

Global scams targeting Cayman

Two frauds are currently being perpetrated on people in Cayman and the RCIPS is warning people not to be fooled.

One is a scam known widely as 'Pig-Butchering', whereby overseas

criminal groups are targeting victims in the Cayman Islands.

The scam is a type of fraud in which criminals lure victims into digital relationships to build trust before convincing them to invest in cryptocurrency platforms. Unbeknownst to victims, the fraudsters control the platforms and will eventually take all the money and vanish

Sexual Harassment Bill being discussed

To ensure maximum input from the public, the government is holding a series of meetings in the coming weeks to discuss the proposed Sexual Harassment Bill, 2023.

Back in March, government issued a White Paper and a period of consultation was open to the public until 15 April 2023. This resulted in significant responses from over 300 individuals and organisations. A summary of the public feedback can be viewed by visiting the public consultation website at www.gov.ky/sexualharassment.

The decision to hold meetings now is to share some of the proposed changes

to the White Paper based on the feedback received and to facilitate some additional public consultation on this very important bill of national concern, the government said in a press release.

The Sexual Harassment Bill seeks to provide individuals with protection from sexual harassment. It sets out requirements and duties for employers, institutions and associations, as well as members of qualifying bodies, associations, charitable/not-for-profit organisations, employment agencies, people involved in the transaction of goods, services, facilities, real or

personal property, landlords and tenants, and relevant third parties.

Premier Wayne Panton said he was pleased with the level of engagement and support which was received during the first round of public consultation.

"It shows that our country expects the government to address sexual harassment in a robust and well thought out way," he stated. "Our government recognises the scale and scope of this legislation and therefore felt it necessary to ensure that everyone had an opportunity to give feedback - particularly the business community who will be asked to ensure many of the provisions of the bill are upheld. I once again urge the public to acquaint themselves with the proposed bill and the feedback shared so far by attending the Town Hall or joining us online."



Caribbean UKOT Leaders Meet

Heads of Government from United Kingdom (UK) Overseas Territories (OT) in the Caribbean met on Saturday 29 July 2023 to discuss issues of mutual importance and agree on actions to address shared challenges. The meeting, chaired by Premier of the Cayman Islands, Hon. Wayne Panton, was held in Miami, Florida.

The packed agenda covered a wide range of topics of interest to the territories including improved engagement and information sharing between Caribbean OTs, beneficial ownership, representation at international forums and the United Kingdom's relationship with its Overseas Territories. Opportunities were explored to foster greater awareness among the territories of the shared historical and heritage links especially through youth, sports and cultural exchanges.

The meeting was also used to prepare for the next Joint Ministerial Conference in November 2023, as well as to discuss Overseas Territories participation in the upcoming United Nations Climate Conference (COP28) and other similar forums.

In attendance were Premier of the Turks and Caicos Islands, Hon. Charles Misick; Premier of the British Virgin Islands, Hon. Dr Natalio Wheatley; Premier of Anguilla, Hon. Dr. Ellis Webster; Deputy Premier of Bermuda, Hon. Walter Roban as well as Cayman Islands Minister for Youth, Sports, Culture and Heritage, Hon Bernie Bush and Premier of Montserrat, Hon. Joseph Taylor-Farrell participated in the meeting virtually.

Additionally, several senior officials and civil servants from the respective Overseas Territories joined the session.

In underscoring the importance of the meeting of Heads of Government, Premier Panton noted his gratitude to his counterparts for their willingness to participate in the important discussions. "Our respective Overseas Territories find themselves at a critical juncture. While we welcome the increased levels of engagement and interest in the Overseas Territories that is now emanating from the UK, it is important that we come together as a regional group to share our observations and experiences. The weekend's successful meetings not only reaffirmed the strong spirit of friendship and partnership between the Caribbean OTs but reminded us of our similar priorities and challenges due to our geographical and cultural ties. It is therefore critical to exchange ideas and agree joint positions

on solutions wherever possible," he emphasised.


