# Small Business Spotlight: Chisholm's Grocery

Anyone who has driven to Cayman Kai or Rum Point, whether resident or tourist, has undoubtedly noticed Chisholm's Grocery on the waterfront side of the road, near the Hutland junction. In fact, for 69 years the business has been a fixture in North Side.

Originally started as a 'Mom and Pop' operation by Will and Ida Chisholm, the business is now in the hands of a third-generation family member and has grown from strength to strength throughout the years. Chisholm's is indeed a prime example of a business done right and it has flourished because of that.

This week, we had a chance to speak with the current owners/management. We were primarily concerned with how the business has fared since the lockdown, and how it is doing during the current season. This was a refreshing experience as every answer offered to our questions was further confirmation of the worth of this establishment. Below is a transcript of the interview.

Since the island opened up to visitors, post-pandemic lockdown, how has the business fared?

"The return of visitors/tourists to the island has resulted in steady progress in the level of business with the peak season of 2022 showing levels above pre-pandemic business."

How is the business this year compared to last year?

"Business for the first 6 months of 2023 is up substantially from the first 6 months of 2022 as the first 6 months of 2022 was only the beginning of the reopening to visitors."

What strategies or approaches have you taken to ensure the business remains viable?

"The owners/operators through 69 years this 13 August 2023, starting with "Mr Will" and "Mrs Ida" Chisholm, and following with Rhoda Erena Ebanks (nee Chisholm) to the present operator, have always considered and treated customers as friends. Whether it was Mrs. Ida and Mr. Will giving credit, or Nana letting late-night arriving tourists have goods until they could return with cash (before credit card acceptance), to today's operator's policy of "The customer always comes first" (not AL-WAYS RIGHT but ALWAYS FIRST), the best way to ensure a business remains viable is to continue to build on the heritage of the hard work of those before, and a genuine appreciation of the customer."

What is the key to a successful business?

"The operators of Chisholm's Grocery believe that success can be defined in as many ways as there are businesses. However, they believe there are a number of keys, again depending on one's definition of "success". Some of these are: First, being able to stand on the shoulders of those (Like Mrs Ida, Mr Will and Nana) who invested their entire lives in sweat equity. There is no overnight success; perseverance is a key to success. Secondly,






learning and accepting change in the business environment surrounding you. Third is never taking for granted the customer, your workers, or the inheritance/legacy you are to continue. Finally, and most importantly, the operators of Chisholm's Grocery believe that there is no single "key" and they believe that the most important key to their definition of success is, "A good reputation is more desirable than great riches; to be esteemed is better than silver or gold." (Proverbs 22:1).

How has the summer been for the business? Has there been any slowdown? If so, to what do you attribute the slowdown? Is it because of the tourist off-season, the economic situation here in this country, the steady rise in the cost of goods, and of conducting business in general? Or is it Something else?

"The summer invariably almost always shows a slowdown for Chisholm's Grocery with less visitors but, with a good customer base of locals, Chishom's Grocery hasn't seen any dramatic slowdown, compared to, say pandemic-lockdown or even pre-pandemic levels. Chisholm's Grocery has endeavored to keep price increases to the bare minimum and customers have responded very positively." Is there anything else that you would like

to share about Chisholm's Grocery?

"The owners wish to express their deep and sincere appreciation to their customers, whether they are decades-long faithful local customers, or the first or repeat tourist customers, for their patronage over the past 69 years (13 August 1954). They know that, in the part of the words of Max Ehrmann's "Desiderata" (Things desired), "... Enjoy your achievements as well as your plans. Keep interested in your own career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time. Exercise caution in your business affairs, for the world is full of trickery. But let this not blind you to what virtue there is; many persons strive for high ideals, and everywhere life is full of heroism."

