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
Cayman's New National Symbols

I write to correct the error in the Ministry of Youth, Sports and Heritage's announcement declaring turtle as the national dish of the Cayman Islands. Turtle although a popular dish, was not as widely available as we are led to believe, and therefore could not have been "national".

By the time the modern Cayman Islands came into existence turtle had long been extinct in the waters surrounding the Cayman Islands. As a matter of fact, turtles were even extinct in the waters between Cayman and the south coast of Cuba, where Caymanians fished after depleting supplies in our own waters. During its peak the turtle trade brought wealth to several, Caymanian entrepreneurs and for years there was a brisk trade in turtle between Grand Cayman, Key West and Tampa,

Caymanian turtle fishermen, having 'fished out' the surrounding waters then resorted to poaching turtle from waters surrounding the Miskito Cays. These Cays were territory claimed by Nicaragua. For most of the time Caymanian turtle fishermen successfully poached turtle in these waters but there were numerous occasions where Caymanian vessels were seized, and the crew imprisoned by the Nicaraguan authorities. Such incidents often necessitated the diplomatic intervention of the United

Kingdom acting in the interests of the Caymanian fishermen. As Nicaragua complained of these incidents, pressure to discontinue the trade weighed upon the Caymanian fishermen and this pressure as well as a growing call for a ban of the trade brought a clamour for some alternate supply.

Some years before the eventual CIT-IES ban in the 1970's Cavman fishermen were able to procure limited licences from the Nicaraguan authorities to fish for turtle at certain intervals. Then after the Falklands War at the Convention on Trade in Endangered Species (CITIES) was held in Argentina, The Convention declared turtles an endangered species and imposed a worldwide ban on the trade.

To their credit, the Caymanian authorities had some years prior encouraged a group of foreign investors to pursue the experiment of rearing turtles in artificial conditions. This venture enjoyed modest success and although it demonstrated modest success, the worldwide ban stunted its growth, and we know well its current challenges. The experiment has never been able to meet the demand of the Caymanian market.

Turtle as a staple food, even before the ban was not widely available on Grand Cayman during all times. And even when it was available, it was most easily procured in George Town or West Bay. In West Bay because that district produced the majority of persons involved in all aspects of the trade from mariners to ship owners and financiers.

George Town as well, had its share of those who, participated in the turtle trade, from entrepreneurs like the late Dr. Roy McTaggart, owner of a number of turtle schooners, including the now infamous Majestic. George Town also produced legendary turtle butchers like the late Lorraine Russell. Older generations of Caymanians will no doubt be able to recall the nights at the 'Old Market' where the turtles were butchered and sold. At such times, that venue was a veritable temple for the "Who was Who" among Caymanian men. It was a conclave rich with Caymanian culture



and tradition as men like the late Ashley Godfrey, Neville Ebanks and their contemporaries would 'hold court' for hours on end.

For a brief time during the heyday of turtling the Cayman Islands Government operated a canning factory specialising in the production of turtle soup. This venture, for all its promise did not reach its full potential ... the result... a lack of a steady supply of turtle.


Of significance also, is the fact that history suggests that the turtle trade was not significant in the lives of the people of Cayman Brac and Little Cayman as it appears to have been for those on Grand

The popular dish throughout the Cayman Islands was and still is the" Cayman stew" or what folks nowadays call "run down". This dish, the ingredients of which was widely popular, even to the Seventh Day Adventists who did not eat turtle. This stew or "run down" was made with coconut milk, the 'breadkind' being cassava, sweet potatoes, bottlers, yam breadfruit all in one pot with fish or salt beef providing the protein.

It was a dish available and popular among folk from all walks of life. It was not dependent upon the turtle schooner's arrival from the Miskiti Cays, nor was it hampered by bad weather.

The Ministry of Culture is correct in naming swanky as the national drink, accompanying the (run down) fish or salt beef stew.


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NEW ECONOMIC REPORT CHALLENGES THE STATUS QUO

A new economic report looking at the challenges and opportunities facing Cayman has come in for intense scrutiny in the past few weeks with a range of opinions on either side of the spectrum.

The report titled Unleashing Cayman's Potential: A Journey to Prosperity and Unity was researched and written by prominent Caribbean economist Marla Dukharan.