"It remains a priority of my Government to strengthen partnerships and increase collaboration with our regional counterparts as together we are stronger. Therefore, it is important that the Cayman Islands continues to play its role in facilitating strong and mutually beneficial relationships with our regional neighbours."

Earlier this year, Premier Panton, other Overseas Territories and United Kingdom Ministers participated in the Joint Ministerial Council in London to discuss issues aimed to promote the security and good governance of the territories, sustainable development, economic and social progress and to agree priorities, develop plans and review implementation.

GOVERNMENT INCREASES STIPENDS FOR OLDER PERSONS, SEAFARERS, VETERANS & PERSONS LIVING WITH PERMANENT DISABILITES

Older persons and adults living with permanent disabilities who receive financial assistance from the Cayman Islands Government, will see their monthly stipends from the Needs Assessment Unit (NAU) increase by more than 30% immediately. Recipients of

Long-Term Financial Assistance (formerly known as Permanent Financial Assistance) and the Seafarers and Veterans Ex-Gratia Benefit, will now receive \$1,250 per month, an increase of \$300. There will also be a one-time back payment of \$300 for the month of





July to assist with summer utility increases.

Minister for Investment, Innovation and Social Development Hon. André Ebanks expressed his gratitude to his colleagues within Caucus and Cabinet for their unanimous support of the additional funding.

"As we navigate our current economic and social landscape, ensuring our older persons, seafarers, veterans and those living with permanent disabilities are supported to receive the services they need is one of my Ministry's core priorities. This is just one of the many changes we have planned to revolutionise financial assistance. By addressing gaps and providing bespoke services, we can better serve those members of our community who are facing economic challenges."

"Persons living with permanent disabilities and older persons account for approximately two thirds of the NAU's clientele. This group is more likely to need longer periods of financial support, and we have adapted Long-Term

Financial Assistance to better support them. With the current economic challenges many in our community are facing, we felt it important to provide this increase now rather than in January, which has traditionally been the case. Our next step is to refine the services we offer to the remaining third of clients who may need transitional or supplementary forms of assistance based on their income or employment status", Minister Ebanks added.

Additional changes to the NAU will come throughout the remainder of this year as the Ministry and Department continue to work towards implementing the Financial Assistance Act, 2022, which was passed in Parliament last October. When the legislating commences, the NAU will become the Department of Financial Assistance (DFA).

Long Term Financial Assistance and the Seafarers and Veterans Ex-Gratia Benefit are both administered by the Needs Assessment Unit. For more information, call 946-0024 or email NAUinfo@gov.ky





Cayman Islands Postal Service to participate in Overseas Workshop

Acting Postmaster General Melissa Martinez-Ebanks and Mails Manager Henry McField of the Cayman Islands Postal Service are set to participate in the Electronic Advance Data, Customs Declaration System (EAD/CDS), and Postal Security Training Workshop, which will be held in Miami, Florida from 8-11 August 2023.

Both Ms Martinez-Ebanks and Mr Fields received fellowships from the event hosts, the Universal Postal Union's (UPU) International Bureau and the United States Postal Service, which will cover the cost of the trip.

During the workshop, members from the Caribbean Postal Union and the Postal Union of the Americas, Spain and Portugal will discuss a range of topics including Electronic Advance Data and Disaster Recovery Management programmes, as well as receive training on several key tools to enhance their services. The workshop will also provide a venue for postal operators to share best practices and discuss the potential for further advancement within their country or region.

Late last year, through their dedication to excellence in our postal security, the Cayman Islands Postal Service earned the UPU S58 and S59 Silver

Certification, joining the company of Barbados, Bermuda, Jamaica and St. Vincent and the Grenadines all of whom hold varied levels of certifications. Postmaster General, Ms Sheena Glasgow, stated, "Earning the certification is a fantastic achievement and shows the commitment of our CIPS managers

and staff to enhancing our competitiveness while also working to meet international standards. However, there is always room for improvement, and we are actively working towards obtaining a Gold+ certification, the highest certification level from the Universal Postal Union.