#### NOTICE OF INTENT TO MAKE AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC COMMENT THE DRAFT ENVIRONMENTAL STATEMENT (ES) FOR THE PROPOSED ReGen PROJECT (FORMERLY THE 'INTEGRATED SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM')

#### REQUEST FOR COMMENTS AND NOTICE OF OPEN HOUSE SESSIONS

The Environmental Assessment Board (EAB) established for the ReGen project is hereby providing Notice to the Public regarding the availability of the Draft Environmental Statement (ES) for the proposed ReGen project (formerly known as 'Integrated Solid Waste Management System (ISWMS)'). Cayman Islands Government (CIG) and Dart Consortium (the "Proponents") indicate that the proposed project is designed to meet international best practices & standards and to meet waste management needs of the Cayman Islands as envisaged in the CIG National Solid Waste Management Strategy. This notice invites the public to review and provide comment on the Draft ES prepared by specialist consultant GHD. This notice also invites public participation at three open houses to view presentation of the draft ES and discuss the project with expert consultants and the Proponents.

GHD has developed the draft ES by using the Terms of Reference (ToR) approved by the EAB to guide the Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA). The draft ES is a written report of the EIA process and provides a technical evaluation of potential environmental impacts that may be expected because of construction & operation of the proposed ReGen project. The draft ES also includes a Non-Technical Summary (NTS) that presents the conclusions of the EIA in a simplified manner. The ES has been reviewed by the Environmental Advisory Board (EAB) and the draft ES reflects the comments provided by the EAB.

The Draft ES for ReGen will be available online at www.doe.ky and www.regen.ky from Friday August 18, 2023. The draft ES can also be accessed via a Virtual Engagement Room (VER) at regen.ghdengage.com. Hard copies of the draft ES will be available for review from Friday Aug 18, 2023 at the following locations:

The public comment period will be open for 21 days from August 18, 2023 to midnight of September 07,2023. Comments on the draft ES must be submitted in writing using the following means -

The public comments submitted via the above channels will be received and collated by the EAB. Any personal data provided during the comment submission will be regulated by the provisions of the Data Protection Act (2021 Revision). The comments received before the closing date will be reviewed by the EAB & the Proponents and considered in the finalization of the ES document.

Three Open House sessions are being arranged to inform the public about the EIA process and facilitate public discussion & comments on the Draft ES. Representatives from GHD, the Proponents and the EAB will be available at the sessions to provide information, answer questions and receive comments regarding the Draft ES. These sessions will be held on the following days:

1. Monday, August 28, Harquail Theatre from 6 PM until 9 PM; Presentations will begin at 7 PM.

2. Tuesday, August 29, John Gray Memorial Church Hall, West Bay from 6 PM until 9 PM; Presentations will begin at 7 PM. 3. Wednesday, August 30, Mary Miller Hall, Red Bay from 6 PM until 9 PM; Presentations will begin at 7 PM.

The Open House on Monday August 28<sup>th</sup> will be broadcast live via CIG TV and the recording will be made available for viewing post session.

### Air Traffic Controller Supervisor Attends International Air Safety Course

The Cayman Islands Airports Authority (CIAA), which operates the Owen Roberts International Airport (ORIA) on Grand Cayman and the Charles Kirkconnell International Airport (CKIA) on Cayman Brac, is proud to recognise Air Traffic Controller Supervisor Joshua Burke (CKIA) for recently attending the Air Safety Support International (ASSI) Air Traffic Services (ATS) Assessor/Examiner Course in St. Maarten in March 2023. Joshua was trained to be well versed in the practical, oral and written requirements needed to be a Licensed ATS Assessor/Examiner in the Cayman Islands.

The course content was derived from the ASSI training manual as well as various International Civil Aviation Organization (ICAO) and Overseas Territories Aviation Requirements (OTAR) documents that set the standards for Air Traffic Services. The overall objective of all the practical exercises was to monitor and ensure Trainee Air Traffic Controllers were able 'to provide a safe, orderly and expeditious flow of traffic using standard (ICAO) procedures, liaison and radiotelephony phraseology'. This fiveday course required three end-of-course examinations based on all the mentioned documents, manuals and materials presented during the course. The pass mark for the exams was 80% or above. To receive a certificate of successful completion, Joshua had to pass the practical, written and



oral exams, which he successfully did and was commended by the instructors and peers for his attention to detail and documenting. Examiners observe and analyse the performance of Air Traffic Controllers during live operations sessions to assess their adherence to standard procedures and guidelines. This course qualifies Joshua to evaluate trainee air traffic control officers (ATCOs) and recommend them to be licensed by the Civil Aviation Authority of the Cayman Islands (CAACI). The ASSI ATS Assessor/Examiner's course evaluated Joshua's ability to display the personal qualities and professional standards required to develop into a competent ATS Assessor. To become a qualified ATS Assessor/Examiner, Joshua had to be able to: 1. Provide a satisfactory short introductory brief to ATC Trainees 2. State the aim of the simulation session and the standards expected 3. Monitor the Controller's performance

