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# PACT REPACKAGED?

At the end of a day bristling with political drama Premier Wayne Panton's PACT (People-driven, Accountable, Competent and Transparent) coalition just managed to hold on to office on Tuesday night at the

end of a bruising no-confidence motion.

But less than twenty-four hours later in the post-mortem of the motion, it was becoming apparent that high-level talks were underway to shore up the faltering administration.

Premier Wayne Panton was said to be

battling to save his shaky coalition government after this close call. Sources close to the talks have indicated to Caymanian Times that intense efforts to keep PACT intact were continuing with one proposition

### **Update on Dengue in the Cayman Islands**



The Ministry of Health & Wellness and the Public Health Department are providing the following updates relating to Dengue and its transmission in the Cayman Islands:

- As of Tuesday, 7 November, there have been 18 laboratory confirmed cases of Dengue in the Cayman Islands;
- Since the beginning of 2023, 97 investigations have been conducted to date by the Public Health team (including the 18 confirmed cases);
- Of the 18 cases, 9 are considered imported cases with recent travel history where Dengue transmission is known, whereas the remaining 9 cases had no travel history and are considered locally acquired cases.

"The current outbreak of Dengue within our region continues to be the primary point

of caution for us here in the Cayman Islands," explains Dr. Nick Gent, Chief Medical Officer. "As we enter the holiday season, and as people get ready to travel, we continue to remind our residents to take all the necessary precautions, which includes familiarising themselves with the Dengue situation at their destination."

The Jamaican Ministry of Health & Wellness confirmed on Thursday, 2 November, that the country has on record "2,763 suspected, presumed and confirmed cases of Dengue" as of 1 November, with 694 confirmed cases as of that time. "Travellers heading to Jamaica should continue to monitor the situation in the country,

adhere to all prevention methods, and ensure that they are seeking medical treatment if they become symptomatic during or after their visit," Dr. Samuel Williams-Rodriguez, Medical Officer of Health emphasises.

#### **Travel Advice**

- 1-Research your destination and learn the risk for Dengue and other mosquito-borne illnesses such as chikungunya, malaria, and
- 2-Review the country specific travel recommendations, health notices and warnings, including any identified 'hot spots'.
- 3-Add mosquito repellent to your packing list. Repellents that contain DEET are recommended.
- 4-Include items of clothing with long sleeves and long pants for additional protection
- 5-Sleep indoors in places with air conditioning and window screens. If this is not possible, use a bed net.

6-Seek medical attention if you develop symptoms of dengue.

#### Local /Community Prevention Advice

- Use mosquito repellent, especially during peak times of mosquito traffic (dusk and dawn)
- Use light long sleeve shirts and long pants to prevent bites
- Take steps to keep mosquitoes out of your home via the use of air conditioning, window and door screens
- Once a week, empty and scrub, turn over, cover, or throw out items that hold water,

such as tires, buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpots, or trash containers. Check inside and outside your home. Mosquitoes lay eggs near water.

#### Sidebar: More about Dengue Fever

Most people recover without any complications, using pain relievers and bed rest. Once a patient has developed a fever, the infectious period lasts for one week only.

Dengue symptoms include:

- high fever;
- severe headache;
- backache;
- joint and eye pain;
- nausea and vomiting
- Muscle and or bone pain
- A rash (sometimes) may be visible two to five days after the onset of fever.
- Nausea or vomiting (sometimes)
- Signs of bleeding (such as pinpoint red or purple spots on the skin, nosebleeds,
- bleeding gums, blood in urine or stool, or vaginal bleeding) dengue fever is seen in a severe form known as dengue hemorrhagic fever, severe dengue, or dengue shock syndrome.

being a strong likelihood of a major shift in the coalition's power structure.

A major Cabinet reshuffle was not ruled out with the probability of defected members returning to the fold and giving a revamped PACT coalition its previous unassailable parliamentary majority.

A reconstituted PACT coalition without Mr Panton at the helm was one of the options cited by Opposition and Progressives leader Roy McTaggart when he presented the no-confidence motion. The others were a Progressives-led coalition or early elections - the latter proposition which he said he did not favour.

While the outcome of the no-confidence motion ended days of speculation over PACT's survival, it left unresolved the constitutional issues surrounding the ongoing hung parliament with both government and opposition benches commanding nine of the 19 seats - the other held by the Speaker.