The new report focuses on the economy broadly, and addresses specifically the sectors of tourism, financial services, and construction. It also deals with issues surrounding employment and inequality.

But the assertions on tourism have jumped to the forefront of local reaction, including criticism by the Hon. Minister for Tourism, Kenneth Bryan.

In the report, Ms Dukharan stated that tourism is a heavily import-dependent sector in the Cayman Islands - more so than the rest of the Caribbean, based on the largely-foreign workforce in tourism.

"But has anyone ever looked at the data to analyze whether there is any truth to these widely held beliefs that tourism and financial services are the twin pillars driving the Cayman economy and that construction is needed to create growth? And if not, why not?" she queries.

Against that background, her analysis raises several questions for Cayman's policy-makers to address.

It states that the Cayman Islands is the only country in the Caribbean that consistently shows a net outflow of remittances, as foreign workers send a portion of their wages back home. Ms Dukharan says this net outflow of remittances "constitutes a drain on the Cayman Islands economy, just like imports."

She cautions that "if Cayman continues growing the tourism sector, which requires more and more physical space, more hotels, bringing in more and more people, and generating more and more waste and pollution, we risk jeopardizing the very culture and natural environment which are the only major domestic input into the tourism sector."

The economist also raises the question: What about the impact that tourism has

on the amount of revenue the Government earns and can therefore spend in the econ-

According to her, "While we have found no official data published on the revenue generated from Work Permits granted to the tourism sector specifically, the Tourism Accommodation and Cruise Ship Departure charges amount to less than 3% of Government Revenues."

The Hon. Minister for Tourism Kenneth Bryan has taken exception to the report's conclusions on tourism declaring that "her analysis on the lack of contribution to our government revenues is unfortunately

"Who asked her to do it, who paid her to do it?" Mr Bryan asked during an interview on Radio Cayman's For The Record programme with Orrett Connor.

He further questioned what he felt are political insinuations within the report where it says in part: "It is especially important in the year ahead of an election, to make sure Caymanians understand how the economy works and what actually are the problems you need to resolve, so you can make the best decisions possible when you head to the polls."

Mr Bryan termed that "highly inappropriate to get into our local politics" adding that he would be addressing the matter further in Parliament.

In responding to the concerns raised, economist Marla Dukharan affirmed that this report is an independent in-house document produced solely by her company as part of a regular series of economic perspectives and analyses not only on Cayman but other countries.

Speaking on the Radio Cayman programme Talk Today with Sterling Dwayne Ebanks, she viewed some of the reactions "as an attempt to discredit the analysis and the findings."

"I would say categorically that nobody paid me to write this report. It was funded entirely independently by me. And the fact is that I've been covering the Cayman Islands economy for the past 12 years or so...people like me need to say what needs to be said irrespective of who might not like it."

While the section on tourism has jumped to the forefront of comment and reaction, Unleashing Cayman's Potential: A Journey to Prosperity and Unity also addresses other

Comparatively, it places the financial services sector as the bedrock of the economy having an impact on the tourism sector as well. It asserts that without the license fees paid by the financial services sector, the Government will generate a fiscal deficit every year, and will have to borrow to pay

"The financial services sector therefore, in effect, subsidizes everything else in the economy - including tourism...So - tourism isn't quite the goose laying the golden egg that many believe it is, and I think it is safe to say that while financial services is producing a bounty of golden eggs, these are really the only solid eggs in Cayman's basket. And this makes Cayman fiscally and economically vulnerable (not unlike the rest of the Carib-

Under the heading of 'WORK' it credits the labour force participation rate in Cayman as "probably the highest in the region, which means there is less idleness and less informality in the economy - all of which is positive...Cayman is the only country in the region where unemployment is not a prob-

However, the report sounds a note of caution regarding the link between employment and education in Cayman: "Only 27% of students in Government primary schools and 37.5% at Government secondary schools are achieving the expected standards in their education. This is at odds with a country of Cayman's GDP per capita and the level of fiscal spending on education. It suggests that Cayman will likely have to continue to outsource its most highly paid and highly sought after jobs for the foreseeable future."

It also said that a skills-gap analysis has not yet been conducted in Cayman which would tell the specific skills employers need versus the existing skill-set of the Caymani-

And while the construction sector is highlighted as "a major growth driver in Cayman", the Dukharan report asks: "Why then does Cayman seem to have a long-standing affordable housing problem?"