4. Observe adherence to standard procedures and phraseology 5. Taking adequate notes 6. Provide a debrief, identifying and correcting any errors 7. Evaluating the overall Controller simulation session

After the successful completion of the ATS Assessor/Examiner course in St. Maarten, Joshua then had to complete two ATS Assessor/Examiner check rides under the requirements of the Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) and in accordance with the OTARs. This was completed during his annual refresher training at Advance ATC in Valdosta GA back in May of this year. "We commend Joshua for his incredible hard work and congratulate him for all of his success in becoming a Licensed ATS Assessor/Examiner. We are proud to have such a dedicated and committed Air Traffic Controller Supervisor on our team and look forward to what he will achieve next," said CKIA Airport Manager Miguel Martin. Joshua now has the additional rating of ATS Assessor/Examiner for both CKIA and ORIA added to his ATC License along with his current rating as an OJT Instructor, making him one of only two controllers with these ratings in the Cayman Islands.

## road to renewables Part 3: The electricity grid


On the surface, electricity appears very straightforward; you flip a switch and turn on a light, blend a smoothie, watch television or any of the other things you use electricity to do at your home or business. But behind the scenes, there is constant activity on the part of the utility provider to balance and match generation supply to all our consumers in realtime to ensure you have power to do all those things. As you might imagine, the demand for this service continues to grow with the addition of new technologies, devices and equipment, which all require electricity.

To manage the grid, system operators closely monitor and control the flow of electricity to safeguard grid stability and power quality. If the demand for electricity and the maximum able to be supplied were to become unbalanced, it could lead to fluctuations in the frequency and voltage and cause outages.

Voltage fluctuations means there can be damage to electrical equipment, which can impact sensitive electronics and harm the grid infrastructure, which can ultimately lead to power outages.

To prevent these issues, grid system operators utilise advanced monitoring to continuously adjust electricity output via the multiple generating units at CUC's North Sound Road Power Plant and soon via the Battery Energy Storage Systems (BESS) at CUC's substations to match realtime changes in total consumer demand.

# The Use and Abuse of History

Famous historian E. H. Carr notes that history is a dialogue between the past and present and that how historians understand the past, is influenced by the social, cultural, and political issues that stirred their time. This is important to know as having shaped the present, the past does not just wither and die. Many of those who construct current policy are conscious of engaging the past, even though sometimes they do so in pursuit of their own selfish purposes.

What we teach our young about the past is as crucial an activity as what takes place in engineering, accounting, and medicine. The recording of history is expected to be based on the critical examination of sources, the careful and 'objective' sifting and synthesizing of information. It is expected to obey the standards of scrupulous attention to details and scientific exactitude in source documents utilized etcetera. However, historical data do not necessarily speak for themselves and so the historian describes, contextualizes, and explains. In piecing together human meanings and institutions, the historian interprets history, and in many instances, to serve specific objectives of various kinds. Thus, Churchill's famous quip, 'History will be kind to me, as I intend to write it.'

While there is some truth to the claim that winners write the history books, hitherto colonized peoples especially must take the writing of their own history as important as their desire to achieve sustained socioeconomic transformation. As our history is important for self-knowledge and self-empowerment, as the basis of a sense of identity, and for the creation and sustenance of our cultural frameworks, it must be taken seriously what we teach our young people as historical knowledge. This is especially urgent given

that what is written as historical knowledge is subject to abuse by those desirous of maintaining dominance in the social, cultural, and political spaces of society.

I will mention two examples of such abuse. The first is the literature about the factors that ended slavery in the British empire. The focus was on the role of the abolitionists, members of the British anti-slavery society such as William Wilberforce, Thomas Clarkson, and James Ramsay. It is not that these individuals did not play an important role, but their role was very much overstated. It is as if, as Eric Williams pointed out, the British started slavey in order to end it and celebrate doing so.

