New school rooted in nature and community

Island Primary is Cayman's newest school which opened this academic school year, catering to students from Reception to Year 6. Jenn Cowdroy, the school's Director, said the shortage of quality primary school spaces in Cayman was the motivation for opening the school.

"We wanted to help on that front," she

confirmed, "but also use the opportunity to build a school that was rooted in our culture and sense of community."

She said the school's stated purpose sums us up its ethos quite well: "To provide a dynamic learning community committed to actively engaging with, and contributing to, an ever-changing and diverse

local and global society."

Ms Cowdroy said from the design and layout to the staffing and materials, everything was thought out to ensure that they stayed true to this ethos.

"Building a school isn't like building a corporate office or a house, as a great deal of planning goes into not only how our staff and specialists use the spaces, but also our students and their families use the spaces," she advised. "Ensuring we

had plenty of room, with all natural grass fields and an abundance of trees that will soon provide a beautiful canopy, was key to the design, but at the same time ensuring we stayed connected with each other. This was the basis for designing the school around a central courtyard that is essentially the 'heart' of our school."

"Our school is built around nature and community, providing the perfect platform to spring from," she advised.

Ms Cowdroy's background is in finance and operations, which, she said, surprised people when they learn she is not a teacher.

"However, throughout my 30 years in Cayman holding positions in multi-national firms as a financial controller and operations director, one of the key lessons I learned was that a successful business requires a team of people who individually are strong, but together create a synergy that encapsulates the concept of the whole being greater than the sum of its parts," she said. "I know my own strengths, and limitations, and I was fortunate to build a team of specialists in education, and through the last year it's been a fantastic learning experience for us all as we gained insight into the myriad of requirements, issues and ideas that come with undertaking this project."

Ms Cowdroy said that they had received a fantastic response from parents already.

"I dare say some are shocked we made it happen in time," she said. "It was by all accounts a pretty aggressive timeline, and I think, many just couldn't believe we'd be open in time. We have spaces available in our Reception and Years 1-3 classes, with our Years 4, 5 and 6 classes full for the year, although more spaces will open next year for those year groups."

The school currently has two classes per year group and they are currently in discussions with another school which has started the planning process to move in next to them and which will provide their students with a high school.

"I'm not yet at liberty to announce the school, but we hope to within weeks," she stated.

Ms Cowdroy admitted it had been "an incredible two years."

"Along the way, there has been a fair share of highs and lows, but with every day, it provided an opportunity to find solutions to every hiccup, and welcome moments to celebrate every milestone, and we are so happy to have shifted from building to teaching," she confirmed.

CAYMAN REAFFIRMS ITS COMMITMENT TO CARIBBEAN TOURISM GROWTH

Cayman will continue to play an essential role at the forefront of regional tourism to the mutual benefit of the jurisdiction and the rest of the Caribbean.

That commitment has come from Hon. Minister of Tourism Kenneth Bryan, who is the current chairman of the regional tourism organisation, the Caribbean Tourism Organisation (CTO).

It is supported by the Director of Tourism Rosa Harris who presently chairs the board of the CTO and is welcomed by the new Secretary-General and Chief Executive Officer(CEO) of the CTO, Dona Regis-Prosper of St Lucia.

The new CEO/Secretary-General was invited to Cayman to be introduced to the region and the world during a globally live-streamed press conference hosted by Mr Bryan.

In response to a question posed by Caymanian Times publisher Ralph Lewis on how Cayman benefits from and supports the CTO, Cayman's Tourism Minister and CTO chairman Bryan framed his response this way: "No man is an island and it's obvious that collectively we learn together from information-sharing and best practices. We don't compete against each other, we work together and we believe there is enough market share for us not to

compete. Because we are the most attractive tourism region globally there's room for growth, so whenever one member grows all of us grow together," he affirmed.

Mr Bryan, who has been flying the marketing flag for Cayman and regional tourism since he took over the CTO chairmanship exactly a year ago this week added: "With respect to the Cayman Islands, what benefits do we get? One obviously, is the collective package of marketing that is normal and all the other best practices, even though I think that we're doing quite well on the top end of being ahead of the game due to the many experiences and talent we have here in the Cayman Islands."

He also cited the example of looking into electric buses for Cayman by tapping into the experiences of Barbados, another CTO member country.

