On Sunday, 29 March 2026, the Cayman Islands Government (CIG) will be launching the national movement challenge Move it Cayman. Spearheaded by the Ministry of Health, Environment and Sustainability (MHES), Move it Cayman – the first initiative under the Step into Wellness campaign – aims to get the nation moving, one step at a time, to safeguard overall health and wellbeing.

“The STEPS 2023 National Health Survey gave us invaluable information about the health of our nation,” explains Chief Nursing Officer, Mrs. Felicia McLean. “We know what the risk factors for non-communicable diseases (NCDs) are for

Only authorised CUC employees or contractors are permitted to install, remove or otherwise work on the Company's utility poles.

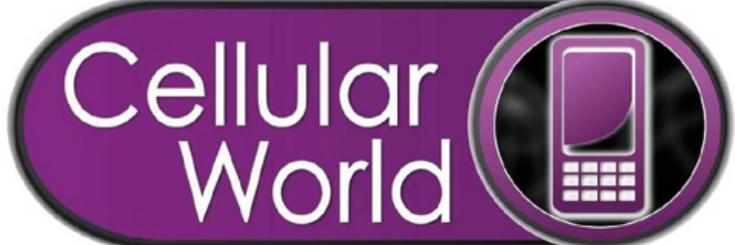

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THE LOCAL COSTS OF A FAR AWAY WAR

As the Iran war engulfs the Middle East, Cayman is bracing for the interim and long-term impact on fuel prices and the wider cost of living. With constantly shifting messaging muddying what and when a resolution to the conflict might be likely, there are already some initial indications of the effects locally.

A review of the fuel prices on the website of the Utility Regulation and Competition Office (OfReg) shows a marked difference in prices across comparing this past January and February to March. Fuel prices tend to be higher on Little Cayman due to shipping costs and other factors.

The regulator recently moved swiftly to shut down a viral WhatsApp rumour suggesting up to CI\$7.00 was being charged for regular petrol at unnamed outlets in Grand Cayman. That's well in excess of the officially published price of between CI\$4.93 and CI\$5.32 (current at 25/3/26).

On its website, OfReg "encourages the public to call 946-4282 or email us at fuels@ofreg.ky to advise if any of the fuel prices at the retail fuel outlets are different from the prices provided".

GLOBAL MITIGATION MEASURES TO 'COMBAT' THE MILITARY EFFECTS

The ongoing uncertainties in the global energy market are expected to persist, continuing to impact the cost of living worldwide.

Several governments are already taking contingency steps to mitigate the impact on their citizens.

In the UK this week, the Chancellor of the Exchequer (Minister of Finance) Rachel Reeves, said in a statement to Parliament that she was considering reducing tariffs on food to keep prices down. She also announced that she would be meeting with banks and supermarkets to "discuss how they can further support their customers". The Chancellor also said the British government will "monitor the cost of household essentials for both price rises and disruption" and will "crack down on price gouging".

Elsewhere, more drastic measures are being taken, given the severity of the fallout from the Iran/Israel/US war that's already ensnaring other Gulf states and having effects further afield.

In the Philippines, which imports almost all of its oil from the Gulf, the government this week became the first to declare 'an energy emergency' after local diesel and petrol prices more than doubled since the war broke out on February 28th.

In the Caribbean, which imports most of its oil and other products from the United States, Sir Ron Sanders - Antigua and Barbuda's Ambassador to the United States, issued this statement to the region: "As American producers face higher fuel, fertiliser, logistics, and financing costs, those increases are passed on in the prices of exports to the Caribbean. Our region is therefore not only directly exposed to world oil and freight markets; it is also importing US embedded costs in the form of more expensive food, manufactured goods, and inputs."

Meanwhile, at the Arthur Lok Jack Global School of Business at the University of the West Indies in Trinidad and Tobago, Mariano Browne, the institute's Chief Executive Officer, made a sombre warning, especially to tourism-dependent Caribbean states. "When airfares and hotel prices rise due to higher fuel costs or inflation reduces the disposable incomes of potential visitors, tourism declines everywhere."

CAYMAN'S CONCERNS

As Cayman continues to assess the situation, early indications are that the knock-on effects locally could be significant with implications for the rate of inflation and the consequential impacts on the cost of living.

Just-released data from the Economics and Statistics Office (ESO) shows that the annual rate of inflation for 2025 was 1.3 per cent, the lowest rate since 2020 when it was 1.0 per cent. Since then, the annual rate of inflation has been increasing, peaking at 9.5 per cent in 2022 (the highest rate since 2010). While it has been decreasing over the past three years, the impact of the Iran war is likely to change that to an upward trend.

Caymanian Times reached out to the Caribbean Utilities Company (CUC) for its guidance to help consumers cope. The utilities provider said: "CUC's largest generating units operate on diesel, which means the company is closely tied to global fuel price movements. Although CUC does not source fuel directly from Middle Eastern producers, the region's production decisions and geopolitical stability play a major role in shaping the global crude market that ultimately drives the cost of refined diesel. Because of this, fuel prices in Cayman tend to move in step with broader international market trends. Increased costs will impact customers' electricity bills, and we will do our best to keep customers informed. We post fuel rates that will impact electricity bills on our social media channels and on our website monthly. We would ask customers to closely monitor those updates."

Asked by Caymanian Times, "What can residents do to mitigate any increase in Electricity costs?", CUC offered the following advice:

"CUC continues to encourage customers to actively monitor their energy consumption, particularly as we enter the hottest months of the year when electricity usage typically increases. Customers can track their daily energy use through the MyCUC online portal, and each customer also receives a mid-month consumption report to help them stay informed and manage their usage more effectively.