But the deeper and more profound causes of why it ended were ignored and when premier historian Eric Williams wrote the book, **Capitalism and Slavery** in 1938, a thesis on the economic history of British empire, he was shunned by publishers and accused of undermining the humanitarian motivations for the Britain's Slavery Abolition Act. The data gathered by Williams led him to recognize the shifting but deeper economic forces at play. David Barnette, writing recently in **The Guardi**-

**an**, explains that it was not until 1964 that the work found a publisher in the UK, but it had been out of print there for decades. Now, eighty-four years after, he continues, his work was rejected in the UK, and seventy-eight years after it was first published in America, where it became a highly influential anti-colonial text, a new edition of Williams's book, *Capitalism and Slavery*, was to be published in Britain.

The essence of William's work was that the abolition of slavery in the British empire was due to the changing nature of the capitalism. It was in the interest of British capitalists that it be brought to an end, and not because of a sudden burst of conscience. Sugar capitalists no longer saw advantage in the West Indian sugar monopoly and so turned against the slave trade and then, slavery. Williams was meticulous in detailing interconnections between the wealth of Britain, the slave trade, and the Industrial Revolution. The slave plantations, slave ships, the manufacturing of goods, the insurance companies, the banking system were all locked together.

The extensive wealth that slavery created provided the economic foundations of the industrial revolution. This revolution catapulted industrial capitalists to become the main players in the British economy and they preferred free trade, not the continuation of the preferential sugar duties that benefited the traditionally wealth classes. They desired an army of low wage factory workers and a global playing field. Williams also pointed out that the very institution of slavery started out of economic reasons, not racial bias, but that as the institution ballooned and flourished, racial theories and justifications were developed. In other words, racism did not cause slavery, but developed because of it. Slavery was essentially economic.

The abuse of history here was the deliberate attempt to sideline a considered perspective that would have added to and widened the discourse.

A more recent example of the abuse of history is Florida's new educational standards in relation to what is taught about slavery in America. It is now required of public schools that they teach that enslaved black Americans learned useful skills which they could apply in their personal lives, and thus, in this sense, they benefited from slavery.

This is not only the abuse of history, but also obscene and obviously racist. The brute fact that slavery wreaked havoc on the lives of millions of Africans casting a shadow on their descendants must not be undermined by a desire to abandon the truth to meet political and other objectives.



# Crooks pair on top again

Youth sports in Cayman Islands has for decades been excelling way above expectations for such a small island, and judging by the brilliance of its swimmers as well as athletes in other sports, world class performers will continue to bring glory and prestige.

Last week at the Commonwealth Youth Games in Trinidad, Cayman not only broke the threshold of never winning a medal but the squad came home with two gold medals, a silver and three bronzes.

This week there was more sporting excellence when the Ministry of Youth, Sports, Culture & Heritage congratulated Jordan Crooks for being selected as the 2023 @cayconnect #MakingWavesAwards Sports recipient.

Swimmer Crooks has been making huge waves and recently qualified for the 2024 Olympic Games by winning the 50-metre freestyle heat at the World Aquatics Championships in 21.90 seconds and 47.77 secs in the 100m to break a 14-year-old national record.

At the Commonwealth Youth Games on the first day James Allison won Cayman's

first ever medal at the tournament with silver in the 200m freestyle.

Jillian Crooks, Jordan's sister, also won medalled on the first day with

bronze in her 100m backstroke in a personal best time and national record of 1 minute 02.10 seconds. Crooks, also competed in the 50m fly, where she fin-

ished seventh in 27.67 seconds.

"Being able to step onto the pool deck with Cayman Islands on all my gear means a lot," Crooks said. Allison and Crooks were among 11 athletes representing Cayman at Trinbago 2023.

The rest of the team comprised of five other swimmers: Sierrah Broadbelt, who set a national 13-14 record in the 50m butterfly, Harper Barrowman, Teagan Nash, Connor Macdonald and Allysson Belfonte; sisters Anija and Briana Delapenha in beach volleyball; and Andrew Stone and Ty Goddard in track and field.

Stone took gold with his 7.70m long jump, an amazing leap for a teenager.

Finally, Cayman featured three swimmers in the long-course finals of the Commonwealth Youth Games. They were Harper Barrowman and Teagan Nash in the women's 800m freestyle and Sierrah Broadbelt in the women's 200m butterfly. Broadbelt completed her swim in 2:23.45. Harper and Teagan set personal bests in their events.

