### GOVERNMENT MODERNISES LITTER LAW

The Ministry of Health, Environment and Sustainability has strengthened the legal framework used to address littering and illegal dumping with the passage of the **Litter (Amendment) Bill, 2026** during the recent sitting of Parliament.

The amendments modernise existing legislation by introducing stronger enforcement measures and clearer powers to address litter offences, supporting cleaner neighbourhoods and helping protect the Cayman Islands' natural environment.

The Minister for Health, Environment and Sustainability, Hon. Katherine

Ebanks-Wilks, also highlighted the important work of the staff of the Department of Environmental Health and expressed her appreciation for their continued service.

*"On behalf of the people of the Cayman Islands, I want to recognise the dedication of the Department of Environmental Health. Their work plays a vital role in maintaining the cleanliness of our communities and protecting our environments,"* she said.



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# BRYAN'S MOTION TO 'UN-MASK' WINS FULL PARLIAMENTARY BACKING

A spirit of cross-party unity that characterised recent sittings of the Cayman Islands Parliament was again demonstrated with the broad support of a motion brought by Hon. Deputy Leader of the Opposition, Kenneth Bryan, to restrict the wearing of face masks in public as an anti-crime measure.

Mr Bryan, who is also the Deputy Leader of the main opposition People's Progressive Movement (PPM/Progressives), said 'masking-up' in public by some persons, regardless of the purpose, has become a cause of anxiety for others.

"I urge my colleagues on both sides of the aisle to support this motion. Let us stand and send a clear message that the Cayman Islands will not be a playground for masked criminals. We will protect our businesses, we will protect our residents, and we will restore the peace that our three islands deserve."

Presenting a Private Member's Motion, he urged the government to legislate against the practice. "Let us give the Royal Cayman Islands Police Service the legislative clarity that they need to challenge someone wearing a full face-mask in high-risk areas without a legitimate reason," the George Town Central MP urged in tabling his motion.

## 'UN-MASK' THE CRIMINALS

The reaction was swift and extensive,

with Government and Opposition members immediately rallying in support while also stressing the need for a balance between fighting crime and upholding individual rights.

Leading off the debate, Hon. Premier Andre Ebanks committed the government to following through with developing the relevant legislation, mindful, he said, of proportionality and human rights considerations.

"We agree with the foundation. We're going to work with the Attorney General's chambers to find a method and a manner in which to do this so that it's not unneces-

sarily challenged. That will include consultation with the opposition."

The Premier also stated, "But at the end of the day, I think that is broad agreement and support. The country is rejecting full face covering, which has some legitimate grounds because we do not feel safe."

Hon. Deputy Premier and Minister for Tourism Gary Ruddy: "This is long overdue... We need not only to make our people feel safe, but also our visitors who come to our shores...It's a very balanced proposal that has been put forward."

Hon. Minister for Planning, Agriculture, Housing and Infrastructure, Jay Ebanks, observed: "This has become a serious problem. It has actually brought crime into the area...What are the fines for this? That is what we need to deep dive into, making sure it's not just another slap on the wrist. We're taking it very seriously."

Hon. Minister for Health, Katherine Ebanks-Wilks, acknowledged that in some instances there would be medical reasons for wearing a face mask. But she also raised the alarm about criminal activity, even in her constituency. "On behalf of the people of West Bay Central, we have been impacted by individuals who come into our constituency with those T-shirts around their faces and choose to rob the little way-side stores."

Hon. Minister for District Administration and Home Affairs, Nikolas DaCosta: "This is a very easy motion for me to support, as the Premier said, especially observing the emerging and constant behaviour of full-face coverings around this country. It's unacceptable." Pointing out that his Ministry of Home Affairs has made significant investments into CCTV systems for public safety, Mr DaCosta said, "All of that money goes to waste if we can't even identify

who's frolicking and gallivanting around the streets."

Hon. Minister for Social Development and Youth, Isaac Rankine, spoke of a direct link between some mask-wearing and crime. "We have seen this build-up, and there is obviously a direct link to mask-wearing and the increase in crimes that we've seen around the country."