She further noted, "We have received recommendations of areas where there can be further security improvements and have already begun implementing them. The EAD/CDS and Postal Security Training Workshop will be an invaluable experience for Mr. McField and Ms. Martinez-Ebanks and their attendance will no doubt contribute to our operational readiness and the further development of our e-commerce."

The UPU security standards S58 (General security measures) and S59 (Office of exchange and international airmail security) are internationally recognized and their objective is the protection of the international postal supply chain. Ensuring the safe and secure exchange of mail among all member countries is critical for the continued viability of the postal sector. There are five levels of certification, entry-level or basic certification, Level C (Bronze), Level B (Silver), Level A (Gold), and the Plus certification. Each member country is re-evaluated every three years.

NCU to Honour Shirlene Henriques at Historic 100th Graduation Exercise

Northern Caribbean University (NCU) will confer the honorary Doctor of Science degree on Caymanian Shirlene Henriques, MA, OCI, who graduated among the first batch of NCU-degreed nurses in 1974.

The honorary doctorate will be awarded during the institution's historic 100th commencement exercise on Sunday (August 13, 2023). The "robing and hooding" ceremony will take place in Grand Cayman at the George Town Seventh-day Adventist Church, on Smith Road, at 8 am on Sunday. This local aspect of the conferral will be presided over by President of the Cayman Islands Conference of Seventh-day Adventists Ivor Harry, DMin, assisted by Livingston Smith, PhD, and Joan Latty, PhD.

Mrs. Henriques retired as Chief Executive Officer of the Cayman Islands Health Services Authority in 2008. In 2021 she was made an Officer of the Order of the Cayman Islands (OCI) for distinguished services to nursing and the Cayman community.

At this 100th graduation ceremony, more than 700 graduands from 77 academic programmes offered across the institution's four colleges and one school are eligible for the conferral of certificates and degrees. The 100th graduation exercises will be held August 10-13 in the gymnatorium on the Mandeville Campus of NCU.

The president of NCU, Prof. Lincoln Edwards, DDS, PhD, described the 2023 graduating class as "prestigious, not only because of the determination" that took graduates to where they are today, but because this is "the 100th graduation ceremo-

ny since the institution opened its doors on this hilltop."

Mrs. Henriques is the third Caymanian NCU graduate to be conferred with an honorary doctorate from NCU, the first being Dr. Wilton McDonald, who received the Honorary Doctor of Divinity in 2013. The second was Dr. the Hon. Linford Pierson, former Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, Cabinet Minister, and long-serving Civil Servant, upon whom NCU conferred the Honorary Doctor of Public Service in 2021.

Among recognition earned during Mrs. Henriques's nursing career, the 1995 award of the Cayman Islands Certificate and Badge of Honour (Cert. Hon.) highlighted her work with AIDS patients.

Other contributions to the development of the nursing sector in the Cayman Islands included her role as In-Service Education

Coordinator at the Islands' then-only hospital, where she introduced the LPN (Licensed Practical Nurses) training. As a testament to the rigorous standards of the initiative, several of the first batch of graduates completed their BSN in Florida in two years, Mrs. Henriques said.

After 34 years' ground-breaking service, she retired in 2008 as Chief Executive Officer of the Cayman Islands Health Services Authority.

Mrs. Henriques is well known in the Cayman community for her philanthropic initiatives, led by her Manna House Pantry. That agency has been collaborating with the Cayman Food Bank since 2018 in distribution of food to families in need.

Others to be awarded honorary doctorates at this 100th graduation exercises include the Hon. Audrey Sewell, the recently appoint-

ed Cabinet Secretary of the Government of Jamaica, on whom NCU is expected to confer the Honorary Doctor of Public Service. Jamaican-born hotelier and businessman, Mr. Dennis Morgan, who is also an alumnus of NCU, will receive the Honorary Doctor of Commerce degree.

Mrs. Sewell will deliver the keynote address at the second of two commencement ceremonies on Sunday (August 13) while United States-based telecommunication entrepreneur, Mr. Freddie Figgers will address the morning ceremony.