"For example, recently we were thinking about going into electric buses, and that led to the transportation of tourism, and I went to Barbados to speak with their transport ministry, and we learned a lot about that and now we're taking some of that information and set up processes under consideration here in the Cayman Islands. It's just a small example."

Addressing his dual roles as Cayman's Tourism Minister and chairing CTO, the region's umbrella tourism body, Mr Bry-

an stated that the benefits were mutual.

"In respect to the chairmanship, it gives an opportunity to show the Cayman Islands as a leader within the region as we have always done in respect to other industries like financial services, recovery assistance - during COVID we gave away hundreds of thousands of dollars in vaccines to other Caribbean islands. That leadership is something we're known for. We embrace it because Cayman is all about 'Caymankind' showing that we are ready to be there for our brothers and sisters. And that's one of the main reasons when asked to take up the chairmanship I was happy to do so even recognising it would take that away from the Cayman focus, but to balance both of the interests of Cayman as well as the region, I knew that it came out as we'll get the benefit."

Mr Bryan also spearheaded a new air link between Cayman and Barbados for the national carrier, Cayman Airways as part of several recent route expansions for the airline.

Director of Tourism Risa Harris, who also currently holds a role in the CTO as chair of the Board of Governors, concurs and draws on her own professional experiences of nine years executing Cayman's tourism strategies.

"When I don't know where to look for information, I pick up the phone or I send an email to CTO and I ask 'Is there another country that's doing this and do they mind sharing information?' I can't tell you how many times over the last nine years that I've had to do that."

She said specific instances included collaborating on matters including marketing, legislation, research, insurance, airlift, training, and sharing experiences on issues such as the use of technology in processing immigration (e-immigration).

New CTO Secretary-General and CEO, Dona Regis-Prosper who brings a vast wealth of tourism-related experience to the role underlines the benefits of regional cooperation in tourism.

"We share one Caribbean Sea and because of that factor, there's so much that unites when you compare it to what divides us. We could achieve so much when we work together and collaborate together."

Mrs Regis-Prosper, who hails from St. Lucia, has lived and worked in multiple Caribbean destinations. Her previous roles included CEO of Tortola Pier Park in the British Virgin Islands, Director of Business Development for Margaritaville Caribbean Group in Jamaica, Director of Marketing and Product Development of the St. Lucia Air and Seaports Authority, and General Manager of Antigua Cruise Port.

Following growing concern in the community about an increase in the spread of COVID-19 in the Cayman Islands, Chief Medical Officer, Dr. Nick Gent, would like to advise the general public of the following:

- Respiratory illnesses overall have increased;
- Not all respiratory illnesses are caused by COVID-19;
- This overall increase is not only normal but expected during this time of the year, especially in light of the upcoming flu season;

- There has been a small increase in hospital admissions testing positive for COVID-19 in August;
- · Current hospitalisations due to respiratory illnesses are in line with previous years;
- The Ministry of Health & Wellness is maintaining vigilance on current and emerging trends and will issue a public advisory if/ when necessary.

All persons who are suffering from a respiratory infection, whether caused by COVID-19, influenza or the common cold, are advised to:

• Remain at home if symptomatic (febrile (having or showing symptoms of fever), coughing,

running nose, muscle aches, chills)

• Return to work after being symptom free for a minimum of 24 hours (if febrile. 24 hours from when the fever breaks)



Blue Belt workshop planned to strengthen marine conservation



An upcoming workshop will explore opportunities for expanding deep-sea marine conservation efforts in the Cayman Islands with support from the United Kingdom (UK) Government's flagship Blue Belt programme.

Facilitated by visiting representatives from the Foreign, Commonwealth & De-

velopment Office, the Centre for Environment, Fisheries and Aquaculture Science, the Marine Management Organisation, and the Joint Nature Conservation Committee, the workshop will form part of a week-long series of events where local agencies will develop future plans for safeguarding Cayman's Exclusive Eco-

nomic Zone (EEZ) waters from the impacts of pollution, illegal fishing, and climate change.

The Blue Belt programme aims to assist UK Overseas Territories in protecting and enhancing ocean health to halt biodiversity loss, enable sustainable growth, ensure climate change resilience, and to

connect people with the natural environment.

