

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Cold Front Brings Wave Action, Chilly Weather to CI



► A Nor'wester accompanied by a cold front affected the Cayman Islands over the weekend and into Tuesday, 3rd February.

Folks in Grand Cayman have had to grab their winter gear over the weekend as a recent Nor'wester was accompanied by a cold front that brought temperatures down to the low 60's between January 30th and February 3rd.

Meteorologists explained that a strong Arctic cold front is currently bringing

gusty north winds (20-30+ mph), rough seas, and cooler temperatures to the Cayman Islands, with conditions expected to last through Monday.

Marine warnings are in effect due to dangerous waves and temperatures are expected to remain mid-to-upper 60s into the week.

According to the Cayman Islands Weather Service:

"Strong northerly winds and rough seas are expected over the Cayman area as a cold front continues to dominate the weather pattern. A Marine Watch is in effect. Sea conditions will gradually improve through Tuesday evening. The chance of showers continues to be low as dry air moves across the area."

Businesses along the waterfront of George Town were disrupted, as wind conditions resulted in nine to 15 foot waves, causing closures and forcing establishments to take precautionary measures to

protect their properties.

Motorists along Harbour Drive and Seafarer's Way in George Town were also on the defensive as waves crashed against the iron-shore, making it difficult to navigate the Capital's coastline.

With reports of boats being washed onto the reef, Marine warnings are in effect and all water users are advised to stay out of the water.

The strong seas and chilly weather are expected to continue on Grand Cayman and the Sister Islands into Tuesday, 3rd February.

According to records, the coldest temperature ever recorded in the Cayman Islands was 52 degrees Fahrenheit, which occurred on February 11, 1968 and was measured at the Owen Roberts International Airport.

That record low has stood for decades, though cold fronts in Cayman can bring temperatures down to the high 50s or low 60s.

Your first stop might be Zilker Metropolitan Park, the city’s beloved green heart. On weekends, it fills with picnics, frisbees, and families sprawled under the shade of pecan trees. One TripAdvisor reviewer described it as “the kind of park you end up staying in far longer than planned — peaceful, huge, and perfect for kids to run wild.”

Just across the lawn lies Barton Springs Pool, a natural spring fed swimming hole that stays a cool 68–70°F year round. It’s

one of Austin’s most iconic experiences — and a lifesaver in the Texas heat. Visitors consistently rave about it, with one noting, “It’s like swimming in bottled water — crystal clear and unforgettable.” Families gather on the grassy banks, teenagers dare each other to jump from the diving board, and toddlers splash in the shallows. It’s simple, joyful, and distinctly Austin.

For indoor fun, the Thinkery — Austin’s hands on children’s museum — is a hit with families. Exhibits encourage tinkering, splashing, building, and experiment-

ing. Local parents frequently praise it as “a place where kids don’t even realise they’re learning because they’re having so much fun.” Cayman children will feel right at home in its bright, playful spaces.

Food, of course, is part of the adventure. Austin’s famous food truck parks, like The Picnic on Barton Springs Road, offer a relaxed, open air dining experience perfect for families. You can wander between stalls serving tacos, barbecue, Thai noodles, and ice cream — all under strings of lights. It’s casual, communal, and wonderfully unfussy.

If you want a taste of Texas tradition, The County Line on the Lake delivers slow smoked barbecue with a side of scenery. Families sit on the deck overlooking the water while kids feed turtles and ducks between bites of brisket. Reviewers often mention the atmosphere as much as the food, calling it “a beautiful spot where the lake makes everything feel peaceful and unhurried.” (This restaurant is widely recommended in family travel guides and Austin dining roundups.)

For those craving a bit of adventure, Austin’s greenbelts and trails offer shaded escapes. Bull Creek District Park, for example, is a favourite among locals for its shallow limestone pools and easy walking paths. Travel writers describe it as “a natural playground where kids can hop rocks, splash in the creek, and explore safely.”

And while this feature focuses on family friendly fun, Austin still has something special for adults travelling without children — or for parents who manage a night out. Instead of the usual sunset cue paragraph, let’s keep it simple and honest: Austin’s live music scene is legendary. Whether it’s blues on South Congress or indie bands downtown, the city’s venues offer an atmosphere that’s intimate, electric, and unmistakably Texan. It’s a chance to experience the soul of the city in a single evening.