Hon. Parliamentary Secretary Julie Hunter noted that in many instances, the wearing of face masks is at best suspect. "I would say that a lot of people who walk around with face coverings are not doing it just for the sake of having on a face covering, but most times you associate that with something wrong that they want to do...and to cover up something that they've done that is not acceptable."

Hon. Minister of Finance and Education, Rolston Anglin, appealed for broad deliberation in putting the legislation to ensure that it also safeguards individual rights. However, he added: "We don't need anyone to tell us there is a definitive connection in masking up to commit crimes, certainly in fashions that otherwise would not have even been attempted...This not only poses a huge public risk. As has been mentioned, this is a culture that we want to stamp out."

Hon. Independent MP for Bodden Town West, Chris Saunders, made this observation: "There are certain things that are very Caymanian, and there are some things that are un-Caymanian...And the minute we start seeing these things chip away, at some point, it becomes the norm. And this is one of the things that should never become the norm."

The motion was unanimously adopted and will now go to the Government to begin the process of consultation and drafting the legislation.



# GOVERNMENT MODERNISES LITTER LAW WITH PASSAGE OF LITTER (AMENDMENT) BILL, 2026

The Minister noted that the amendments also reflect the values traditionally associated with Caymanian culture and community pride.

*“These changes reinforce in law, the same standard of civic pride that earlier generations of Caymanians were known for, ensuring that Cayman Islands continues to maintain the clean and green standard that we value so highly.”*

Key changes introduced through the amendments include:

- Increasing penalties for littering and related offences to strengthen deterrence.
- Empowering Police Constables and Environmental Health Officers to issue fines for litter offences.
- Enabling Cabinet to introduce regulations establishing an administrative penalty system for certain offences.
- Strengthening provisions that allow authorities to address derelict vehicles as a form of litter, including powers to require their removal.


The Bill was debated in Parliament and further refined during the Committee stage, where amendments were introduced following feedback from Opposition members and the public. Minister Ebanks-Wilks said the process helped strengthen the final legislation and welcomed the unanimous support of the Bill received.

*“The feedback received during public consultation and the parliamentary process helped improve the Bill and ensure the final legislation reflects practical considerations for enforcement and community standards. The collaboration between the Government and the Opposition demonstrates how important these legislative changes are for the entire Cayman Islands.”*

Acting Chief Officer in the Ministry of Health, Environment and Sustainability, Exie Tomlinson-Panton, also recognised the work of the Ministry team and public officers who supported the development of the amendments.

*“I would like to recognise the dedication of the Ministry team and the many public officers who contributed their expertise throughout this process. Their work helped ensure these legislative improvements were carefully developed and brought forward in a way that will benefit the Cayman Islands.”*

The Ministry will work with relevant departments and agencies to support the implementation of the amendments. Copies of the Act will be made available on the Cayman Islands legislation website following assent.


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# Uncharted 2026: Cayman Charts a New Path Toward True Inclusion

Hotel Indigo was buzzing with purpose on Saturday, 14 March, as more than 200 people gathered for Uncharted 2026, the inaugural family conference hosted by Inclusion Cayman. From the moment breakfast plates clinked and name tags were pinned on, it was clear this was not a typical conference. It was a community stepping forward together — families, educators, policymakers, business leaders — all ready to reimagine what inclusion in Cayman can and should look like.

Grounded firmly in the social model of disability, the event challenged attendees to shift their focus from individual impairments to the systems, environments, and attitudes that shape access and opportunity. The message was simple but transformative: inclusion is not about “fixing” people — it’s about fixing the systems around the, so that they are included without question, and by default.

## Leadership Signals a New National Commitment

Master of Ceremonies Tobi Brennan opened the morning, followed by a series of welcome remarks that underscored the national significance of the day. Inclusion Cayman CEO Shan Harriman spoke about the organisation’s mission to ensure that people with disabilities are fully included

in every aspect of Caymanian life — education, recreation, employment, and community.

