# Liquor Licence holders receive New Year's Extension



Liquor licence holders will be granted an extension beyond regular closing times on New Year's Eve.

At a recent meeting, the Liquor Licensing Board decided that bars, restaurants, nightclubs and hotels will be permitted to sell liquor and play music until 4:00 a.m. on the morning of Monday, 1 January

Licensees are advised that the last serving of alcohol must be done at  $3:50\ a.m.$ , ten minutes prior to the closing time - in

accordance with Section 11 (8) of the Liquor Licensing Act (2019 Revision). The playing of music must cease promptly at 4:00 a.m.

All other licensing stipulations will remain in effect. The board also noted that there are no extensions in effect for Christmas Eve on Sunday, 24 December.



# Avoid being charged for Illegal Dumping



The Department of Environmental Health (DEH) is reminding residents that this year's bulk waste collection already took place earlier in May, replacing the traditional November schedule. Persons wishing to dispose of any bulk waste are required to make alternative arrangements to transport these materials to the George Town landfill or the landfills operating in the Sister Islands.

"Any bulk waste placed in the curbside and/or empty lot will be considered illegal dumping/littering and should be reported. The shifting of the annual collection of bulk waste from November to May, ahead of the Hurricane Season, was largely advertised and successfully completed in an effort to reduce the amount of debris that could be generated by any form of severe weather", explained DEH Director Richard Simms.

Any illegal dumping and littering should be reported to the DEH or the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS). This unlawful practice can result in a penalty of 6 months of imprisonment and a minimum fine of \$500.

The department's team of Environmental Health Officers has strengthened its community monitoring programme. On a once-weekly basis, this activity is carried out to identify and promptly address obvious environmental health issues, including littering and illegal dumping.

The George Town Landfill operates from 7:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on weekdays, until 1:00 p.m. on Saturdays and is closed on Sundays. The landfill drop-off facility at the gate will remain accessible to the public and small vehicles 24 hours per day.



# CBC Online Payments for Single Declaration Imports Launching Soon

For the past few years, the Cayman Islands Customs & Border Control Service (CBC) has embarked on streamlining its processes using technology to better serve its stakeholders while maximizing customer experience.

The CBC Online System known as COLS, will undergo the necessary testing stages, and beginning Monday, 6 November 2023, the facility to allow importers and traders to pay online for single declarations with a maximum payment of two thousand five hundred dollars (CI \$2,500) will be launched.

Deputy Director of Imports Kevin Walton said "We are currently in the final testing stages of this new product and are confident that this offering is aligned with CBC's strategic objective of streamlining and improving our business processes. The ability to pay duty online will offer our customers greater efficiency and more convenience in using our services." Head of Finance Mrs. Camile Beckford-Johnson said, "While the maximum dollar amount for a single payment is limited to \$2,500, the department continues to offer other payment methods for larger traders that are registered with us and have signed up for our bond facility. We will continue to facilitate trade and improve our offerings to the public; however, we are mindful of the significant bank charges associated with online payments as CBC is poised to collect over \$300 million dollars in revenue this fiscal year".

On 6 November, for some importers, the access to pay online will appear on your COLS account and a button called Make a Payment will appear on the View Declarations and View Historical Declarations screen. When this option becomes available, you can select a declaration that is in Awaiting Payment status and make a payment for that specific declaration. A payment receipt will be emailed to the email address provided when registered to have a COLS account. A release notice will then be available for viewing and printing. It is important to know that the release notice does not exempt the goods selected for a random inspection.

Single declarations online payment is the first phase of this facility and will advance to multiple

declarations payment in the next phase of CBC's technology advancements. As we transition to our new banking service, the limit will also be revisited to better serve our stakeholders.





This year, UCCI was proud to host four globally acclaimed keynote speakers who brought a wealth of knowledge and global expertise to the event:

- Dr. Martha Williams, born on Cayman Brac, is a celebrated Ph.D. Polymer Scientist and Inventor. She retired from NASA atier 29 years, having served as the Lead Polymer Scientist at the NASA Kennedy Space Center in Florida until 2018. Dr. Williams shared captivating insights from her journey in space science with over 300 people atended this opening speech.
- Vanessa Slowey, an accomplished Chief Executive Officer with a vast experience spanning 27 countries and handling revenues of \$2.1B, shared her journey

in spearheading digital transformation across the globe. She shed light on her leadership roles in both the corporate and non-profit sectors, providing a unique blend of insights.