With a vote of eight in favour, seven against, and three abstentions, the Opposition motion to unseat PACT - supported by former PACT coalition members - had failed to dismantle the government. Despite the votes in-favour dominating, the motion nevertheless failed to achieve the necessary two-thirds majority required in the constitution.

Unlike the United Kingdom and several Overseas Territories (British Virgin Islands, Montserrat and Turks and Caicos Islands) which use a simple majority, the Cayman Islands constitution requires a two-thirds majority for a no-confidence motion to carry.

However, speculation over whether the government's position would have been effectively rendered untenable was being played down in the aftermath of the motion.

Mr Panton's PACT coalition has suffered the exit of three members this year; former finance minister Chris Saunders, Labour Minister Dwayne Seymour and earlier this month backbench supporter McKeeva Bush, which was the trigger point for the Opposition-led motion of no-confidence. With the departure of Mr Bush in particular, the PACT was left in a precarious position, having just nine members on the government side of the Parliament

Surprisingly two of the three abstentions came from within the PACT coalition; Deputy Premier Juliana O'Connor-Connol-

ly and André Ebanks - Min. Financial Services and Commerce.

Both the government and opposition each still hold nine seats out of 19 in the chamber, leaving the Speaker with a critical casting vote on legislative issues. But Speaker Ebanks-Wilks assured in her comments at the end of the meeting: "I know that I have displayed nothing but neutrality since I've been here."

In a profound intervention at the end of the session, she called for constitutional reform to be considered especially pertaining to the position of the Speaker in such situations and for the role to be autonomous.

Earlier in the session, in leading off the debate, Opposition and Progressives leader, McTaggart, referred to what he called "an unprecedented situation". He submitted that the motion was directed at the policy shortcomings of "a dysfunctional government" which he said had now lacked the parliamentary majority to govern effectively.

The former finance minister with the previous Progressives-led government, was particularly concerned about the delayed status of the upcoming budget, proposed cutbacks and the wider implications for the government's economic management

Responding to the motion of no-confidence, Premier Wayne Panton strongly defended his government's track record and rejected the Opposition's move as "oppor-

tunistic". He brushed aside reports of rifts in his PACT team dismissing them as being blown out of proportion.

"We all wish for a Cayman that will focus on the greater good and the welfare of the less fortunate, and that is what we've been trying to deliver on," he stated and called for the Parliament and the country to move beyond the issue of the no-confidence motion.

The two main speeches for and against the motion by the Opposition Leader and the Premier were book-ended by equally passionate presentations from both sides of the Parliamentary divide. Minister for Health Sabrina Turner stood by the Premier and the PACT team, contrasted by ex-PACT colleagues Chris Saunders, McKeeva Bush and Dwayne Seymour.

Ex-PACT Finance Minister Saunders cited his disagreements with PACT leader Premier Wayne Panton which led him to quit the coalition but praised other remaining members of the coalition as hard-working and committed.

Current Minister of Health Sabrina Turner defended the track record of the PACT coalition and committed to keeping her political loyalty intact with PACT.

Mr Seymour disclosed internal differences led the PACT caucus to vote for their leader, Premier Wayne Panton to step down. He also reminded that he had tabled a motion of confidence in Parliament in support of the coalition.

Former Premier and ex-PPM/Progressives leader Sir Alden McLaughlin was

excoriating in his assessment of the PACT government especially its leadership, invoking Shakespeare's Macbeth and Merchant of Venice to illustrate what he saw as the demise confronting the coalition. He also referenced the 12 Green Bottles nursery rhyme as an omen of PACT falling apart.

Deputy Opposition leader (Progressives) Joey Hew also went on the attack against the PACT governing record and reports of internal divisions, saying the rest of the region was watching the unfolding political drama in Cayman, an observation previously made.

PACT Commerce Minister Andre Ebanks admitted that there were stresses within the coalition and referred to instances in the Parliament where the Cabinet seemed to be "at battle with itself".

In a remark which has sent political reverberations beyond Tuesday's sitting, in quite sombre tones Mr Ebanks put team PACT on notice. "I'll do my part, and if everybody chips in we can reform somehow and get it together and exceed expectations."

Advising that he would abstain in the initial vote, he also ominously warned: "If we do not make it and there is some crash, some scandal, Premier there won't be any long letter to you or the Governor... There'll be a two-line resignation that says I will therefore have to put the country first."