Government leaders echoed that commitment. Premier Hon. André Ebanks, Minister Rolston Anglin, and Minister Isaac Rankine each emphasised that inclusion must be woven into the fabric of public policy. During an interview, Minister Anglin drew on his own experience helping members of his own family and people who he knew, before reaffirming both his, and the Government’s ongoing commitment: ‘We as a community

care for those who are disadvantaged — differently enabled, those who are vulnerable. The work Inclusion Cayman is doing has to be supported by government if we are to be truly inclusive in everything we do.’

For many families, these remark like this from members of the Government carried real weight. Rohan Bromfield, whose 13 year old son Jordan was born with Down syndrome, said hearing the Premier share a personal story about the challenges which had arisen in his own family, made the government’s commitment feel genuine. “It showed how early intervention and the right resources can change everything,” he said. Reflecting on his own journey, he added: “We’ve navigated these waters for 13 years, always looking for the next best opportunity Jordan can integrate into.”

It was a story that must have been echoed a hundred time in the hearts of parents, teachers and guardians throughout the morning. The will to help and nurture is natural, but its often difficult to navigate the right path at the right time, and events like the connections, the help that is needed.

## Keynote: The Pease Brothers Bring Inspiration and Proof of Possibility

The morning’s keynote address came from Kyle and Brent Pease, internationally recognised for their work in inclusive athletics. Brent competes in endurance events while pushing Kyle in a specially designed racing chair — a partnership that has taken them all the way to the Ironman World Championship.

Meeting them in person, you feel the force of their message: inclusion is not theoretical. It is lived, practiced, and made real when communities remove barriers and open doors. Their story set the emotional tone for the day — a reminder that people with disabilities belong not on the sidelines, but at the centre of community life.

## Relationships, Employment, and the Human Side of Inclusion

Cary Ombres and Leslie Bromfield explored Best Buddies – a wonderful programme now being rolled out across Cayman, where children become not just

helpers, but buddies of other children with special needs. Leslie Bromfield explored friendships, relationships, and social skills — areas often overlooked in policy discussions but central to belonging. Their message was clear: inclusion is not only about access; it is about connection.

The employment panel that followed brought the conversation into the workplace. Caron Murphy of A. L. Thompson's, Keisha Powery Roberts of Conyers, and Leif Edwards Best of Dart shared practical strategies for building inclusive hiring practices. Central to all the discussions throughout the day was the concept that inclusive employment is not charity — it strengthens workplaces and communities alike.

## Afternoon Workshops: Tools for Real World Change

The afternoon breakouts gave families and professionals hands on tools to navigate systems that can feel overwhelming. Sessions ranged from sustainable advocacy and turning assessments into actionable support, to long term planning, the Disabilities Act, and the role of technology and AI in inclusive learning environments. A sensory processing workshop offered practical insights for everyday life.

Across all sessions, the theme remained constant: people with disabilities must be brought fully into the mainstream of

Caymanian life — not separated, not sidelined, but included in education, recreation, employment, and community.

## A Day That Moved the Needle

By the end of the day, Uncharted 2026

had done more than deliver information. It created a shared space where families, professionals, and policymakers could learn from one another as equals. It left attendees inspired, informed, and ready to push for systems

that reflect Cayman's values of care, dignity, and belonging.

Inclusion Cayman's message rang through every session: when we design systems with intention and empathy, everyone benefits.

# Explore Cayman's oldest surviving public building

The Cayman Islands National Museum is packed full of information, exhibits and education on every aspect of Cayman's history, but there is, arguably, no part of the museum that is more interesting than the Old Courts Building itself, the actual home of the museum. Currently, the museum has a new exhibition dedicated to exploring its own fascinating history, as the oldest surviving public building in the Cayman Islands.

Brian Watler, The National Museum's Communications Manager, said the timing for the exhibition came about as it was part of the museum's 35th anniversary programming and they had wanted an exhibition that told the story of the Old Courts Building, where the museum is presently housed.