With air conditioning being the largest contributor to energy consumption in the Cayman Islands, we highly recommend that customers revisit their usage patterns, especially when no one is home.

Utilising a smart thermostat to increase air conditioning temperatures when the



property is uninhabited and setting the smart thermostat to cool the property 30 minutes prior to occupants arrival is recommended. CUC recommends 78 degrees Fahrenheit for properties when occupied and 87 degrees Fahrenheit or higher for an unoccupied property.

Using these tools empowers customers to make informed decisions about their energy habits.

CUC also said additional energy-saving tips and resources are available on the CUC website and across our social media channels.

ChatGPT Is Not Your Business Risk. Using It Wrong Is

Your employees are already using ChatGPT. The question is whether you know about it.

ChatGPT launched in November 2022 and hit 100 million users within two months. Alongside alternatives like Claude and Gemini, these tools have become as common as Google Search. People use them to draft emails, summarise articles, and get quick answers to everyday questions.

On the business side, your staff are using these same tools to rewrite proposals, run calculations, and draft client communications. Some on company devices. Many on their phones during lunch. Whether your business has acknowledged this or not, AI is already inside your operations.

The real risks

The risk is not that AI exists. The risk is that it is being used without guardrails.

Data leakage. With many free-tier AI tools, you cannot verify how your data is handled once you submit it. When an employee pastes a client's financial statement or customer personal information into a free chatbot, that data may leave your control entirely. In a jurisdiction like Cayman, where robust data protection legislation is in place and confidentiality underpins entire industries, this is not a theoretical concern.

Hallucination. AI tools will confidently give you wrong answers. They are designed to produce a response, and when they do not have the right one, they will fabricate something convincing. The technology does not carry the liability. You do.

Over-reliance. Using a draft email from ChatGPT as a starting point is sensible. Sending it to a client without reading it is reckless. The same applies to reports, analysis, and any work product that carries your business's name.

Restriction is not the answer

Some businesses have responded by banning AI tools entirely. That creates its own problems. Your competitors are not banning them. An outright ban pushes usage underground, onto personal devices where you have even less visibility. You risk frustrating your best people, the ones who want to work smarter.

If you have not said anything about AI usage, you have implicitly allowed everything. No policy means no protection.

What to do instead

You may already have policies for email use and social media conduct. An AI usage policy follows the same logic. Start with three things:

Define what data is off-limits. Client data, internal financials, and personal information should never go into a consumer AI tool.

Approve specific tools. Enterprise-grade tools with privacy commitments are fundamentally different from free chatbots. Decide which your team can use for work.

Require human review. No AI-generated

output should reach a client, a regulator, or the public without a human checking it first.

Training matters just as much as the policy itself. In my experience, providing training alongside policy gives employees the guidance they need but also the confidence to know that their usage of AI is allowed and encouraged. A one-hour team session on the risks of hallucination, data handling, and appropriate use cases in the workplace goes further than a five-page document nobody reads.

The real competitive risk

The biggest risk facing Cayman businesses is not using AI wrong. It is watching your competitors use it well while you do nothing. The businesses that train their teams and build sensible policies now will be measurably ahead within a year. The ones waiting for perfect clarity will be playing catch-up.

The technology is not slowing down. Your response to it should not either.

those of us who live here in Cayman. Now that we have the information, we have to act on it. This is where the Step into Wellness campaign comes into play.”

Step into Wellness is a national awareness and education campaign that aims to empower individuals to prevent or mitigate the impact of NCDs on their own health. Step into Wellness focuses on four key areas:

- **Movement:** Physical activity contributes to prevention and management of NCDs such as cardiovascular disease, cancer and diabetes. It also reduces symptoms of depression and anxiety, enhances brain health, and can improve overall wellbeing.

- **Nourishment:** Consuming a healthy diet throughout the course of one's life helps to prevent malnutrition in all its forms as well as a range of NCDs and conditions.

- **Mindfulness:** Mental health is a state of mental wellbeing that enables people to cope with the stresses of life, realise their abilities, learn well and work well, and contribute to their community. It has intrinsic and instrumental value and is integral to our well-being.

- **Knowledge:** Understanding one's body and its functions is crucial for maintaining good health. This knowledge, known as body awareness, helps us recognise and respond to our body's signals. When coupled with health literacy - the ability to understand and use information and services to inform health-related decisions and actions - we can make informed decisions about your wellbeing.

“The STEPS survey results were quite eye-opening,” explains Hon. Katherine Ebanks-Wilks, Minister of Health, Environment and Sustainability. “While my Ministry and the Public Health Department certainly have our work cut out for us, the reality is that health does not exist in a vacuum. The social determinants of health, meaning our neighbourhoods, our employers, education facilities and access to green spaces, all play a significant role on the state of our health. I am happy to be a part of a government that understands this, and that so many of my colleagues have joined us in this endeavour to make this a truly national campaign.”

Move it Cayman is a collaborative effort between MHES and the Ministries of Youth, Sports, Culture and Heritage, Education and Training, District Administration and Home Affairs, as well as the Cabinet Office and the Offices of the Premier and the Deputy Governor.

“Move it Cayman is an excellent example of what we can achieve when we work together to support the health and well-being of our people,” adds Premier the Hon. André Ebanks. “It's encouraging to see Ministries, the Civil Service and our wider community coming together around such a positive initiative. I would encourage everyone to lean in, get involved, get moving and enjoy being part of a national effort to build a healthier Cayman. Let's move it!”

