent well-received book, How to Avoid a Climate Disaster: The Solutions We Have and the Breakthroughs We Need, Gates looks at methods to get zero emissions of man-made greenhouse gases and the removal of carbon dioxide, nitrous oxide, and methane from the atmosphere within thirty years. He has several chapters on the expansion of existing clean technologies such as wind and solar energy, electric vehicles, and heat bumps. He also

proposed a new generation of nuclear weapons, plant-based meat and resilient crops and livestock.

Technological innovations are certainly important strategies to confront climate change. Industrial countries account for nearly 75% of the fossil fuel derived emissions of carbon dioxide and almost 60% of the total carbon dioxide emissions. This is changing and will continue to do so as developing countries develop

Another major source of energy related to greenhouse emissions is transportation. Substantial opportunities exist for reducing the energy intensity of cars, trucks, busses, and airplanes. In the electricity sector lighting loads are growing as developing countries bring electricity to its citizens. The supply of luxury appliances will see increases in greenhouse emissions from electricity production

New technologies are being developed to include more efficient lighting and better electric motor drivers on the end use side and solar wind, biomass, fuel cells and advanced combustion systems on the electricity supply side of the equation. These are clearly important as an approach to confronting the problem. The sad

truth is, however, that so far, these are making a difference as yet. Greenhouse gas emissions have continued to increase.

Whatever the perspective, the situation is dire. And this brings us back to the summary of the urgency given by the Barbadian Prime Minister. The increasing incidents and scale of droughts, floods, hurricanes, the endangerment of our underwater resources, are troublesome for the viable survival of future generations. This is particularly so for the most vulnerable countries such as small island developing states even though they have contributed little to the greenhouse gas emissions. She tells of how as temperatures and the sea levels cause droughts and limit access to potable water for months, 'at a time where for example in the Caribbean a country's entire GDP can be wiped out in a night or in the case of Dominica, 227 percent of its GDP with Hurricane Maria and Irma.'

The issue is both macro and micro. The indebtedness of most developing countries, in Africa, Latin America and those in the Caribbean included. does not help when they will need to spend on tackling the problem. As Mottley puts it, 'we will not solve it by techno optimism, and some loose change being thrown at people the world needs to spend about three trillion dollars a year on investments to transition to renewable and regenerative energy, transport, and agriculture, and the more we talk about it, and the less we do it, the more critical the problem becomes.'

She makes the case on the world stage in a very powerful way. Telling the story to the most powerful actors who are at the root of the cause of global warming is one thing- a necessary thing. Getting more 'resolve' 'ambition' and 'humanity' is crucial. But as Caribbean people 'on the front line' and other developing countries, there are urgent issues to address in relation to climate change that we must do ourselves and as urgently as Mottley reminds the world. We pick up on these in the next article.