- Aditi Joshi, an AI extraordinaire at Google, with affiliations to esteemed institutions like Yale Law, Harvard, Stanford GSB, and Yale, delved into the potential and challenges of artificial intelligence in today's rapidly evolving landscape.
- Dr. Erica Gordon, UCCI Professor Dr. Gordon's plenary focused on puting the A in STEM

The conference also hosted over 30 hands-on breakout sessions with thousands of participants in subjects such as radiology, mangroves, solar car-building, climate change, sustainability, AI, virtual surgery, lionfish dissection, astronomy and more.

In line with UCCI's commitment to sustainability and a greener future, the University has also this month unveiled its

Funded by a generous grant of €1,024,899.75 EUR from RESEMBID, a programme designed to support Caribbean countries in their efforts towards sustainable development and resilience, the newly launched 'Sustainable UCCI' is set to revolutionize how UCCI uses and teaches about clean energy, waste management, water conservation and other sustainable practices, making the institution a real-life learning environment.

UCCI President and CEO, Dr. Robert W. Robertson, emphasized the institution's unwavering commitment to STEM. He stated, "UCCI is deeply commited to pioneering STEM-related education and training across the Cayman Islands and the wider Caribbean. Our innovative approaches, including offering short, stackable, industry-certified courses across the country, respond to the rising demand for STEM skills, as

highlighted by the recent Cayman Islands' Labour Market Assessment (LMA). The LMA highlighted the need for skills development in key areas such as STEM and construction related trades. To address the identified skills gaps UCCI has recently been named a National Center for Construction Education and Research


and has partnered with CompTIA. These relationships allow UCCI to offer industry recognized certifications valued by employers globally.

"STEM Carib 2023 was a resounding success atracting hundreds of business-people, thousands of students, and global spokespeople eager and willing to impart their knowledge to our country. Caymanians in sustainable trades. UCCI is an accredited center for the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) in the Cayman Islands, providing training modules and curriculum that address green building practices and sustainability in the construction industry. This aligns with the broader movement in the construction sector to adopt eco-friendly practices and ensures that new professionals entering the industry are equipped with knowledge about sustainable building.

By fostering collaborations, educating the community on STEM, securing significant grants, and constantly updating its curriculum to reflect global best practices, UCCI is ensuring that the Cayman Islands—and by extension, the Caribbean—becomes synonymous with STEM excellence.

In keeping with UCCI's aim to create a thriving workforce within the STEM sector, STEM Carib 2023 culminated in a panel discussion highlighting skills-based training and the future of work, with no-

table global spokespeople including Mr. Leonard Wadewitz from CompTIA, Dr. Brendan Lee from St. Mathew's University, and Mr. Kevin Baxter from the Turks and Caicos Islands Community College.

STEM Carib 2023 also saw sponsorship from many of the Cayman Islands' premier STEM companies including The Ministry of Education, Caribbean Utilities Company (CUC), Health City, Enterprise Cayman, Water Authority Cayman, Cayman Airways, and RESEMBID.

# Baby shark dies in shallow waters



The Department of Environment reports that a young Caribbean reef shark was found dead earlier this month next to the Lobster Pot boat ramp in George Town. DoE shark scientist Dr Johanna Kohler conducted a post-mortality exam to try and confirm the cause of death and her findings revealed the shark was a male, 78cm / 2 ½ feet in length, and that its nearly closed belly button indicated



it was approximately 3 months old. Dr Kohler identified a hole and cut in the pectoral fin, which suggested the shark was hooked and then released.



Even though the shark had been released after having been caught, the scientist believed it most likely died from the immense stress of being unintentionally caught and then released, coupled with the possible lack of oxygen and internal injuries.

"The ordeal might have been just too much for the shark to handle, causing it to die either during release or shortly after," the DOE said.

They went on to remind anglers to be extra careful in the shallow waters around Cayman's shores, where baby sharks born over the summer will shelter from predators and find small crustaceans, worms and fish to eat. Using non-stainless steel circle hooks helps ensure the safety of sharks who maybe accidentally hooked, they advised.