The exhibition chronicles the history of the Old Courts Building, from its beginnings as a courthouse to its various uses over the years, such as a bank, library, schoolroom, dance hall, church, government offices, post office, and so on, he explained.

Mr Watler detailed why the building is so iconic:

*"Built in the 1830s along the George Town waterfront, the Old Courts Building stands as one of the Cayman Islands' few surviving nineteenth century structures. For more than 180 years it has endured hurricanes, Nor'westers, salt air, and time itself,"* he said. *"Long before a lighthouse marked the harbour, the building played a vital role in navigation: each evening a lantern was hoisted on the flagpole to guide returning turtles and seamen safely home. approaching by sea, the sight of the Old Courts Building signalled land, safety, and community."*

Located at the historic centre of George Town, the Old Courts Building housed the first Post Office, the earliest Commissioner's Offices, and the first purpose built Courthouse.

Through artworks, architectural drawings, and detailed models, visitors can discover how this landmark has evolved over time. Featuring works by several local artists, the exhibition highlights the building's lasting presence on the waterfront and its important role in preserving and sharing Cayman's heritage.

Visitors can enjoy this exhibition Monday to Friday from 9am to 5pm and on Saturdays from 10am to 5pm. Make sure you take time to appreciate all that the museum has to offer, at least 45 minutes to an hour, and, in particular, do not miss the 20 minute introductory video.

The Old Courts Building exhibition will be on through May 2026 and there are also guided tours available by appointment.

# The Expatriate Conundrum

In this article, we move on to chapter four of Bodden's most recent work, **Deconstructing Development: Immigration, Society and Economy in Early 21st Century Cayman**. Readers should know that this is a series which looks at the work of local intellectuals urging us to read their books and contribute to the conversation. In this chapter, Bodden's 'conundrum' means that expatriates are needed, in fact, essential for economic development, but at the same time they create inequality and social tension. These are two distinct realities, and this is what causes the 'conundrum'. This chapter argues that expatriates in Cayman play an important but complicated role. On one hand, they contribute greatly to the country's economic growth. On the other hand, their presence can also create inequality, social tension, and questions about who truly belongs. This creates a situation that is difficult to resolve, with both benefits and challenges existing at the same time.

## Bodden's Perspective on What It Means to Be an Expatriate in Cayman

A key focus of this chapter is the meaning and use of the term "expatriate" in Caymanian society. Bodden says that this is not a 'neutral' label, but that it reflects deeper issues related to race, class, and the legacy of colonialism and that in everyday practice it is most often used to describe white migrants from developed countries such as the United Kingdom, the United States, and Canada. By contrast, migrants from the Caribbean, Asia, and other regions are usually identified by their nationality rather than being described as expatriates.

This distinction, he believes, is significant because it points to an underlying social ranking within the society. The label "expatriate" is often associated with higher status, greater economic opportunity, and increased social influence. The chapter says that these differences are not based on ability or contribution but are shaped by historical patterns of privilege that continue to influence how people are perceived and treated.

Put simply, Bodden's view is that in Cayman, being an expatriate, the legal status apart, it often comes with higher social standing and influence. Even when individuals may not have held such advantages in their home countries, they are often seen as more important or capable. The chapter suggests that expatriates can sometimes reflect old colonial patterns. This may include acting as though their culture is superior, overlooking the abilities of Caymanians, keeping their distance socially, and presenting themselves as key to the country's success while downplaying local contributions.

At the same time, expatriates often ben-

efit from clear advantages, he says, better access to jobs, support through their networks, greater opportunities to own property and build wealth, and influence in important decisions. In short, being an expatriate in Cayman, Bodden maintains, often brings both real advantages and a position of power within society.

## The Expatriate Conundrum

For many Caymanians, the presence of expatriates has contributed to what can best be described as a "state of flux", in Bodden's view. This situation is shaped by pressure coming from two directions. On one hand, Caymanians face competition from expatriates who often dominate high-skilled and high-income sectors. On the other, they compete with lower-wage migrant labour in other parts of the economy. As a result, many Caymanians feel economically squeezed within their own society, encountering barriers to advancement in sectors that are increasingly influenced by foreign expertise and capital.