In the special awards category, senior NCU administrator Georgette Baker will be awarded the 2023 President's Medallion, while the 2023 "Product Sample" will be awarded to NCU alumna Dr Melva Spence, who is a counselling psychologist and advocate.

Opposition happy with ex-gratia increase

Government's decision to increase the ex-gratia payment of \$950 per month to \$1,500 per month has been well received by the Opposition. Opposition Leader Roy McTaggart believed the Government had made a good move.

"As the leader of the Opposition, I am always appreciative when the Government takes the advice of my colleagues and myself on the Opposition benches," he said, adding the Opposition had asked the Government to undertake such a move frequently this year.

Mr McTaggart said the increase was particularly important given the fact that most of those receiving the assistance were elderly with little income and relied on this help to survive each month.

Mr McTaggart pointed out that during the Progressives' tenure in Government, the payment was raised from \$500 to \$950.

"This assistance needed to increase further due to the dramatic increases in food and everyday costs," he confirmed. "The announcement that the Government has now, at last, agreed to increase the assistance to some of our most needy from \$950 to \$1,250 per month is a very good start."

The Opposition Leader said he was grateful that the Government had listened and agreed that an increase was warranted.

"Our elderly and needy will undoubtedly welcome the added help," he stated. "I pray that at the budget session in Parliament, the Government will provide for a further increase to at least \$1,500. We, in the Opposition, will certainly be calling for it."

Emancipation Day: Lessons for the Present and Future

Harvard Professor Orlando Patterson, of Caribbean background, is easily the preeminent scholar on the institution of slavery. Within the covers of his books such as Slavery and Social Death, Freedom in the Making of Western Culture, and The Sociology of Slavery, he has explicated every crevice of this dastardly institution. He defines slavery as the personal and violent domination of generally dishonored persons, who are under the direct power of another or his agent. The slave does not belong to the legitimate social or moral community and has no independent social existence. An excommunicable person, slave ownership usually entails the power of life and death over the slave. So, for him, the three main aspects of slavery were the use of naked force, natal alienation, and dishonor, Natal alienation refers to the fact that the slaves had no rights at birth and so were 'non-persons and non-citizens'. Though practiced in various ancient societies like Greece and Rome, its manifestation in the Americas was unique, vile, and fundamentally different especially that it was founded upon racial characterizations. In fact, without slavery, the course of modern racial thinking would have been totally different.

Even though many Caribbean countries have just celebrated 'Emancipation Day', which they should, given what this means for people of African descent and for humanity on a whole, equally important was the end of the slave trade on March 25, 1807. This was just a few decades before the passing of the Slavery Abolition Act in 1833 in the British parliament but en-



forced in August of 1834 as the beginning of the end of slavery in the British Empire. They obviously go together.

The consequences and significance of the end of the slave trade and of slavery itself, was the subject of two speeches made in the United Nations by two of the Caribbean's most accomplished historians and cultural luminaries: Professors Rex Nettleford and Verene Shepherd. Nettleford was invited to deliver this speech on March 26, 2007, on the 200th anniversary of the ending of the slave trade while that of Professor Verene Shepherd, was delivered on March 20, 2015, on the occasion of the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. Her speech was entitled, 'Learning from Historical Tragedies to Combat Racial Discrimination today.' Both are carried on the CARICOM website.

In his presentation entitled 'The Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade: The Psychic Inheritance', Netlleford described slavery

trade and slavery as 'the greatest scourge of modern life' and that this horrific past has left the legacy of 'hate, intolerance, discrimination, racial arrogance, class exclusivity, intellectual snobbery, and cultural denigration,' and 'the psychological conditioning of millions into stations of self-contempt bolstered by an enduring racism, underlying rigid class differentiation, and ending up with the habitual violation of human rights.'