Reintroduction of Community Policing Officers across Grand Cayman

The Royal Cayman Islands Police Service (RCIPS) has announced the return of dedicated Community Policing Officers to their respective beats across Grand Cayman. This marks the end of a temporary consolidation period in which community officers, the majority of whom were from George Town, were redirected to support core frontline services due to staffing constraints in September 2025.

As of 1 February, residents in Central George Town, Prospect and West Bay will once again see their familiar beat officers patrolling neighbourhoods, attending community activities and engaging directly with local businesses and the Bodden Town Community Policing Officers will remain and continue as normal. The RCIPS recognises that community policing is the pillar of public safety and serves as the primary link between the police and the public, focusing on proactive problem-solving and building the trust necessary to keep the islands safe. “Our community police presence provides a sense of security that goes beyond traditional patrolling,” says the Commissioner of Police Kurt Walton. “While the temporary withdrawal was a difficult operational necessity, our recruit-

ment efforts have now reached a stage that allows us to return these officers to the heart of our communities.”

Mindful Eating

Have you encountered this before?

You're sitting at your computer desk staring at a number of emails. After sending a reply, you reach for a sandwich on your desk. You hurriedly take a few bites and grab a drink while looking at the screen and opening the next email. Before you realise it, lunch is over.

A growing body of research suggests that eating more slowly and mindfully may support weight management and help reduce reliance on processed and less nutritious foods.

What is mindful eating?

The American Diabetes Association suggests that mindful eating involves paying attention to our food, on purpose, moment by moment without judgement.

Why be more mindful when eating?

The British Dietetic Association (BDA) advises that mindful eating creates opportunities to appreciate food more and make a better connection with it. Importantly, mindfulness helps in recognising the difference between physical and emotional hunger. It involves asking yourself this question: Am I truly hungry or do I crave comfort foods to ease my stress?

The practice of mindful eating

Dr Lilian Cheung, Lecturer and Director of Mindfulness Research and Practice at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health's Department of Nutrition, devised seven practices for mindful eating in her co-authored book, *Savor: Mindful Eating, Mindful Life*.

The seven practices of a mindful eater

- **Honour the food:** Appreciate where food comes from including the people, culture and natural resources involved in bringing it to the plate.
- **Engage all senses of sight, touch, hear, smell, taste and intuition:** Eat with awareness of taste, smell, texture, colour, sound and intuition.
- **Serve modest portions:** Choose



portion sizes that meet rather than exceed physical needs.

- **Savour small bites and chew thoroughly:** Slow down to support digestion.
- **Eat slowly to avoid overeating:** Put your fork down between bites and chew slowly. Avoid distractions and sit to eat.
- **Don't skip meals:** Plan regular meals and healthy snacks in between.
- **Eat a plant based diet, for your health and for the planet.**

Mindful eating while dining out

- Read the menu and choose dishes to support your health goals.
- Ask questions about cooking methods: foods that have been poached, broiled, baked or grilled are more health conscious options than fried food.
- Be aware of portion sizes and choose meals with smaller portions. Consider sharing dishes.

- Eat slowly and savour flavours. Pay attention to taste, texture and aromas to increase satisfaction.
- Stop eating when comfortably full, not overly full.
- Notice fullness and take left over foods home. It reduces waste and supports next day meal.
- Stay hydrated and drink water. Be aware of sugary or alcoholic drinks.
- Savour the social experience by engaging in conversation rather than rushing the meal.

Mindful eating to prevent food waste

- Plan your meals with intention to avoid over buying.
- Save time and money by shopping mindfully. Check cupboards first, make a list and buy only what you realistically need.
- Be creative with leftovers to avoid waste.
- Organise your fridge to prioritise items that need to be used first.

- Consider freezing left over foods with shorter shelf life.
- Store food properly as it helps to reduce spoilage.
- Donate leftover food to local charities, food banks, share with relatives, and friends.