Move it Cayman is the first of a series of planned projects and initiatives that will make up the Step into Wellness campaign. The goal is simple: to help individuals increase their movement no matter what level of activity they currently partake in.

by encouraging students to make movement part of their daily lives. I encourage our Ministry, Department and schools to take part and support this national effort to prioritise health and well-being.”

The MHES team has also engaged stakeholders in the public, private and NPO sectors for collaboration and to join forces in making more opportunities for movement available to the community during the challenge. “We want as many people to join this challenge as possible. Businesses that have employee wellness programmes, or that are interested in getting staff more active, are invited to get in touch with us and share their goals for the challenge,” adds Mrs. McLean. “We will be launching a community calendar of both free and discounted events across all three islands that will help residents see what is on offer throughout the three months. We will also be engaging with participants via social media throughout the event and will be offering opportunities for both individuals and groups to enter to win fun prizes.”

“What began in 1976 with seven civil servants contributing CI\$5 each has grown into a strong cooperative serving nearly 21,000 members across the Cayman Islands,” Mr. Hurlston said. “Our story is a testament to the power of cooperation and the belief that when people come together to support one another, communities thrive.”

Chief Executive Officer, Ms. Patricia Estwick, noted that the milestone reflects the collective commitment of generations of members, volunteers, and staff.

“For five decades, our Credit Union has remained grounded in the simple but powerful principle of members helping members,” she said. “Every achievement we celebrate today is the result of the trust our members have placed in us and the dedication of those who have served the organisation over the years.”

Founded in 1976, the Credit Union began with a group of seven civil servants who pooled CI\$35 in contributions to establish a financial cooperative built on shared ownership and mutual support. These pioneers were Mr. Gilbert McLean, Mr. Louis Moncrieffe, Mr. John (Lemuel) Hurlston, Mr. Colford Scott, Mr. Ray Miller, Ms. Rachael Ebanks, and Mr. George McCarthy.

Today, the Credit Union has grown into one of the Cayman Islands’ main lending institutions and the only locally owned financial institution, with over CI\$705 million in assets, CI\$518 million in loans issued, and a membership of nearly 21,000 individuals across the islands.

Beyond providing financial services, the Credit Union has also invested significantly in community development. Over the years, more than CI\$3 million has been directed toward education, supporting grants, youth initiatives, and financial literacy programmes that help empower future generations.

During the ceremony, guests reflected on the Credit Union’s role in helping Caymanians achieve important life milestones, from purchasing homes and financing education, to building financial stability for their families.

The Chairman of the Board, Ryan Rajkumarsingh, said, “As we celebrate this golden anniversary, we are reminded that the strength of the Credit Union is not defined solely by its financial performance, but by the community it serves and the opportunities it creates for its members.”

Expect more than a standard art exhibition.

“At Gram Bella’s, we refer to our exhibitions as “dialogues”. This terminology reflects our focus on the active communication between the artist, the artwork, and the audience. These creative dialogues are intended to foster broader community conversations regarding stewardship and our shared environment,” Kerri-Anne said.

She furthered that Kerwin’s collection was a “living project”.

“As he continues his efforts to clean local beaches, his supply of materials—and the works themselves—constantly expands. This showcase features 2D and 3D works crafted from discarded items like “ghost” fishing nets, HDPE plastics, and grocery store paper bags, reimagined into intricate mosaics and sculptures,” she said.

The showcase is accessible to the public 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Those arriving after sunset are invited to use the light switches located on the wall to illuminate the space, and to kindly turn them off on departure.

Gram Bella’s is located in North Side on Rum Point Drive, conveniently situated near Chisholm’s Grocery.

The showcase features a robust schedule of interactive events designed to bring the conversation deeper into the community, beginning with the opening on 1 April. This is followed on 4 April with a community art activity at 3pm followed by a ‘meet the artist’ evening. On 18 April at 8am there will be a beach clean-up at the shore across from Gram Bella’s, followed immediately by a ‘makery session’ using the items collected. From 22-24 April Earth Week school field trips will take place (requested through manavelins@gmail.com). On 22 April, Earth Day, an ‘Illuminate The Earth’ event will take place, with green lighting switched on. On 25 April at 6pm there will be a panel dialogue featuring government officials, artists, activists, and community members to discuss the intersections of art and environmental policy and on 16 May at 6pm there will be a film screening related to environmental themes. On 30 May from 9am there will be Cayman Art Week East bus tours (registration required at caymanartweek.com). On 13 June at 6pm there will be a film screening related to environmental themes, and finally, on 27 June from 6pm there will be a closing party.

North Side’s artistic project pace, Gram Bella’s, is presenting a new showcase opening 1st April, by multidisciplinary artist Kerwin G. Ebanks. The showcase is called ‘Manavelins 4’ and marks the fourth iteration of Kerwin’s evolving body of work, now expanded with new pieces.

Kerwin G. Ebanks is a Caymanian artist whose work explores human impact on natural resources. His practice highlights critical issues such as pollution, overfishing, and the evolving politics of beach access using found objects, mixed media, painting and sculpture.

Cultural Practitioner Kerri-Anne Chisholm, who runs Gram Bella’s - a unique entity that fosters artistic exploration and community engagement through contemporary art and multidisciplinary showcases - explained that “Manavelins,” is a 19th-century nautical slang term referring to miscellaneous odds and ends, scraps of food, or extra gear.