Premier and Minister of Sustainability & Climate Resiliency Hon. Wayne Panton said the Blue Belt programme offers unique opportunities for the Cayman Islands to strengthen protections for marine biodiversity and manage human impacts on deep-sea marine areas.

"Here in the Cayman Islands, we have recognised the unique value of our marine ecosystems for a long time and have taken significant steps to safeguard our coastal waters through an enhanced marine protected area network with zones covering an impressive 55% of our nearshore waters. But, further out at sea, we know our pelagic species and environments are at risk from human impacts like illegal fishing and pollution that our islands do not currently have the capacity or infrastructure to monitor and enforce. The Blue Belt programme offers the chance for us to tap into a broader network of support for assisting with compliance and enforcement, strengthening governance and management frameworks, and building local capacity in these areas," he said.

Attendees at the workshops will include representatives from the Cayman Islands Coast Guard, Customs & Border Control, the Maritime Authority of the Cayman Islands, the Port Authority of the Cayman Islands and representatives of local offshore fishing vessels or 'snapper boats' which fish far offshore from the Cayman Islands.

DEH Secures Conviction in Court for Littering

The Department of Environmental Health (DEH) secured its first conviction in court for an offence under the Cayman Islands Litter Law (1997 Revision).

A West Bay resident was charged on Tuesday, August 22, 2023 at the Summary Court for an offence under the Cayman Islands Litter Law Section (1997 Revision) 3 (1) which states "Whoever throws down, drops or otherwise deposits and leaves any litter in, into or from a public place in such circumstances as to cause, contribute to or tend to lead to its defacement by such litter is guilty of an offence and liable on conviction to a fine of five hundred dollars or to imprisonment for six months." He was found guilty and a fine of \$200 was imposed on him since it was his first such offence.

The incident took place at Block and Parcel 4D 308 located next to the Ed Bush Stadium on Garson Smith Drive in West Bay on December 12, 2022, when the individual was observed and caught on video dumping a sofa on Crown Land. An investigation was launched by the DEH and the matter was brought before the Office of the Director of Public Prosecution as a recommendation for prosecution.

The Judge stated that he does not recall ever trying a litter case in the Court in Grand Cayman and he was pleased. He reiterated the importance of this conviction as littering is a major problem and it is sad to see people littering this beautiful country.

DEH Director, Mr. Richard Simms expressed his satisfaction on the outcome of the matter. "This decision represents the first court prosecution since our enforcement to crack down on litter and illegal dumping. Our Environmental Health Officers and Assistants have been working hard to tackle environmental health breaches/crimes in our communities", he said.

In recent months, the entire team of Environmental Health Officers and Assistants successfully completed a very comprehensive training on Case File Preparation in partnership with the Office of the Director of Public Prosecution. They were trained by Senior Crime Case Manager, Dennis Walkington in evidence collection and handling, statement taking, preparing summary of facts and forms and court procedures to enhance their performance as enforcement officers.

Additionally, the DEH has partnered with the Ministry of Tourism & Ports and the Beautification Task Force (BTF) in the current Anti-Littering Campaign launched on August 1, 2023.

Members of the public are encouraged to do their part in keeping the Cayman Islands clean and report any instances of littering and illegal dumping to the DEH at 949-6696, or via email to dehcustomer-

service@gov.ky or click on https://ow.ly/ LTgE50Pz9xn. Under the Litter Law, con-

victions can result in \$500 fines, and/or six months imprisonment.







CCMI NOW ACCEPTING SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS FOR THE CARIBBEAN MARINE ECOLOGY CAMP IN LITTLE CAYMAN

Darwin Plus is funding 14 scholarships for local students to attend October half-term Caribbean Marine Ecology Camp



Funded by the UK government through Darwin Plus, 14 Caymanian students will be selected to participate in the Central Caribbean Marine Institute's (CCMI's) week-long Caribbean Marine Ecology Camp (CMEC) during the October half-term. During the CMEC, students focus on tropical marine ecology and conservation. Learning from CCMI scientists & educators, no two days are the same as campers dive, snorkel, and explore a pristine reef system. Students will stay at the Little Cayman Research Centre, a remote field station, and learn firsthand about CCMI's cutting-edge research. 