Summary

Mindful eating is a way to enjoy what you are eating whilst being in tune with your body and acknowledging your thoughts and feelings. It encourages us to gain awareness of our eating experiences and can help to encourage healthy eating choices and positive eating behaviours. In relation to Nutrition and a mindful approach, the aim is to eat, small, regular nutritionally packed meals.

BERMUDA IN A FOX NEWS TRIANGLE?

What might have otherwise been dismissed as an innocuous joke remark by an American television host with a reputation for controversy is causing quite a stir in Bermuda.

In his Fox News TV programme, Jesse Watters alluded to a scenario in which the US would take over the British Overseas Territory on security grounds.

He made the remark during a discussion of the controversial idea by President Donald Trump, who has spoken of the United States taking control of Greenland for similar reasons.

“If we needed Bermuda to defend the Caribbean from the enemy, I think the British would let us borrow the island, it’s called sharing,” he said in one of two programmes where he threw out the scenario.

Watters also said: “The Europeans are lecturing us about colonies, but if we needed Bermuda, we’d take it.”

“We let the British have Bermuda because it’s cute, but if we needed Bermuda, we’d take it. And the British would let it happen,” the TV host stated.

While to date there has been no known official comment from the government or



the political directorate in Bermuda, there has been a flurry of reaction on local social media, ranging from disbelief to being dismissive. Many seem bemused by the issue which has also been reported on by the territory’s mainstream media.

It’s not clear why Watters chose Bermuda as a reference point. The British island lies in the North Atlantic off the eastern seaboard of the United States.

What appears to be driving the interest in his remarks seems to be concern about

the unpredictable nature - and execution - of recent US foreign policy, including in the region, under the Trump administration.

There are no indications of any official US interest in Bermuda beyond business investments in the territory’s successful offshore financial sector, real estate and tourism industry.

However, the comment “if we needed Bermuda, we’d take it” has gained prominence in the current geo-political climate, in which President Trump is emphasising the Western Hemisphere - including the Atlantic and Caribbean basin - as a central focus of new US foreign policy priorities.

Recent actions, policies and comments by the president and others in his administration have underlined the administration’s intensified interest in the area.

“What Europe doesn’t understand is that Greenland is an island in North America,” Watters said, adding, “And we have dominion over the entire Western Hemisphere.

Also driving the debate emanating from the Fox News host’s remarks are links between that network and the Trump administration. Several officials in the government have spent time on the network as hosts advocating policies that they are now implementing.

National Gallery Announces 4th Cayman Islands Biennial Awardees

The National Gallery of the Cayman Islands (NGCI) is proud to announce the award recipients for the 4th Cayman Islands Biennial, Archipelago. At a lively award ceremony held on Friday, 23 January, the National Gallery recognised a selection of artists whose work exemplifies the technical proficiency and conceptual exploration defining the contemporary Caymanian art scene.

Archipelago, co-curated by Davin K. Ebanks and Dr. Joseph L. Underwood, brings together 76 artworks by 60 artists/collectives across six venues on all three islands. This year's Biennial explores the unique intersection between individual identity and collective experience during a period of rapid national transformation. By framing Caymanian society as an archipelago—both a single conglomerate entity and a collection of distinct parts—the exhibition serves as a nexus for open dialogue, critique, and personal reflection on global geopolitics, social isolation, and the evolving identity of the nation.

The Awards

The Biennial's highest honour, the Bendel Hydes Award is named after the late pioneer of Caymanian contemporary art. This prestigious accolade carries a significant monetary prize, an exhibition opportunity at the National Gallery, and a commitment to purchasing the work for the National Gallery's permanent collection. This year's Award was shared by two artists working in very different mediums: Joanna Austin for *StreetView* (2025) - a collection of drawings of South Church Street; and Randy Chollette for *Laid in Stone* (2024-2025) a site-specific installation that uses stacked and painted cement blocks to represent generational growth.

The Bendel Hydes 'Emerging Artist' Award was also presented at the event. This award, which recognises a practitioner who shows exceptional promise, includes a monetary grant specifically intended to support a residency programme or professional training opportunity, furthering the Gallery's mission to nurture the next generation of talent. The prize

was awarded to Iain MacRae for his painting triptych: *Grand Cayman, Cayman Brac, Little Cayman* (2025) which uses layered symbolism, visual storytelling and scale to explore the interconnected identities of the three islands. Says MacRae, "I am deeply grateful to receive the Emerging Artist Prize. The support and recognition are especially meaningful at this stage of my practice, and I am inspired by the strength and generosity of the artistic community involved. Many of the previous winners of this prize are massive inspirations to me, so to share this with them is incredibly humbling."