Unleashing Cayman's Potential: A Journey to Prosperity and Unity also touches on issues of inequality within the economy and society. "Regrettably, we do not have any data beyond 2015 on inequality in Cayman. This puts Cayman's policy-makers and nation builders at a significant disadvantage in addressing inequality, and there has been no meaningful improvement in inequality since







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
Cosmetology Hygiene and Safety Training



The Department of Environmental Health (DEH) is announcing the resumption of its Cosmetology Hygiene and Safety Training Courses for hairdressers, barbers, tattoo and body piercing technicians, and other personnel in the cosmetology industry. Registration is now open for the training session scheduled for March 25, 2024 and May 20, 2024 at the Red Cross Conference Room in George Town. This training is required for all new personnel working in the cosmetology industry and anyone whose certification has expired (Certification expires after 3 years). Business owners are encouraged to act now and register their employees for these important workshops to educate operators on safe hygiene

practices within the cosmetology industry. Failure to become certified may affect the granting and/or renewal of your trade and business license. The training will focus on equipment sterilization and disinfection; preventing the transmission of communicable diseases; and updating participants about updates to DEH guidelines for operating cosmetology-related establishments.

The cost of registration is \$15 per person and includes the cost of materials. Payment should be made at DEH headquarters, located at 580 North Sound Road, between 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday. 

Police Investigate Credit Card Fraud, Three Men Arrested

Police are investigating multiple instances of credit card fraud, where persons have made purchases using credit card details which have been obtained fraudulently, without knowledge or consent of the cardholders.

At times these purchases have been made over the phone or online, however police have

recently seen a number of instances where the culprits have made purchases in person without providing a physical card or identification.

On Tuesday, 19 March 2024, officers arrested three men, ages 32, 32, and 33, who are visitors to the island, on suspicion of obtaining property by deception, after the men had earlier purchased several items with card information from multiple cards, which appears to have been fraudulently obtained. Police also conducted a search of the premises where the men were located, and seized several items, including phones, computer items, perfumes and expensive jewellery, which are suspected to have been obtained by the same method.

The men remain in custody as investigations continue.

Businesses which have conducted transactions with manually entered card details since 16 March, particularly involving a group of three American men, two of whom are of dark complexion, one of light complexion, are asked to review these transactions and contact the RCIPS Financial Crime Investigation Unit at RCIPS.FCU@rcips.ky<mailto:RCIPS.FCU@rcips.ky> if they have any suspicions.



The RCIPS is taking the opportunity to advise the public and businesses of the steps that can be taken to help avoid becoming victims of this type of fraud.

Members of the public should remember to never share card details or your PIN with others, always keep your cards in sight when making payments, and otherwise out of sight of other persons.

It's also important to monitor your account for payments you don't recognise. If possible, take advantage of transaction alerts provided through email or a bank approved app. This way, if you see a card payment you do not recognise, you can report it immediately to your bank.

Finally, persons should avoid, as best as possible, making payments with your card via phone. Instead, remote payments should be done through secure recognisable platforms.

Businesses should avoid conducting card transactions when persons are unable to produce the physical card with matching identification.

Additionally, businesses may want to consider not conducting card transactions over the phone, since a physical card cannot be provided in these cases.

Police Commence 2024 Road Safety Operations with Easter Holiday Campaign



The Easter holiday period has traditionally been a time of increased roading activity across the islands. The RCIPS has chosen the upcoming Easter holiday period to kick off the first of what will be a number of targeted road safety campaigns over the course of the year, that aim to reduce serious injury and fatalities on our roads. These operations are being conducted in conjunction with the National Road Safety Strategy, 'Safe Roads, Safe Cayman: The Road to Zero.'

Commencing Friday, 22 March, through to Friday 5 April, RCIPS will be conducting high visibility policing initiatives and traffic enforcement across the islands, focusing on persistent road safety offences and poor driving behaviours, including speeding, DUI, inconsiderate and distracted driving.

While police focus on these primary road safety offences, the campaign will have a wider reach, including partner agencies such as DVDL and the Public Transport Dept, who will be targeting un-road-worthy vehicles and un-safe loads.