This pressure is intensified by several factors, including large-scale land acquisition by foreign investors, perceived alliances between expatriate capital and po-

litical actors, and the underrepresentation of Caymanians in highly profitable industries such as real estate. Over time, these developments have contributed to a growing sense of dispossession and marginalisation, particularly among the Caymanian middle class, along with concerns about loss of control over the country's economic and social direction.

At the same time, the issue of expatriates is not straightforward. It is best understood as a "conundrum" because it reflects a deep and unresolved paradox. On one hand, expatriates have played a vital role in the development of the Cayman Islands. They have contributed significantly to the growth of the financial services sector, supported the expansion of tourism, and provided important technical expertise and professional skills. Though it was Caymanian seamen who first exposed Cayman to the forces of globalization, and laid the early economic foundations, expatriates in their role forms part of the broader story of Cayman's economic success, the chapter argues.

On the other hand, the presence of expatriates is also associated with a number of challenges. These include economic dominance in key sectors, the exclusion of locals from certain opportunities, perceptions of cultural insensitivity or arrogance, and the reinforcement of existing racial and class hierarchies. There are also concerns about the impact on social cohesion and national identity. This creates a difficult paradox: Caymanian society depends on expatriates for its continued prosperity, yet at the same time experiences tension and unease about the inequalities and social changes that accompany their presence.

The situation is further complicated by the fact that expatriates themselves often experience uncertainty and ambivalence. Many lack long-term security or permanent status and continue to maintain strong emotional and financial ties to their home countries. As a result, they may be hesitant to fully integrate into Caymanian society and often live with a sense of being "in between", neither fully settled nor entirely temporary. This creates a condition in which expatriates can be economically powerful and influential yet socially de-

tached and without a strong sense of belonging.

At the same time, Caymanians occupy a similarly complex position. They are the hosts in their own country, yet do not always feel fully in control of its economic and social trajectory. While they benefit from the development that expatriates help to drive, they may also experience some of its negative consequences. The result is a degree of mutual distance and misunderstanding between the two groups, shaped by cultural differences, limited knowledge of each other's histories, and the absence of a shared narrative about identity and belonging.

## Toward Resolving the Conundrum

The chapter suggests that ultimately this conundrum cannot be resolved through economic policy alone. It requires attention to ethics and how the groups resolve to work together. Greater emphasis must be placed on reciprocity, Bodden insists, mutual respect and fairness, along with recognition of the contributions made by both Caymanians and expatriates. If expatriates benefit from Cayman's economy → they should respect the culture and contribute positively and if Caymanians benefit from expatriate expertise → they should also engage fairly and constructively.

Efforts must be made to reduce prejudice and stereotyping, as well as to promote more inclusive and balanced approaches to development, are also essential, are recommendations emerging from Bodden's analysis.

Importantly, the chapter acknowledges that the situation is not simply one of opposition. Not all expatriates are dismissive or exploitative, and not all Caymanians are resistant or exclusionary. Rather, the relationship is complex, fragile, and evolving. Its future will depend on deliberate efforts to build understanding, trust, and a more equitable foundation for coexistence.

This is undoubtedly a significant chapter in the book, addressing a subject that is both complex and sensitive. There is indeed much to unpack, though a more detailed examination must be reserved for another time.

- (c) no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed by a court outside the Cayman Islands other than a sentence on conviction of an offence constituted by conduct which, if it occurred within the Cayman Islands, would constitute an offence punishable under the law of the Cayman Islands by imprisonment of twelve months or any greater punishment.
- (d) A revised list containing the names, street address and occupation of all persons qualified to vote in the said district—
- whose names appear in the current Register of Electors; or
  - who have submitted to the registration officer a duly completed and signed application for registration in Form 4 will be available at the Elections Office in George Town, the District Administration Office in Cayman Brac and the Post Office in Little Cayman for a period of twenty-one days beginning on the **17th day of April, 2026**.