Harper won bronze in a time of 9 minutes 11.72 seconds, shaving eight seconds off her best time.

But it was beyond the Caribbean that the mumblings manifested into a loud rumble in one of the popular diaspora carnivals. City officials of Rotterdam in the Netherlands issued a firm and enforceable warning against vulgar conduct and borderline nudity in their annual Caribbean carnival.

That did not stop the carnival. It went ahead, well-attended as usual, just as loud and flamboyant - but just with less flesh on display and not as much 'dirty dancing' as before in public.

The Rotterdam Summer (Zomer in Dutch) Carnival at the end of July is the second largest in Europe after London's Notting Hill Carnival.

"This is a family event for everyone, including little children. And we want it to stay that way," Eva van der Vegt, director of Rotterdam Unlimited Zomercarnaval told Dutch media company NOS (as reported by NL Times).

However, she too had to navigate the blurred lines between those who use culture as a defence, and when is too much - or too little - really going too far.

"You see two people dancing and it goes on forever and you think "what's going on there?" It's not as if shaking your bum will land you in jail. We are just appealing to people's sense of decency," she said.

And whether subjective or community collective, it's that interpretation of what's acceptable or unacceptable which has become a discussion point as the Caribbean carnival season quite literally 'winds down' - until its reboots with year-end carnivals in some islands.

Many forums and social media posts across the region have been debating the issue of 'carnival conduct', especially costumes that leave little to the imagination often with the musical soundtrack and lyrics to match. Double entendre now seems a lost art or no longer considered necessary when almost everything is plain to see.

The choice of what to wear - or what not to wear - whether as a personal choice or part of troupe choreography, is being met with more than mere raised eyebrows or lowered eyelids.

The issue is awash with contradictions; from laws prohibiting skimpy clothing in city streets while at the same time turning a blind eye to near-nudity on the same streets during carnival. There are the claims that it is culture on display, to strongly held views that 'baring the flesh with barely anything left' is an expression of self-confidence.

Is too little costume too much? And is 'dancing' - especially 'twerking' which leaves little to the imagination - particularly in the presence (and in some instances, the involvement of children) going too far? What's next one might ask; barely fitting mankini outfits for men?

From Cayman's Batabano to every carnival across the Caribbean and in the global

diaspora, the questions are being asked: Has creativity lost ground to nudity and vulgarity? Is this a display of culture or a corruption of morals in the bacchanalian abandonment of carnival? Has the playfulness gone out of 'playing mas'?

# **Suggested Hurricane Supply List**

To prepare for the unknown, each home should have a 72-hour Disaster Survival Kit. You will need to pack some essential items to help you and your family survive, whether you stay at home or leave it during a disaster.

Ensure at least three days (72 hours) supply for each person. Do not forget pets where applicable! The following is a minimum suggested list of Survival Kit supplies:

#### **Drinking Water:**

• One gallon per person/per day in unbreakable containers, Avoid using containers that will decompose or break,l such as milk cartons or glass bottles. A normally active person needs to drink at least two quarts of

water each day. Hot environments and intense physical activity can double that amount. Children, nursing mothers, and ill people will need more.

• Don't forget to add additional water for mixing formula if you have children and for your pets. Rotate the drinking water each year.

· Food preparation and sanitation require another two quarts (minimum) per person daily.

• Purchased bottled water that has been sealed is best for storage. It meets FDA guidelines for food and is not as vulnerable to temperature changes as unsealed water

• Tip: Purchase water this year and use it for drinking next year. This allows for rotation on an annual basis and keeps the water fresh. Yes water can go bad!

#### Water for sanitation use:

• Store extra containers of water to be used for flushing toilets, cleaning, and bathing.

• Purchase water purification tablets (Halazone) to be used if you still have running water but are told to boil water before using it. This allows you to fill the bathtub and other containers without purchasing expensive drinking water.

• Tip: Keep plastic containers (milk jugs and other containers) and fill them with water when a storm threatens. You can put these items in the freezer to keep food cold longer in the event that the electricity goes out.

#### Non-perishable Food:

• Maintain at least 3-7 days of food for each member of the family.

• Small, preferably single serving cans (should not require cooking or refrigeration). Dried fruit, peanut butter and jelly, coffee, tea, soft drinks and pet foods.

• Ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables.

· Canned juices, milk, soup (if powdered, store extra water).

• Staples - sugar, salt, pepper in water proof containers.

• High energy foods like crackers, granola bars, trail mix.



· Raw vegetables that do not need refrigeration.

• Fresh bread.

• Comfort/stress foods - cookies, hard candy, sweetened cereals, lollipops, instant coffee, tea bags.

• Sterno for cooking.

- Vitamins
- Food for infants

• Paper cups, plates, and plastic utensils

• Non-electric can opener

- Aluminum foil
- Plastic storage containers

· Lots of ice (you can freeze your water supply)

· Pedialyte (to restore hydration if needed)

• Tip: Purchase only items that you like to eat and would eat even without a storm. Rotate these items by using them Dec-May each year and purchasing new items Jan-May. This allows you to reduce the cost of buying items for a hurricane kit at one time and keeps the items fresh. Yes even canned goods have a shelf life! **Baby Needs:** 

• Special foods (enough for several davs)

- Formula (enough for several days)
- Extra diapers
- Medicines (get a copy of prescription) Blankets
- Diaper Rash Ointment
- Baby Wipes
- Powder
- Bottles
- Pacifier
- Favorite toy/blanket
- Medicine dropper
- Diaper-rash ointment

#### Sanitation

• Toilet paper, towelettes, soap, baby wipes, liquid hand sanitzer

- Liquid detergent
- Feminine supplies
- Personal hygiene items (toothpaste, deodorant, shampoo etc.)
- Plastic garbage bags, ties (for personal sanitation uses)

# Government Supports First Phase of Children and Youth Services (CAYS) Foundation's New Vision

The Ministry of Investment, Innovation and Social Development (MIISD) has approved CI\$100,000 in additional funding to the CAYS Foundation, operators of the Bonaventure Boys' Home, Phoenix House and Frances Bodden Children's Homes, for much-needed upgrades to the organisation's IT network, additional housing facilities and staff resources.

MIISD Minister Hon. André Ebanks noted that the Ministry's focus is on implementing a comprehensive social development agenda that will enable all people in the Cayman Islands to reach their full potential. This funding will allow the CAYS Foundation to provide an improved experience for their residents. "We acknowledge the daily challenges the staff of our residential children's homes face as they support and nurture their residents. Removing administrative barriers such as failing technology and limited space will create greater efficiency as the CAYS Foundation fulfils their mission to offer strength-based development to the children and youth in their care", he stated.

The IT upgrades will allow the operators of the facilities to exist on a shared cloud-based network and address legacy issues, such as dated equipment and slow internet connectivity speeds. The funding will also enable personnel to comply fully with data protection regulations by allowing for secure, paperless management of resident and staff information. Finally, residents will be able to properly access online education and leisure resources without the frustrations of slow or inactive equipment.


The second project will see the conversion of the current workshop at the Bonaventure Boys' Home into a standalone two-bedroom residential home. The add-on facility will accommodate residents who may have challenges with group living, accommodate potential overflow and provide transitional housing to those who have recently become legal adults.

The CAYS Foundation Chairman, Garth Arch thanked the Ministry for their commitment to improving the experience of both residents and staff through this additional funding. "We would like to express sincere thanks to the Ministry, and the wider government for helping to resolve two key issues that impact both our residents and staff. Both projects will enhance the resident experience tremendously and will help us on our mission to empower our residents as they become upstanding members of society. We look forward to forming additional creative and innovative partnerships with private sector entities and community organisations who would like to make a real difference in the lives of the children and young adults in our care as we continue to work towards our renewed vision."

Ensuring the most vulnerable members of our society are able to access the support and resources they require to succeed is at the forefront of the Ministry's current priorities. In the coming months, the Ministry will be implementing the Financial Assistance Act, 2022, which will see the Needs Assessment Unit become the Department of Financial Assistance. This comprehensive transition includes the increase in financial assistance to older persons, seafarers, veterans, and those living with disabilities made last week. Further, the Ministry is also undertaking legislative reform on the Children Act (2012 Revision) and the Adoption of Children Act (2021 Revision) to enhance safeguarding provisions for children and ensure international best standards are applied and upheld in our country.