“It is a fitting metaphor for Ebanks’ practice; since 2018, he has worked almost exclusively with repurposed materials and “trash” salvaged from Cayman’s shores,” she said.

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Immigration, Development, and the Question of Who Benefits

In this article, we move on to chapter five of Bodden's most recent work, **Deconstructing Development: Immigration, Society and Economy in Early 21st Century Cayman**. The chapter is entitled 'Immigration and the Population Explosion. Readers should know that this is a series which looks at the work of local intellectuals urging us to read their books and contribute to the conversation. Local scholars bring their lived experience, especially when they have lived their lives in the context of which they write. They bring cultural insight, and historical depth that are often absent from external analyses. Engaging with their work allows us to better understand our own society on its own terms and to participate more meaningfully in shaping its future.

This chapter offers a serious and, at times, unsettling examination of immigration and population growth in the Cayman Islands. At the heart of this chapter is the question posed by the author: *for whom is development really intended?*

The author begins by placing the issue in historical context, arguing that Cayman has been searching for a workable immigration policy since as far back as 1934. Over the decades, successive governments, he argues, have introduced new laws and reforms, each presented as a solution. Yet rather than resolving the issue, these efforts appear to have produced new problems what the author describes as "morbid symptoms", or troubling warning signs that something is fundamentally wrong. He identifies these symptoms as sham marriages, growing backlogs of permanent residency applications, and increasing pressure on the immigration system.

A key moment in this history is the introduction of the 1971 *Caymanian Protection Law*. Intended to safeguard Caymanians from being displaced by better-trained and more experienced newcomers, the law was, in the author's view, fundamentally flawed. It sought to protect Caymanians without adequately preparing them for participation in a rapidly changing economy. As a result, Bodden concludes, rather than empowering Caymanians, it contributed to a lingering perception that they were beneficiaries of protectionism rather than active competitors in the labour market. Later reforms in 1984, 1992, and 1997 raised hopes for meaningful change, especially following a major national review process. But political shifts and a lack of sustained commitment meant that many of the most important recommendations were never fully implemented.

The consequence, the author argues, is a system that has drifted rather than evolved. Immigration policy has become reactive rather than strategic, leaving the country with unresolved applications, an imbalanced work permit regime, and growing uncertainty about how to manage future popula-

tion pressures. This is main point that Bodden makes in this chapter.

But the chapter is not only about policy. It is also about the transformation of Caymanian society itself. One of its central themes is the emergence of ethnic minorities as a defining feature of modern Cayman. Where once the islands had relatively little demographic diversity, economic expansion, particularly since the late twentieth century, has brought a steady influx of workers from across the Caribbean, Latin America, Asia, Europe, and North America. Jamaicans, Filipinos, British nationals, Indians, and others now form significant parts of the population. The chapter gives the 2023 breakdown of this demographic.

This demographic shift, the author suggests, has created a new social reality, one that is not always comfortable. While some groups have integrated over time, others remain socially distinct, leading to a growing sense of fragmentation. For many established Caymanians, this is not simply a matter of diversity, but of displacement. There is a rising concern that Caymanians are becoming a minority in their own country, the author says, and with that comes anxiety about culture, identity, and control over the future of the islands.

What makes this particularly complex is that these concerns are not purely economic or demographic they are also deeply social and emotional. The chapter highlights how perceptions of difference, whether based on culture, behaviour, or nationality, are shaping attitudes toward immigrants. In some cases, these perceptions are leading to increasing intolerance and a widening divide between "Caymanians" and "others." Bodden does not suggest that this tension has yet reached the level of open conflict, but he warns that the trajectory is troubling. Interviews and surveys conducted for the study reveal widespread unease about access to land, housing, and employment.

Many respondents express concern that future generations of Caymanians may be unable to afford to live in the country at all. Others point to the scale of remittances leaving the islands, or to the perception that certain groups dominate key sectors of the labour market. Whether all of these concerns are fully supported by evidence is less important than the fact that they are increasingly felt. In the author's view, perception itself is becoming a powerful force, shaping public sentiment and potentially influencing future social and political outcomes.

Yet perhaps the most striking argument in the chapter is not about immigration alone, but about the model of development that underpins it. Please bear in mind that the title of the book is: **Deconstructing Development**. In this context, "*deconstructing development*" means stripping away the assumption that growth automatically benefits everyone. It involves examining whose interests are being served, who is being left behind, and what social costs are being ignored. It is, in essence, a call to rethink development not as 'something' that is always good, but as a process that must be judged by its outcomes.

The author makes the case that Cayman's rapid economic expansion particularly in tourism, finance, and real estate has not been structured in a way that benefits established Caymanians. Instead, he suggests that it has primarily served the interests of developers, foreign investors, and affluent expatriates. Each new hotel, condominium, or commercial project creates additional demand for labour that the local population cannot meet, leading to increased reliance on imported workers. This, in turn, fuels further immigration, more residency applications, and greater pressure on infrastructure and social systems.