The talks to repackage PACT were reportedly continuing at press time.

CUC has already made a move towards a sustainable future with the purchase of two 10 megawatt (MW) battery systems that redefine energy resilience.



#### Why liquified natural gas (LNG)?

Another component of transitioning to cleaner energy solutions includes the sourcing of liquified natural gas (LNG). CUC recently sought qualifications for LNG providers, a seismic shift towards cost-effectiveness and carbon consciousness. LNG, being lower in cost than diesel or propane and with less CO<sub>2</sub> emissions, will lower costs for both CUC and its customers. Burning LNG in CUC's repurposed diesel generating units will reduce carbon emissions to new lows.



While natural gas may hail from the fossil fuel family, its footprint is but a shadow compared to the legacy of burning diesel. This project supports the Cayman Islands National Energy Policy (NEP) by heralding a new era of energy efficiency, reduced emissions and a diversification of the generation portfolio in the Cayman Islands.



In 2019, The Utility Regulation and Competition Office (OfReg) announced that for large scale solar to be offered on Grand Cayman, there would be a competitive bid process for utility scale solar. CUC anxiously awaits the bid process with OfReg. This bid process will allow CUC to openly provide details on the plans that the Company has for renewable energy and demonstrate to the public its commitment to finding affordable, reliable and environmentally friendly energy for the people of Grand Cayman.

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# Q3 Stats Show Continued Strength in Cayman Insurance Industry

The latest insurance sector licensing statistics released by the Cayman Islands Monetary Authority (CIMA) have shown continued international interest in the captive insurance industry, which has maintained its extremely strong position.

According to data for Q3 2023, CIMA issued eight new insurance company licenses between July and September, which kept pace with the growth seen in both the first and second quarter of this year. Five Class B(i) licenses were issued during Q3, alongside three Class B(iii) and one new Portfolio Insurance Company.

On a year-to-date basis, the overall total of new international licenses issued by CIMA for 2023 stands at 24 for the first nine months. Considering the fourth quarter is traditionally a busy period for new licensing activity and the majority of Cayman insurance managers continue to report healthy new business pipelines, this activity points to another buoyant year for the jurisdiction, which has consistently added more than 30 new international insurance licenses in each of the last seven years.

With the addition of these new licensees, as at Q3 2023, there are 679 Class B, C and D insurance companies licensed

in the Cayman Islands, writing approximately US\$57billion in premiums and with total assets of US\$137 billion. These numbers are consistent with Cayman's position as the second largest captive insurance domicile globally and have increased significantly in the past two years, notably with premiums up from US\$23 billion and assets rising from US\$75 billion in 2021.

Licensing activity in 2023 has also included five new portfolio insurers and one Class D open market reinsurer. Cayman's modern Portfolio Insurance Company legislation allows insurance companies established as Segregated Portfolio Companies to incorporate cells as Portfolio Insurance Companies, which has been a highly popular way for industry participants to enhance risk management. The reinsurance sector has also developed into a significant part of Cayman's international insurance business in recent years and there are currently eight Class D licensed reinsurance companies, compared to three in 2017.

North America continues to be the dominant risk location for the Cayman Islands international insurance industry, accounting for 90% of the total in Q3 2023. Medical malpractice liability, workers compensation, general liability and property remain the most significant lines of business, together making up almost 70% of licensees.

"Thanks, in part, to CIMA's excellent proportional regulatory approach, the Cayman Islands insurance industry is experiencing continued growth across sectors, with established companies expanding their portfolios and group captives welcoming new members," said Lesley Thompson, chairperson of IMAC. "These healthy third quarter statistics signal the likelihood of a strong finish to the year and we expect to see increases in license applications and double-digit license issuances in O4."



### OfReg halts fuelling operations at Jack's Esso II (North Side)

# for non-compliance with environmental data request

OfReg has taken action to cease fuelling operations at Jack's Esso II in Northside effective today, 14 November 2023, due to the operator's failure to comply with a remedial notice request. The request was issued to obtain essential data required for the regulator's analysis of the environmental conditions at the site. The information requested by OfReg would show if there is any leakage in the tanks which could adversely affect the environment.

Despite prior communication and the issuance of a remedial notice, the operator of Jack's Esso II has not provided the necessary data crucial for the regulator's environmental assessment.