Stefan Langlois was recognised as the Emerging Artist Award Runner-Up for his ambitious *Ode to Ten* (2025) sculptural installation, which is on view at Gram Bellas in North Side.

In addition to the Bendel Hydes Awards, special commendations were extended to Nancy Barnard (née Kirkaldy) for *Our Built Heritage: Identity Loss (and Protection)* and *The Clayton Nixon House* (2025); Andre Jennings for *Inner Thoughts* (2025); Michael Mothen for *Fisherman's Dream* (2025) featuring Rita Estevanovich; and Elizabeth Paige Smith for her site-specific installation at Gram Bellas, *Who Remains*, (2025).

This year's awardees were determined via a rigorous selection process and lengthy deliberations, which reflected the overall level of excellence of work on view. NGCI wishes to extend sincere thanks to this year's jurors: Carl A. Brown (NGCI Board Member and Chairperson of the Collections Committee), Kerri-Anne Chisholm (Artist, Curator, and Founder of Gram Bellas), Davin K. Ebanks (Biennial Co-curator), Dr. Veerle Poupeye (Director of the National Museum), and Dr. Joseph L. Underwood (Biennial Co-curator).

"Each iteration of the Cayman Islands Biennial serves as a vital platform for artists working across a range of contemporary art disciplines, ideas, and approaches, inviting viewers to consider how art responds to both local realities and global dialogues. This year's Bendel Hydes Awardees have sought to both honour our cultural heritage in their work while also embracing new ideas and experimental practices that speak to our evolving cultural identity," says NGCI Director Natalie Urquhart. "Congratulations are extended to each of them, and indeed all of the Biennial artists, for challenging us to look more

closely, think more deeply, and to imagine more expansively about our contemporary moment."

The awards were presented by Hon. Isaac Rankine, Minister for Youth, Sports, Culture & Heritage, and Hon. Julie Hunter, Parliamentary Secretary for Youth, Sports, Culture & Heritage. Remarks and congratulations were extended by Hon. Minister Rankine, along with the Biennial Sponsor Butterfield, represented by Rory Mann, Vice President of Marketing, Mrs Susan A Olde, OBE, National Gallery Chairperson, and Natalie Urquhart, NGCI Director. In addition to the honouring the Awardees, congratulations were extended to each of the 60 participating artists, along with the six Biennial partner venues—the Cayman Islands National Museum, Little Cayman Museum, Cayman Brac Heritage House, Mission House, and Gram Bellas—for their support in making this a dynamic tri-island event.

Archipelago – 4th Cayman Islands Biennial is on view until 18 February. Admission to the Gallery and the exhibitions is free to all. Opening times are Monday to Saturday 10:00am – 5:00pm. As the Biennial enters its final weeks, the public is encouraged to visit the various exhibition sites before the official closing on February 18, 2026.

On Tuesday, February 17, a Catalogue Launch and Biennial Closing Event and will be hosted at the National Gallery when the 160-page exhibition catalogue will be launched. The catalogue is part-supported by a generous grant from CNCF's Grants for the Arts programme, and will be distributed to schools and libraries across the Cayman Islands. In addition, free community programmes run throughout early February. Creative crafters pool talent

When talented artists come together great things are produced. In the case of multi-talented artist Nasaria Suckoo Chollette and her family and friends, it comes in the form of intricate quilting. Following last week's article on Nasaria's participation in the Island Soul Festival where she employed quilting as a holistic process for others to enjoy, we hear more about this fascinating craft.

Nasaria has enjoyed being part of a quilting group called Friends and Needles which allows participants the chance to pool their skills, discuss ideas and create joint projects that are artwork pieces in themselves. The group started four years ago, although Nasaria was not a founding member.

"Friends and Needles started in 2022, and I was not a part of it at that time," she advised. "It was started by Rhonda Edie, my aunt, and involved primarily her church sisters. I decided to start attending shortly after and since then we have been adding members with varying skills."