- any post office or sub-post office;
  - the registering office for any electoral district; or
  - the Elections Office



# Arteta: We're Gunner do it!

Arsenal are still on course for a historic quadruple after seeing off Bayer Leverkusen on Tuesday night.

The Gunners booked their place in the quarter-finals of the Champions League after beating the German side 2-0 at the Emirates, winning their round of 16 tie

3-1 on aggregate.

Eberechi Eze scored a fantastic opener before hobbling off in the second half with an ankle injury. Buoyant Eze insisted he will be okay to play in Sunday's EFL Cup final against Manchester City.

Mikel Arteta's side will face Sporting Lisbon in the quarter-finals, and are heavily favoured against the Portuguese side. Should the Londoners beat Sporting, they will face either Barcelona or Atletico Madrid in the semi-final.

Arsenal have already beaten Atletico

this season, though Barca could be challenging. The Catalans have looked vulnerable defensively, so if the Gunners can use the pace of stars like Gabriel Martinelli, they stand a strong chance of reaching the Champions League final.

Liverpool have come closest of any English team in achieve the quadruple, but they fell short in both the Premier League and Champions League in 2021-22.

The Gunners are favourites for Sunday's game while they also boast a nine-point lead in the Premier League over City whose form has been erratic recently. Arsenal are chasing their first Premiership title in 22 years.

Arsenal will face Southampton the quarter-final of the FA Cup, and while they will still have to navigate two more rounds after the last eight, they have the quality and depth needed to go all the way.

The Champions League is inherently unpredictable, but the Gunners, along with Bayern Munich, Barcelona, Real Madrid, holders PSG - who blew Chelsea away on 8-2 aggregate - are amongst the competition's favourites.

An upbeat Arteta is hoping that Jurrien Timber and Arsenal captain Martin Odegaard will pass fitness tests ahead of the trip to Wembley after both were ruled out of the second leg against Leverkusen. However, Mikel Merino remains a long-term absentee.

## Sammy remains as Windies coach despite T20 shortfall

West Indies head coach Daren Sammy's job is safe. For the time being. Despite admitting he is disappointed after the West Indies failed to win the recent ICC Men's T20 World Cup, Cricket West Indies president Dr Kishore Shallow said that there is no immediate intention to fire Sammy.

The West Indies were seeking to win their first title in 10 years and third overall, but were eliminated at the Super Eights phase of the competition for the second successive T20 World Cup.

While Sammy's future as all-formats head coach has been frequently questioned, Dr Shallow said a decision would likely not be made until after his contract

expires after the ICC Cricket World Cup in 2027. St Lucian Sammy, 42, is a former West Indies captain.

Dr Shallow said: "Ultimately we didn't go to the World Cup to reach the Super Eights. However, we showed some improvements in all areas; we won five out of seven matches, and the matches that we won we did so convincingly, and barring the one game against South Africa, we really competed.

"So, it was a credible performance, but still we wanted to win, and I suspect that if you speak to Sammy, Shai Hope or any other member of the team, they would tell you that they're disappointed that we didn't win. There's work to be done."

## Rousey back in MMA hoping new company can rival UFC

Most Valuable Promotions (MVP) is gearing up for a major surge in combat sports activity, featuring high-profile boxing and MMA events, particularly showcasing women's boxing and a blockbuster Netflix MMA card.

There are low-key shows scheduled for next month in London and New York before the first major one at the Intuit Dome, Los Angeles on May 16.

Nate Diaz will be returning to MMA against fellow UFC alum 'Platinum' Mike Perry on the undercard to Ronda Rousey-Gina Carano. Rousey, 39, left the UFC after initially dominating then losing her last two bouts badly. She turned to wrestling and is now back to MMA.

Prior to the announcement on Monday, MVP's first MMA event was due to be headlined by the Rousey-Carano fight and co-headlined by the return of Francis Ngannou against Philippe Lins. But as the card continues to expand MVP has added a contest between two fighters who cut their