The result is what the author describes as a kind of treadmill, one that is difficult, if not impossible, to step off. Growth generates more growth, but not necessarily in a way that is sustainable or equitable. At the same time, the social consequences of this model are becoming increasingly visible. Rising land prices, unaffordable housing, and widening income ine-

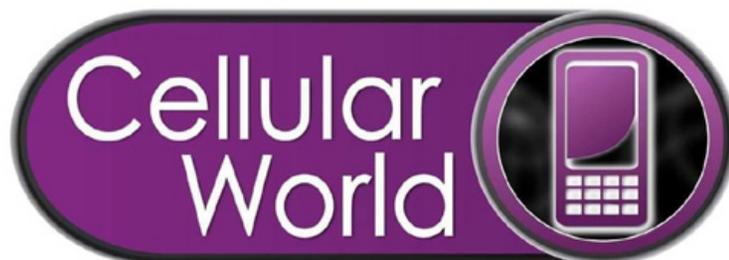
quality are placing strain on the fabric of society. The chapter paints a stark picture of contrast: affluent expatriates living in secure, gated communities, while others struggle with the realities of high living costs and limited opportunities. Bodden does not see this as merely economic disparity but as the emergence of a more segmented and unequal society.

Importantly, the author does not see this as inevitable. He contrasts Cayman's experience with that of Anguilla, which chose a slower and more controlled approach to development to avoid precisely these kinds of pressures.

This leads to one of the chapter's most critical observations which is that, according to Bodden, Cayman has never fully articulated a clear national development strategy. In the absence of such planning, he argues, Cayman has grown beyond the point where its own population can meet its labour demands. This has locked the country into a cycle of dependence on imported labour, a situation the author sees as both economically illogical and socially destabilizing. Ultimately, even though the chapter analyses immigration or population growth, it is really about the authors perspective on where the country is heading, its direction. This explains the questions it raise about identity, ownership, and the future of Caymanian society.

If development continues at its current pace, without a clear strategy or a deliberate effort to prioritize the interests of established Caymanians, the author suggests that the consequences could be significant. Cultural erosion, social fragmentation, and increasing inequality are not distant possibilities, they are already emerging realities.

The question, then, is not simply how to manage immigration, but how to rethink development itself, Bodden implies throughout the chapter. What does development mean? What are its forces? Should we not define it as we see fit? And perhaps the most important question of all remains the one the author posed decades ago—*for whom are we developing?* In the next article, we turn to chapter six, particularly sensitive and important question: "*Jamaicans in Cayman: Bane or Blessing?*"

Qualifications of Electors

90(1) Subject to section 91, a person shall be entitled to be registered as an elector in one electoral district only, but he or she shall not be entitled to be registered as an elector for elections to the Legislative Assembly unless—

- (a) he or she was, on the day immediately preceding the date of commencement of this Constitution, entitled to be registered as an elector; or
- (b) he or she –
- is a Caymanian; and
 - has attained the age of eighteen years; and
 - is resident in the Cayman Islands at the date of registration; and
 - has been resident in the Cayman Islands for a period or periods amounting to not less than two years out of the four years immediately preceding the date of registration;
- or
- (c) on the day of the issue of a writ ordering an election, he or she is otherwise qualified under paragraph (b) but has not attained the age of eighteen, but he or she will attain that age on or before the polling day at the election.

Disqualifications of Electors

91(1) A person shall not be entitled to be registered as an elector in any electoral district who—

- (a) subject to subsection (2) is serving a sentence of imprisonment (by whatever name called) exceeding twelve months imposed on him or her by a court in any country or substituted by competent authority for some other sentence imposed on him or her by such a court, or is under such a sentence of imprisonment the execution of which has been suspended;
- (b) is a person certified to be insane or otherwise adjudged to be of unsound mind under any law in force in the Cayman Islands; or
- (c) is disqualified for registration as an elector by any law in force in the Cayman Islands relating to offences connected with elections.
- (2) For the purposes of subsection (1)(a)—
- (a) where a person is serving two or more sentences of imprisonment that are required to be served consecutively he or she shall, throughout the whole time during which he or she so serves, be regarded as serving a sentence exceeding twelve months if (but not unless) any one of those sentences exceeds that term;
- (b) no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed as an alternative to or in default of the payment of a fine; and
- (c) no account shall be taken of a sentence of imprisonment imposed by a court outside the Cayman Islands other than a sentence on conviction of an offence constituted by conduct which, if it occurred within the Cayman Islands, would constitute an offence punishable under the law of the Cayman Islands by imprisonment of twelve months or any greater punishment.