The participants meet every two weeks and share with each other the traditional skills that they most often practice so that they can all expand their practices, she said.

"For the most part, I share contemporary art aesthetics, encouraging them to break out of the literal interpretations and to express themselves freely," Nasaria explained.

The group undertakes one charitable project per year, where part of the proceeds of sales go to a charity, or they make special Christmas gifts and give to people whom they have encountered during the year who have provided excellent customer service.

"Our aim is to gather as women, to dissect the world around us and to interpret it through our work, as well as to preserve heritage," she said.

Nasaria's Aunt Rhonda has been her guiding force when it came to the craft.

"My aunt has always worked with textiles and fabrics, but it was after her retirement from Edie's Decor five years ago that she began making art using fabric and collage and began to make quilts. Some of her first quilts were made to honour her siblings who had passed away, by using pieces of their clothing in the quilt," Nasaria stated.

Nasaria is often motivated to create a quilt from a story that she wishes to tell, which she shares with the group. They then enjoy choosing materials, planning techniques and critiquing work.

One such piece which is on loan to the Cayman Islands National Museum is entitled Sea Spray and Sailcloth II. This is an evocative piece created by Nasaria, her aunt Rhonda, Celia Hydes, Ina Augustine, Raejani Lopez, Kerry Nixon, Carol A Terry, Dorothea "Cindy" Shaw, and Lorna Reid. It



tells the tales of seafaring of days gone by. Interwoven within the quilting are stories of how fishermen used to set their nets for turtles on the Cays, brave rescues at sea, and the passing on of seafaring skills to youngsters.

Another example of Nasaria's work is a magnificent quilt dedicated to midwifery. "I received a grant from the Cayman Na-

tional Cultural Foundation to collect oral history on midwifery in Cayman and because the stories were so visual, it was a natural process to turn it into a quilt," she explained. "As the quilts are our comforters, so are the midwives."

A quilt is a great way to teach history and preserve heritage stories, Nasaria said.

Currently Nasaria is working on a quilt honouring Elizabeth Jane Trusty, an ex-slaved African woman in Cayman's slavery past, who freed herself and bought freedom for others, and became a homeowner and a businesswoman.

"This is how I do my part to teach our people about their African heritage," she adds.

International Data Protection Day 2026: Know your rights!

On Wednesday, 28 January, the Cayman Islands joined the rest of the world in celebrating International Data Protection Day.

Some Ombudsman office staff members spent part of the day meeting with interested members of the public in front of our offices at Anderson Square, answering questions about data privacy and access rights while also providing some promotional material to visitors. Approximately 100 members of the public stopped by the information booth on Wednesday to learn more about data protection rights.

Cayman’s Data Protection Act (DPA), which came into effect on 30 September 2019, contains important rights for individuals, including the right to be informed about how personal data is being used. Individuals also have the right to request corrections to inaccurate personal data, to object to direct marketing and to request access to their personal data.

The DPA also sets rules for the use of personal data by public and private sector organizations based on eight core principles. Those include fairness, adequacy, retention and security of personal data processing, among other requirements.

The Office of the Ombudsman is tasked with oversight and enforcement of the DPA. Individuals have the right to complain to the Ombudsman if they believe their data is not being processed legally or fairly.

The DPA requires personal data breaches to be reported to the Ombudsman and affected data subjects. The most common data breach notifications involve instances where emails containing personal data have been inadvertently sent to unintended recipients. Individuals who have concerns about how their data is being used by organizations can make a complaint to the Ombudsman for investigation under the DPA.

HSA nurses receive Ruth E. McLaughlin Alumni Excellence Award three years in a row

Christina Blair has been named the 2025 recipient of the Health City Ruth E. McLaughlin Alumni Excellence Award, marking the third year in a row a Health Services Authority (HSA) nurse has been recognised and reaffirming the high nursing standard upheld by the organisation.

This award recognises the outstanding alumni of the Ruth E. McLaughlin School of Nursing at University College of the Cayman Islands (UCCI), celebrating nurses who consistently demonstrate excellence in patient care or nursing administration. Additionally, it acknowledges those who embody the six Cs of nursing: care, compassion, courage, communication, commitment, and competence.