The decision to cease fuelling operations was made under OfReg's mandatory responsibility and commitment to uphold environmental regulations and safeguard public health.

As the regulator for the fuels sector, OfReg has a legal obligation and duty of care



to hold operators to account for complying with the terms of their licences and in this case, protecting the environment and safeguarding public health.

OfReg is committed to upholding environmental regulations and this case also highlights the necessity for all operators to comply with regulatory requests promptly. OfReg is actively working with the operator to resolve the compliance issues and is working to resume fuelling operations at Jack's Esso II as soon as possible. The site will remain closed for the sale of fuels until further notice.

sions on a variety of topical issues.



# New exhibition explores mapping in art


The latest exhibition to open at the National Gallery is entitled '81 Degrees West: Cartographic Explorations in Contemporary Caymanian Art', and is a fantastic exploration of the connections between art and cartography (making and interpreting maps). The exhibition charts the subject stretching from ancient times into the digital era of GPS and satellite technology. Touching upon Cayman's maritime history and seafaring traditions, 81 Degrees West focuses on the ways in which both

map making and navigation have shaped the Cayman community from initial discovery and first settlement through to the Cadastral survey of the 1970s and the rapid developments that have dramatically transformed the Caymanian landscape in recent years.

Lead curator William Helfrecht said this was a project he and the team (National Gallery Director Natalie Urquhart, Jamaican curator Veerle Poupeye, an author on

Caribbean art, and Daneila Granados) had been working on for some time.

"It's an interesting way to explore thematic territory beyond the visual arts," he confirmed, stating that the exhibition, in keeping with many other National Gallery exhibitions, touched on ideas such as Caymanian history and social themes.

"This was an opportunity to look at maps themselves as visual artefacts... but also to explore in both literal and symbolic ways the field of cartography more broadly and how it has influenced and inspired visual artists in Cayman," he advised. "It's not so much an exhibition about maps; it's more about this field of the cartographic and what that means within the space of visual culture."

He went on to say that maps and mapping had been intertwined with some important but also contentious topics, such as the legacies of colonialism, slavery, and the somewhat romanticised view of exploration, and this exhibition touched upon weightier and loaded implications of that period of exploration.

A mixture of original and copies of historical maps greets the visitor, telling the history of European exploration and colonisation of the Caribbean through the documents. Combining historical maps of Cayman and the wider Caribbean dating from the 16th to the 19th centuries alongside artworks that respond to, or draw inspiration from, the visual and symbolic language of mapping, the exhibition showcases original and facsimile copies of some of the earliest known chartings of the Cayman Islands, including the Cantino Planisphere of 1502, as well as objects borrowed from the Cayman Islands National Museum, the Cayman Islands National Archives, the British Library in London, and several private collectors.

Several artists directly utilise the iconography of maps and their material traces in the fabrication of their work, notably Bendel Hydes, whose early works incorporate collaged fragments of nautical charts within the abstract surfaces of his paintings.

"One of the things we start exploring as we move through the exhibition is how the artists start to respond and engage with this topic in more and more symbolic or metaphorical ways," William explained.

Bendel Hydes' work was, in a way, the inspiration for the entire exhibition because his work was so grounded in these narratives of Cayman's maritime history, he said.

John Broad uses maps on which to paint traditional Caymanian figures and he explores the juxtaposition of the historical subject matter superimposed upon contemporary maps, exploring how the landscape has changed. Others have adopted a looser and more expansive interpretation of the subject, among them Brandon Saunders, Simon Tatum, and Kaitlyn Elphinstone, all of whom repurpose processes that are symbolically related to map-making, as the basis for creative exploration.

Pushing the mapping boundaries, Al Ebanks (who is more associated with abstract work) has created 'Walking on

Shedden Road', which is a meditation on home and where he was raised. He created his artwork from memory, exploring the sense of place and connection that people have in Cayman, particularly as the painting has been created from memory so recognisable iconic buildings are not in the exact order, and some, such as Patterson the Farm Soldier's God People Market do not even exist anymore. Nasaria Suckoo-Cholette's complex collage painting uses symbolic motifs to explore Caymanian culture, creating a somewhat jarring

feeling of the juxtaposition between nostalgic images of historical cultural motifs and a pattern or network of roundabouts and roadways which are so ubiquitous now but so alien to the older ways of life, William said.