The speech makes numerous deep and valid points. The decimation of the native Americans and the emergence of plantation America was also the creation of geo-cultural area and the plurality that emerged is the basis of the dynamism of Caribbean culture. The role of Africans and their descendants in the Americas has too often 'been plunged, wittingly and unwittingly, into subterranean and submarine silence' which must be broken in the face of their massive contribution to the Americas in areas such as 'language, religion, artistic manifestations, kinship patterns, in ontology and cosmology.' He called for the end of such 'obscene habits' of a racialized division of the world in the terms we use, and so on. Diverse cultures

must be tolerant of each other and appreciate how the process of cross-fertilization and the 'synthesizing of contradictions' is part of humanity's 'becoming.'

Dialogue among civilizations, with none believing that it is superior to the other is crucial in 'the quest for peace, tolerance, justice, liberty, sustainable development, trust and for respect and human understanding, and should not be seen as a threat, but rather as a guarantee for peace'.

There is genius in plurality and intertextuality of existence, Nettleford, insists, where humanity accepts itself as 'part that', 'part the other', but totally human, like Caribbean people being part African, European, Asian, and Native American, yet still totally Caribbean. 'It is the full grasp of the creative diversity of all of humankind that provides the source for tolerance, generosity of spirit, forgiveness, respect for the Other, that the new millennium will require if it is to house the brave new world with the human being as centre of the cosmos.' These are eternally relevant guidelines as our societies grapple with difference and plurality and as we come to grips with our past.

Bermuda considers corporate tax

Like the Cayman Islands, Bermuda has no corporation tax, a feature that has greatly contributed to that jurisdiction's success globally as an attractive offshore jurisdiction, however that may soon change as the country considers implementing corporation tax. Bermuda's Royal Gazette reports that the Bermudan government is moving towards the implementation of corporate income tax in what they say would be the biggest shake-up of the island's tax system since the 1800s.

The report states that Bermuda is looking to align themselves with the OECD's Inclusive Framework, which is seeking to reform international tax rules to ensure that large multinational enterprise groups pay a mini-

mum level of corporate income tax, at a minimum rate of 15%, applying to multi-nationals with more than €750 million in total global revenues in at least two of the previous four accounting periods.

David Burt, Bermuda's Premier and Minister of Finance, said Bermuda found itself at a pivotal point and must consider how they could adapt to these impending changes to global tax rules.

"Bermuda's current consumption-based tax system was developed in the 1800s and reflected the expected scope and nature of expected economic and business activity, given our size and other factors," he said. "Therefore, in response to the substantial changes in the global tax landscape, the

Government is considering the implementation of a new corporate income tax regime as part of its work to address the Pillar 2 requirements agreed by the Inclusive Framework."

The report said the Bermudan government anticipated that the proposed Bermuda corporate income tax legislation would be effective for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2025. It is estimated that about 2,000 of the island's 16,000 international companies would be affected.

Like Cayman, Bermuda's tax system currently levies no corporate taxes on profits, income, dividends or capital gains.

The Bermudan government has issued a consultation paper regarding the proposed changes to the island's tax structure,



and which is a product of deliberations by the Bermudan government's International Tax Working Group, which delivered its report last month. A consultation period, the first in a series of such periods, is open until 8th September.

Global scams targeting Cayman

The name of this fraud comes from the Chinese phrase, Shāzhūpán, whereby the scams are usually perpetrated over a long period of time. They combine elements of romance scams, investment schemes, and cryptocurrency fraud. Fraudsters build a relationship with their victims, metaphorically fattening the pig before deceiving them into making investments in fake business ventures before the "butchering" and scamming them of their every penny.

The RCIPS says anyone can fall victim to this type of scam, however the most common victims have been persons between the ages of 30 and 60. A wide cross-section of victims have been seen globally, even including police officers, those familiar with investment products, graduate students, engineers, consultant doctors and those working in the virtual currency space. Unlike the stereotypical scam victim, many of them are highly educated and digitally savvy.