If you encounter a shark, stop fishing immediately. If you accidentally hook a shark, remove the hook and release it immediately to improve its chance of survival

# Miss Universe joins anti-bullying cause

A family fun day took place last weekend at Public Beach, organised by the United Against Bullying Foundation in partnership with the Miss Universe Organisation, and Cayman's Miss Universe Ilean Powery was in attendance to lend her support to this important campaign.

Ms Powery explained why she was compelled to support the cause:

"Bullying is an issue that not only affects one person or one demographic, but it can affect anyone because it does not discriminate," she said. "I think it's so important for people to stand up against bullying because there are numerous negative long-term effects, such as the development of mental disorders such as PTSD, anxiety and depression and more severely, it could result in people taking their own lives."

Ms Powery felt it was vital that people used their voices to protect those who might be experiencing bullying and speak out if they are the one being bullied, because the cycle would only continue if people did not.

Janet Young, founder of United Against Bullying, furthered that bullying happened everywhere in schools and the workplace and the most prevalent form of bullying was cyber bullying.

"Anyone can experience bullying; noone is immune," she confirmed. "But victims should not allow their experiences with bullying to define who they are."

At the event, Miss Cayman Islands Universe National Director, Derri Lee, pleaded with people not to jump on the bandwagon of glorifying bullies and elevating social media platforms that promote bullying.

"Just because some people who are educated, are considered elite or officials, are supporting it for the likes does not mean it should be standardised in our small community. What it does is break down the element of humanity in a society. Children and adults are facing some serious mental health issues because of bullying and defamation in our community. Remember negativity is the root cause of mental health issues," she warned.

Miss Lee said people ought to be careful as to what they fed their mind daily.

"You should wake up in the morning thanking God for a new day with a grateful heart and ready to be a force for good," she said. "Let's join forces to work on spreading positivity and eradicating bullying."

Shihan Floyd Baptist from Purple dragon dojo also spoke about how finding an outlet such as karate or any sport could help children overcome the effects of bullying.

Ms Powery said, as Miss Universe Cayman Islands, some of the greatest ways that she could use her position to ensure that she stood up against bullying was by using things such as her social media platforms to voice her knowledge, understanding and experiences of bullying, as well as connect with and provide hope to those who felt voiceless and helpless in this area.

"Also, whenever I have school visits and radio interviews, I can ensure that the message is spread and it continues to be an ongoing conversation throughout the Cayman Islands," she added.

Ms Powery said she had had minor experiences with bullying.

"However, with these situations, I've





learned at a young age to use my voice to defend and protect myself," she confirmed. "I did this by ensuring that I told a trusted person near me, whether it was a teacher,

counsellor or my parents, about the issue that I was experiencing as soon as I could."

Ms Powery said she encouraged any young person, or anyone for that matter

who was experiencing bullying, to find and speak to someone they trusted about what they were experiencing so that they could receive the help that they deserve.





# RCIPS TACKLING SPURT IN SERIOUS CRIMES

A spurt of serious criminal activity is occupying the attention of the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service(RCIPS).

In one recent incident, firearms officers and emergency medical personnel were dispatched to a report of an attempted murder at an address on Gorse Lane in the Birch Tree Hill area of West Bay. It was reported that a man had been shot multiple times while outside the residence. The victim was hospitalised with serious injuries but was subsequently said to be in stable condition. In their investigation of the shooting, RCIPS officers found a number of spent shell casings in the vicinity of the shooting.

They have concluded that it was a targeted attack and appears to be gang-related

Commissioner of Police Kurt Walton assured that "as always, our main priority remains ensuring public safety. He also said the RCIPS was taking the immediate step of increasing proactive patrols, particularly in targeted areas. "Members of the public can expect to see an increased presence of armed officers and may experience some inconvenience due to vehicle control points and stop checks. We urge the public to cooperate with our officers as best they can, to assist us in bringing the culprits to justice, and proactively preventing any potential retaliation."

"Although this attack was targeted, we understand that members of the public may be concerned by this and other firearm-related incidents which have taken place over the weekend," Commissioner Walton adds. "We urge everyone to continue to exercise personal safety, but by the same token, we remind everyone not to attempt to take matters into their own hands, but allow the police to do our job. The best way to do this is to provide information which can assist with our investigations, no matter how minor it may seem. Don't help the culprits evade

justice by keeping information to yourself"

Meanwhile, the RCIPS is busy with investigations into other armed robbery attempts. They include an attempted armed robbery at a restaurant on North Sound Road just north of Shedden Road by three masked men. They fled the location. No shots were fired, no one was injured, and nothing was stolen during the incident.