Three nurses from HSA have been consecutively honoured since its inception. They are Gracian Beale in 2023, Martika Williams in 2024, and most recently, Christina Blair for 2025.

Nurse Blair noted that her journey at HSA began in 2019 when she entered the Transition to Practice (TTP) Programme, a 12-month HSA initiative aimed at bridging the gap between academic studies and real-world clinical practice.

"Receiving this award is a deeply meaningful honour that reflects the grace of God and the unwavering support of my leaders, managers, and colleagues. Professionally, it strengthens my commitment to excellence and reaffirms my dedication to serving my community with respect, integrity, and compassion," said Nurse Blair.

"HSA has played an instrumental role in my development, providing exceptional mentorship, guidance, and opportunities that shaped me from a new graduate into a confident and capable nurse," she continued.

Director of Nursing Dr Karen Stewart noted that Nurse Blair's achievement and the three-year streak exemplify HSA's high standards of nursing excellence, which reflects a culture grounded in clinical competence and continuous improvement. "Sustaining this level of performance over time demonstrates strong leadership, adherence to best practices and commitment to quality outcomes."

Receiving the award in 2024 was a defining moment for Martika Williams, who was eight months pregnant with her second child at the time. "It reminded me of my strength, resilience, and purpose as a nurse – qualities that have guided me throughout my seven-year career," she said.

For the HSA's first award recipient, Gracian Beale, now approaching 15 years in nursing, the recognition was an unexpected but deeply meaningful milestone. Both nurses credit the dedicated HSA preceptors who shaped their clinical foundation and entrusted them with leadership opportunities. For Nurse Williams, this included her transition into the Shift Coordinator role, which helped her grow into a more confident, compassionate caregiver. Nurse Beale stepped into the role of Charge Nurse, something she said she "would never imagine doing", but accept-

ing the challenge has strengthened her love and appreciation for the profession.

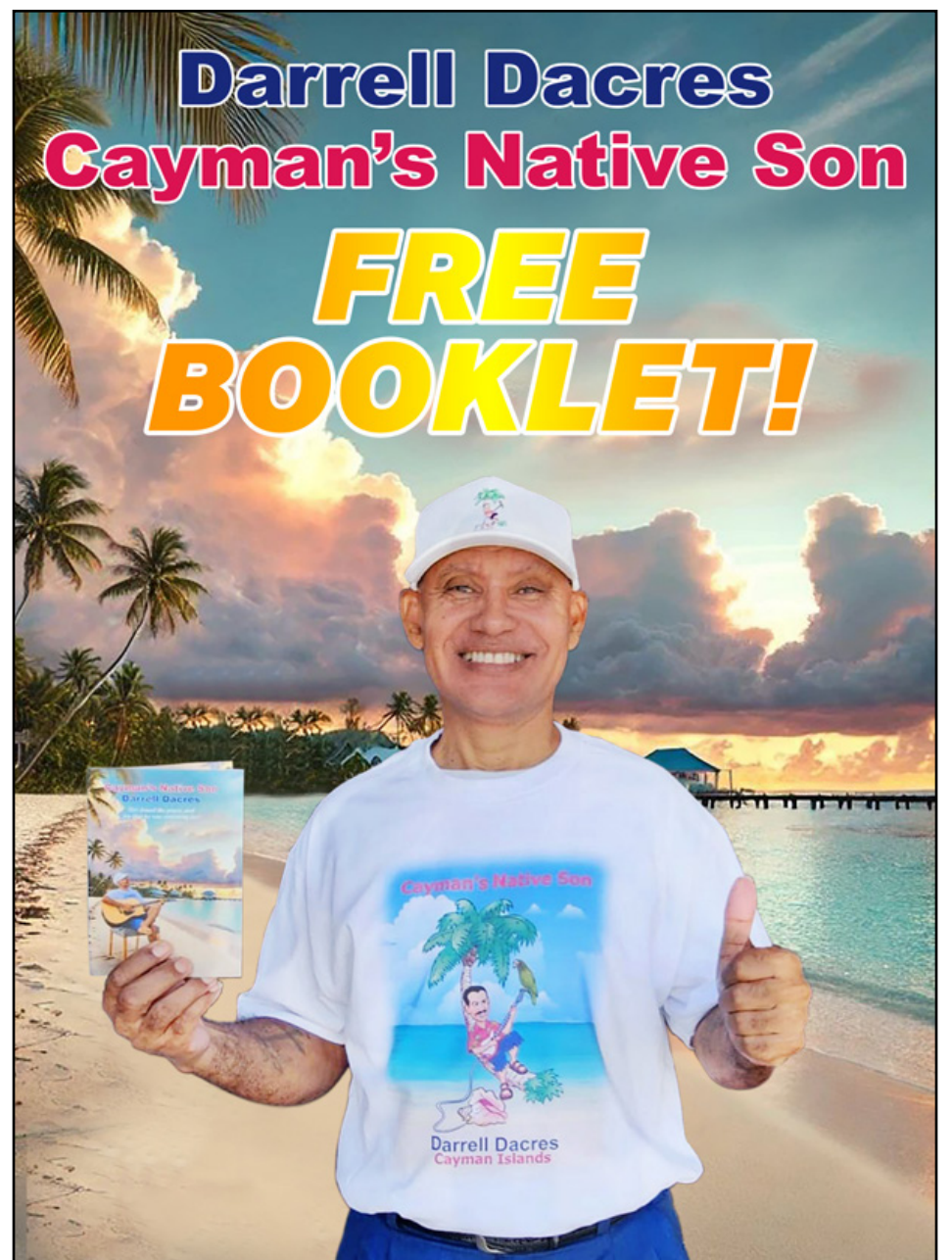
The HSA plays a central role in developing Cayman's next generation of nurses through a strong training pipeline that begins at UCCI, continues through the TTP Programme, and extends into full nursing roles across the Authority. This is further supported by the HSA's partnership with CIFEC, where students complete six- to eight-week Healthcare Aide clinical rotations under the guidance of experienced preceptors.