"We know Easter is a special time of year, here in the Cayman Islands, where families and friends come together, commuting from district to district to socialize, while visitor numbers are up", says Chief Superintendent Brad Ebanks. "This is why the officers will be out in numbers over this period; proactively focusing on those that demonstrate disregard for the law and endanger other road users. The main objective here is not to prosecute persons, but rather create safer roads for everyone. Motorists tend to do the right thing when they know police officers are out and about."

Policing efforts will target known hot spots and times of day/night where poor driving behavior is most prevalent. "The community can expect to see increased police visibility on the roads over the length of the campaign", says Inspector Andre Tahal, Head of Traffic and Road Policing. "Ultimately, our enforcement efforts are about keeping our roadways safe. Persons can play their part in supporting police efforts by not drinking and driving, slowing down and being considerate of fellow road users. And passengers, you have a role to play too - call out unsafe driving behavior when you see it".

RCIPS continues its commitment to promoting road safety, especially during periods of increased road activity, as we work with our partners in government to support the National Road Safety Strategy.

"I was happy to see even people in mov-


ing vehicles stopped to hear us and accept what we were giving out. For those who were not home we were able to leave their invitation at their door/mailbox" - Black-



New show promotes architectural preservation



► John Doak's wattle and daub style cottage


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The show is made up of artwork primarily from the National Collection held at the National Gallery, along with new work on loan from several leading artists and collectors. In addition, the Gallery has worked with local architect John Doak to feature his renderings of the four distinct styles of Caymanian early homes and their evolution. John's book, Cayman Style, is also available for purchase at the Gallery and is a treasure trove of information on

the field of domestic architecture, detailing his extensive research on the subject.

National Gallery Collections Curator William Helfrecht said the exhibition was timely given the current discussions in Cayman about the scale and pace of development, and the lack of legislation around preservation of historic homes.

"The exhibition emphasizes the unique architectural heritage of our Islands and the need to pro-actively preserve the built heritage that remains. It seeks to raise awareness about the complexity of his-



► The Upstairs House by John Doak


toric preservation and to shed light on the stakeholders who are invested in this area, such as the National Trust, who we work very closely, with and also the government," he advised. "The loss of notable historic buildings that have been demolished over the past couple of years has really thrown a spotlight on this urgent issue."

The Gallery hoped that the exhibition will help to increase visibility around the urgency of the topic, as well as to shed a balanced view in terms of the surrounding issues.

"There are a lot of families who inherit a historic property and the costs is exorbitant if you've got a property riddled with termites you might want to with the best intentions try and restore something - it's about having the expertise, access to funding and the materials," Will said.

It is anticipated that the exhibition and subsequent educational forums that will accompany it will give people a real insight



into the what is needed to protect and preserve Cayman's historic properties.

"Our Curatorial Team and Education Department have collaborated in the development of this project and, as with many National Gallery exhibition projects, it is conceived as a forum for dialogue and learning. The accompanying programme is as central as the actual artworks on display," Will confirmed.

Architect John Doak's research has been key to the show, which begins with what Will describes as "more literal architectural drawings of quintessential archetypal domestic structures" by the architect. The drawings are reproductions of John's original drawings. They depict John's classification of four basic designs of a Caymanian house. Some of the drawings are generic and some are of real properties (whether they are standing or not), the first being the wattle and daub cottage, a basic structure that goes back to the 1700s made from wattle and daub with a silver thatch roof. Later, the Cayman Cabin is a variation of the first design, an evolution employing ironwood posts, and, from about the 1920s, with corrugated roofing. The manor house or 'upstairs' house then followed, a two-storey dwelling that is a progression of the cabin form. John Doak's image is of Cousin Mabel's house, a property still in existence at the end of Boggy Sands Road in West Bay, with a gabled roof and stairs which are often configured in different orientations, Will described. This

was followed by the bungalow.

"A lot was tied to changes in material," Will explained. "This evolution that John sketches through his history is an evolution of construction techniques and materials. The rise of the bungalow after World War 2 is correlated to the prevalence of concrete as a new material."

For the broader exhibition, the National Gallery has dug deep into its collection for some fascinating artwork from some of Cayman's best-loved artists, including Charles Long, Bendel Hydes, Joanne Sibley, C.E. Whitney and Chris Mann.