The exhibition features 19 established and emerging artists including: Cameron Bridgeman, David Bridgeman, John Broad, Kerri-Anne Chisholm, Randy Chollette, Chris Christian, Al Ebanks, Davin Ebanks, Kaitlyn Elphinstone, Kathryn Elphinstone, Latoya Francis, Bendel Hydes, John Reno

Jackson, Iain MacRae, Chris Mann, Linda McCann, Brandon Saunders, Nasaria Suckoo Chollette, and Simon Tatum. It has been made possible by support from Davenport Development Ltd., along with several artworks generously being loaned by the Cayman Islands Museum, The Cayman Islands National Archives, and several private collectors.

81 Degrees West is now open to the public and admission to the Gallery and the exhibition is free. Opening times are Monday to Saturday 10:00am – 5:00pm.

### **RCIPS Meet the Public in GT**

The Royal Cayman Islands Police Service have been holding community meetings across the entire country, including the sister islands. On Thursday, November 9th, they held their final district meeting of this series. Of course, this is the first time that a series of meetings has been led by Mr. Kurt Walton, since his appointment as the Commissioner of Police.

Inside the Constitution Hall, Mr. Walton got the meeting started by greeting the audience members and asking if it was okay for him and his panel members to sit at the floor level immediately in front of the audience, rather than on the stage behind a table that had been set up. Once they had repositioned, he then greeted the audience members again and proceeded to introduce the other members of the RCIPS who were present. After also specifically welcoming the Members of Parliament who were there. Mr. Walton went on to speak about the purpose of these meetings.

The new Commissioner stressed the importance of involving the public in the process of policing through giving them a chance to give feedback, suggestions, and even criticism to the service, and then using that to help make better decisions for the entire service. Mr. Walton then again reiterated that he expected to be held accountable by the public, and he encouraged them to openly and freely share their concerns and thoughts. He plainly stated, "I am the Commissioner of Police who also

happens to be a Caymanian. Therefore, I don't expect that you would go easy on me. I expect that you would hold me accountable and let me know when and where you think I can do better."

At this point, the commissioner shared that the RCIPS was in the final few months

of their current three-year policing plan. He said that the new one was currently in the works and that he expected the 2024-2026 plan to be completed and ready for submittal to the Governor's Office by December. He spoke about his vision for the service with the primary objective being

the safety of all residents of these three islands.

Once the floor was opened to the audience, the Commissioner was hit with questions, comments, and even some snide remarks about different areas and responsibilities of the RCIPS. These addressed topics from traffic woes, the rise in serious and gun crime, the attitudes of the police officers, the responsiveness of the police, and the need for more police presence in our communities. Certain community areas were of particular concern and carried the discussion for a while, due to the perception of the community members that the police were not doing enough to help in that area.

Mr. Walton handled all questions and comments with grace and poise, thereby displaying some of the leadership qualities that led to his appointment as the Commissioner of Police. He assured the public repeatedly that he was there for the benefit of the country as a whole and that he would give his endeavor best to improve the safety of all citizens and residents.

This is an important point in our country's history. The members of the public know it and, certainly, Mr. Kurt Walton knows it as well. The Royal Cayman Islands Police Service is in capable hands going forward. Now, it behooves us to support him and the entire service as best we can, and to be willing to work with them. There is much work to be done, for sure. However, with our new Commissioner of Police in charge, we can look forward to seeing significant progress.

# Police investigate report of Rape



Shortly after 10:25AM on Monday, 13 November, officers were dispatched to a report of a serious sexual assault. It was reported that a woman had been at a bus stop in the Savannah area of Bodden Town, when she was offered a ride by a group of three men in a small car, one of whom was known to her. When she entered the car, the men drove her to a secluded area, brandished a firearm at her, and sexually assaulted her. The men then allowed her to exit the vehicle before driving off.

The woman then sought help from persons passing by, who were driving a silver Suzuki Swift, and transported her to an address in George Town, where police were called. Police are appealing for the persons who were driving this car to

contact the George Town Police Station at 949-4222.

The woman was transported to hospital for medical evaluation and subsequently discharged. Appropriate safeguarding measures have been put in place for her.

The suspect who was driving the vehicle is described as being tall, of dark complexion and muscular build.

The suspect who brandished the gun is described as being of dark complexion, with a large beard and short hair.