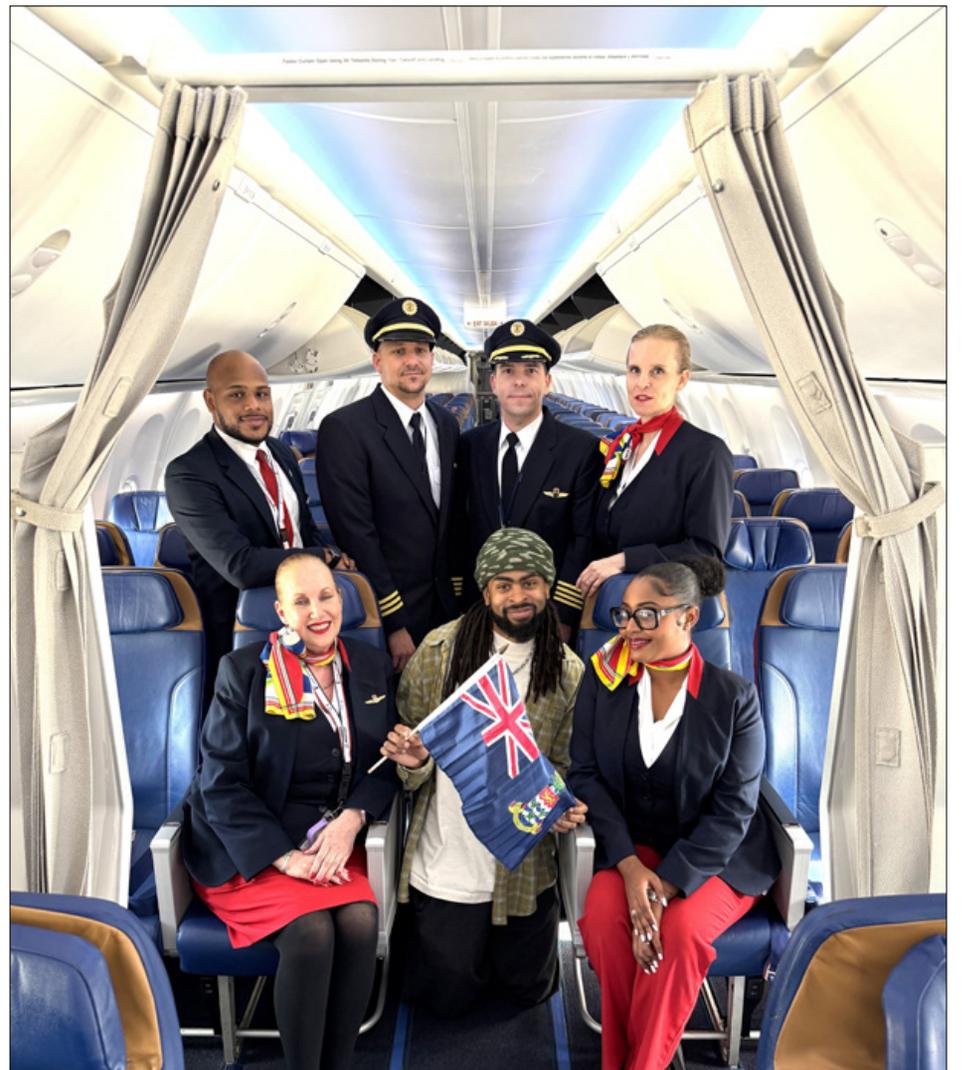

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Cabinet approves plans for Cayman's first designated National Park

Cabinet has approved a management plan for Hemmington Forest in Cayman Brac. The approved plan envisions that the protected area will be the Cayman Islands' first formally designated National Park. It introduces a comprehensive management framework for the Hemmington Forest National Park, designed to both protect its ecological value and thoughtfully enhance the experience for residents and visitors.

Spanning 194 acres of biodiverse dry forest and shrubland in west central Cayman Brac, Hemmington Forest is Crown land protected under the National Conservation Act. It is home to a rich array of native species, including the Sister Islands Rock Iguana, Red-legged Thrush, Cayman Brac Parrot, and the iconic Yellow Mastic tree.

Honourable Katherine Ebanks-Wilks, Minister for Health, Environment and Sustainability said: "The creation of the Hemmington Forest National Park marks a defining moment in the protection of our natural environment. This park represents a lasting commitment to safeguarding the landscapes, wildlife and quiet beauty that make Cayman Brac so special. It will stand

as a source of pride and a clear expression of our responsibility to protect and preserve the natural heritage of these islands for generations to come."

Department of Environment Director, Gina Ebanks-Petrie explained how the park embodies the purpose of the DoE. "The Department of Environment exists to safeguard our natural environment for the benefit of present and future generations, and to inspire others to do the same. Hemmington Forest not only provides a safe haven for our unique biodiversity, but as the management plan is implemented, it will offer many different experiences and spaces where nature and people can thrive together. As people visit and enjoy the park, it is our hope that they will be continually inspired."

Enhanced accessibility and visitor experience

A key objective of the National Park is to improve public access in a way that is both sensitive and sustainable.

The management plan proposes a series of improvements including upgrades to the traditional Hemmington Road trail,

and the creation of a new network of walking trails to provide greater public access to explore areas of outstanding beauty and interest throughout the park. Additional informational signage will also be installed across the park.

A new canopy-level observation tower is also outlined in the plan, aiming to give visitors a view over the forest with its tall Yellow Mastic trees that are characteristic of the area.

The park will remain freely accessible to the public and will be managed by the Department of Environment (DoE), working in partnership with the Department of District Administration and local community groups.

National Conservation Council Chair, Dr Ian Kirkham affirmed how Hemmington Forest offers managed access to Cayman Brac's unique natural environment. "The establishment of Hemmington Forest as Cayman's first National Park is a milestone to be celebrated. Cayman Brac is home to so many incredible species of animals and plants that do not exist anywhere else in the world, but it can be difficult to experience them with rugged terrain. The man-

agement plan for Hemmington Forest will bring people and nature together in the way a National Park should, using low-impact infrastructure to make the experience accessible without disturbing the true nature of the environment. The National Conservation Council looks forward to the next steps in advancing this new experience for Cayman Brac residents and visitors."