Victims commonly lose between KYD25,000 - KYD\$100,000, although others lose many hundreds of thousands, with some unfortunately tricked into parting with over KYD \$millions. Unfortunately, it is the case that very few victims can get any money back. Whilst the actual frauds are often perpetrated by smaller scale fraud shops or teams of scammers, criminals mostly use a third-party money laundering service to obfuscate and hide the stolen funds within a huge and sophisticate network turning over billions of dollars before being cashed out, usually to Chinese crime syndicates operating in South East Asia.

While this scam sometimes uses romance as a tactic, scammers can also build other types of personal or professional relationships over time in order to convince their targets to invest more money.

Investigators within the Cayman Islands Bureau of Financial Investigation encourage anyone who feels they may be engaging in online activities that appear similar to what is described, to



visit our crime prevention page here, review our tips and take the necessary steps to prevent any further loss. You may also call (+1 345 649 4358) to make a report or speak with an investigator in person.

'Smishing' (SMS phishing) campaigns have also been on the rise. The RCIPS Cyber Crime Unit has noted an increase targeting the Cayman Islands. The latest involves someone impersonating Cayman National Bank. The scammers will

send a one-time code (OTP) and ask you to call a 1-866 number. It should be noted that the telephone number changes frequently.

The RCIPS said this is a scam. Banks in the Cayman Islands will never ask for your password or other log on details via telephone or email. If you receive an SMS of this nature please ignore it.

That West Bay man was arrested on suspicion of accessory after the fact of murder, as he is believed to have mislead the police throughout the course of the investigation, where then 24-year-old Justin Manderson was shot at the front of a shopping plaza located on West Bay Road. He was transported to the George Town Hospital where he later succumbed to his injuries.

The West Bay man has since been bailed pending further investigations into the incident. This is matter has been open and active for the past 7 years and was

The Cayman Islands athletes continued their superb performance at the Commonwealth Youth Games in Trinidad and Tobago. Up to Tuesday they had won two gold medals, five in total. The week-long Commonwealth Youth Games ended on Thursday.

Caymanian Andrew Stone shattered the Games long jump record, taking gold with a leap of 7.70 metres. Stone erased the eight-year-old games record of 7.67m, set by Ghana's Richard Seklorwu in 2015.

He broke the record on his final attempt, after nearing it on his third with 7.63m. The 17-year-old youngster told Newsday he felt "really great" and basked in the energy of the crowd. He said: "In Trinidad, it's really amazing. It's not like they're cheering only for their country, they're cheering for everybody."

On being the record-holder, he said, "It's

really good. I'm just trusting my Lord and saviour Jesus Christ." Stone is making impressive progress. He won the CARIFTA long jump in April with a leap of 7.54m.

The first gold medal came from Jillian Crooks, Monday evening, in the 100m freestyle with a national record time 55.18 seconds, 14 seconds faster than her time from the 2023 World Aquatics Championships. Crooks' victory came after her bronze medal in the 100m backstroke on Sunday. She also won bronze in the 50m backstroke. The 16-year-old swimmer is aiming for an Olympic berth at next year's Paris Games.



Renewed Drivers' Licences Can Be Collected at Post Offices

Residents of the Cayman Islands can now choose to collect their renewed drivers' licences from their post office. This new free service, offered in partnership with the Cayman Islands Postal Service, is available at all post offices across all three Islands.

Licence renewals can be completed in person at any of the Department of Vehicle and Drivers' Licensing (DVDL) locations or online. To receive their driver's licenses via mail, customers should send an email to DVDL.Helpdesk@gov. ky requesting delivery. Drivers will be given the option to choose post office collection and will be informed via text or WhatsApp when it is ready for collection.

All items not collected or delivered

within 15 days of posting shall be processed for return-to-sender.

Fire Safety Visits Resume on 1 August

· aid persons in developing an effective fire evacuation plan;

· verify electrical safety by checking for electrical overload, improper use of cords and other hazards; and

 discuss cooking safety and fire safety practices for children.

"Our Home Safety Inspections

are a major part of our proactive fire safety education practices. Visits will be conducted on all three islands, and the Fire Service will also share information on its channels to keep the public safe and informed", stated Chief Fire Officer D. Randy Rankin.