The third suspect is described as being skinny, of brown complexion, with short dreadlocks.

The matter is currently under investigation by George Town CID, and anyone with further information is asked to contact the number above.




Second place was claimed by RSM (team

### Dominica protects sperm whales

Dominica has established a Sperm Whale Reserve off the Caribbean side of the island to ensure the gigantic mammals will not become extinct.

The new reserve will help generate tourism income while also protecting a species under increased threat from human activity. Scientists involved in its planning and establishment assert that protection of almost 800 square kilometres will deliver multiple benefits.

Sperm whales have the largest brains on earth, matrilineal societies, and a complex language. They are the planet's largest-toothed predator with males on average 16 metres (52ft) long – bigger than a school bus. Sperm whales are found worldwide - from Iceland to New Zealand. But Dominica is one of the few countries in the world where sperm whales can be seen consistently throughout the year. Dominica offers a unique habitat where a resident population of sperm whales finds food and shelter, making the west coast of the island critical feeding and nursing grounds.

"The 200 or so sperm whales that call our sea home are prized citizens of Dominica," said Dominica's Prime Minister Roosevelt Skerrit. "Their ancestors likely inhabited Dominica before humans arrived. We want to ensure these majestic and highly intelligent animals are safe from harm and continue keeping our waters and our climate healthy. Dominica is honoured to establish the first Sperm Whale Reserve on our planet."

Once the reserve is established, a Senior Whale Officer and observers stationed to tourism and research vessels will oversee and reinforce the expanded whale tourism regulations. Sustainable fishing, which does not interfere with the sperm whales' behaviour or compete with them for food, will be permitted. Visitors to Dominica will have the opportunity to swim with these whales or view them from a boat, but they will do so in more sustainable numbers and under new strict regulations, to ensure that the sperm whales and other species of whales and dolphins aren't dis-

"Protecting these whales offers an incredible, cost-effective climate solution that has been overlooked by policymakers," said Enric Sala, the founder of Pristine Seas and an Explorer in Residence at National Geographic. "By protecting sperm whales, Dominica is bolstering its climate resilience. The more sperm whales in Dominica's waters, the more carbon sequestered in the deep sea, thus helping to mitigate global warming." Sala has been advising the Dominica government on the establishment of the reserve.

Whale faeces are particularly climate-friendly. Sperm whales dive between 650-1000 metres deep to hunt squid. When they are at the surface between dives, they breathe, rest and defecate. Their nutrient-rich faeces - with iron concentrations 10 million times greater than the surrounding water at the surface - foster plankton blooms which capture carbon dioxide from seawater. When the plankton dies, it sinks to the deep sea with the carbon in it, thus becoming a carbon sink and helping to mitigate the impacts of global warming.

Based on a study of carbon sequestration by sperm whales elsewhere, and assuming 250 sperm whales currently in Dominica's waters, Sala estimated that these whales could sequester 4,200 metric tonnes of carbon every year – equivalent to the carbon sequestered by 18,000 acres of US forests in one year.

# JA health chiefs burning to stop smoking deaths

Jamaica may be best known for illegal marijuana consumption but its tobacco smokers are causing a major health problem too.

Minister of Health & Wellness, Dr Christopher Tufton is focused on Jamaica's renewed commitment to tobacco control, as more young people take up the habit as the world faces a ballooning non-communicable (NCDs) disease crisis.

"The challenges to human and environmental health

that tobacco presents are well documented and significant. This is the case globally and certainly as we consider the Jamaica situation," noted Dr Tufton, speaking at a recent high-level Tobacco Free Finance Pledge event, held during the United Nations General Assembly in New York.

"Annually more than eight million people lose their lives to tobacco use. In Jamaica, as elsewhere in the world, we have a NCDs epidemic, fuelled in part by tobacco use. More than 70% of deaths in Jamaica annually are linked to NCDs," he added. There is an alarming rise in the number of teens and young adults smoking not just

weed and tobacco but also e-cigarettes as well which are also causing long-term health damage.

This data, he noted, is in addition to what is known of the implications for the planet.

Dr Tufton said: "We have a big job on our hands to preserve human health and the health of the environment from tobacco. I am confident that working together, we can get it done, including through the continued engagement and partnership of players from the finance sector in support of the transition to a net zero world where tobacco has no place," he added.

#### Fitness Rule #4: Keep Dinner Light