In 2024, the HSA deepened its investment in local talent through a Memorandum of Understanding with UCCI's Ruth Eleanor McLaughlin School of Nursing, expanding opportunities for students to refine their nursing and procedural knowledge and interpersonal skills.

HSA's Nursing Department has grown in recent years. According to Dr Stewart, this is driven by rising demand for quality care, strengthened leadership structures for greater oversight and clinical operations, improved nurse-to-patient ratios, enhanced regulatory requirements and a robust Clinical Education Department focused on continuous professional development.

These efforts were recognised at the 2025 Chamber of Commerce Business Excellence Awards, where the HSA won both the Training Champion and Youth Education categories.

"Our investment in leadership, education, and workforce development ensures a strong, future-ready nursing team equipped to deliver the highest standard of care to our community," said HSA's CEO Lizzette Yearwood, who herself is a registered nurse.



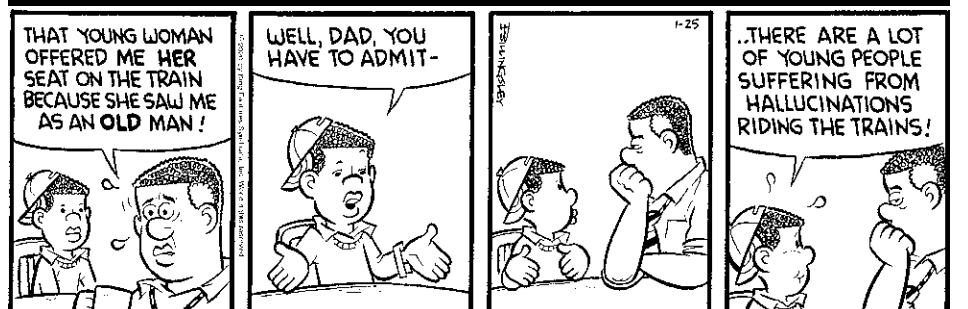

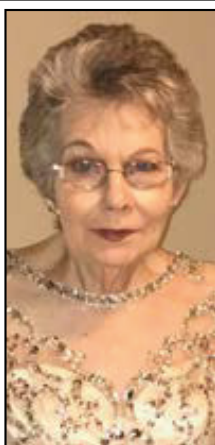