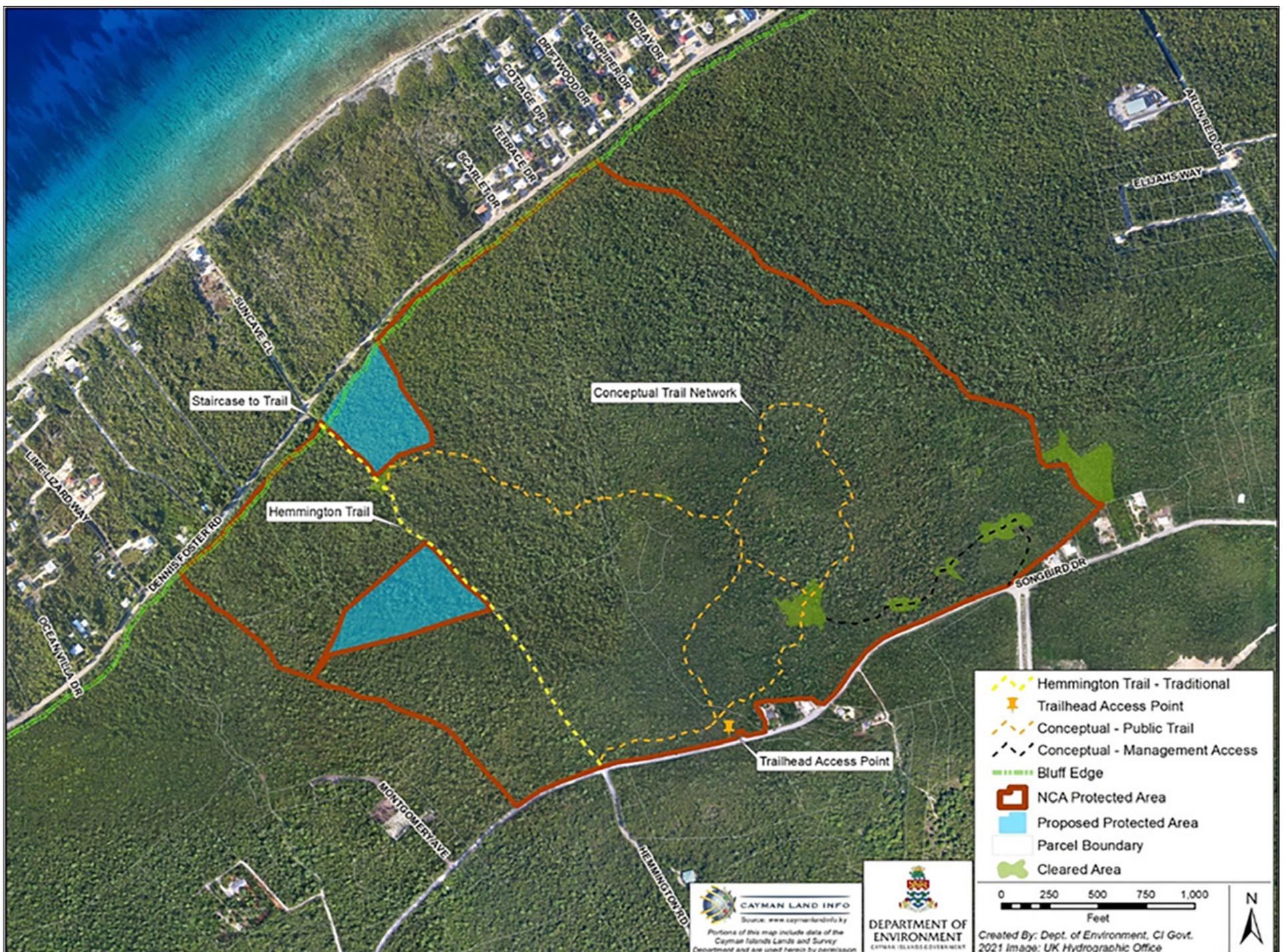
Natural Resource Management

As a formal and legally designated National Park, the management plan includes surveyance and monitoring of the physical environment, as well as administrative management.

Cayman Brac currently has the lowest proportion of protected land across the three Islands. The establishment of Hemmington Forest National Park represents a meaningful expansion of protected areas, and a notable portion of the Brac's unique forest and shrubland ecosystems.

O'Garro added: "With this decision by Cabinet to approve the management plan for Hemmington Forest as the Cayman Islands' first National Park, and to expand its public access and enjoyment facilities, active management of the park will include the control of invasive species, restoration of parrot nesting habitats, and the natural regeneration of previously disturbed areas – strengthening the resilience of this important landscape over time."

Next steps

The approved management plan will be overseen by the Department of Environment in collaboration with the Department of District Administration and with support from local community stakeholders in Cayman Brac.

Hemmington Forest National Park will stand as a lasting investment in Cayman Brac — protecting what makes the island unique, while opening it up for all to experience and enjoy.



URCO issues operating permit for Two Crew Quickstop service station in North Side

The Utility Regulation and Competition Office (URCO) is pleased to confirm that it has approved the issuance of a Fuel Operating Permit to KD Legacy Ltd., trading as Two Crew Quickstop, located at 1779 Old Man Bay, North Side, Grand Cayman.

This approval marks an important step toward restoring fuel service at the location formerly known as Jack's Esso 11, which had previously been closed for retail fuel supply since late 2023 due to safety issues. URCO welcomes the reopening of this essential service for the North Side community and thanks the new management for its work towards meeting the various compliance requirements.

Hon. Minister Jay Ebanks, Member for North Side, welcomed the reopening, stating: "I understood the reasons for

the original closure of this station due to serious safety issues being identified, and

the safety of North Side residents must always come first. I am now pleased that the new management has worked with the regulator to meet the required standards and restore this important service to the community."

Hon. Rolston Anglin, Minister responsible for URCO, said: "This is a positive outcome for the North Side community. I want to thank the new operators for their cooperation and commitment to meeting the required standards. This permit issuance reflects the importance of working collaboratively with regulators to restore services safely, responsibly, and in a way that builds public confidence."