Mahomes seeks Paradise

Patrick Mahomes is the most accomplished quarterback in the NFL, his stats of the past few seasons fully support that. In the post-Tom Brady era, Mahomes has assumed the mantle seam-

But the Kansas City Chiefs QB has relied heavily on teammate

Chris Jones for all his early career success, and at the start of the week it was evident Jones would be missing for Thursday night's season opener against the Detroit Lions. The defensive tackle has not been in practice and was a major doubt for the Lions game.

Mahomes has relied on Jones throughout their time in Missouri. He said on Sunday that regardless he would lead his team out intent on victory in the showpiece game of Week 1.

Mahomes won his second Super Bowl ring in three visits to the NFL's showpiece game over the last four years in February, having notably spent his rookie year learning behind Alex Smith in 2017. He is a two-time Super Bowl MVP and a two-time league MVP, last year becoming the first player since Kurt Warner in 1999 to collect both accolades in a single season. And he is still only 27. He emerged out of the shadow of Brady or Aaron Rodgers before they'd even moved on.

American football's pre-eminent quarterback is on a crusade to take his team to Paradise and become the first franchise in nearly two decades to lift the Vince Lombardi Trophy in successive seasons.

Mahomes went close to doing just that after winning his first Super Bowl in 2020, leading Kansas to a 31-20 victory against San Francisco 49ers.

The Chiefs returned to the Greatest Show on Turf 12 months later but failed to emulate the 2004 and 2005 New England Patriots into gridiron immortality.

Their opponents were also seeking a fairy-tale finish and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, playing in their Raymond James Stadium and with Brady chasing his seventh Super Bowl ring in his first year away from the New England Patriots, ran out easy 31-9 victors.

That defeat stung but Mahomes and the Chiefs regrouped and clawed their way back to the Big Show in February, beating the Philadelphia Eagles in a 38-35 barnstormer.

Kansas are masters at retaining key players while upgrading veterans and Mahomes still has trusted touchdown target Travis Kelce to aim for while young wide receiver Skyy Moore is another productive outlet with coach Andy Reid calling the

Bones: I'm worried about vet Miocic

Ion 'Bones' Iones makes his second heavyweight fight soon in what looks like an undemanding night's work. Yet he insists he is not looking past Stipe Miocic.

Jones defends his UFC heavyweight title against Miocic in the main event of UFC 295 at Madison Square Garden, New York, on Nov. 11. At 41 and coming off a 32-month layoff, analysts aren't giving Miocic much of a chance, but Jones disagrees, saying that he's still fixated on the fight and the dangers Miocic poses as UFC 295 draws closer.

"I feel like when you get to a place when you don't feel anything is probably when it's time to hang it up and try something different," Jones said. "At this point, I still get really nervous, man. I have nightmares

about my opponents. But the goal is to just conquer that."

Though he is widely recognised as the most accomplished heavyweight in UFC history, Miocic has not fought since his knockout loss to Francis Ngannou in their rematch at UFC 260. But despite that, and the crop of surging contenders in the heavyweight division, Jones insists that fighting Miocic is viable.

"Stipe has balls. He has courage," unbeaten Jones, 36, said. "He's not the youngest fighter, but that is a man. That is a man. I'm not the youngest either. I understand where Stipe is at, just being looked past by a lot of people, and I respect him even more for training his ass off. I know that in his camp, he expects to win, so I respect him."

Kraigg is back in English county

West Indies captain Kraigg Brathwaite has signed for Warwickshire for their four-game County Championship run-in.

The 30-year-old Barbados batter was in the Bears team for their meeting with Division One leaders Surrey at the Oval, which started on Sunday.

Brathwaite opened the batting, with regular openers Rob Yates (unwell) and Alex Davies (sore back) both missing. He is no relation to fellow Barbadian Carlos Brathwaite, who played in the Blast for the Bears in 2021 and 2022.

"It's been quite a busy few days," said Brathwaite, who is playing for his fifth county side after previous stints at Yorkshire (two games in 2017), Nottinghamshire (four games in 2018), Glamorgan (three games in 2019) and Gloucestershire (six games in 2021).

"But when I was asked if I'd be willing to join up with the Bears it was an easy decision. I feel in good form and having played in England previously, I'm ready to test myself in those conditions."

He faced West Indies team-mate Kemar Roach, who has returned to Surrev for their final three matches. Brathwaite