Police are on the lookout for the suspects in that incident. The one brandishing the gun is described as being about 5'6" tall, and of dark complexion. He was wearing all black, including a black hoodie and shoes, and carrying a black handgun. The second suspect is described as about 5'9" tall, and was wearing a black hoodie, a white mask and white slippers. The third suspect was wearing a black hoodie, dark-coloured jeans, sneakers, and was carrying a green bag. All three suspects are described as being of slim build.

In another incident, officers responded to a report of a possible attempted robbery outside a business on Shedden Road, just east of Mary Street. A security officer had just exited an armoured truck at the location when two men dressed in dark clothing and hoodies approached. One of the men was carrying a black handgun. The security officer immediately approached a nearby police vehicle. Upon

seeing the police vehicle, the two men fled the location. No shots were fired, no one was injured, and nothing was taken during the incident. One of the men is described as being about 5'11" tall, and of slim build, the second man is about 6'2" tall and of medium build.

Shortly before 8:00PM the same night, officers responded to a report of an attempted robbery at a business on Bodden Town Road, east of Cumber Avenue. It was reported that a man entered the location, brandishing a handgun, and demanded cash. The man was challenged by the owner of the establishment, who brandished a machete. The assailant fled the location. No shots were fired, no one was injured, and nothing was taken during the incident. That suspect was dressed in all black, with a black hoodie and a black mask, and was carrying a black handgun.

The RCIPS says all three matters are under investigation and anyone with information is asked to contact the Criminal Investigations Department at 949-4222. # SPEEDING PERSISTS DESPITE RECORD TICKETING


Despite a record increase in speeding tickets issued to drivers, speeding - and the resulting accidents - continues to plague the Cayman Islands, especially on Grand Cayman.

With just two months left in the year, the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS) have issued more tickets so far this year than all of last year. To date, drivers exceeding the speed limits have been slapped with over 4,000 speeding tickets, an increase of just over 30% - or more than a third - compared to the 2022 total which was 3,063.

At recent RCIPS community meetings, speeding has been one of the key topics raised by members of the public. Commissioner of Police, Kurt Walton and his officers, received calls from attendees for greater police presence and increased ticketing in order to reduce speeding.

"The complaint of speeding is nation-wide", said CoP Walton. "As I have said before, we cannot ticket our way out of this problem". On explaining the significant increase in speeding tickets issued this year, along with increased road policing presence CoP Walton noted that the numbers speak for themselves. Officers are delivering on community demands, however, people still speed, he noted.

"As a community, we must take responsibility to change our behaviour



when we get behind the wheel. If every driver applied the following basic rules and advice, the result would be less collisions and less fatalities on our roads".

According to Commissioner Walton, "We know ticketing isn't going to solve the problem. Education resulting

in changing driving behaviour is a lot harder to achieve. It's not a quick fix, but it is a key to success."

This forms part of the vital work the RCIPS is contributing to alongside our Cayman Islands Government colleagues, as part of the National Road Safety Strategy (NRSS)", says CoP Walton.

The RCIPS reports that it is working with partners, including the NRA, 911, Fire, and DVDL to develop and deliver NRSS outputs which aim to ultimately reduce road fatalities, but also improve the roading network, improve traffic legislation, enhance enforcement, and improve the overall driving experience in the Cayman Islands over the coming years.

The RCIP is urging drivers to adhere to the speed limit. "In the short term, there is something we can all do to improve the driving experience for all road users. That is to slow down. Until we do, we will continue to see collisions and in the worst cases, serious injuries and fatalities on our roads."

Remember:

- \* Slow down, drive to the speed limits and the road conditions.
- \* Don't overtake when it's not safe to do so, or illegal to do so.
- \* Follow roundabout rules and indicate your turns
- \* Don't allow yourself to be distracted while driving, put your phone down.
- \* Be patient when driving. Think of other road users and your passengers every time you get behind the wheel. The roads are to be shared, and road rules are to be respected.