Sonji Myles, Interim Chief Executive Officer of URCO, added: "URCO welcomes the reopening of this North Side service station and the restoration of an impor-

tant convenience for residents. Having been closed since late 2023, it was critical that all deficiencies were properly addressed before operations were allowed to resume. We appreciate the constructive engagement from the new operators and their responsiveness throughout the permitting process. Our fuels team will continue to work with the operator through the final pre-opening steps, including pump calibration, and we look forward to supporting ongoing compliance so the station can operate safely and reliably for the community."

URCO notes that the new operators are in the process of acquiring their fuel products. Once the Office is notified that this is done, a URCO Fuel Inspector will attend to test the station's pumps' calibration. Once proper calibration is confirmed, the green light to dispense fuel will be given.

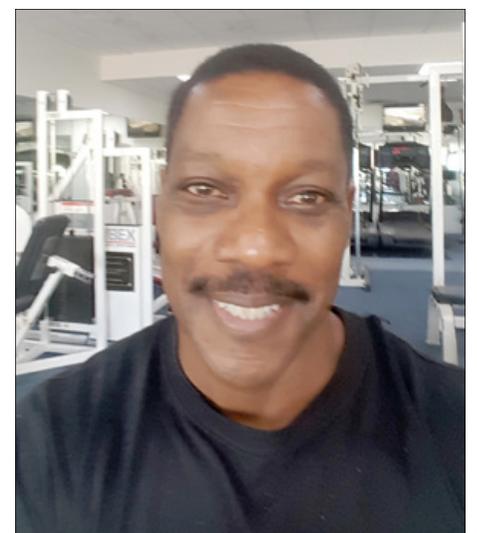

Islands. During the first series, held in November 2025, the Cayman Islands Men's National Team split its two matches — falling 2-1 to the British Virgin Islands before rebounding with a 4-0 victory over Anguilla.

That November window also provided important opportunities for squad development, including several senior national team debuts and valuable match minutes as the programme continues building toward regional competitions in 2026.

The March series will again bring together the four Group D teams in a compact schedule designed to provide competitive international fixtures during the FIFA window.

He also spoke about balancing academics with elite sport. "My school work is coming on good. I was studying Computer Science... my coach changed my major because of practice times to Human Development and Family Sciences... and I'm going back to Computer Science," he said.

Howell described the evening as a milestone for Caymanian athletes: "I think this event tonight is a great event in presenting opportunities to other Caymanian athletes... this is a big brand deal that they are investing in me... and how I can promote their brand. This is a big step forward in getting athletes endorsements."

Among those recognised was former Cayman Olympian Stefan Baraud, who supported Howell in his early years and was invited to stand and be acknowledged.

Hon. Michael Myles, Minister for Caymanian Employment & Immigration, also

It sounded like a street meeting, the kind that used to spring up on corners in the old days, so I got on my bicycle and followed the sound from the end of Powell Smith Drive toward the Ed Bush Stadium.

The music kept slipping away — swallowed by reggae and rap from passing cars, by the hum of Saturday evening life in West Bay. Still, I kept pedaling, chasing that little thread of praise until I turned a corner and found it again. The sound of joy. The sound of heaven's embrace. The sound of people gathering simply to praise the Lord.

At the entrance to the small community space beside the stadium sat a young woman at a little table with a cash box. Her name was Tasha, wearing a bright pink Circle of Love T shirt. When I asked if I could come in — and maybe get some prayer, because I felt a bit like a lost and lonely sheep — she didn't hesitate. "Come," she



said gently. "I'll take you to someone who can pray with you."

She led me inside and introduced me to her mother, Julie Hunter, now the MP for

West Bay West, but here simply as a woman of faith among her sisters. We stepped aside to hear each other over the music and clapping — faces lighting up as famil-

iar gospel favourites rolled out one after another.

Tasha explained the purpose of the evening: "I'm part of the Circle of Love Women's Ministries. We're a non profit, and we host different events for the community. Our biggest are the Annual Children's Breakfast in May for Child Month, and the Seniors Brunch in October. This concert is a fundraiser for the Children's Breakfast."

Circle of Love also reaches out to families in need all across the Cayman Islands, and also school backpacks for children, so of course, part of what they do is raising funds through events like this wonderful gospel concert. "We have 15 members, and we meet once a month at the George Town Yacht Club," Tasha said.

Their Children's Breakfast, usually held at the Mary Miller Hall in Red Bay, draws 300-400 children from across Grand Cayman and Cayman Brac. It's not just a meal — there's plenty of fun, prizes, encouragement, and joy. And of course, the sense of joining a great big family for a morning.

Inside, the music was already in full flight. A lady on stage lifted her hands and her voice: "Thank you Jesus for loving me this night... thank you for your grace and your mercy for all of us." These weren't international gospel stars — they were Cayman's own. The kind who sing in little churches, who give their time freely, who use God's gift humbly to lift the hearts of others.

Julie leaned over to tell me who they were: "We have Cranston Forbes & Friends... then Mr. Paul Roberts, Shaun Brown, Sister Sheryl... and Mr. Ebanks from the Boatswain Bay Church." Cranston Forbes, a respected Caymanian music educator and performer, anchored the evening with his musicianship, while each singer brought sincerity and soul.

They weren't performing. They were ministering.

On Saturday night, I stumbled into their circle by accident. But once inside, I felt embraced — by the music, by the community, and by the unconditional love that still moves quietly through Cayman like a song on the wind.
